School News 2017-2018 Highlights

Athletic State **Tournaments**



Diver Ellie Gunderson '19 competed in the 2017 Girls State Swimming and Diving Tournament on November 18 at the University of Minnesota.

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Co-curricular Achievements



The Science Club competed in the State Science Olympiad on March 3. TG students competed against 33 teams in an average of four events each. Congratulations to Jacob Zahn '20 and Zach Kuffel '19 who finished 8th in Astronomy.



On January 28, 23 Totino-Grace DECA students competed in the District Four East Conference at the National Sports Center in Blaine. They competed in a range of career and business related events against other schools in the area. Ten TG students qualified for the DECA State Career Development Conference on March 5 and 6, competing among 2,000 students in approximately 60 different events.



The Totino-Grace Mock Trial team had a fantastic season, winning three of their four trials. This year's case, based on actual events, involved charges of criminal vehicular homicide and careless driving. Students portrayed both attorneys and witnesses on the Prosecution and Defense side of the case.



Vishal Chandra '19 was selected as one of six Minnesota students to attend the Global Youth Institute in Des Moines, Iowa, October 18-21. Vishal first learned of the opportunity through the Totino-Grace Kathleen Murphy Scholars Program. To apply to the institute, Vishal submitted a research paper on global issues related to hunger and food insecurity. Selected students then participated in a oneday symposium on local, national, and global hunger and food insecurity issues through the Minnesota Youth Institute. The event offered participants the opportunity to present their research and recommendations, engage with local leaders and experts, and participate in activities to explore hunger issues.

Mission and Service



Totino-Grace High School's mission trip program encompasses the core values of the Lasallian mission while providing students with unique opportunities to learn about different cultures and poverty issues locally and internationally. Partnering with Lasallian communities, schools, and ministries allows us to do this most effectively. This year, 165 students will participate in one of 15 TG mission trips, living out the Gospel as Jesus calls us to do.



Throughout the academic year, Totino-Grace athletic teams and co-curricular groups lead and participate in a number of service projects and fundraising initiatives to support local and global organizations. With the support of their peers and members of our school community, participants are able to put Totino-Grace's Catholic Lasallian mission into action to make an impact on those most vulnerable and in need. Our students' efforts supported Tackle Cancer and Stick it to Cancer, Feed My Starving Children, Nuestros Pequenos Hermanos, local food shelves, Sharing and Caring Hands, Red Cross, and many more. This fall, students raised funds for the families of a fellow Lasallian school, Justin-Sienna, following the devastating impact from the California fires. The Instrumental Music Department partnered with St. Olaf Catholic Church in Minneapolis, adding a day of service to their annual Christmas concert, to assist with the church's homeless initiatives.



Pat Schommer '77

At different ages and in different seasons, my volunteer experiences have allowed me to find significant meaning and contribute my professional expertise and provide service to others. Shakespeare once said, "The meaning of life is to find your gift. The purpose of life is to give it away." As a young teen, while most kids were playing in the park, I found meaning hanging out in a nursing home. Seeing life through the eyes of the elderly, sometimes demented, often dying, shaped who I am. With these precious, vulnerable people, I found my gifts.

As a teen and young adult, with my Dad, I volunteered with Civil Air Patrol (CAP)—an arm of the US Air Force—which provides search and rescue expertise for downed aircraft in the state. In CAP, I received my first training in safety and first aid and through a collaboration of Grace High School and Spring Lake Park High School, I became certified as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Eventually I began teaching others these same skills.

Education enticed me later in life, after serving as a health care administrator for twenty-five years. My husband died following a brief battle with a brain tumor; our kids were 10 and 15 at the time. In a single parent household, working an hour from home in long-term care and hospice, and employing 150 people, no longer worked for us. I looked to higher education to share my passions—the elderly and health care—with others.

I am the Director of the Rural & Metropolitan Physician Associate Program at the University of Minnesota Medical School. These programs are national exemplars in providing longitudinal education for third year medical students in rural and urban medically underserved areas. Prior to my current role, I was the Associate Director for the Center on Aging at the University of Minnesota and served as the Executive Director at Stevens Square in Minneapolis, an organization providing long-term care/end of life care for the elderly.

I am so proud to have participated with Minnesota academia and clinical experts in Alzheimer's disease and related dementias to write a graduate, professional level, curriculum and provide clinical tools for health care providers. This curriculum and tools are now the gold standards and basis for national curriculum and provider tools.

I encourage students to look for transformative educational opportunities which are career focused but also are flexible and allow options for growth and change. When I went to college after high school, I didn't plan to become a young widow and a single parent, but life happens. The solid underpinning of my passions and first degrees allowed me to expand career opportunities into health care education.

Teaching today, requires completely different skills and changed pedagogy than in years prior. Teachers today can count on more diverse students in every way, less parental involvement and overall support, increased public oversight, and diminished funding. Core subjects can be memorized and understood, but learning emotional intelligence is much harder. I enjoy being "the guide by the side" in teaching and learning with my students and colleagues.

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Mike Sullwold '82

I thought about teaching as early as eighth grade. During the summer I worked for the city of Crystal in the park and rec department during the summer. It was a great job; I was paid to play games with the kids all summer. An early career influence for me was Dave Johnson who taught Physical Education at St.Raphael. At Totino-Grace, Mrs. Sweet was so helpful in English, Mr. Nigon taught speech and helped me become more comfortable talking to adults, and Mr. Thompson was the best at helping students with math and was just a great person to talk with in general. My high school coach, Lou Mitteco, offered me my first high school coaching job the year after I graduated; I helped coach ninth grade basketball.

My faith has kept me grounded. I am a product of 14 years of Catholic schools, first at St. Raphael, then Totino-Grace, and I received my bachelor's degree from the University of St. Thomas. I have been teaching in Catholic grade schools for 30 years, first at Our Lady the Great, St. Kevin, Resurrection, and St. Michael; and have been at St. Rose of Lima for 20 years as athletic director and physical education teacher.

In addition to teaching, I have coached football, girls basketball, and softball at TG for many years. Through the Courage Center, I was able to coach both a youth wheelchair basketball team, the Rapid Rollers, as well as a women's wheelchair team, the Rolling Timberwolves. This might have been one of the most rewarding things I have ever done. I was able to see the country as we traveled to play in many tournaments. It was thrilling to be considered for a coaching position of the women's wheel chair basketball team for the Sydney Olympics in 2000.

What is exciting about teaching is just seeing the kids enjoy their time in class with you. It is great when you see the students finally "get it." Students today have so many opportunities in front of them and technology and access to information continually improves. A benefit to today's students is the ability to learn about and research many different academic areas to study and careers to explore.

The advice I would give to someone who wants to go into education is to go for it. I have enjoyed my time as a teacher -- it keeps me young. I love talking to students to see what is new in their lives. As a teacher, remember that at times you also serve as a parental figure for kids.

A defining moment for me is when my former students come back to visit, sharing what they liked about their time in my class. It is so rewarding when I hear that I played a role in their pursuit of teaching. As a teacher, you have the ability to connect with kids and help them pursue the right direction in life. This is what makes teaching or coaching worth it.





Dan Bittman '90

I attended Immaculate Conception School in Columbia Heights from kindergarten through grade eight before attending Totino-Grace. My parents modeled continuous learning and a strong work ethic and sacrificed so much for my sister and I to attend TG. Their continued support, focus on having a quality education, and encouragement inspired me along the way. There have been countless mentors and colleagues who have encouraged, supported, and challenged me, to which I am forever indebted and grateful. My wife, who was an elementary school teacher, and three children, ages 15, 13, and 10, allow me to remain grounded and connected as I experience education through each of them.

My faith journey at TG had a tremendous impact and has influenced how I raise my own children, lead others as a school superintendent, and help to balance the complexities of daily life. I feel as though my faith journey at TG helped to build a strong foundation that keeps me grounded, calms me in times of chaos, and reminds me how unimportant everything else is. Regardless of the situation, when we make decisions that are in the best interest of children, things will work out well.

Having the opportunity to serve as an educator and administrator in school districts as small as 4,400 students and as large as 310,000 has been amazing! I am currently the Superintendent of Schools in ISD 728 (Elk River Area Schools), which is the eighth largest school district in the state.

Various personal and professional travel opportunities through Asia, Europe, and the United States have inspired me to continue to learn, taught me the importance of relationships, and created urgency for me in my professional life. Navigating experiences in a foreign land, learning from others, becoming familiar with various cultures, and embracing diversity make each and every one of us better people and leaders. I want every child to have opportunities to see the world, learn from others, and to recognize that anything is possible.

Being a student and growing up in this day and age is challenging. Society places a tremendous amount of pressure on our children to grow up fast, achieve greatness in everything they do, and to understand and navigate extremely complex issues and situations happening in society. As educators and adults, we have an opportunity to provide support, encourage productive conversations, listen thoughtfully, learn from our youth and each other, and to be present.

I believe my greatest successes have been helping to build capacity in those I serve, seeing so many of my former students, educators, and administrators go on to achieve greatness, be genuinely happy, and have a positive impact on countless students, families, and organizations. When you have an opportunity to help people find their passion, be true to themselves, and make the world a better place, how can one not be proud?

I was humbled to be recognized as Nevada Teacher of the Year; Nevada Soccer Coach of the Year; and as Minnesota Superintendent of the Year throughout my career thus far. Each of these recognitions has been humbling, as I have felt so fortunate to serve with so many amazing educators. Working with and for children is an exciting and humbling experience for teachers. To see students develop an appreciation for learning and finding their passion is priceless.

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Erin Lauinger Schmidt '99

I have been teaching science (biology, ecology, microbiology, forensic science) at Totino-Grace for the past 15 years. I have always loved school -- everything about it. For the most part, it all came pretty easy to me, except science. The subject challenged me the most and also peaked my curiosity. It was in Mrs. Wiger's classroom that I decided that I wanted to study biology. I traveled to Wolverhampton, England, for my student teaching and spent three months at a boarding school teaching biology. Away from my friends and family is where I solidified that teaching was indeed my calling. I saw the immediate impact I had on the students I taught there, and in my heart I knew I made the right decision.

With Totino-Grace, I have been fortunate to participate in a number of mission trips with students. I have traveled to Browning, Montana and spent time with students on the Blackfeet Reservation. In Chicago, Illinois we tutored at a few inner-city schools and I worked with Habitat for Humanity in Winona, Minnesota. I was also able to participate in the Lasallian Social Justice Institute for Homelessness in San Francisco.

Traveling the world became an exciting opportunity for me as a teacher. I was fortunate in my first year of teaching to chaperone a student trip to Germany, Austria, and Switzerland. The next summer I was with a student group on a Mediterranean cruise and the following year we spent two weeks in Italy. The next two summers were spent scuba diving in the Cayman Islands; it was there I discovered my love for the ocean.

A career highlight was to participate in unique professional development experiences as a result of two separate national teaching fellowships last year. I was one of 12 teachers to travel to Costa Rica to study leatherback sea turtles with Ecology Project International and one of 10 teachers chosen to study the effects of climate change on owls in Arizona with Earthwatch.

Becoming a teacher has opened a lot of doors for me, both personally and professionally. The role certainly comes with many challenges, but the reward of inspiring young minds and seeing students discover who they are and where they want to go with their life has made it fulfilling year after year. The icing on the top is to hear about their success stories as professionals.

I am thrilled when a student connects with me to share that they are now pursuing a career in science. To hear that my course somehow influenced their decision to enter the science world is one of the best successes I have as a teacher.






