LHS Athletic Hall of Fame Inducting Three Members

The Lemont High School Athletic Hall of Fame will induct three LHS alumnus on Sunday, September 30, at Cog Hill Golf Club in Lemont. The honorees are Kevin Earnest, Anthony Jordan, and Suzette (Lesnieski) Sniegowski.

Kevin Earnest, '02 graduate, was a four-year varsity soccer letterman who helped Lemont to a 63-15-6 record from 1998-2001. He earned a scholarship to play men's soccer at Northwestern University and was an Honorable Mention selection to Northwestern's "Team of the Decade" in the 2000's. Earnest also played in the 2004 Big Ten Championship Game and helped Northwestern to its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance in 2004.

Anthony Jordan, '91 graduate, is one of the top amateur bowlers in the state. He is an accomplished member of the United States Bowling Congress. He was the only amateur among the top 24 finishers at the 2010 U.S. Open. He also won the Bradley Open in Lexington, Kentucky in 2010, was the Illinois State All-Events Champion in both 2003 and 2005, and is a five-time Boot Hill Champion. Jordan was a member of the five-man Fox Bowl squad that won the Team All-Events title at the 2008 USBC Open Championship in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Suzette (Lesnieski) Sniegowski, '76 graduate, was the girls' track and field team MVP as a senior in 1976 and won the Northeast Conference title in the high jump her senior year. She won the district title in the long jump in 1975 and she also finished as the Northeast Conference runner-up in the long jump as a sophomore and senior. Sniegowski was a member of the Northeast Conference 440 Relay championship squad in 1974. She was also a four-year member of the cheerleading squad, serving as team captain her senior year and she participated in the uneven bars as a gymnast.

The ceremony will take place on September 30 at noon. LHS School & Community Relations Director, Tony Hamilton, says, "Lunch will be served at 1 p.m., with the induction ceremony beginning at approximately 1:45 p.m."

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I Am SHERlocked



Everyone knows Holmes - the super-sleuth of the 1800's. Sherlock Holmes has become a household name for famous detectives, but not many people know of the modern-day renditions of the classic stories of Holmes, the British Broadcasting Corporation's show *Sherlock*.

Sherlock takes place in 2010 London, where army doctor John Watson, played by Martin Freeman (*Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy*), becomes flat-mates with detective Sherlock Holmes, played by Benedict Cumberbatch (*Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy*). The NFL season is underway, in both the real world and the ever-growing fantasy world. Fantasy football has become a major market for NFL fans of all kinds, from the never-miss-a-gamers to the casual fan.

Fantasy football is now a legitimate business. According to a May 2012 report from Northwestern University's Medill school, fantasy football is over a \$1 billion dollar a year industry, with about 32 million people playing in the United States and Canada. And just about every major fantasy website, such as Yahoo! and ESPN.com, has numerous analysts and writers that report and give advice solely on fantasy football.

What makes it so popular? Well, it is generally easy to play, free in most cases and allows fans to be involved in the game and be in charge of their own team, without the consequences of the real world. With that said, here are some of the biggest storylines from the first two weeks.

Redskins rookie quarterback Robert Griffin III was outstanding through the first two games, leading most standard leagues in points with over 500 passing yards, 100 rushing yards and 5 total touchdowns, while throwing only one interception. Meanwhile, some of the usual top quarterbacks, including Aaron Rodgers, Tom Brady and Matthew Stafford, haven't been scoring as much as previous years.

As expected, Ray Rice and Arian Foster have been by far the top two running backs, but many rookies and previously average running backs have turned into very productive fantasy players. Rookie Trent Richardson, started off slow in Week 1, but exploded for a monster game in Week 2, while another rookie, Doug Martin has been solid both of the first two weeks.

CJ Spiller of the Bills has been unstoppable in two games since taking over for injured starter Fred Jackson, averaging over 10 yards per carry and scoring three touchdowns. Meanwhile, one time 2,000 yard rusher, Chris Johnson, struggled to even get 20 yards through the first two games. Receivers have not changed dramatically from last year, although the Broncos'

Demaryius Thomas was the highest scoring receiver through Week 2, and as he had a fairly good season with Tim Tebow at quarterback last year, his numbers should stay among the best with Peyton Manning throwing to him this year. Danny Amendola of the Rams has also been very good, and had 15 receptions, 160 yards and a touchdown in Week 2.

At tight end, the usual top players have all been good, but Aaron Hernandez of the Patriots was injured in Week 2 and is expected to miss about month. The Ravens' Dennis Pitta and the Giants' Martellus Bennet have been breakout players early on.

Bears' Offensive Line Still Struggles After 23-10 Loss to the Packers

One of the most historic rivalries in all of football was revived on a national stage Thursday, Sept. 13 between the Chicago Bears and Green Bay Packers.

Green Bay and a monstrous defense were able to take advantage of a weak offensive line that struggled to keep Jay Cutler on his feet.

Cutler was sacked seven times, threw four interceptions and only had one touchdown Thursday night.

Cutler was seen walking off the field after a possession yelling at left tackle J'Marcus Webb for missing numerous blocking assignments, leading to Cutler getting blindsided.

On Friday, Webb posted a Facebook status about Thursday's loss, writing, "There is nothing like having a bad game, but when you have it, you have to deal with it correctly. It's not how one deals with a win. How does one deal with a loss or bad game? I'm no different than you. Time to prepare. Go Bears!"

On the other hand, Green Bay was able to bounce back from their Week 1 loss to the San Francisco 49ers, and pulled out all their tricks in Week 2.

In the second quarter, the Packers lined up to kick a field goal but instead ran a trick play where punter Tim Masthay took the snap and flipped the ball to back up tight end Tom Crabtree, who wound up taking the ball into the end zone for the first points of the game.

After a rare play call, Chicago got the ball back and the Packers defense stepped up as Tramon Williams picked off Cutler and gave the ball back to Aaron Rodgers and the explosive offense to drive and have one more shot to score before halftime.

Rodgers and the offense drove the field and gave kicker Mason Crosby a chance to kick a 35-yard field goal that put the Packers up 13-0 at halftime.

Green Bay is not known for their defensive play but Thursday night they looked solid and reminded some fans of the defense they had back a couple of years ago when they won the Super Bowl.

Cutler being on the ground seems to be a reoccurring problem for the Bears front seven. Even in the week one victory against the Indianapolis Colts Cutler was sacked three times.

A change was made to the Bears offensive line but it was made a left guard instead of left tackle. Chris Spencer was benched and Chilo Rachal will now have a chance to show his talents at the left guard position.

The Bears for week three have a home game versus the St. Louis Rams and many worried fans are hoping the offense is able to turn things around and have the offensive line problems worked out.

Week three has come and gone and the Bears came out victorious with a 23-6 win against the Rams.

Cutler was only sacked twice during the game Sunday an improvement from the last outing against the Packers.

Cutler in an interview with ESPN Chicago said the most important thing was "we won the game". "Offensively, there are some things we can get better, but the idea is to win".

Major Wright and the defensive came up big in the victory sacking Sam Bradford six times.

Wright had a 45 yard interception for a touchdown that sealed the deal for the Bears.

Chicago will travel to Dallas and play the Cowboys on Monday, Oct. 1 and look to continue their winning ways.
