Parish Episcopal School is a leading college preparatory school serving more than 1,100 students in PreK through 12th grade. Our Upper School houses 433 students including 107 seniors, 113 juniors, 104 sophomores, and 111 freshmen.

Academy of Global Studies

AGS offers students a tailored, four-year, research-oriented approach to global studies. AGS is a rigorous, outcomes-based academic program which complements both our AP and college preparatory paths. The experience is comprised of coursework, community service, co-curricular activities and a capstone project.

Leadership Institute

The Leadership Institute requires selected students to participate in coursework (three trimester electives), self-reflection and observation with a mentor, and the completion of a LEAD project. The LEAD Project involves starting, building upon or moving a project in measureable terms.

ParishBridge

ParishBridge is an opportunity for seniors to design personalized curricula in their third trimester. Incorporating interdisciplinary learning with real-world applications, the program requires five weeks of blended learning, 25 to 50 hours of professional experience, an online course of their selection, and life readiness seminars hosted on campus.

Academic Schedule

The academic calendar is divided into trimesters. Core classes are 85 minutes and meet alternating days on a block schedule 36 weeks per school year.
