a message from the president

Dear Friend of Cathedral High School,

I write this letter on a bitterly cold morning in Indianapolis. The mild temperatures of the late fall and early winter have passed and we are reminded, once again, that Cathedral is located in Indiana.

It's cold on the outside, but the energy of the school year will sustain us during the next few months. It has been a wonderful year so far, with many accomplishments on many fronts. I read the vision of the school each morning, and our pursuit of being "the model for all high schools as she (CHS) profoundly shapes the way (our) students think, serve and lead" is very real for me.

editor's note

It's a rare thing when weather shutters my hometown.

After all, we're a meager five miles from Minnesota. And it was the editor of my hometown's newspaper who first used 'blizzard' to mean dangerous winter snowstorm. Some dispute the origin, but Merriam-Webster gives us credit, noting that the word first appeared in that form in 1870 in the *Northern Vindicator*.

That said, the storm that took out the Metrodome a couple weeks back also closed the two roads that lead to and through my hometown. I knew it was bad when I called to check on my dad, and he mentioned the plows had been pulled off the roads.

That's upper-Midwest speak for, "It's pretty bad out."

Because the nature of a blizzard is that it's not really the snow that makes the storm so dangerous.

It's the wind.

Gusts of 35 or 40 mph whip what can be a relatively small amount of snow into a blinding shroud that impairs a person's ability to perceive reality.

North becomes South.

East becomes West.

White becomes black.

And only the lucky have anything that comes after that.

I couldn't help but think that it's a similar storm that at times blows into my world.

Life's hectic whirl can sometimes get me so focused on the tasks that clamor for my attention that I lose sight of what I believe I'm called here to do — offer a small bit of nurturing to the kids who fill these halls each day. And hopefully assist our amazing teachers and staffers, and the parents we partner with, in helping our young people see that God has unbelievably great things in mind for each of them.

A storm's treacherous complications offer a good reminder to me to grab a mental shovel and widen the path back to the things that matter.

I'm smiling now as I think of one young man in particular who has a spirit of caring so refined, it's a blessing just to watch him minister to others.

I'm thinking of another young man who has embraced a cause too great for one person to tame, yet he runs unfettered into the challenge almost daily.

And I'm thinking of the young woman who has yet to realize her potential, but whose heart holds the Lord's light. At times she lets it shine, but she's still struggling with trying to define herself by her own values and ideals. She'll get there. I don't doubt it for an instant. There's too much goodness in her that simply won't be denied.

Those momentary reflections remind me of what can be the beautiful part of a blizzard — the odd peace that comes *because* of the storm.

It's a peace that forces a silence we didn't know we needed. A silence that, if we're lucky, forces us to hear the Lord. Be still, He says. Know I am God. Be. Still. 🔊 \bigcirc

a message from the principal

Dear Alumni, Families and Friends,

As I write this, we are in Advent Season and are preparing for Christmas. Each year, during Advent and Lent, we offer a Reconciliation Service for our students so they have at least two opportunities for confession during the year. For those of us who are older, confession was an important part of our childhood if we were in Catholic schools. However, for today's teens, although reconciliation is a sacrament of the church and most have taken part in this a few times, for some, this is still a time of some discomfort and self-consciousness. In trying to help them overcome their fears, we offer reconciliation to our entire student body at least twice a year, thanks to the very generous assistance of many local priests. Additionally, Father Munshower will hear confession for any student or faculty and staff member who requests it.

Following Advent reconciliation, I sent an e-mail to each student, asking for a brief response about how this program was for them and for any suggestions to improve it for all. I was impressed with the insight of many of their responses. Let me include a few here:

• I think that the concept is great. It gives students who maybe don't go regularly a chance at confession. Personally, the only thing that I think I would change about the process is maybe having a couple private sections. It is a great thing what Cathedral has to offer to the students. I thank you.

• I thought reconciliation was great today. Honestly, I don't think there is any way to improve it. Listening to the music while sitting their contemplating your thoughts is nice and refreshing. It is a lift off your shoulders once you have gone through the sacrament. I think it was put on very well.

• I am not a religious person, but I am a deeply spiritual one. After going on se-

nior retreat, I feel more comfortable going to talk to a priest about things, and how to better (things) through God.

• I really enjoy having the services at school because it is very rare that I am able to attend them at my own parish. However, what has bothered me in the past and still did during this past Reconciliation, was the lack of privacy provided during the service. While I completely understand that there may be a lack of space for complete privacy, I have heard comments from students who report that they are hesitant to participate in the sacrament because of fear of being overheard or watched by others. (Still) I am very grateful for the opportunity Cathedral offers for Reconciliation.

I also heard from a parent who shared with me a bit of a conversation between her son and a friend on the way home from school.

• It was great to hear my son asking his friend how it went and how he felt. They both mentioned the "cleansing nature" of the experience and how great it was. Now granted it was not in holy terms and was just like casual conversation, but I was so grateful that my child is at a Catholic school in which this is part of the routine. He went, he enjoyed it, and he talked about it. Of course, not directly to me, but that is one of the pluses of driving your kids places. You get to hear things ... !"

Our students have given me some ideas for improvement.

In a world where teens are often negatively judged, I am continually impressed with the wonderful students we have at Cathedral! 🗞

the family as "Ioe Cookies." By 2005, Fulnecky, then just 9, took his skills on the road. competing in

State Fair Culinary Arts competition, knowing that winners got free tickets. Win he did, every year since he's entered his raspberry pie. He was named Grand Champion in 2007.

But this year, he wanted to try something new, so when word of the SPAM contest got to him, Fulnecky decided to go for it.

He was named the blue ribbon winner in the Kid Chef competition for his "Fiesta SPAM Casserole" recipe, shown at right.

FIESTA SPAM CASSEROLE Serves 4-6

1-2 tablespoons cooking oil 1 (12 oz.) can SPAM Hot & Spicy, chopped 1/2 cup onions, chopped 1 box macaroni and cheese, (squeeze cheese, not powder)

- 1 (15 oz) can black beans, drained 1/2 cup bell and jalapeno peppers, chopped
- 1 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1-2 cups any shredded cheese
- 1 1/2 cups crushed corn chips

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Place oil in pan; fry SPAM and onions until onions are transparent and SPAM is crisp. Drain on paper towel; set aside.

Boil 8 cups salted water; cook macaroni from box until al dente. Drain and add squeeze-cheese packet from box; mix. Add SPAM/onion mixture, beans, peppers, milk and cinnamon. Stir well.

Pour macaroni mixture into lightlygreased oven-safe pan. Top with cheese and corn chips. Bake 10-15 minutes or until cheese is melted.

Serve warm.

Two invited to be IU Wells Scholars

Two members of Cathedral High School's Class of 2011 have been invited to join the Wells Scholars Program at Indiana University Bloomington for the 2011-12 academic year.

John "Jay" Ruckelshaus, son of John and Mary Ruckelshaus and a member of St. Pius X Parish in Indianapolis, and Sarah TeKolste, daughter of H. Kim and Jeanne TeKolste and a member of St. Elizabeth Seton Parish in Carmel, were selected from more than 500 nominees from across the country, said Charlene Brown, with the Wells Scholars Program at IU.

"They are in extraordinary company," Brown said. "This is a highly generous, highly prestigious scholarship. We would be very pleased to have Jay and Sarah join us."

Brown said 57 nominees were considered as finalists, and those invited were selected from within that group.

Though Brown declined to say how many students are invited to join each year, she said the goal is to have a Wells class of about 18-22 students each year.

"We are so proud of Jay and Sarah," said David L. Worland, Cathedral principal. "They are illustrative of the values of hard work, perseverance, versatility and global-mindedness promoted not only here at Cathedral but within their families as well. They set great examples for all our Cathedral students. We're so pleased to call them Irish!"

Lynn Miller, college adviser at Cathedral, said Ruckelshaus and TeKolste are not only exemplary scholars but are heavily involved in all aspects of life in and out of school.

"Jay was co-captain of the boys' cross country team, is a member of the Indianapolis Rowing Center team, has impeccable character and values, and can fit in with any group of students," she said.

"And Sarah has a passion for the theater and for languages. She has had many roles on stage and behind the scenes in Cathedral's highly-regarded theater department, and has studied abroad. Her leadership, organizational skills and creativity are inspirational."

Surgeon inspires Cathedral

In 1987, Dr. Ben Carson made medical history with an operation to separate a pair of Siamese twins. A 70-member surgical team, led by Carson, worked for 22 hours on the successful surgery. The twins were separated and can now survive independently.

The path to that historic moment was anything but easy. After his parents' divorce, Carson fell behind in school and developed an anger that threatened his future.

But thanks to his mom, Carson got back on track. He graduated with honors from high school, went on to Yale, the University of Michigan Medical School and then Johns Hopkins Hospital, where ultimately, he became the hospital's director of pediatric neurosurgery. In 2008, Carson received the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Carson has written a memoir, "Gifted Hands," and a motivational book, "Think Big," and he and his wife have established the Carson Scholars Fund.

The foundation has awarded 4,300 college scholarships since it began in 1994. স্টেন্

is nothing about Matt Renie that hints white tights and a gold lame vest sit in his dresser drawer at home.

In his khaki school uniform pants and ubiquitous college sweatshirt which Cathedral seniors cling to like Linus to his blanket, Renie is remarkably inconspicuous.

He is not, however, unknown.

Follow Renie from even one class to another and a nearly tangible aura surrounds the quietly confident young man who has become a somewhat reluctant hero.

Because at school assemblies, athletic contests, pep rallies, even at the fall open house, when the telltale drumbeats of Cathedral's

school song sound and a crowd comes to its feet, Renie is in the heart of the action.

Gone is the student garb.

In its place, a custom-made, short-panted green suit complete with navy-striped silk tie, white button-down shirt, white tights, gold lame vest and green felt tophat with a jaunty gold-buckle perched above the brim.

Exit Matt Renie.

Enter Cathedral's latest adaptation of her long-storied leprechaun.

"It's crazy," Renie said, when asked to consider his role as mascot. "I thought it would catch on, but not this quickly. I'll be talking with one of my peer mentees (a freshman student) and she'll tell a friend, 'This is the leprechaun.' And the friend will be like, 'Oh my God, that's the leprechaun?' — it's crazy."

To get a glimpse at just how 'crazy' it's become, consider this: When Renie and his core compatriots declared the Class 4A state championship football game against Ft. Wayne Dwenger to be a "green out," the several thousand Irish fans who came out that afternoon were only too happy to oblige.

Perhaps the only thing quirkier than the speed at which leprechaun love took hold is the way that it was brought back to life to begin with.

Renie's freshman and sophomore years seemed to him to have an acceptable level of spirit.

But last year, he said, "Things slipped."

"I felt like there was no unity between the classes, especially during spirit stick week," said Renie, senior class president. "I felt the classes were really divided so I thought, 'What could be recognizable?' and 'What would they follow?'"

That examination and a trip to a really great seamstress (who, Renie adds, is the mother of a Bishop Chatard student) coupled to create the re-birth of the leprechaun.

It's not the senior year Renie imagined.

The graduating from Cathe-

dral part was never in question. After all, it's become a bit of a family tradition and alums include his grandparents, Dorothy 'Dot', SMA '52, and Jack Ryan, '52, and his parents, Colleen, LSA, '75 and Joe Renie, '75, along with a host of siblings.

"Being the last in a line of about 30 people in my family to attend Cathedral, I think my parents would have made me sleep outside if I even considered going anywhere else," Renie joked. "But if you had stopped me four years ago ... and said to me, 'You'll be the senior speaking at Open House night,' I would've laughed and said, 'No, you've got the wrong guy."

Quiet, painfully shy, the student who was in his own words "afraid of his own shadow," Renie assumed he'd enjoy his high school experience, but not end up

"And every single time I ask myself that, the only reason I can come up with is it's because of walking up and down the halls of my favorite place in the whole world for the last three-and-a-half years."

The suit, Renie said, is a symbol of "exactly what Cathedral does in so many students' lives every single year."

"It says I'm being taught and I work alongside

some of the best teachers and students in the state. It says there are no limits to how much you can grow as a student, and more importantly, how much you can grow as a person.

"It says there are no limits to what you can make of yourself."

Tom Greer, Cathedral's vice principal for student affairs agrees that Renie took advantage of the opportunities offered him.

But he said there's a lot more than just advantageous timing instincts going on underneath that green and gold.

"He took a risk," Greer said.

"He has a love and respect for

those around him, for tradition, and for those who have come before him. But he had a belief that we can all get better."

So Greer said Renie did what great leaders do: Made himself vulnerable and walked his talk.

"Since I have been here (22 years) I can think of only three or four students who ... can lead an entire student body. Very few like Matt come along."

Rick Streiff, head football coach agreed.

Having spent 16 years on Cathedral's sidelines and in her classrooms, Streiff said "There has not been this kind of school spirit created by one person in a very long time."

Renie is quick to deflect the words of praise.

"I think I'm given a little too much credit for whatever changes have come. This is definitely not a oneman show," he said. "I have an army. Our (class) officers are fantastic.

"A lot of what has taken place is because of the love my classmates have for Cathedral."

It's a love that for many, Renie said, will stay with them forever.

"Cathedral has taught us that if you have a dream, you can achieve it. Nobody here lets you take the easy road, but they do help you step up and grow," he said. "We treasure the love we get — we'll cherish it for the rest of our lives."

Building a foundation

The rebuilding began.

And though the process was far from easy, Jim Nohl, '78 said the first steps were clearly made for the Irish boys cross-country team.

The team's finishes may not have been as strong as hoped.

But progress was made, and a foundation was laid for what could be a successful future, said coach Nohl.

"If we can keep what we've got going, we should be good next year," Nohl said. "It's a matter of going forward and not dwelling on what we've done."

With Hale O'Herren and J.R. Ricker, the core of the team the

past four seasons, graduated, Nohl said a group of freshmen and sophomores became the program's foundation.

"There was a little bit of an unknown," Nohl said. "Basically for cross-country, a lot depends on who runs in the summer to get ready. It took more during the year than I anticipated to get people to step up. So far, it turns out we have more freshmen and sophomores who are leaders and stepping up to be those types of runners.

"We've got a nucleus of good runners," he said. "It's just a matter of time now to build up some higher mileage."

That, Nohl said, is the sort of approach needed for the Irish

to make a post-season push. The program annually competes in one of the state's toughest sectionals, regionals and semistates.

"The top five in our regional — eventually, four out of those five finished in the top five in the state," Nohl said.

The underclassmen are talented enough to be successful at that level, he said. Thus far, they have shown the commitment needed, too.

"They're putting in 45 miles a week," Nohl said. "There's a core group of about 10 runners.

"They show up every day no matter what the weather is and say, 'What do you want us to run?' Then, off they go. That's what you want." 🗞

Bright future

For the Cathedral High School girls cross-country team, the 2010 season wasn't as much about the present as the future.

And coach Mark Doctor said it's a bright one.

The Irish had youth this past season. And they had talent.

"They've been showing up, doing what they need to, and hopefully ... will keep going." ♥ᢒ

Irish win third state title in last five seasons

n paper, it will be recorded that the Irish played and won their eighth state football championship on Nov. 27, 2010.

But Rick Streiff, who this season completed his 16th year as the coach of the Irish, said that only tells part of the story.

Streiff, who has coached the Irish to six state titles — two in just the last three seasons — said in a very real sense this year's title began months before.

"We have a group of kids who decided last spring that they were really going to get better," he said.

"They were going to get themselves over the hump. Obviously, everybody says, 'We're going to do this. We're going to do that.' But they worked and they were successful in fulfilling their goal."

The Irish (12-3), who finished the season ranked No. 6 in the Associated Press poll and No. 7 in the coaches poll, not only became just the fifth school in Indiana with eight or more state football titles, they rolled through the playoffs in dominating fashion.

The Irish beat Broad Ripple

(53-6), Northwest (78-14) and Roncalli (48-7) to win their fifth consecutive sectional title, then beat Pendleton Heights, 56-24, to win a fifth regional in as many years.

They followed that with a 56-28 semistate victory over Evansville Reitz, the team that eliminated Cathedral from the postseason in 2007 and 2009.

"Getting over the hump against Reitz was big," Streiff said. "They were a very scary football team. Offensively, I thought we could score. But you thought, 'Is this going to be a 75-74 shootout?' We just didn't know if we could stop them. Defensively, I thought we played exceptionally well.

"You say, 'Coach, you gave up 28 points.' No, we played

some really good defense against those guys. We made stops when we had to make stops and the offense was phenomenal."

The Irish, who won the 2008 state title — Streiff's first season back at the helm of the team — with a defensive-oriented team, won with a decided offensive feel this season. That ability to change styles, Streiff said, largely can be attributed to "a great coaching staff."

"In 2008, we won a state championship pretty much on defense," Streiff said. "This year, we had a great quarterback. We had four or five kids who could catch the football. We had an offensive line that could protect. We found two sophomore running backs who kept people honest.

"We did what we needed to do on defense to win the games. That's the sign of a really good coaching staff: 'Here's what you've got; let's make the most of it."

And though the Irish were dominant in the state playoffs, Streiff said the season wasn't without its trials.

As has been the case in many recent seasons, Cathedral played



one of the state's most difficult schedules, and Streiff said there was disappointment among players following early-season losses to Class 5A Carmel, East St. Louis (later forfeited into a Cathedral victory) and Cincinnati St. Xavier that left Cathedral 0-3.

"We knew we were pretty good," Streiff said. "The question was, 'Could the kids hang on and stay mentally tough enough to fight the fight? They did.

"We were at a crux where we said, 'OK, we're either going to be

really good or we're really going to not be very good and we're going to be dis-

appointed.' But you just don't know.

"We knew we were too close not to be better than we were."

Quarterback Connor Barthel capped a standout senior season by completing 23 of 34 passes for 335 yards and two touchdowns in the title-game victory over Dwenger, and senior Reece Horn caught six passes for 122 yards and a touchdown. Barthel fin-

ished the season completing 235 of 361 for 3,532 yards and 35 touchdowns and Horn caught 83 passes for 1,419 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Alec Bitar also caught 14 touch-

down passes for the Irish this season.

Seniors Ted Karras and Stephen Clark anchored a solid offensive line, and Schuyler Montefalco and Kyle Kennedy — who overcame injuries as a senior — helped anchor the linebacking corps. Also key Streiff said, were defensive linemen David Shepard and defensive back Ian Cureton, who played

"the game of his life" in the title game.

Fullback/tight end Pat Jones also played a critical role, Streiff said.

"We had some seniors who took it on their shoulders that they were going to self-sacrifice and make themselves better," Streiff said. "Those kids were just phenomenal. You win the first one (state title) and it's for you because of the old coaching ego. The other times it's for those kids who have made that commitment.

"They talked about finishing. I'm not sure we necessarily had a motto of 'Finish,' but the kids know. These senior kids just stepped up to the plate and decided, 'We're going to be the guys that people are going to be remember.' They fulfilled that."

Tough times yield good results

Many people expected success from the members of the Cathedral girls golf team, their coach included.

The Irish, ranked No. 9 in the Indiana High School Golf Coaches Association preseason poll, overcame a difficult regular season — one that featured an illness to one top player and an injury to another — to rally in dramatic fashion to finish among the state's top 10 teams.

"It was an unusual season in a way," said coach Joe Vollmer, '66. "It was fun."

The Irish struggled early, slipping from the rankings due to injuries and illness.

"There's such a short season that there isn't a lot of recovery time," Vollmer said.

The Irish, after winning the sectional, finished third in the regional, and that got them to the state tournament for a fourth consecutive season.

Few expected much from the Irish there, Vollmer said.

The exceptions were the Irish themselves. With everyone healthy, the Irish took advantage of one of their few good weekends of golf of the season.

The Irish were right, and many observers were wrong.

The team's five golfers — junior Molly Ward (81), junior Christie Cates (83), senior Christine White (87), freshman Karli LaGrotte (89) and junior Katherine Hale (103) — combined to shoot a first-round 340 to make the cut. They finished eighth at the tournament, with LaGrotte medaling for her performance.

Vollmer said while Katie Vanderbosch did not play at the state tournament, she was critical throughout the season.

It was their best finish at state since finishing seventh in 2007.

"We only played two rounds of golf the entire season with our starting five healthy and intact," Vollmer said. "It was at the state finals. I'm sure it was a surprise to a lot of teams that we finished as high as we did.

'That was a real thrill."

The season, Vollmer said, "ended up being pretty satisfying. We didn't know if we were going to get the opportunity to show what we could do healthy. Fortunately, we did." ^{*}

Fun run

Runner-up status not a bad way to end a season

One more game. A state title was the goal. But considering whom the Irish beat to get to the Indiana High School Athletic Association state soccer championship game, a runner-up finish was no cause for disappointment.

"It was a great run," said coach Paul Schroeder.

How good? After a 12-3-1 regular season, the Irish finished

No. 6 in the final Indiana Soccer Coaches Association rankings, then faced one of the toughest roads to the State Finals possible — they needed to beat ranked teams, two of which had beaten them during the regular season.

The Irish first won the Heritage Christian sectional, then faced regional tournament competition. Cathedral overcame an early one-goal deficit to beat Noblesville, 2-1, then beat Carmel, 2-0, in the regional championship to advance to the semistate round.

The Irish beat Avon, 2-1, on penalty kicks in the semifinal round of the semistate, then scored a relatively comfortable 2-0 victory over Pike to win the semistate and advance to state for the first time in six years and the third time in program history. "It was just kind of different this year," Schroeder said. "There were eight or 10 teams that were really good enough. It was, 'Who could put a run together from Central Indiana?' We were going to have to win five games. We were good enough to beat them, but by no means did we go in saying, 'We expect to win this.' We knew it could go either way. It just kind of worked out that we strung five together."

The Irish beat No. 7 Warsaw 2-0 in the semifinal, but lost in the championship game, 2-0, to Lake Central.

"It was a great season. I tried to remind the guys of that. I told them there were a lot of teams that would like to trade places. It was a great experience." ²⁶号

Three in four

Girls soccer seniors leave with three final four appearances in four seasons

As Irish girls soccer coach Marc Behringer sees it, his senior class is perhaps the most important story surrounding the program this season.

They entered four years ago with the program on the verge of joining the state's elite.

They leave with the program

firmly entrenched there.

"The team in the last six years now has been at that level," Behringer said. "Four years ago, we actually broke through, and since then, it has been — I don't want to say 'expected' — but it has been a simple goal for us.

"The girls really set their sites all the way at the top. That helps the program."

He was quick to note that one match didn't ruin the season, or

"That's beyond anything any other group (at Cathedral) had done," Behringer said.

It may not be fair to say the Cathedral Irish came back this season.

That's because in reality, girls volleyball was never really far from being one of the state's elite teams.

But a year ago, the Irish missed winning a sectional title for the first time since 1998, and early in the 2010 season, Irish coach Jean Kesterson said there were rough times.

By season's end, the Irish were sectional champions — and oh-so-close to perhaps much more. So, yes, Kesterson said in a sense, the Irish are back.

But she said what was most important about this season was the Irish made strides. They grew.

we started to where we finished.

"These kids did grow a lot. They came together, and they started to believe in themselves and in their team.

"We were just a play or two away from beating Muncie Central and being in the state final."

Those words might have seemed farfetched early in the season.

The Irish, who won six state titles from 1997 to 2008, began the season close to .500 and slipped to 7-5 with a loss at Bishop Chatard.

The match was a turning point.

And what really changed the season, she said, was a meeting at which Kesterson said the team discussed an altered attitude, a new approach. The Irish had to start playing for the present.

And they did just that.

"They finally started believing in

each other and letting things go," Kesterson said. "It was kind of a fun ride. When we went down to the bottom of the bottom, after we lost to Chatard at their place, there was a 'Come to Jesus' meeting. We had to tell the kids, 'Let it go. Things are going to get better.'

"They kept getting a little more confidence. And that made a huge difference."

The Irish advanced to the regional semifinal, losing to eventual state runner-up Muncie Central.

"It was, 'Never quit — don't quit on your teammates, believe in yourself," Kesterson said. "We kept talking about, 'Live in the moment. Play in the moment. Good things will happen. If you work hard and you believe in yourself and your teammates, good things will happen."

Alumna blessed to be 'Bride of Christ'

Have you ever wondered what God's plans are for your life? As the oldest of five, I grew up taking care of younger ones at home, in the neighborhood and at church. I found my passion for teaching in helping with parish religious education. In my mind, I had my life planned out; go to college, get a degree, a job, get married and have a family.

God had other plans.

My family and I went to Mass every Sunday, and sometimes prayed the rosary on long trips. When I was little, my parents prayed with me every night before bed. I knew my faith was an important part of my life. My sixth-grade teacher was Sister Mara, a Sister of Notre Dame. She told us that sisters were "Brides of Christ" and wear wedding bands to symbolize they are married to Jesus. I thought that was pretty neat but still thought one day I'd be married and have my own family.

Here at Cathedral, I had an opportunity to explore my faith life a little more, with teachers like Jim Obergfell. I remember learning "life skills and knowledge" in his class through books, articles, movies and discussions. Mr. Obergfell had us choose someone we thought was influential to us. We were to read a book and write a paper about them. I chose Mother Teresa of Calcutta. Looking back now I smile! She died my freshman year and I didn't know much





about her, but she intrigued me.

While studying at Purdue, I was a member of St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic Church, taught religious education and joined Purdue Catholic Students. During a retreat, I was matched with a "prayer buddy" and was shocked and surprised when he said he was thinking about becoming a priest. That's when I thought, "Wow! People my age are thinking about these things. I wonder if God is calling me?" I talked to a few friends and put it in the back of my mind.

After graduating, I began teaching at Our Lady of Mount Carmel School. The presence of the Dominican Sisters of St. Cecilia awakened an excitement in me about religious life. The sisters radiated joy, and the habits they wore were beautiful. As I began spending more time praying in the Adoration Chapel, I realized God was calling me to

I began to be more involved with the Frassati Society and met other young adults considering religious vocations.

I thought I knew God's plan, then discovered a medical condition that would be an obstacle with certain communities. I wondered what God was doing in my life.

Still, I visited the Sisters of St. Francis of Perpetual Adoration in Mishawaka, Ind., in '08. I felt comfortable but didn't know if I would fit in.

I skipped a vacation in 2009 to visit the Sisters again, and God showered me with peace and joy. I saw that the daily schedule was not easy but something I could handle. It felt like the pieces just clicked.

I entered as a Postulant with The Sisters of Perpetual Adoration on Sept. 6. My family brought me to the convent on, Sept. 5, the death anniversary of Blessed Teresa of Calcutta. I believe God heard my prayers and Blessed Teresa of Calcutta helped me.

God had been preparing me through teaching, Eucharistic Adoration, living in a big family, and the drive up the hill reminded me of my days at Cathedral. I knew this was "home." 🔊
