Happy New Year!

As we ring in 2019, we wanted to take a moment and ask for your help in an effort to maintain a safe environment for everyone in the parking lot. Since the start of the school year, we have had several situations where safety has been a concern. The majority of these incidents have occurred during student drop-off and pick-up in the parking lot and cross-walk. Simply stated, several vehicles dropping-off and picking-up our students are not paying attention to basic safety, courtesy, and traffic laws.

As you drop-off or pick-up your child, please follow these guidelines:

*Please watch your speed when entering, driving through, and especially exiting the parking lot and crosswalk. There have been several close calls with some vehicles exiting this area way too quickly.

*Please park in one of the 200 plus parking spots. There have been many vehicles reported parking along the woodchip facility driveway and in the crosswalk that lines the right side of our parking lot. As stated within Vermont's Motor Vehicle Statutes, no person may stop, stand, or park a vehicle on a crosswalk.

*Handicapped parking spots are to be used only by those vehicles that have a handicapped plaque visible on the dash.

*Please be courteous to those that choose to walk and be aware of pedestrians, not only at the crosswalk, but also at street corners near our school. Please drive slowly and stop for pedestrians.

*When able our local police department will sometimes be visible in the parking lot. Please be respectful and courteous to them. They are following the safety procedures that have been established for our students, staff, families, and guests, essentially for everyone who accesses our parking lot. Please know that they have full authority to ticket cars and drivers who are not adhering to driving laws within our parking lot which can include speed, crosswalk and/or parking issues.

Crops by Kids

Some years snow blankets the ground, some years we have had green peeping through in January. The recent rain certainly decreased the snow cover. Snow is an important insulator, especially for perennials. Let's hope for more.

Maybe some of you have seed catalogues already on your counter. It isn't too early to think of all the plants you want to grow this summer. We hope many of you

are anticipating the annual Crops by Kids seed fundraiser.

This year we will be trying something new. The seeds will come from **High Mowing Seeds**, a local, organic seed company. Your seed orders support necessary purchases for our school/community garden. The survey that was distributed this past year indicated that the current company didn't offer the variety that gardeners want. Let's see if **High Mowing Seeds** offers what you are looking for.

Be looking for the seed order forms by mid-January. If you don't receive one, and would like to, email <u>dcurtis@u61.net</u> with your child's name and homeroom teacher. We want to support your gardening needs, and we'd like you to support ours.

This year we encourage you to invite your family, friends and neighbors to buy seeds with us. The more seeds sold, the greater percentage we get. Ask family and friends to participate and feel free to make copies of the seed order forms that come home or ask your child's teacher for more.

So here's to a winter with the hope of plenty of snow to cover the garden and for plain 'ol fun in the snow. For those who want to continue to garden in the winter, Dr. Leonard Perry, Extension Professor University of Vermont lists a few ideas.

~**Windowsill gardens**. When snowdrifts keep children inside, try cultivating a windowsill garden. All you need is a sunny spot and a few containers of soil. Herbs are an excellent choice for windowsills. You can start from seeds or purchase small plants.

~Watch seeds sprout. Line a glass jar with a damp paper towel and insert several zucchini seeds between the glass and the towel. Place a lid on the jar, leave it on the kitchen counter, and check the paper every day to make sure it's still moist. Seeds should sprout in a few days. Or try bush beans instead of zucchini. Make a simple chart of the progress or have the children draw what they see each day.

~ **Terrariums**. Carefully place some soil and a few mosses and plants (with roots) inside a clean mayonnaise jar. Keep your indoor garden moist with a plant mister, and cover the opening with clear plastic wrap.

News from the Nurse's Office

Keep Your Home Safe from Carbon Monoxide Reprinted with permission from Vermont Department of Health

As you heat your home this winter, keep it safe from an invisible, deadly gas – carbon monoxide. Many heating systems burn fuel - like natural gas, propane, oil, or wood - which produces carbon monoxide (CO). When it's cold out and homes are closed up tight, carbon monoxide can build to dangerous levels if it's not properly ventilated.

You can't see or smell carbon monoxide, so you may not know if your family is at risk. But you can take steps to prevent CO poisoning in your home:

- Install a carbon monoxide alarm. Change the batteries regularly and replace the alarm when it expires.
- Have your heating system and other fuel-burning appliances serviced every year.
- Keep the vents outside your home clear of snow and ice.
- If you lose power, only use generators outside at least 20 feet away from your house.
- Never run a vehicle inside your garage, even if the door is open.

Symptoms of CO poisoning include headache, dizziness, weakness and upset stomach/vomiting. This can sometimes be confused with the flu. If your CO alarm goes off, go outside immediately to get fresh air, then call 9-1-1.
