

What is a college entrance essay?

- A response to a specific prompt from either The Common Application or a particular university
 - Example 1: Recount an incident or time when you experienced failure. How did it affect you, and what lessons did you learn? (Common App.)

What is a college entrance essay?

- A response to a specific prompt from either The Common Application or a particular university
 - Example 2: Alice falls down the rabbit hole. Milo drives through the tollbooth. Dorothy is swept up in the tornado. Neo takes the red pill. Don't tell us about another world you've imagined, heard about, or created. Rather, tell us about its portal. Sure, some people think of the University of Chicago as a portal to their future, but please choose another portal to write about. (University of Chicago)

What is a college entrance essay?

· Example 3: Our families and communities often define us and our individual worlds. Community might refer to your cultural group, extended family, religious group, neighborhood or school, sports team or club, co-workers, etc. Describe the world you come from and how you, as a product of it, might add to the diversity of the University of Washington.

How should an applicant structure a college entrance essay?

- Tell a story
- · Describe a scene
- Explain a process
- · Define a key idea
- · Explain the causes and effects of an event or change
- Recount examples

What topics should an applicant address?

- · Personality
- Abilities and talents
- Struggles and recoveries (especially finding resources independently in order to recover)
- Responsibility
- · The past AND the future
- Virtues
- Extracurricular activities
- · Volunteering

What structures and topics should an applicant avoid?

- A list of accomplishments
- Duplicating information available in other parts of the application
- Moments too intricate or awkward or personal to capture in a limited space (from 200 to 600 words)
- · Confessions without redemption or resolution
- Incomplete or confusing explanations evidence ALWAYS requires analysis

If the essay only conveyed one idea well, it should be . . .

- College readiness
- · Unique personality
- · Growth as an individual
- · Passion for a subject area (related to an intended major)
- Potential to contribute to the future college or even THE FUTURE

What effect should the essay have on the reader?

- · Maintain interest from beginning to end
- Convey a sense of writing style (and thereby college readiness)
- · Vividly immerse into an event or scene
- Memorably tell the story

THE BOTTOM LINE: college admissions officers give an essay two to three minutes to make the right impression

How does an applicant make the essay memorable?

- Personal statements the reader should get a sense of who the applicant is
- · An original, unique beginning
- A powerful ending build to a crescendo
- A command of English to the point of style (diction, syntax, figurative language)
