Dear Fuqua Community,

On the eve of our 25th year, Fuqua School is positioned well for the future. During the 2016-2017 school year, the Board of Trustees and school leadership have been carefully planning for the next quarter century and making strategic decisions to ensure the long-term sustainability of Fuqua School. The most immediate result of this process is a \$1.9 million facilities improvement project that began in August of 2017 and is designed to meet the most immediate needs of our campus. The scheduled re-roofing, re-lamping, and HVAC upgrades will both improve the quality of the learning environment and result in considerable energy

and maintenance savings.

Building on collaborative relationships with the Town of Farmville, Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney College, The Moton Museum and Prince Edward County Public Schools, Fuqua School has emerged as a private school with the public purpose of engaging the greater community to offer the best possible independent-school education in Southside Virginia. By locking arms with these key partners, we are contributing to and benefiting from the inclusive and positive trajectory of Farmville, and continuing to honor the vision of JB Fuqua by serving as a model for rural education in America.

This same collaborative spirit continues to be present in the most critical space on campus, the classroom. The cover of this year's annual report captures a day in the life of a Fuqua School student. In Mrs. Jefferson's 4/5 Virginia History class, students use the Geographic Information Systems (GIS) capabilities of the iPad to interact with a life-size map of Virginia to estimate the location of places not labeled on the map. This innovative and technology-rich STEAM lesson is just one example of the dynamic teaching that occurs across our campus every day.



PEA/Fuqua spirit was present during our June Alumni Weekend with record attendance at the annual Skeeter Fore Golf Tournament and the alumni luau at the Gee Price/Pool that followed. Please be sure to read through the entire annual report to catch the alumni highlights, and don't forget to share your news with us.

RUNNING FOR THE FUTURE

Technology is ever changing. What was once the popular program or device of last year is now considered outdated. In education, technology has a huge impact on instruction and student learning. Because of this, the lower school placed an emphasis on updating our current technology in our media center, classrooms, and our online resources for parents and students. During the fall of 2016, the lower school held its first FUNDrun. This fundraising event enabled us to reach out to parents, grandparents, teachers and the community in order to achieve a common goal: increasing our technology inventory to benefit student learning. Through this event, we were able to purchase an additional 20 iPads and protective cases that

have been used each and every day in all of our lower school classrooms. In celebration of FUNDrun's success, Head of Lower School Dara Tucker kept her promise and kissed a pig! In addition to this fundraiser, our annual Bag the Falcon event provided an opportunity for attendees to "Fund a Need". Through these generous donations, the lower school was able to purchase 20 Chromebooks that are used in both the lab and classrooms. As our technology inventory increased, our students have been able to access learning programs right from their desks, work on technology-based science and history projects in small groups, create slideshow presentations for their literature circles, implement our new online math program, DreamBox, and use Google Earth and other programs to take virtual field trips to places such as Rome,

Antarctica, and beyond. The new iPads have also enabled us to also move from an outdated testing method, the paper-and-pencil California Achievement Test, to the online standardized Comprehensive Testing Program at both the lower and middle schools. Also with this new technology, the lower school added an additional technology class to the 4/5 curriculum which focused on developing students' technological skills using email, word processing, presentation programs, and the cloud to store information and collaborate on assignments. Without the support of teachers, parents, and community members to help make our goal of being up-to-date in the latest educational technology, it is hard to imagine being able to utilize all of these amazing new programs that are now at our fingertips.



ON THE HILL

Middle school can be a confusing and challenging transition for many children. Because we care about your whole child, the middle school took several steps to support its students both academically and emotionally. Mrs. Jamie Estes was brought onboard as the new Fuqua School guidance counselor. Mrs. Estes provides students who were struggling with issues or concerns to have an outlet and support to guide them through these situations. In addition, the middle school implemented lunchroom-table guidelines which had the overall goal of discouraging exclusion. Also, the middle school students took a trip to Sandy River Retreat where counselors worked with these students to help them learn to problem solve, develop appropriate team building skills, and focused on positive interactions with one another. Longwood Head Basketball Coach, Jayson Gee, spoke to the boys about being men of character, while Longwood's Chi Alpha Director, Jenny McIntosh, taught the girls about

rejecting negative labels and using words that help foster positive relationships. The middle school also traveled to see the movie, *Hidden Figures*, and small group leaders led students in discussions about respect and how it can be reflected in their actions. Middle school students also participated in a small group talk and project based on the book, *There's Only One You* by Linda Kranz, which is centered around celebrating individuality, while still encouraging healthful ways to come together as a community. Our new Fuqua School Values were also a focus for the year, and monthly lessons to highlight each value were delivered to the students. This served as a pilot for the new Advisory Program at the middle school.

In addition to focusing on building self-confidence and being the best they can be, middle schoolers also worked together in The Heart for the House project, an effort to beautify the middle school campus. Students cleaned the middle school campus, painted benches, cleaned out the fish pond, and painted

locker spaces. The goal of this project was to improve their school community while also improving their connections and relationships with one another.

Technology also became a focal point for the middle school students and staff. The middle school is preparing students for the upper school by integrating more technology in the classroom, more cloud-based collaborative projects for assignments, and exposing students to online resources to help strengthen skills learned in class. In addition to this, the new middle school robotics program has expanded to incorporate a variety of STEAM-based learning in which updated technology is critical. Because increasing our technology was a focal point at the middle school, we needed to find a way to expand our technology. A Bowl-A-Thon was held in the spring as a means of funding our technology needs. Thanks to the support of the Fuqua School community, The Bowl-A-Thon raised over \$14,000 which enabled the middle school to purchase Chromebooks and iPads that are now used in the classrooms daily.



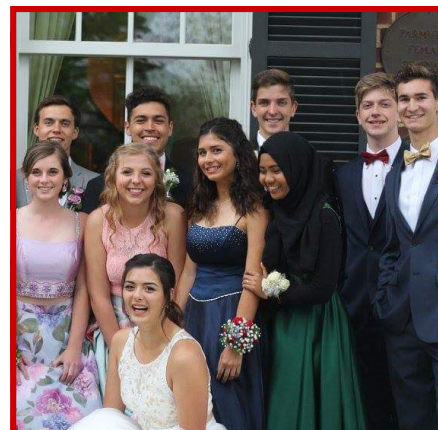


LEADING THE WAY

The 2016-2017 school year in the Upper School at Fuqua School was marked by both change and consistency. We welcomed a new Head of the Upper School, Alex Huggard, along with several other new faculty members. We examined our curriculum and began to implement the values of the school in an intentional manner. The Upper School maintained its commitment to excellence and our young people began to grow as students.

A few of the Upper School highlights:

- The Battle of the Brains team advanced past the preliminary competition to the round of eight.
- One member of the Class of 2018 qualified in the Lincoln-Douglas debate for the National Tournament of the National Speech and Debate Association (NSDA) as well as the NSDA debate team for the World Tournament.
- The Aviation program continued to make excellent progress on the Fuqua plane, adding the internal mechanicals and purchasing the wings to attach to the fuselage.
- Two students were tabbed to attend a highly-selective national conference based on their performance at Virginia's Model General Assembly.
- Nine members of the Class of 2017 committed to play a sport in the NCAA



and 95% are attending either a two- or four-year college or university.

- We welcomed international students from across the globe—China, Indonesia, Kyrgyzstan, Mexico, and Spain—to the Fuqua family, and many of them graduated with the Class of 2017.
- The Envirothon Team advanced to state competition for the second year in a row.



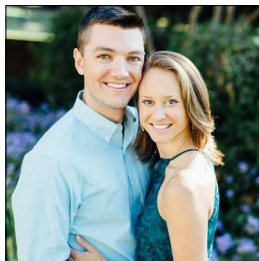
Although these moments from the last year highlight the achievements of a few, the true measure of our students' successes happens in the day-to-day commitment of each individual in the Fuqua family. Faculty members often talk about the “a-ha” or “lightbulb” moments that are the highlights of their years. These “lightbulb” moments occurred many times throughout the year—in Honors Calculus, in the senior art seminar, in the science lab, in Health and Fitness, in English courses, in the shop, and in day-to-day relationships. These moments are not the result of genius or luck; they are the consequence of hard work and perseverance. These moments do not occur in a vacuum; they happen as the outcome of rising to meet the challenge. When a student moves from challenge to success, they become hungry for more of the same. Our students' commitment to growth and learning inspires all members of the Fuqua family: the students themselves, the faculty, the staff, and the students' families. 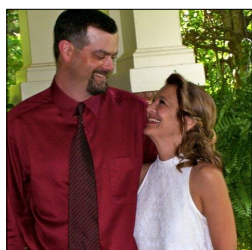
While in Scotland, **Lyndsey Johnson '12** and Evan Rossen were engaged. A June 16, 2018 wedding is planned.

Hunter Gilliam '18, son of **Cameron Gilliam '89** and Lisha Robinson, committed to play baseball at Longwood University.



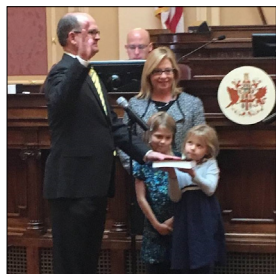
Rodney Orange '96 married Jenifer Woodruff Orange on May 5, 2017.

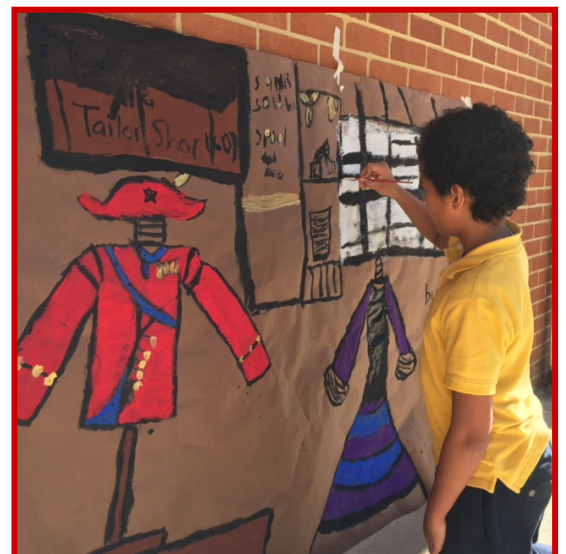

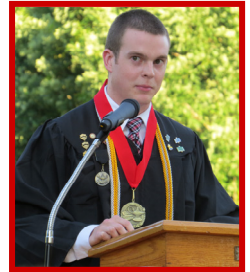


Valedictorian Brad Davis said of him and his classmates, “Our identity is diversity. We’ve got so many different things going on between the members of this class, which, in my mind, makes us one of the greatest classes to ever come from Fuqua. If our theme is ‘boundless individual potential,’ look at us. We’ll have farmers and doctors, athletes and coaches, trainers, politicians, soldiers, lawyers and much more. We’re all so different, but we’re all very similar — we’re Fuqua Falcons.” He continued, “No, I don’t have the answers to life — that’s the Bible in my belief. However, I will leave you with one thing that I’ve learned through my years here ... All human beings are similar, and each person is unique. It’s a pretty simple concept. We all have our own backgrounds that define who we are and what we do, but the thing that can bring this nation to an end is the simplification of that thought process. We believe that Republicans are Republicans and Democrats are Democrats. We think that if you share ideals with one side you’ve got to stay over on that side, only believe with them. And this couldn’t be further from the truth.”



“I’ve learned that we must lose and win with equal grace,” said Sarah-Jane French, salutarian of the Class of 2017. “If you define failure as an opportunity to learn, then I have learned that being the salutarian means my view is the same as Brad’s, my seat is just as comfortable and I get to speak first, meaning I don’t have to feel nauseated by nervousness waiting for my turn to speak. We are all winners tonight, no matter what seat we’re sitting in, for we all have achieved greatness to be sitting here.”

Robert Burns, the class giftorian and a third-generation graduate of Fuqua, announced the class’ gift of two butterfly benches honoring the school’s faculty.



It is tradition that an alumnus give the commencement speech. The Class of 1985’s State Senator Monty Mason discussed change, civility and taking on challenges. Mason shared, “The foundation of this country is the First Amendment that guarantees my right to stand here and offend as many of you as I like, right? But to what end? What does that do to the message? Shouting louder than someone on the other side doesn’t win the point — in fact it likely weakens it as the lack of decorum becomes the story. Prince Edward Academy was founded on principles that have not stood the test of time. Not the educational foundation and academic rigor always found here, but we now know that separate is decidedly not equal — that segregated societies are unacceptable in our country and should be to mankind. This school had to change and that continues today. While you and I had nothing to do with origins, we have the opportunity to be a bridge from the past to the future. We need you to take the values that you have been taught here combined with the idealism that you know can be and meld it with your future experiences to push yourself into new roles and new opportunities.”

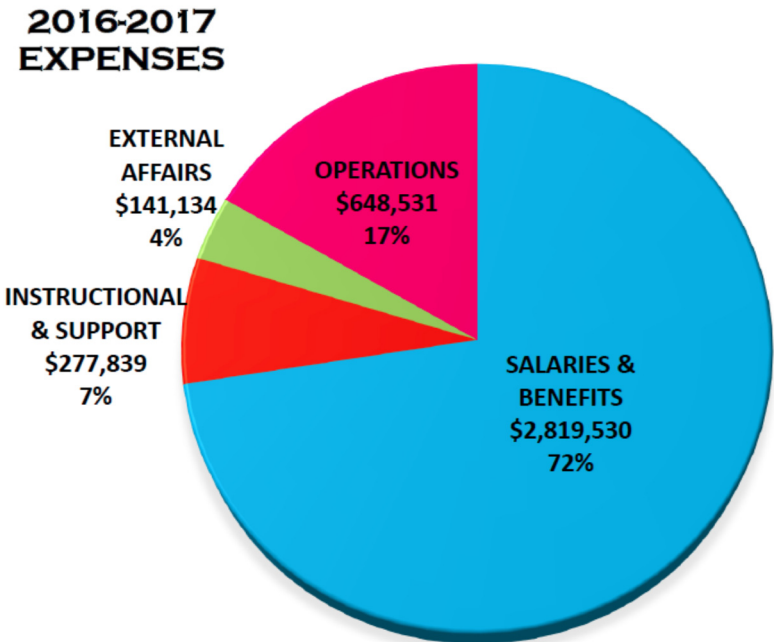
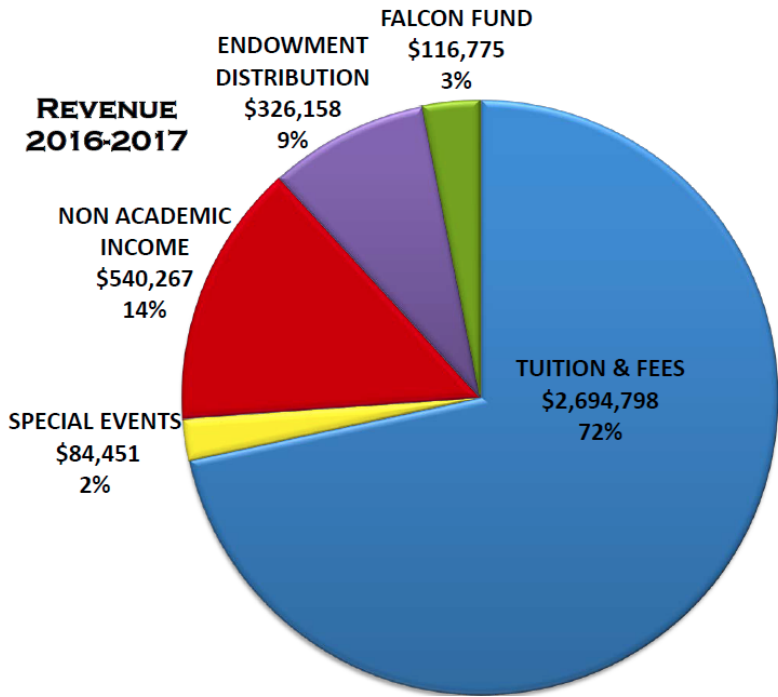

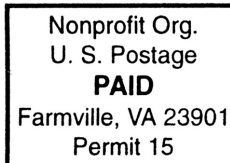
