FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL JOHN MELTON



Fuqua Family and Friends,

The picture on the cover of this Annual Report captures the true gift of the Fuqua School experience. As the graduation processional moves through the lower school, senior David Hice (United States Military Academy at West Point) leads the class offering “hi-fives” to the younger students while Thomas Watson (University of Virginia) pauses for a moment to give Mrs. Naas (5th grade teaching assistant) a hug. Later I asked Mrs. Naas about that moment and she shared that Thomas always stops to speak with her and he often offers a hug. That brief exchange, the small expression of thanks and respect given so freely and honestly, is something we desire for all of our young people, and Fuqua School is a place where that relational gift is cultivated!

The 2015-2016 school year was a period of learning and growth at Fuqua School. From the classroom to the boardroom and from the administrative team to the PTSA, new ideas and new leadership were balanced with time-honored traditions and the collective wisdom of excellent teachers, administrators, and families committed to the mission of Fuqua School. Coming off our successful 5-year Virginia Association of Independent Schools (VAIS) accreditation visit and with a new Head of School, Fuqua School is well positioned for the next five years and beyond.

The revamped “Denim and Diamonds - Bag the Five Grand Falcon” auction sold out and raised a record \$60,000, all of which will be used to support programs for our students. Annual giving was also robust in 2015-2016, with the *Falcon Fund* hitting a five-year high of approximately \$100,000. These and other forms of giving to the school continue to make it possible to keep tuition 28% below the actual cost of educating each child, making Fuqua School more accessible to a wider component of our community.

Our seniors continue to attend prestigious colleges and universities throughout the Commonwealth and across the country. Many are accepted to their school of choice, and some are the first in their family to attend college. In total, our seniors were offered \$3.3

million in academic scholarships. All the while, our academic program remains strong, and our average combined SAT scores are 160 points above the county average, 90 points above the state average, and 130 points above the national average.

We all benefited from the attractive and comfortable new bleachers for Gilmer Field made possible by a generous donation in memory of Ralph and Roselyn Hines, for their enthusiastic support of and generosity to the Athletic Program at Prince Edward Academy and Fuqua School, by their children Joe Hines '86, Robert Hines '81, and Perri Ann Hines Saunders '79. New technology in the form of a campus-wide wireless network, mobile laptop computer carts, and new classroom computer projectors challenged teachers and students to weave more technology into instruction, thus better preparing our students for what lies ahead in college and career! Finally, we became a Microsoft Office 365 school. Now our students and teachers have access to all Microsoft Office software and the ability to work, collaborate, and save projects in their own cloud space.

Fuqua spirit, perseverance, and skill were displayed by all our athletic teams, our marching and concert bands, our newly revitalized debate team, and the “Fuqua Players” theater troupe. Each dazzled us with all their accomplishments and demonstrated the highest levels of Falcon Pride!

To communicate more clearly and more often with our families, the school launched its first monthly electronic newsletter, *The Falcon Flyer*. We quickly had to increase the distribution schedule to twice a month to meet the volume of submissions. You may do so by enclosing your donation in the envelope provided or by going to www.fuquaschool.com and clicking on the “Give Now” button. **It is imperative that we raise approximately 30% of our annual operating budget through means other than tuition, so we rely on your generosity and your appreciation of all that Fuqua School did for you during your time here.**

Near the end of the school year, the faculty, students, and staff brainstormed the core values that define the Fuqua Spirit and then voted on the top nine from this list. Each of these top nine core values is now highlighted during one month of the school year in the following order: September - **Honesty**, October - **Responsibility**, November - **Kindness**, December - **Compassion**, January - **Respect**, February - **Commitment**, March - **Perseverance**, April - **Cooperation**, and May - **Fairness**. Two retiring trustees, Board Chair Bobby Showalter ('60) and Southard Brumfield, led the school for many years on a path aligned with these values. During the 2016 commencement, we thanked Bobby and Southard for their tireless service to Fuqua School and welcomed Terry Hudgins as the new leader of our board. These values will continue to be our guiding light as we live our mission of helping students realize their “boundless individual potential.”

Twenty-five graduates will attend a college or university and one has chosen to serve to his country in the United States Coast Guard.

On a beautiful Friday evening, May 27 at 6 o'clock, Fuqua School held its commencement on the front lawn of the upper school campus. As "Pomp and Circumstance" played, the audience stood while SCA President Brad Davis announced the Class of 2016 consisting of 26 seniors walking together for the last time.

Valedictorian David Hice began by thanking all who had helped him and his class get to this point. David then shared, "I would like to speak briefly about a topic that is very important to me—service. Why should we serve? Each of us has been blessed with talents and abilities specific to us. It may be in music, athletics, academics, or a number of other things, but we each have that special thing that makes us, well, us. In 1 Peter 4:10, we read, 'Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, in its various forms.' Now, you don't have to perform massive acts, but a little help can go a long way. After all, where would you be without the services others have done for you?"

Keeping with the tradition of inviting alumni to deliver the commencement address, the commencement speaker was Dr. Fred Garrett, Class of 1979. Dr. Garrett describes himself in high school as, "The type of student who could sit in class, take in the material and get by without studying or doing homework. Thus, I was the type student that will drive a good teacher crazy." Dr. Garrett shared his love and appreciation to his many teachers but especially Mrs. Brenda Meshejian for "having patience with me in her first calculus class here". Dr. Garrett is now Director of Guidance, Navigation and Control (GNC) Engineering in the Launch Vehicles Division at Orbital ATK in Chandler, AZ and adjunct professor at Arizona State University. Dr. Garrett shared his journey becoming a "rocket scientist" beginning with rejection, and how perseverance led him to graduate from Virginia Tech with a Bachelor's Degree and Master's Degree in Aerospace Engineering and then to Georgia Tech for his PhD in Aerospace Engineering. Dr. Garrett told the Class of 2016, "Life will always work against your plans and the things you dream of. Those who are successful are the ones who find a way to fight back against life and not take no for an answer. If you take that approach, the people around you, people in the position to help you and people in power, will work to help you if you are working toward a goal. Yes, there are those that will hold you back as well. But you just have to ignore those people." In closing, Dr. Garrett challenged the class to, "Seek out opportunities in which you could fail and grow in the process, and I advise you to use all of these things to be the best that you can be."

HISTORY OF THE BELL TOWER



During commencement, Giftorian Thomas Watson presented the school with a token of the Class of 2016's gratitude. The gift involved the most famous part of the campus, the Bell Tower, and donating the money to repair the bell.

During Thomas' speech, he shared a bit of the Bell Tower's history, "Now I have a question for all of you: Has anyone heard of Colonel Wickliffe Preston Draper? Students and teachers here at Fuqua pass by his name every day. It's on a plaque at the base of the Bell Tower right here behind us. I don't know much about Colonel Draper, except that he was born in Massachusetts in 1891, went to Harvard University, and served in both the British and US Armies. He also made several generous donations to Prince Edward Academy over the years. After his death, the school erected this Bell Tower in his memory in 1974.

The Bell Tower has been a centerpiece of our campus since that time. The bell itself has an interesting story. Do you remember seeing the old steam engines as they pulled into or out of train stations? While many of our parents and grandparents remember this scene vividly, most of us remember it from television or the Internet. Anyway, back in the day when a train arrived or departed, the conductor rang a bell, which was located on top of the locomotive. Our bell was donated by Norfolk and Western Railroad from one of their steam engines. For many years at PEA and Fuqua School, members of the senior class were assigned to ring the bell at the beginning and end of each school day, when students arrived and departed. That tradition continued for almost 25 years until it stopped functioning. Then the bell and the Bell Tower were refurbished by the Fuqua School class of 1998, bringing back this wonderful tradition. Coincidentally, 1998 is the same year most of our senior class was born. About seven years ago, the bell once again stopped operating and is now unable to announce our arrival or departure.

In the years ahead, there is no way of knowing when we, the members of the Class of 2016, will be able to make a return visit to Fuqua School. But every time this bell rings, it will serve as a reminder to others of the time we spent on this campus—that we spent with each other. He ends with, 'Therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee.'"

STUDENTS GIVE BACK

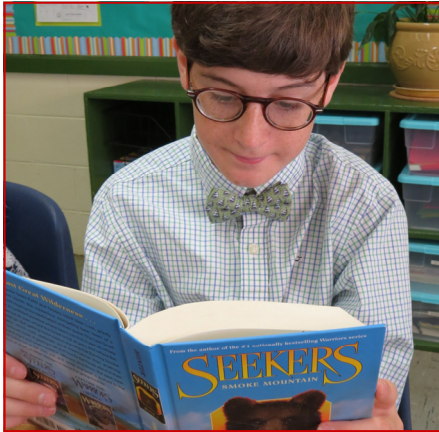
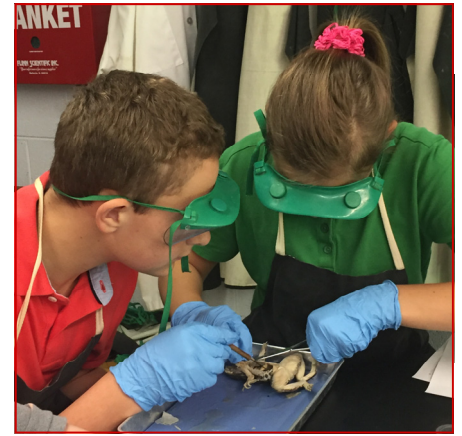
During the 2015-2016 school year, the Lower School Commons was transformed into a collection center for various local charities and organizations. The Lower School SCA met during the second month of school and the conversation revolved around how we, as a school, could give back to those in need in our area. With the support of Mrs. Kathy Jefferson, SCA Advisor, and Dara Tucker, Lower School Dean, the SCA took charge of this initiative and researched which organizations they felt most needed help. After this list was generated, the SCA officers and representatives voted on selecting one charity a month to raise money for or to collect items to donate. Some of the organizations that were selected were F.A.C.E.S., Social Services, local troops serving overseas, Gleaning for the World in Appomattox, Madeline's House, and the Piedmont Juvenile Detention Center.

FUN LEARNING IN AND OUT OF THE CLASSROOM



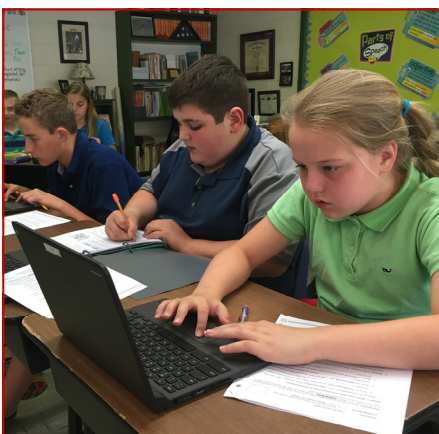


ON THE HILL

Fuqua students love to compete whether on the athletic field or in academics.

"Excuse me, ladies and gentlemen, we have a battle to win." With these words, Mr. Bill Wellman, Mrs. Brenda Meshejian, and the Battle of the Brains team strode out of Gilmer Gym to the applause and cheers of the students gathered for the assembly and send-off. The team was headed to compete in the first round of Battle of the Brains, the longest running televised academic quiz show, which pulls from more than 100 schools throughout Virginia. The team returned victorious to the Fuqua School campus later that day, having soundly defeated Meadowbrook High School 300-195. Fuqua also participates in the Southside Virginia Model United Nations conference moderated by Hampden-Sydney College students. The Model UN employs research, critical thinking, and public speaking skills as they participate. This year Fuqua students represented the United States, Germany, South Africa, Jordan, Nigeria, Bolivia, Chad, and Chile.

The Debate and Speech Team was reestablished this year and successfully competed in the Virginia Catholic Forensic League, which includes public and independent schools, and the VCFL State Tournament. Junior Max Gebauer competed in the National Catholic Forensic League tournament. Quite an accomplishment for a new team!



INTERNATIONAL

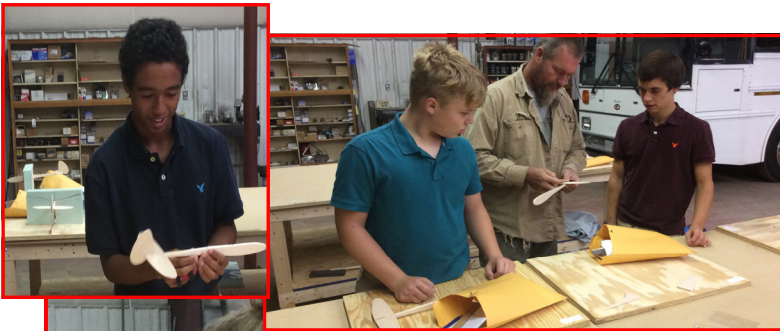

MODEL GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Fuqua School Youth in Government students traveled to Richmond for the annual Virginia YMCA sponsored Model General Assembly (MGA). MGA is a three-day program in which 500-600 Virginia high school students visit the state Capitol to act as senators and delegates, discuss and pass bills, and network with other Virginia students. Senior Thomas Watson was voted last year to be this year's Lieutenant Governor. Watson is the fifth Fuqua student to be elected as Lieutenant Governor.

Fuqua School and The Farmville Chapter of the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) have undertaken an exciting project which will give upper school students an opportunity to explore careers in aviation. In addition, students who enroll in the class will be able to work under the direction of members of the EAA to construct a Zenith 750, an all-metal, single-engine, two-place airplane. Whether a student dreams of becoming a pilot, or is seeking a hands-on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) course to augment his or her upper school curriculum, this new course will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

AVIATION



BUILDING THE PLANE

The new aviation elective is unique—it includes classroom work, an online aviation class offered by Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, and the opportunity to build objects that fly from gliders to an airplane, a Zenith 750 single-engine plane. After construction, the plane will be sold and proceeds will be used to fund the next plane for future aviation classes.



TAKING FLIGHT

The aviation course involves physics of flight: how and why an airplane flies, engines and propellers, night flight and flight relying solely on instruments, navigation, communications, weather, physiological effects of flight, and rules and regulations governing flight. But according to the students, the best part of the class is taking an actual flight with EAA Chapter President and instructor Morgan Dunnivant in his plane.



ARTS DAY

On Thursday, April 7, the Fuqua School community set aside a day of classes to celebrate the arts. Students had the opportunity to attend three workshops from the twenty-eight taking place all over campus including water color, tie dyeing techniques, basket weaving, creating art with technology, PhotoShop skills, culinary arts, and guitar.



LOWER SCHOOL

While many elementary schools are veering away from the arts, Fuqua continues to expose students to the arts in a variety of ways beginning in PK. Each year, students are featured at the LCVA's Youth Art Month Show. Our music program incorporates the foundations of instrumental music with recorder classes in grade 4 and beginning band in grade 5.

Seven Fuqua students were also selected for the prestigious District III Honor Bands based on individual auditions. These students then worked with nationally recognized band directors.
