One of the key changes to our schedule this year is the institution of the activity period. This activity period is used to help broaden our extracurricular options for students as well as to supply more access to teachers during the day for academic help. For students who participate in sports or band, their access to teachers either before or after school has always been limited and challenging to accomplish. This activity period is 25 minutes every day right before lunch, and students can use it to meet with their clubs, meet as student leadership, meet with individual teachers, or use it as a study hall. Born to Ride

This summer, three Fuqua Falcons participated in many horseback riding championships and clinics. While

horseback riding is not a well-known sport in the school industry, riders put a lot of dedication and practice into the activity than we may know. Riders travel across the country to many different states participating in a wide range of riding events winning ribbons and improving their skills as they go.

Fugua School senior Candace Pembelton performed in the United States Pony Club Championships located in Lexington, Kentucky. Beginning in 1954, the United States Pony Club offers many horse shows, competitions, weekly riding lessons, and several clinics to riders striving to further their knowledge on the sport. To this day, the club continues to focus on teaching the proper care of both horses and ponies. The mission of the Pony Club is to develop character, leadership, and confidence while learning how to successfully ride both horses and ponies. Pembelton takes riding lessons once a week, practicing for an hour each time. While training she usually focuses on jumping, depending on what trainer is coaching her. "It's very hot while training, so you have to give your horse lots of breaks and you have to keep working until you get it right," said Pembelton. "It is important to keep trying because all horses learn by repetition."

Another senior Falcon, Savannah Wilson, also takes part in horseback riding. "I started riding when I was six years old," said Wilson. "I compete in a lot of events, but mostly hunter/jumper competitions." Horseback riding has been a major part of Wilson's life since a very young age, providing her with an abundance of time to practice new techniques and to improve her riding skills. Wilson's favorite part about riding is that she is always learning how to perform new things and continuing to

further her skills every time she practices.

Sophomore Rachel Chernault also started horseback riding at a young age. She competes in barrel racing with her horse requiring a lot of speed, balance, and practice. "I love barrel racing!" exclaimed Chernault. "One of my favorite parts about horseback riding is getting the opportunity to create a strong connection with the horses which helps both you and the horse achieve more when you are riding."

How You Seen It?

If you have been out back of the lower and middle school campuses, you may have noticed that our fish pond has

been spruced up quite a bit! This beautification project was all part of the Bronze Award offered by the Girl Scouts of America. The Bronze Award is the highest honor a Girl Scout Junior can achieve prior to moving onto the Cadette level.

Junior Girl Scout members, Ella Estes and Marissa Dempsey (both 6th graders) decided to pursue the Bronze Award for several reasons. Ella said that she, "wanted to do something that would help our school" while Marissa stated that she was excited about the college scholarship offers that can come in high school after obtaining the Bronze Award. The purpose of the Bronze Award is to create a lasting change within one's community. The girls selected the LS/MS Fish Pond because it was "in desperate need of help". They were worried the fish would eventually die out and felt that if they could fix the space up nicely, then it would be a nice place for all lower and middle school students to enjoy.

To put their plan into action, the girls first needed to do research on how to clean up and restore an existing fish pond. They then needed to create a budget that would allow them to make this project come to life. Next they purchased supplies, created a design, and cleaned up the area. Some of their improvements, besides restoring the fish pond, include: fixing the outdoor benches that were beside the pond, pruning back the bushes by the fence, painting the wood around the pond, donating a bench, planting flowers, and creating stepping stones for their flower bed. While most of the work was done by Ella and Marissa, they did want to acknowledge those that helped in some way: their moms, Ella's brother, Levi, T.V. Burkes, as well as her cousins, and another 6th grader, Lexi Piedra.

Different Note Values & Rhythms

LOWER SCHOOL

With the arrival of the instruments and books, this year's 4th grade recorder class is finally in full swing. The class is working out of several different method books, but the main one is Hands on Recorder by Sweet Pipes publishers. The class will be able to earn recorder karate belts throughout the year, but the main excitement will be coming soon with the addition of ukuleles! Not only will the 4th graders be able to learn to play their recorders, but they will also be strumming along by the end of the school year! Listen for a special "ear worm" song to be performed at our Family and Friends Day program this coming spring.

The 5th grade band has had the opportunity to learn to put their instruments together carefully and correctly as well as learning their first two notes. They are learning all about different note values and rhythms as well as the note names and pitches. As the weeks go by this fall they will be able to play simple songs like "Hot Cross Buns" and "Jingle Bells."

Spirited Debate

The World Religion students were debating religious beliefs in Hinduism, the world's oldest religion. Hinduism claims to be a monotheistic religion, yet they have over three million gods. Each debate defended either the fact that they are monotheistic or that they were not. It was a very good and spirited debate.

Inquiry Drives the Discussion

UPPER SCHOOL

The students in Latin 3, taught by Upper School Head Alex Huggard, joined together in their second Socratic seminar of the semester on Thursday, September 13. Within this format, student inquiry drives the discussion, and the teacher acts as facilitator, evaluating how effectively the class members engage with the text and each other. As pupils master their roles in the seminar, they grow in both critical thinking and expressive skills. The most recent topic under discussion was the philosophical problem of evil within a theistic conception of divine goodness or human goodness, or how to reconcile the presence of evil with a belief in God. In advance of the exercise, the young scholars read from Michael Peterson's text on the subject and prepared questions and avenues for exploration. The Latin 3 Socratic seminar series will continue throughout the coming months.

The Challenge

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Middle school students have been challenged by Mrs. Tucker and Mrs. Jefferson to draft and build a 3D model for a new middle school courtyard. They currently have a beautiful grassy lawn with no shade and wooded background. It is peaceful, but lacks adequate seating for all of the students in 6th through 8th grade. This is an opportunity to blend many STEAM processes together while also having input and ownership in what "their" space will look like.

The students have created an idea board in the STEAM Lab where students are currently working on their designs. Using the engineering and design process, they have implemented some of their ideas to draw an architectural plan for their new space. They have also determined that the new courtyard will be used primarily during arrival and break time. Depending on the model selected, it may be utilized as an outdoor classroom space, as well.

They also realize that they cannot create this space without help. That is why they will also create a written or video proposal to the Heads of School and the PTSA. It is their hope to have their ideas considered for the final project. They also hope the PTSA will engage our community's time and talent in helping to help make this a safe, enjoyable place for our middle school students.
