#### **Parking and Traffic Flow – Don't Shoot the Messenger!**

You may have noticed over the past couple of weeks that Southridge facilities personnel are helping to coordinate traffic flow during pick-up, and they have been stationed at key areas that typically generate congestion – often made worse when rules, routines and expectations are not being followed.

The first key area of consideration is at the mid-campus crosswalk that leads to our sports fields. This is a critical confluence of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. Our facilities employee stationed in this zone helps students cross through traffic while also keeping an eye on congestion caused by people who are parked/waiting in their vehicles along the northern border of our turf field, which is meant to be kept clear.

The reason for keeping this portion of our driveway clear is two-fold. First, it allows people to gain entry to our campus by lessening the length of the line that winds itself around our parking lot to the entrance at the traffic lights off 160<sup>th</sup> Street. Second, it allows people to follow our designated exit routes without driving into on-coming traffic.

The second key area of consideration is at the Senior School pick-up zone. An additional facilities employee is stationed in this area to keep the flow of traffic moving by helping people negotiation congestion. Remember there are three lanes in this area: the two outside lanes are for picking-up while the centre lane allows for the continuous flow of vehicles. Our facilities employee will help keep the centre lane clear so that people can more easily navigate this area of our campus in a safe manner.

Although you may not realize on a daily basis, the parking lot at Southridge is very well designed. By independent school standards – and confirmed by architects and traffic consultants alike – our community is lucky to have such a large portion of its campus accessible by vehicle; however, the engineers who designed our traffic flow did so under the assumption that the designations indicated on signs, curbs and road markings would be followed. Unfortunately, when even one person does not abide by our traffic flow parameters, the whole systems falls apart.

Our facilities team is in place to help ensure the engineering plan for our traffic flow works as it should. While I understand the design characteristics of our parking lot may not be convenient for any one individual, they are purposeful, safety oriented and designed for



the collective good. Our employees are the "messengers" of the rules, and they have a difficult job to do. Please treat them with kindness and respect, and appreciate the intent behind their efforts – the safety of (y)our children.

Drive with caution (especially with snow on the ground), follow the rules, pay close attention, appreciate the collective, be patient and slow down.

# Student-Led Learning Conferences: Thursday, February 21, (11:45am dismissal)

On Thursday, February 21, students will have the opportunity host their own Student-Led Learning Conference. The purpose of Student-Led Learning Conferences is to provide each child with the opportunity to independently communicate their learning and daily classroom experiences in a developmentally appropriate manner with their parents. Another goal of the conference is to help students take responsibility for their learning. Students will not just talk about what they are learning, but also about how they are learning, which may be contextualized through the attributes of the IB Learner Profile and/or the Approaches to Learning.

In the PYP grades, your child may share work samples, items from their portfolios, reflections and goals, give demonstrations, describe routines, and may also ask you to participate in different activities in the classroom to give you a window into their learning day. In the MYP grades, your child will share a digital portfolio in which they have documented aspects of their learning through the lenses of the Approaches to Learning (ATL), as well as their yearly goals, and reflections on their progress towards meeting their goals to date.

Please be aware that there will be an 11:45 am dismissal on that day to accommodate the conferences. Please save the date and plan to be present to support your child. The students really look forward to having the opportunity to share and shine!

#### **Dominica 2020 Student Trip**

Dear Parent/Guardian,

I would like to invite you to an informational session about a potential two-week expedition to Dominica in summer 2020 to help with biodiversity surveys run by Operation Wallacea. The presentation will be held at Southridge on **Thursday, February 21<sup>st</sup> at 6:30 pm in the Senior School Library** and is open to students in Grades 10, 11 and 12 (in the 2019/2020 school year).

Dominica is one of the most unspoilt islands of the Caribbean – its steep forested cliffs rise straight out of the sea, and the deep forest canyons and waterfalls have made mechanical clearance on the island impossible. Operation Wallacea is working with the Forestry Department to enhance their datasets on the forest dynamics and faunal communities and students have the opportunity to help with this research.

In their first week, the students will be based in a rainforest research centre, sleeping in dormitories or tents. They will assist with various surveys, such as bird surveys (both early morning mist nets trapping and standard point counts), forest structure, herpetofauna surveys (including documenting the spread of an invasive anolis lizard), freshwater ecological surveys, bat surveys and invertebrate surveys. During this week they will also complete a course on Caribbean Island Ecology and have the chance to either take part in a half day canyoning activity or go on a day excursion to visit some of Dominica's stunning volcanic sites and learn about some of the island's exciting geothermal activity.

For the second week, the group will travel to Fort Shirley in the Cabrits National Park, where students will snorkel while completing a Caribbean reef ecology and survey methods course. Students will also be taking part in sea mammal research using the knowledge and skills that they have gained.

It is also possible to complete an Independent Research Project while on expedition, and the expedition covers key aspects of biology, geography and environmental science syllabuses.

A quote for the expedition will be presented to students and parents at the presentation. The quote will include food and accommodation while on the expedition, comprehensive medical insurance, training and participation in the research program and dive/snorkel equipment rental. It will also include the cost of international flights, internal transfers and hotel stays. It will not include transport to and from the airport in Canada, incidental expenses such as souvenirs and meals on the international flights or at the airports.
