From the

President's Desk

Catholic social teaching calls us to reflect God's love to others. In his Encyclical Letter Spe Salve on November 30, 2007, Pope Benedict XVI called this "hope into action" and wrote, "Our lives are involved with one another, through innumerable interactions they are linked together. No one lives alone. No one sins alone. No one is saved alone. The lives of others continually spill over into mine: in what I think, say, do and achieve. Class of 2011

Keep your eyes and ears open to where the Holy Spirit is guiding you to serve as you make your way along the journey.

I am leading a multi-year "Fit for Purpose" transformation at the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC), a global humanitarian organization dedicated to helping people forced to flee. Currently, NRC has field operations in over 30 conflict-zone countries where they support emergency relief, such as food, water, and shelter, as well as longterm support, including education, health services, and legal support. In this role, I report to the Deputy Secretary-General and regularly present to the Board of Directors and senior executive team. The Fit for Purpose effort comprises a team of 40 global managers designing and implementing coordinated improvements to organization design, decision rights, and accountability mechanisms in order to improve efficiency and effectiveness of humanitarian response. I am still affiliated with Boston Consulting Group, as a consultant, but am currently seconded to NRC.

My Catholic faith instilled in me a firmly-held belief in universal human dignity, social justice, and the equality of all people in the eyes of God. Sometimes I ask myself, if a girl in Mali cannot afford to go to school, why should I get to go to school? If a family in Yemen cannot live in safety, why should I get to live in safety? Of course, the question is a bit extreme when phrased that way, but nevertheless this line of thinking has been an important reminder to me that I did nothing to earn the blessings and privilege into which I was born. Rather, Jesus said, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be expected." This message has always struck a chord with me, and I find it continually challenges me to remember that

the gifts I have been given are not so much mine to expend as I see fit, as they are God's to work through me in service of the kingdom and for the betterment of the world.

The Lasallian tradition at Totino-Grace further rooted my understanding that faith and service cannot be separated. At a pivotal time in adolescence when many teenagers turn away from religion because they feel suffocated by its hierarchies, rules, and traditions, I was drawn deeper into the faith by what I observed to be a Lasallian bias toward humility, compassion, and faith in action that permeated the culture at TG. I will never forget an extracurricular meeting during my freshman year when, in response to a question posed to a group of 200 students on "What does it mean to be a leader?," a senior student council member stood up first and gave a simple but powerful answer: "I think to be a leader is to be a servant." Students nodded all around the room in agreement.

The service-focused culture at TG provided me with countless volunteering opportunities, including mission trips to Guatemala and the South Side of Chicago, tutoring English-as-a-Second-Language for kindergartners at a local elementary school, and working with Central American immigrant families as part of my senior capstone for the Kathleen Murphy Scholars Program. I continued this type of work into college, working on development projects in Bolivia, Singapore, Thailand, and Rwanda for several months each, as well as fulfilling a lifelong dream of mine to volunteer alongside the



Missionaries of Charity sisters in Kolkata, India. It was there, following Mother Teresa's footsteps supporting the "poorest of the poor," that my understanding of what it means to serve grew tremendously. Whereas my business education asked me to serve others in terms of a quantifiable impact or return on investment, my faith challenged me to serve for the sake of love and human dignity alone, even in seemingly hopeless situations. This experience reopened my eyes to the field of humanitarian work, which I had come to regard as somewhat of a fluffy and fruitless endeavor relative to the development sector, as an area where I increasingly felt called to serve.

I've heard it said that one's purpose in life is where your passions and talents intersect to meet a need in the world. I have been passionate about global affairs for as long as I can remember, fueling my curiosity via self-study of geography, languages. and cultures. In school, I was naturally good at solving word problems and communicating persuasively, and I embraced these strengths as I chose to pursue a business management degree. Building off these passions and talents, I began my career as a global business consultant, and from this position, I have started working within the humanitarian sector where I feel God is calling me to serve. My current role leading organizational development efforts at the Norwegian Refugee Council exemplifies this intersection point where I am able to leverage my gifts to serve a bigger purpose in the world, and I hope this is just the start of my lifelong mission-driven career.

Rick Campion

Class of 1986

We're called to radical action.

Use the place you are and the work you do to serve others in a beyond-the-normal way.



As a maybe immature high schooler, I wasn't thinking about my career path; however, I did recognize my privilege in education. My parents supported all of my siblings through Catholic schools, first at St. Raphael and then Totino-Grace. Even as a kid, we had some awareness that they were choosing a better school option for us than the one that would have been available for free.

My mom used to receive a newsletter about an orphanage in New York City when I was a kid, and I would read every one of them from cover to cover. I felt drawn to education my entire life and to working for kids whose opportunities are limited. I have found the life of Saint John Baptist de La Salle to be a strong pull and a model for living out our call to act. My faith taught me to understand that we're all connected. When someone is suffering, it is not only sad, it diminishes me, and I am called to act. I valued my education, and I wanted to start a school where all students had access to a high quality education.

My career has included time in the classroom as a Lasallian Volunteer after college and as a Spanish teacher at Minneapolis Southwest High School, The Marshall School in Duluth, and Totino-Grace. I was a member of the Advancement Office at TG for a number of years and was a member of the founding leadership team at Cristo Rey Jesuit High School, Twin Cities. I am the Co-Founder and current Chief Executive Officer for Strategy at Prodeo Academy.

Prodeo Academy is a network of college preparatory schools that develop students to be critical thinkers and intelligent leaders, expanding their opportunities to contribute positively and productively to society. The Minneapolis campus includes our Primary Academy (PK-2) and our Elementary Academy and we just opened an additional Primary Academy on our St. Paul campus. We have about 600 students across the Minneapolis Campus and about 80 across the St. Paul Campus. The main part of my role is to work on network expansion; leading enrollment, development, financial management, and partnerships from a strategic perspective.

Some of my best friends are still working at TG and doing amazing work developing their students. I look to folks there for advice on a fairly regular basis. Over the last several years, TG students have volunteered at Prodeo Academy; it has been cool to watch them work to support the growth of smaller scholars. Caroline Becker '02, one of my former students, also teaches at Prodeo Academy. Holly Hoey Germann, religion teacher at TG, brings her justice class to meet our scholars once a semester. We started Prodeo Academy because of the injustice in the educational system, and it is important that TG students recognize that injustice so they can think about how they will give back to society someday.

Anytime I see students come to our school and flourish, I feel proud. We have students who come to us below grade level, and then we see a change in both their desire and ability to achieve. We are still in the development process at Prodeo and are constantly growing and improving. However, it has been inspiring to watch our young scholars access their real potential.

Liza Cutter

Class of 1970

Recognize the privilege that you've been given and, with that sense of gratitude, think what you can do to make some part of the world better.

I was a member of the first class to attend Archbishop Grace and, because we were new and the only class in the school, the students and faculty were close. Grace provided me with an opportunity to explore different intellectual paths. The teachers took a personal interest in developing us to contribute to our communities both at the time we were students and in the future. Our teachers believed we could succeed and accomplish important things. I left Grace as a confident young woman. At the time I was in high school, Catholic church leaders were very involved in both the civil rights and antiwar movements. As a result, several from our class were also involved in both movements. I think that those experiences, together with the atmosphere at Grace of working for the public good, led me to a career in public service.

After graduating from law school, I worked as a Special Assistant Attorney General for the Minnesota Attorney General's Office. I represented the Departments of Human Rights, Human Services, and Trade and Economic Development. I then worked for the Hennepin County Attorney's Office in both civil and criminal divisions before joining the Hennepin County District Court in 2013. I was assistant presiding judge in the district court's criminal division from 2014-2016 and I have been the presiding judge in the probate division since 2016.

As the presiding judge in probate, I lead the division's judicial officers, directing the policy and practice of that division. We handle cases involving trusts, estates, guardianship, conservatorship, and civil commitment.

I have been on the boards of several organizations including law-related and community-based organizations. My area of expertise is in the prevention and response to violence against women. In that capacity, I have been able to train locally, nationally, and internationally. I have trained judges in my own district court and throughout Minnesota as a member of the Minnesota State Court Domestic Violence Faculty Development Team. I also trained internationally in Kazakhstan, Turkey, Indonesia, and Moldova with the Advocates for Human Rights and Global Rights for Women. I've had the opportunity to meet with experts in the area of violence against women working in Islamabad, Pakistan, when I visited there in 2016. I often pinch myself that I've been able to meet and work with so many people from such different backgrounds. Those experiences are life-changing and I am so very grateful for those opportunities. Those experiences underscore to me the importance of our rule of law and the importance of maintaining and strengthening public trust in, and the integrity of, our judicial system.

I would say that, as a judge, it is the cumulative experience that has been defining. In this role I can see more clearly that we are not born on a level playing field and that I, and many others, were born with advantages that many (maybe most) people do not have. It is important for me to remember that every day and in every type case that comes before me. The judicial system is the third branch of government with the unique role of ensuring that the other two branches of government do not over-step and improperly infringe the rights of individuals. That means that all parties must have an opportunity to be heard, including—and maybe especially—those who otherwise have no voice.

I am proud that I have been in public service for all of my legal career. I hope that I have served the public well and helped make our justice system more accessible, more responsive, and trustworthy.

Sister Kathleen Bauer, SSND

Class of 1974

I believe the greatest success is truly loving what you do, and making a difference in how you do it.



My parents believed in the value of Catholic education and instilled that same value into all their children. All seven of us went to Catholic grade school and high school. Of course, there was no way my parents could afford the tuition. We each received scholarship money our first year to help offset the cost, and my parents paid what they could. They told us that if we valued Catholic education we would need to prove it by paying our own way. By the middle of our freshman year (if not before) each of us had a job.

In addition to my parents being great influences, Sister Johnita (Liz) Willems and Sister Jolene (Helen) Welter taught religion at Grace and challenged us to think outside the box, to articulate our beliefs, and to live our convictions.

One of my favorite memories from my high school years was a religion class focused on service — a great opportunity to go out into the community and see and experience different cultures and areas of great need. I knew then that I wanted to make a difference in the world.

Beyond high school, I earned a degree in physical therapy and master's in health management and finance. Among my many assignments, most recently I held positions as the IS Site Manager for Abbott Northwestern Hospital (5500 employees and over 2000 physicians), Manager of IS/Epic, Radiology, Respiratory Therapy, Cardiac Services, Pulmonary Rehab, and Sleep Studies, and Manager of Physical Medicine, Fitness Center, Cardiac Services, Medication Clinic, and Occupational Health.

Currently, I am on our leadership team for the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND). We have over 900 sisters in our Province serving in the United States, Guam, and Japan, as well as in Italy and Austria.

The congregation of the School Sisters of Notre Dame was founded on October 24, 1833, when Caroline Gerhardinger and two other women began a common religious life in Bavaria in present-day Germany. This new congregation came to life in response to God's call to address social needs of the times through the education of girls. The state had confiscated church possessions and dissolved most religious congregations, which deprived many girls of an opportunity for education.

The School Sisters of Notre Dame began as educators and continue as educators. Now located throughout the world, SSNDs serve in a variety of ministries, grounded in the concept of transforming the world through education in the broadest sense.

My faith is a gift I do not take for granted — I need to nurture it daily. I entered religious life with the School Sisters of Notre Dame 44 years ago. I admit not every day is "a walk in the park," however, given the chance I would do it all over again today! I have worked in public and Catholic schools, hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, and even prisons. I have ministered to and been ministered by the wisest of children and young at heart elderly. It is comforting to know everyone struggles with their faith, everyone searches for meaning in their life, everyone wants to make a difference. Faith or religion is probably never the "ice breaker" conversation at a party, however, during a break or over lunch I am amazed how our faith can creep into a conversation and beg for attention. It is during these graced moments that I know God is present.

I have loved every one of my ministries and believe "attitude" is the most critical component of success.

When I graduated from Totino-Grace and later from St. Mary's University, I thought I would be a teacher. I wanted to inspire the hearts and minds of others, as my teachers had done for me. The commitment of the teachers, coaches, campus ministers, and other staff made the greatest impression on me during my time at TG. It was clear they believed in their mission. They loved their work (though on some days I'm sure we gave them many reasons not to) and loved doing their work as a community. I think even back then, I wanted to be part of a similar mission and faith community.

I tried teaching for a few years but felt that I was not able to serve students in the classroom as I had hoped. This was a difficult realization and required some significant letting go on my part and a re-imagining of what I believed to be my vocation. With the help of wise mentors, lots of prayer, and a willingness to try something new, I discovered my love of college campus ministry.

During my senior year at Totino-Grace I traveled to Tijuana, Mexico, for a campus ministry service trip. I can still remember the sights and smells, the powerful encounters we had, as well as the questions and feelings that surfaced in just one week. It was life-changing for me and would plant the seeds that would lead me to coordinate service and justice initiatives in my future campus ministry roles.

My faith has certainly played a major role in my choices related to education and employment. Yet, I think it's actually God's daily reminders to trust, to have faith, that have impacted me and my professional journey the most: when God encourages me to step out beyond the familiar, to act boldly when I would prefer to play it safe, or maybe to approach a professional situation with more imagination than I believe I have. a deeper faith. At other times, God asks me to have faith by letting go of perfectionism or relinquishing my need to control an outcome. Faith might also be a willingness to be honest about my motivations in the professional arena. Who am I serving with this project? Is this about my ego or reputation or is this about serving a real need that God would like to address? These are some of the ways faith has been at play and how God is inviting me to an ever-deepening faith on my professional journey.

Attending a Catholic Lasallian high school offered me opportunities for service, prayer and self-reflection, exposure to Catholic Social Teaching, and a sense of belonging to a community. All of this gave me the firm footing, self-awareness and inspiration I would need to contemplate a future career — one that seemed true to what I really wanted my life and faith to be about as an adult. I started working as a camp counselor for the YMCA after I graduated from TG. I thought it would be a fun summer job and worked with the organization every summer through college. Following my college education, I found a position running programs for the YMCA, including summer day camp. I served as the YMCA of the Twin Cities Program Director from 2005-2007. In 2008, Catholic Youth Camp (CYC) had an open position and it was the perfect fit for me.

Community has been such an important part of my life, starting with my time at Totino-Grace, and this factor was important to me as I considered career options. CYC is a strong, faith-based community and it reminds me of TG. I appreciate that the work I do makes a difference to people.







ARE YOUR BENEFICIARY DESIGNATIONS UP TO DATE?

As my son prepared to return to college this fall, my wife and I reviewed what he would once again need to complete another year away from home. That made me think about all of us "adults" and how often we review what we need to make it through another year. I am talking about reviewing 529 plans, wills or revocable trusts, and other beneficiary designations on our life insurance, investment accounts, bank accounts, retirement accounts, annuities, etc. It's a great discussion to have as you are writing out tuition checks.

In general, the assets in any retirement account, 401(k)s, bank and investment accounts, life insurance policy, or annuities will pass to the named beneficiary, regardless of the terms of a will. Therefore, beneficiary designations should be considered an important part of your overall estate plan. Too many people make the mistake of having outdated beneficiaries on some accounts that do not match those in their will or trust, which inevitably creates conflicts among beneficiaries that may become a matter for the courts. When probate courts and attorneys get involved, the time and expense of correcting this mistake can become costly.

We all experience life events – marriage, death of a spouse, birth/adoption of a child, that justify a review of designations. At the time we open our accounts, we sometimes just fill in a name, and plan on changing the beneficiary designations when we have more time.

As a former estate planning attorney, I would always tell my clients, "Take the time to make sure you understand how all your assets are titled, and the effect of that title. Then, review and update everything regularly. It is important to coordinate the account titling and the naming of beneficiaries with your overall estate plan to make sure your assets are passed to your heirs the way you intend."

Totino-Grace would be a wonderful and worthwhile institution to be named as a beneficiary should you decide to include organizations, in addition to your heirs. This generous deed will reduce your tax burden and leave you with the satisfaction of knowing you are helping deserving students obtain a Catholic Lasallian education.
