Planning, assessment and setting up the learning environment will all be considered.

Research in action

The session will look at ways to move away from just being informed by predominant education perspectives from the UK, to being creators of knowledge of what works in the context of our own schools. Drawing on the comprehensive research experience of the Institute of Learning, coupled with the partnership with Durham University, a range of high value research projects are being led within and beyond the group. These projects focus on leadership and pedagogy in international and bilingual contexts. As well as briefing delegates on the key elements of the action research approach, the session will discuss opportunities of how schools can be part of Early Years Hubs across SE Asia, Europe and the Middle East.
