Our Student Senate recently organized a week of activities to promote **The Great Kindness Challenge**


Grade 1 -*When Sophie Thinks She Can't* by Molly Bang

When Sophie can't solve a math puzzle, she feels upset and inadequate. "I can't do it!" she shouts, expressing the frustration all of us feel when we try and fail. Will she ever be "smart" like her sister? Maybe she isn't smart at all. Luckily Sophie's teacher steps in. What does it mean to be smart? Sophie's class is taught that we get smarter when we exercise our brains, such as when we work harder at solving a puzzle. Struggling to solve a problem doesn't mean "I can't do it!" Sophie and her classmates just can't do it... yet!"




Grade 2 -*The Dot* by Peter Reynolds

Her teacher smiled. "Just make a mark and see where it takes you." Art class is over, but Vashti is sitting glued to her chair in front of a blank piece of paper. The words of her teacher are a gentle invitation to express herself. But Vashti can't draw—she's no artist. To prove her point, Vashti jabs at a blank sheet of paper to make an unremarkable and angry mark. "There!" she says. That one little dot marks the beginning of Vashti's journey of surprise and self-discovery. That special moment is the core of Peter H. Reynolds' delicate fable about the creative spirit in all of us.



Grade 3 -*Weslandia* by Paul Fleischman

Enter the witty, intriguing world of Weslandia! Now that school is over, Wesley needs a summer project. He's learned that each civilization needs a staple food crop, so he decides to sow a garden and start his own—civilization, that is. He turns over a plot of earth, and plants begin to grow. As Wesley experiments, he finds that the plant will provide food, clothing, shelter, and even recreation. It isn't long before his neighbors and classmates develop more than an idle curiosity about Wesley—and exactly how he is spending his summer vacation.



Grade 4 -*Cricket in Times Square* by George Selden

Tucker is a streetwise city mouse. He thought he'd seen it all. But he's never met a cricket before, which really isn't surprising, because, along with his friend Harry Cat, tourist in the city, he wants to look around. And he could not have found two better guides—and friends—than Tucker and Harry. Chester makes a third friend, too. It is a boy, Mario, who rescues Chester from a dusty corner of the subway station and brings him to live in the safety of his parents' newsstand. He hopes at first to keep Chester as a pet, but Mario soon understands that the cricket is more than that. Because Chester has a hidden talent and no one—not even Chester himself—realizes that the little country cricket may just be able to teach even the toughest New Yorkers a thing or two.

Basic Early Literacy Skills: Stepping Stones



Building Fluent Readers

One of our literacy goals at DMS this year is focusing on best practices in teaching reading foundational skills. Oral reading fluency is one stepping stone explicitly taught in the area of reading. Students need ample reading practice to develop fluent reading of text. Fluent readers do not need to spend a lot of time decoding the words on the page and can focus their attention on comprehension. Accurate reading, appropriate rate, and using expression leads to understanding the text in front of them while making connections and accessing background knowledge.

As part of your child's literacy instruction, teachers are explicitly teaching and practicing reading fluency in Kindergarten through Grade 4. Fluency instruction focuses on accuracy, reading rate, and expression to support comprehension. Students in every classroom are reading with purpose in order to gain meaning within a variety of genres. They are learning to recognize words automatically where each reading sounds natural, as if they are speaking.


After it is fully developed, reading fluency refers to a level of accuracy and rate where decoding is relatively effortless; where oral reading is smooth and accurate with correct prosody; and where attention can be allocated to comprehension (WOLF, 2003).


Greetings, Families!

We hope that 2019 is off to a positive start! Since the beginning of the school year, many of you may have heard your child talking about earning WISH tickets, stamps, or filling his or her classroom bucket. You may be asking, "What does all this mean?"

Below is an explanation of the positive behavior support program that is being used at DMS.

Individual Level - WISH Tickets

WISH Tickets are given to individual students or to small groups of students who are observed going beyond what is expected. Students can earn WISH tickets in the classroom, in the hallway, at specials, recess, and lunch for a variety of behaviors, such as helping another student pick up a book he or she dropped.



When students earn WISH tickets, they put their name on them and put them in their classroom raffle. At the end of the week, two tickets are chosen per classroom and the winning students get to choose from their classroom reinforcement options. This may include pencils, bookmarks, their choice of seat for the week, or choosing a movement break for the class.

Classroom Level - Buckets

Each classroom has a bucket that students in the class work together to fill. When a majority of the class is meeting expectations, students can earn stamps that will fill their bucket. Once the bucket is filled, the class can choose an activity that the entire class can participate in. This may include extra recess, special guest readers, extra movement breaks, or a stuffed animal day!



Whole School Level - Bucket Challenges

All the classrooms in each grade level work together to fill enough buckets to participate in the school-wide bucket challenge. There are three challenges each year. Each grade level that reaches the bucket goal during the time frame participates in an assembly. This year students have earned the opportunity to watch the Principal and the Assistant Principal get covered with Silly String.

How can you reinforce at home?


When your children bring home their WISH tickets at the end of the week or tell you they earned a WISH ticket:

- Praise them for earning a WISH Ticket.
- Ask them why they earned the WISH Ticket.
- Ask them how earning a WISH ticket made them feel.
- Talk about how it makes others feel when we are following the DMS WISH.

For our next challenge they will get to meet Roxy the famous pig.

We hope that this helps to answer any questions that you might have about the positive behavior supports that are happening at DMS!

Our goal for the year is to keep families informed about grade level curriculum in Music, Art, Library, and Physical Education and how they can support their children at home.

Music

This month third graders will reinforce their rhythm reading skills and add a new note– a dotted half note. Students will sing familiar songs that include dotted half notes, such as “Take Me Out to the Ball Game” and “America.” Students will experience how dotted half notes can be used in music in a $\frac{3}{4}$ time signature. That means there are 3 beats in a measure. Did you know that waltzes are in $\frac{3}{4}$ time? We will practice playing songs that use dotted half notes of note such as, “Whether the Weather.” Students will create their own “weather rhythms” and perform them on instruments.

A **big** thank you to the Stonington Education Fund who awarded DMS music a new instrument, coming soon! We can’t wait to play the contra-bass bar that is going to sound awesome with our Orff Instrumentarium. It’s a low pitch that will be great for many steady beat activities as well as for accompanying students while they’re singing. Thank you, SEF!

Art

Third grade will be cozying up with some yarn this February. Textiles and fibers have been used as a means of artistic expression throughout time and from every culture across the world. The variety and versatility of this medium makes it infinitely interesting; there are just so many possibilities! We will look at various examples of weaving from different times in history, such as African Kente Cloth and Renaissance tapestries, and discuss how fiber arts vary from art forms like painting and drawing. Typically, art made from fibers had a function or purpose in addition to providing decoration. Third graders will be weaving their own small tapestry. We will use different techniques and patterns to make the tapestries unique and textural.

Physical Education

Third graders have been having a ball (*no pun intended*) in PE class this marking period! Their most recent games/activities have been some of their all-time favorites— Quidditch and Box Polo. If you know the Harry Potter stories, then you know Quidditch. We played a muggle version, and the most popular position to play was Harry’s position, the Seeker. This was a fan favorite because it involved strategy on how to capture the golden snitch (*our Zee Ball*) on one bounce, which required quickness, agility, and focus for when that time came. The game was full of fast action play by the Beaters, the Chasers, and the Goalkeepers. The beaters used their “bludgers to stop the chasers from throwing the “quaffle” into the rings high above the goalkeepers, who protected their goal with their goal sticks. It was such fun to play this game!

Box Polo is another fast-action game that involves the shooting skills of floor hockey and the defensive skills of goalkeeping. A twist in this game is that points are bad so the team with zero or the lowest points wins. These games are fun and full of high energy, which in turn gives every student a cardiovascular workout to be remembered.



Our building project is moving further along by the day!

On the first floor, classrooms are being painted while we wait for the delivery of built-in classroom cases. In the classrooms, the mechanical systems are being inspected above the ceilings and ceiling tiles are being installed. Moisture mitigation in the concrete subflooring is complete in the corridors and the installation of the flooring tiles is being coordinated for off hours.

On the second floor, classrooms and hallways are painted. Installation of countertops and window sill millwork is ongoing and plumbers are installing sinks. The second floor hallway is nearly complete and we are awaiting delivery of lockers.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE, CONTINUED

In the kitchen, tile flooring has been installed and food service equipment was delivered. Each piece is being set in place and connected to gas and electricity, and installation will be completed by early February. Painting in the cafeteria is nearly complete, allowing for installation of the ceiling grid. The HVAC ductwork contractor installed return air grilles in the ceiling. The construction trades will complete finishes (i.e. painting, floor tile, etc.) as they work their way down the main corridor and into the cafeteria.

On the outside of the building, windows have been installed in all classrooms and in the cafeteria. This has allowed the installation of exterior metal panels to begin. The contractor is working his way around from the east elevation and rapidly covering the insulation board with the final finished panels.

We are excited to share that the playground design has been reviewed by the state and approved by the K-12 Building Committee for funding. Construction will begin once the equipment has arrived and the temperatures support installing the concrete footings for the equipment.

Registration will be by appointment and will take approximately 30 minutes to complete. Children don't need to be present at the time of registration.

Eligibility

A child must be five years old on or before January 1, 2020.

****State Law requires students to register for school by age 6. If you are unsure about your child's readiness for kindergarten, feel free to contact DMS Principal, Jennifer McCurdy (jmccurdy@stoningtonschools.org) or WV/WB Principal, Alicia Dawe (adawe@stoningtonschools.org) to discuss enrollment options.**

To register*, you MUST bring the following:

1. **Proof of Residency** (All 3 listed below):
 - SIGNED LEASE AGREEMENT OR MORTGAGE
 - CURRENT UTILITY BILL (ELECTRIC, PHONE, CABLE)
 - DRIVER'S LICENSE/CAR REGISTRATION
 2. Child's birth certificate or passport
 3. Legal guardianship papers (if applicable)
 4. Custody papers (if applicable)
 5. **Kindergarten Health Assessments** must be completed prior to entry into school. All Kindergarten Physicals must be completed between January 1st and Dec 31st of the calendar year the child starts school. If the exam was done prior to January 1st, entry to school is accepted until a new physical exam is completed one year from the date of the last physical to remain compliant in school. Please bring documentation of the **MOST RECENT PHYSICAL** with you to registration.
 6. Immunizations Records
 7. **Lead screening results:** Universal blood lead testing is mandated in CT. Children are tested between 9 months and 36 months of age. Proof of testing is required prior to the start of school. This should be documented on physical exam form.

Kindergarten Registration

If you have a child who will be entering Kindergarten in the fall, feel free to send the school nurse results of a recent physical and immunization records. Be sure to complete the Kindergarten Registration— see p. 16.

Absence and Illness Policy

It is imperative during the cold and flu season that you are reminded of the illness policy.

24-Hour Rule

If a child complains of illness, has a temperature over 100°, or is judged to be ill by the nurse, parents/guardians will be called. The child should remain home until the temperature has remained normal, without the use of fever-reducing medications, for 24 hours. The “24-Hour Rule” also applies for vomiting and diarrhea. Please notify the school nurse with information regarding illness/injury. If your child is seen by a medical provider, please provide a doctor’s note.
