

## DAVIS SCHOOL DISTRICT HOMEWORK GUIDELINES (part 2 of 2)

- Teachers should be aware of research regarding homework.
- Homework should be at the appropriate level of difficulty.
- Homework could be started in class to ensure all students understand how to do it.
- Homework should not comprise a significant portion of a student's grade.
- Homework should not be given as a punishment or removed as a reward.
- Teachers should clearly communicate the purpose, directions, and expectations for homework to students and parents.
- Teachers should provide parents with information regarding large projects which require homework. The work should be divided into manageable segments with intermittent due dates and ongoing feedback.
- Homework should not require any material that is not readily and commonly available in homes or provided by the school.
- Teachers should outline the role that technology will play in instruction and the degree to which it will be required at home.
- In general, homework should not require more than approximately 5-10 minutes per night, per grade level, to be completed by a typical student. In the early grades (K-3), it is expected that additional reading time may also be assigned. Advanced academic programs such as Spectrum, Honors, Advanced Placement (AP), Concurrent Enrollment (CE), International Baccalaureate and some elective courses may require additional homework.
- Teachers should carefully monitor the amount of homework assigned so that it is appropriate to students' age levels and does not take away too much time from home activities.
- Teachers should consider how many problems, or how much practice, is actually needed for students to reach proficiency.
- Teachers should avoid assigning homework that must be done during weekends and holiday breaks or during summer recess and off-track sessions in year-round schools.

we will have our second required lockdown drill next Monday afternoon? During a lockdown drill students and teachers are asked to clear the hallways, lock doors, turn out lights, cover the window, move out of sight and maintain silence. People inside the building remain silent until first responders can clear hallways and unlock each door. Parents and visitors inside the building follow all lockdown procedures as well. A real lockdown would be called in a situation when there is a potential threat or hazard inside the school building. In an actual lockdown, the school would contact 911 and local police and other emergency agencies would gather at the school to coordinate the response. The situation would then fall under the command of the lead police agency, in our case Centerville Police Department. During a real lockdown parents should receive updates and information by Davis School District. Initial information is typically distributed through a callout to all emergency contact and might include an email and text message for those who opt-in to receive texts. Updates would also be posted to the school's website, as well as the district's Facebook and Twitter accounts. We appreciate your help as we practice lockdown procedures with your child. We value your child's safety and consider it our top priority. We want to be prepared in the event of an actual threat.






#### THREE THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT THREE FAMOUS AFRICAN-AMERICANS...
