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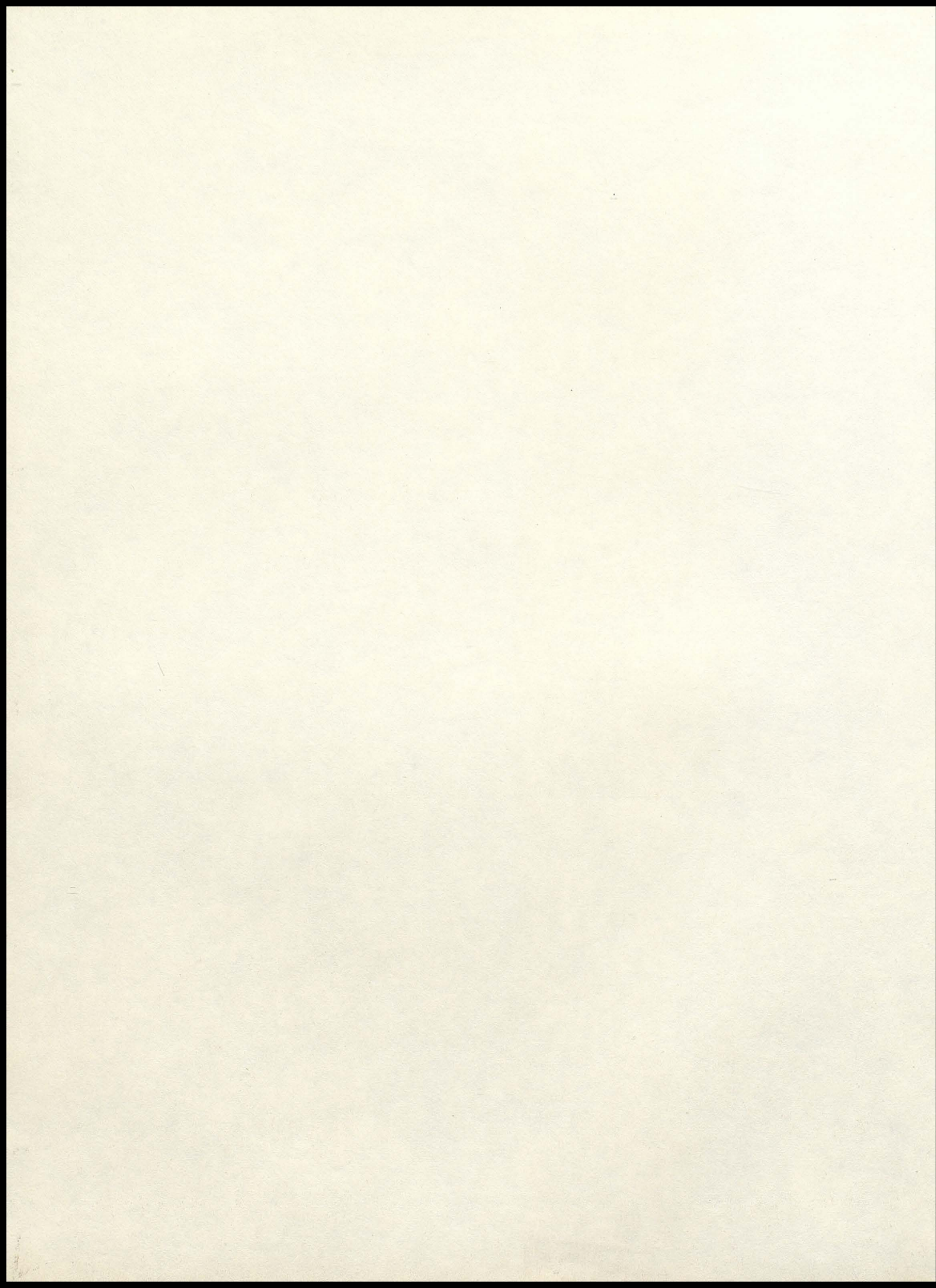



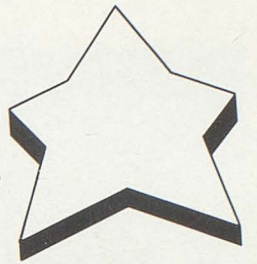

Some day you are bound to win!

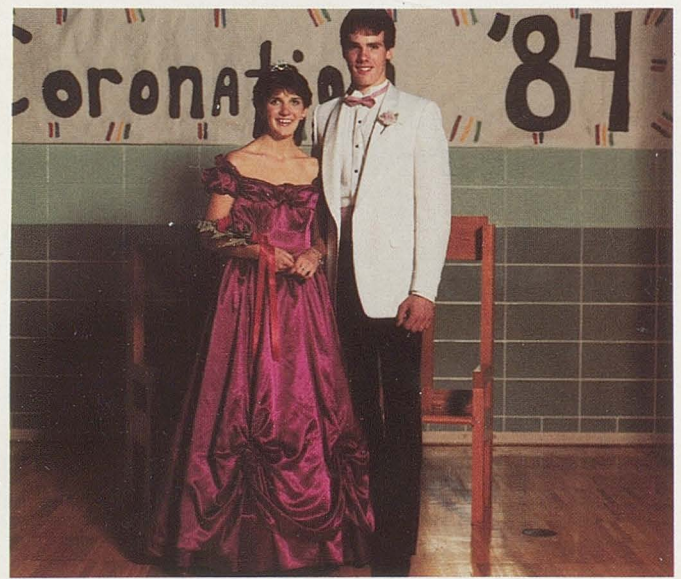
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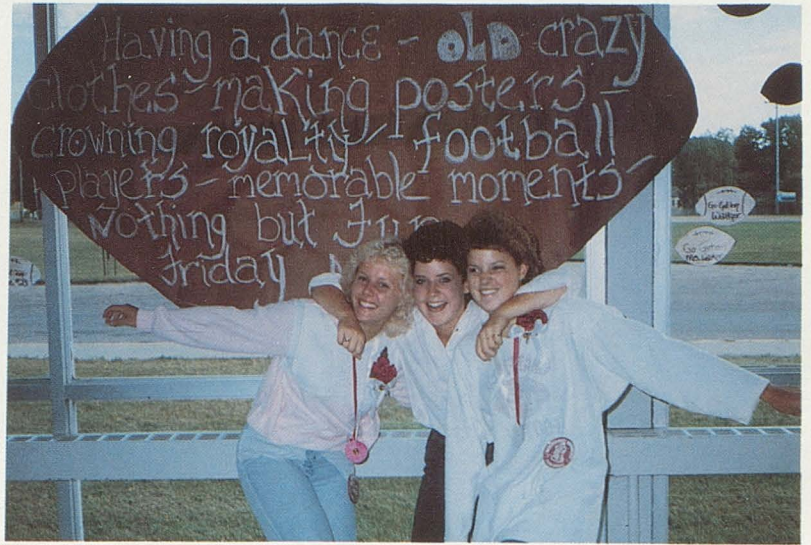

New At CVHS



Energy Savings

On June 4, 1984, a project was begun at CVHS that would provide a 9.97 year payback period in energy savings. The project was the replacement of all windows in the 1958 portion except for the windows in the lunch room.

Originally, the exterior and interior court yard walls were lined with $\frac{1}{4}$ -in plate glass windows. Now the walls contain sheetrock, brick and insulation.

Each room has two small, thermal glass windows. Venetian blinds are enclosed within the double glass windows.

Ample circulation of air will be provided by the windows during warm weather; while uni-vents will continue to circulate cool or warm air, as needed, during the winter months.

Accu-tab

Our school is one of many who have purchased an Accu-tab (pictured at the right). It is not required by the state, but it is recommended so that an accurate count can be kept of those eating hot lunch.

Each ticket is used for ten days. Nine buttons are coded into the ticket in the form of stripes. Each person has a different code which the Accu-tab can read.

After the lunch line is through, the nine buttons are pushed and the count is given for each of the following categories: milk, adult, free, reduced, general students, and tokens. The pieces cut off from the tickets are put into an envelope each day. The state auditor later checks the envelopes to make sure accurate counts are being taken.

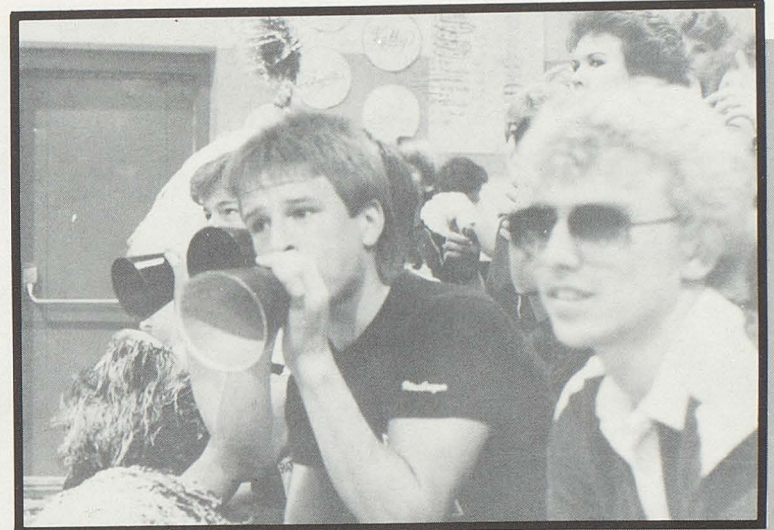
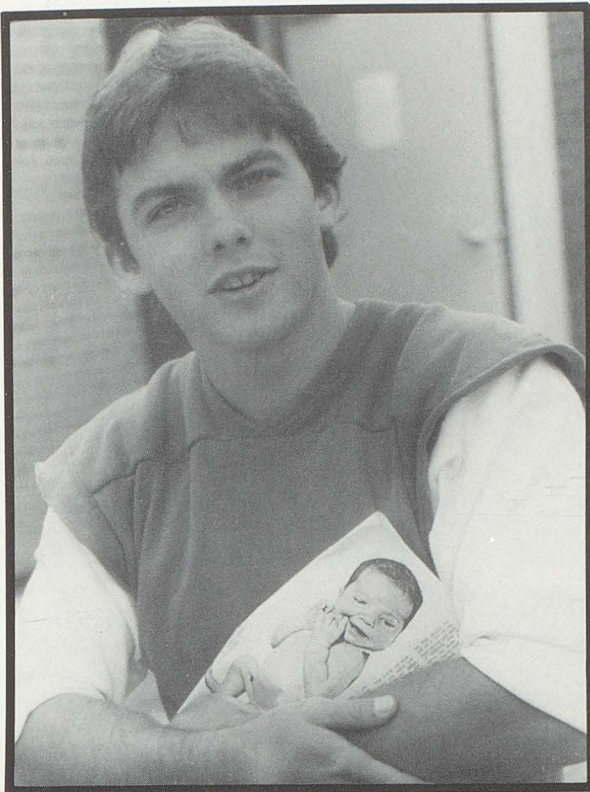

Opportunities Abound

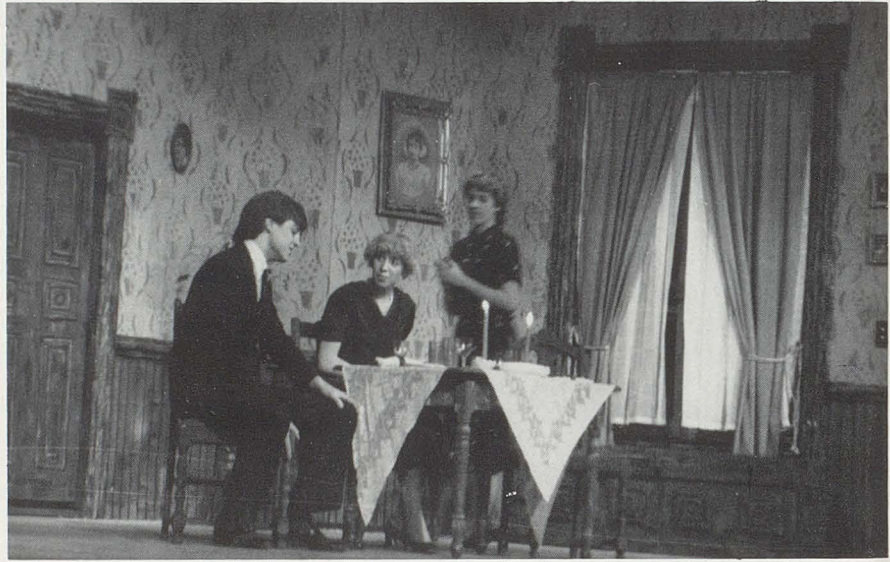
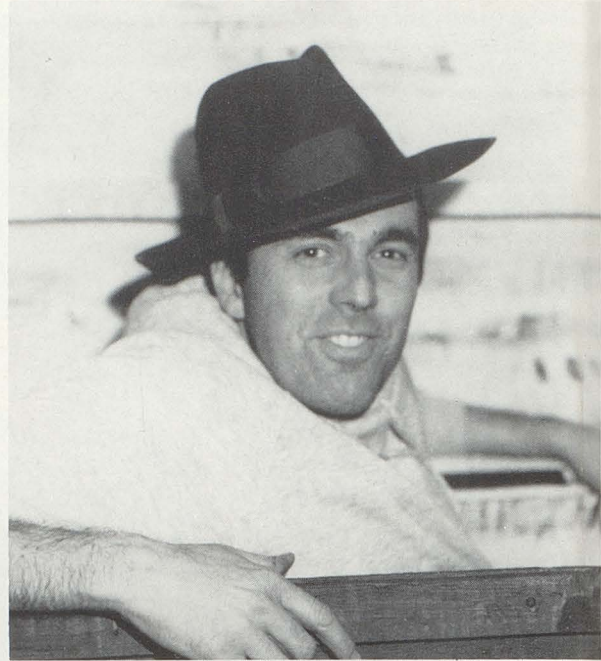
There are many opportunities for young actors and actresses in our school to develop acting skills by participating in drama. The Children's Traveling Theatre and One Act Play Contest are two such options.

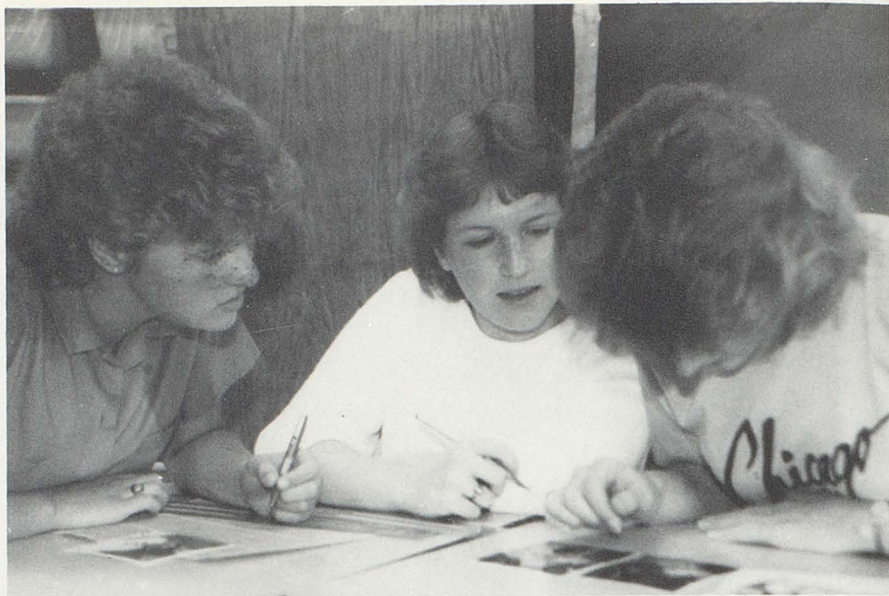


Opportunity To Use Creative Skills

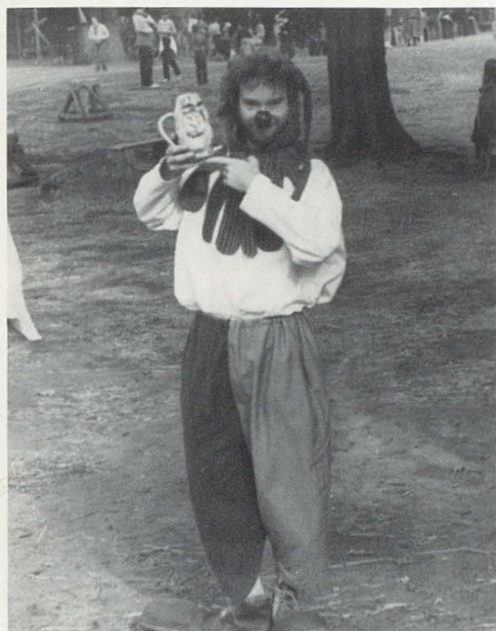

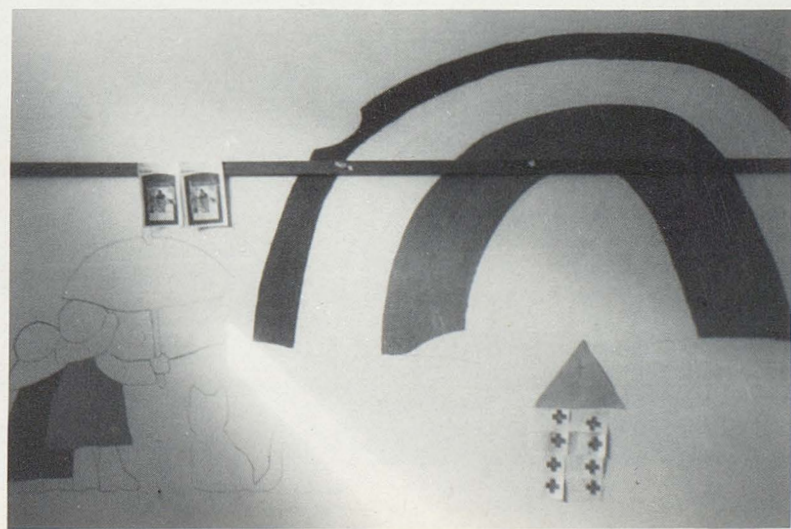
Art Club is open to anyone in grades seven through twelve. During their meetings they work on a variety of arts and crafts projects.

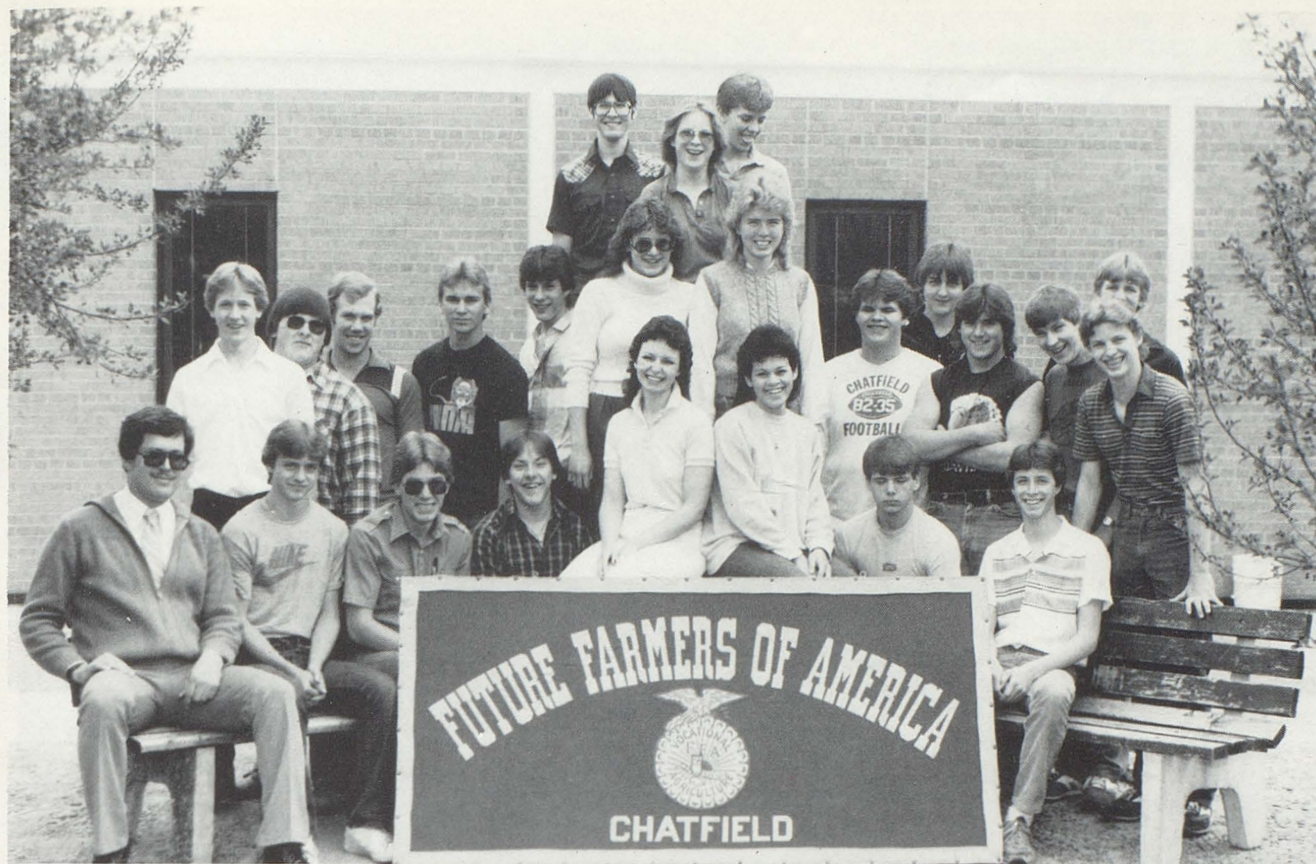
Chapter Makes Achievements

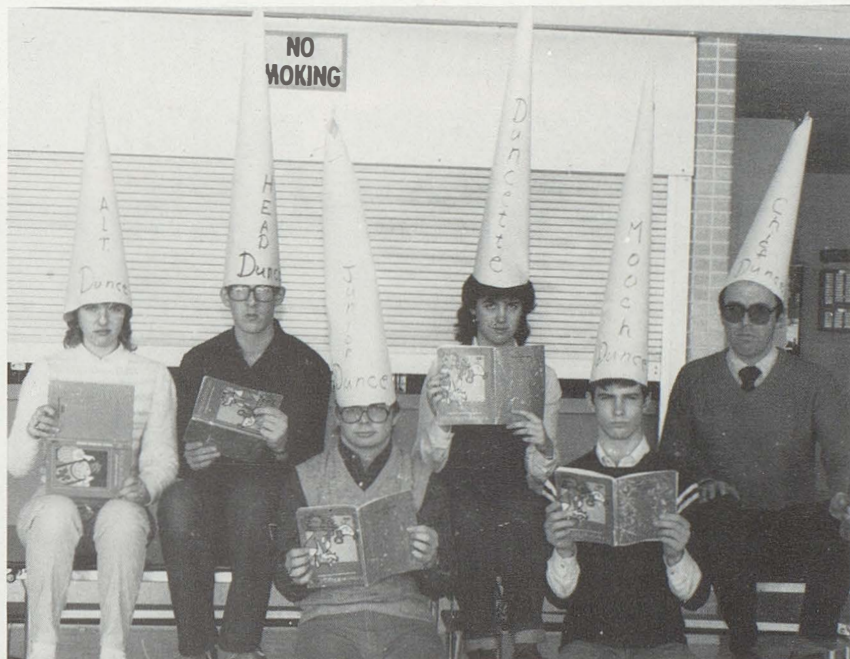
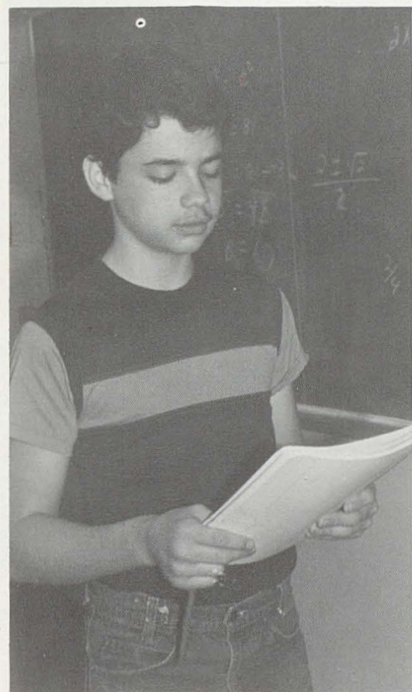

Team Off To A Great Start

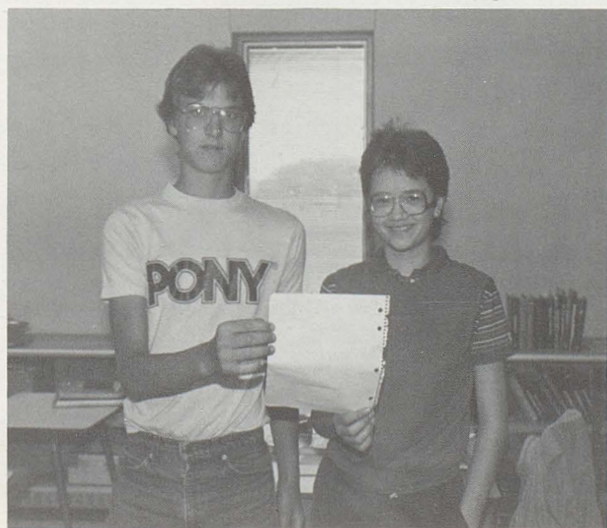

"AFS Club is great! It offers many opportunities to meet students from countries all over the world," said one AFS Club member.

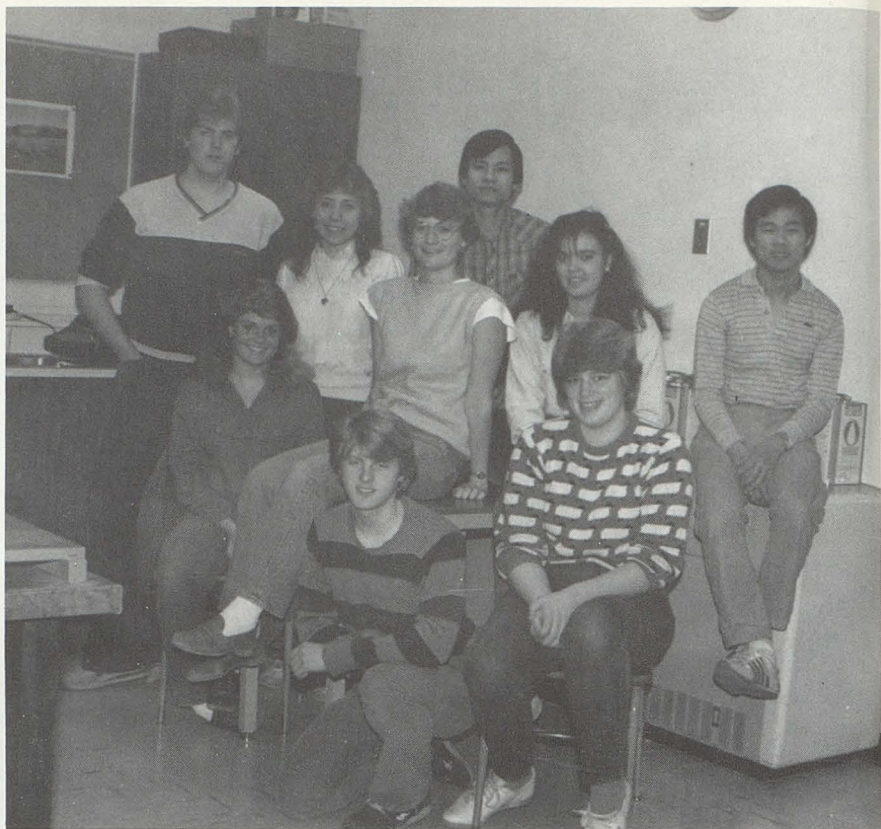

Never A Dull Moment

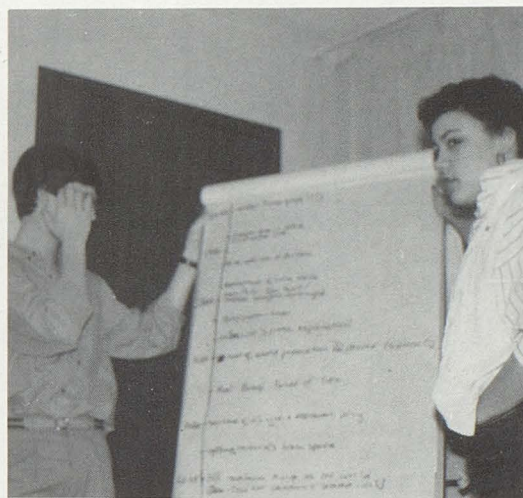

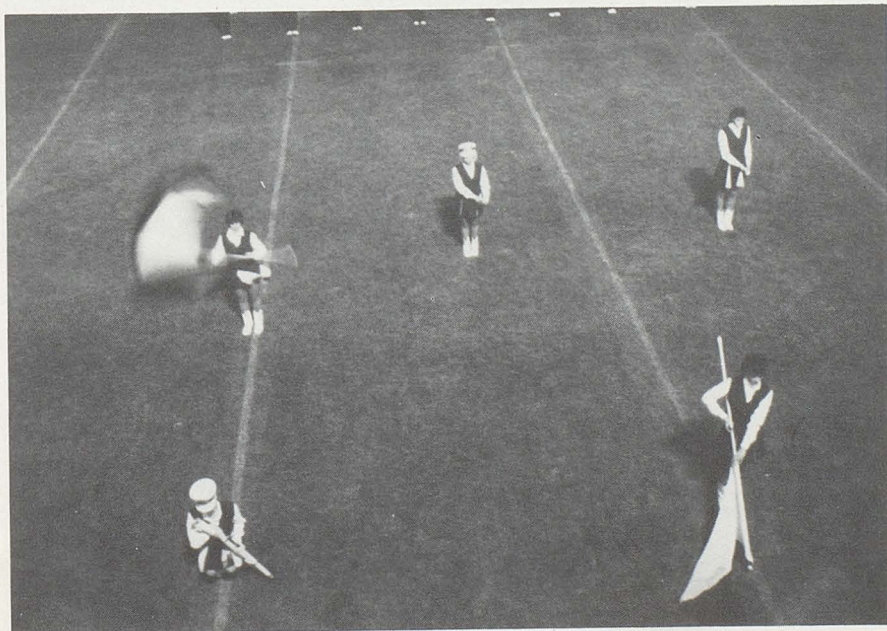

Music Department Remains Strong

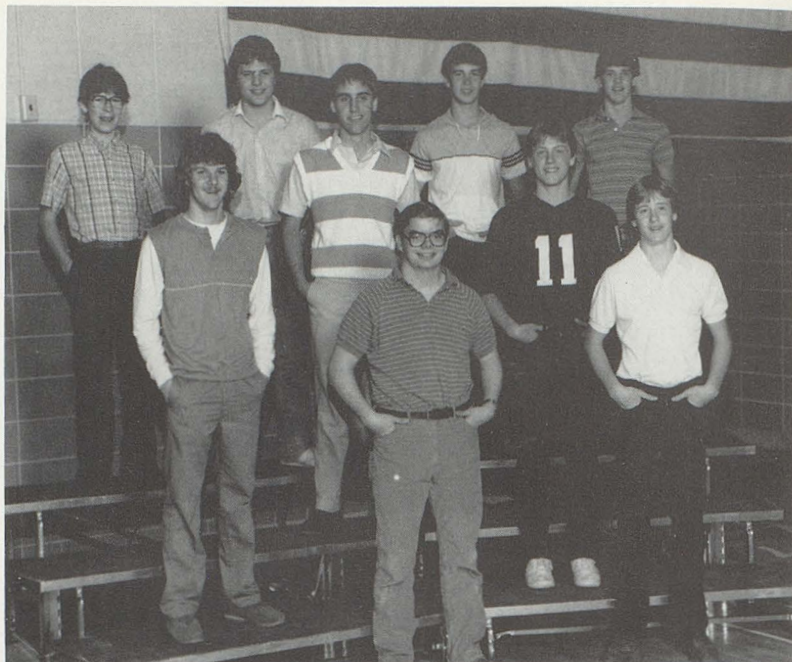
Chorale, like band, met only every other day this year. The program didn't appear to suffer, however. The Chorale earned a superior in the district music contest by obtaining three stars.

A Better Season For The Gophers

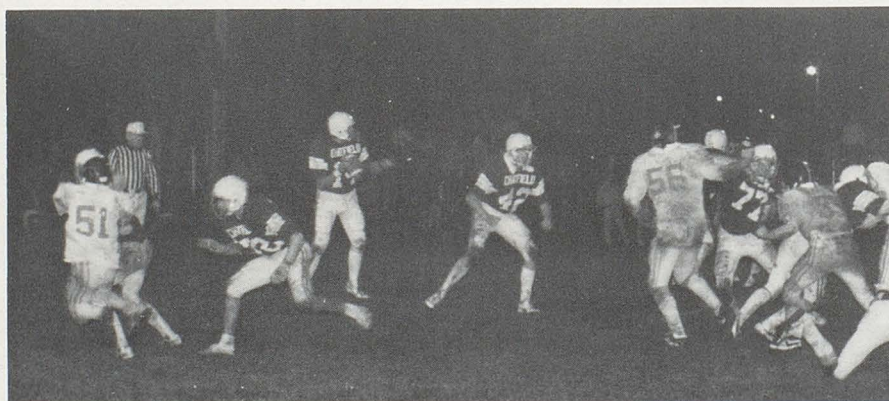

Exceptional Wrestlers Emerge

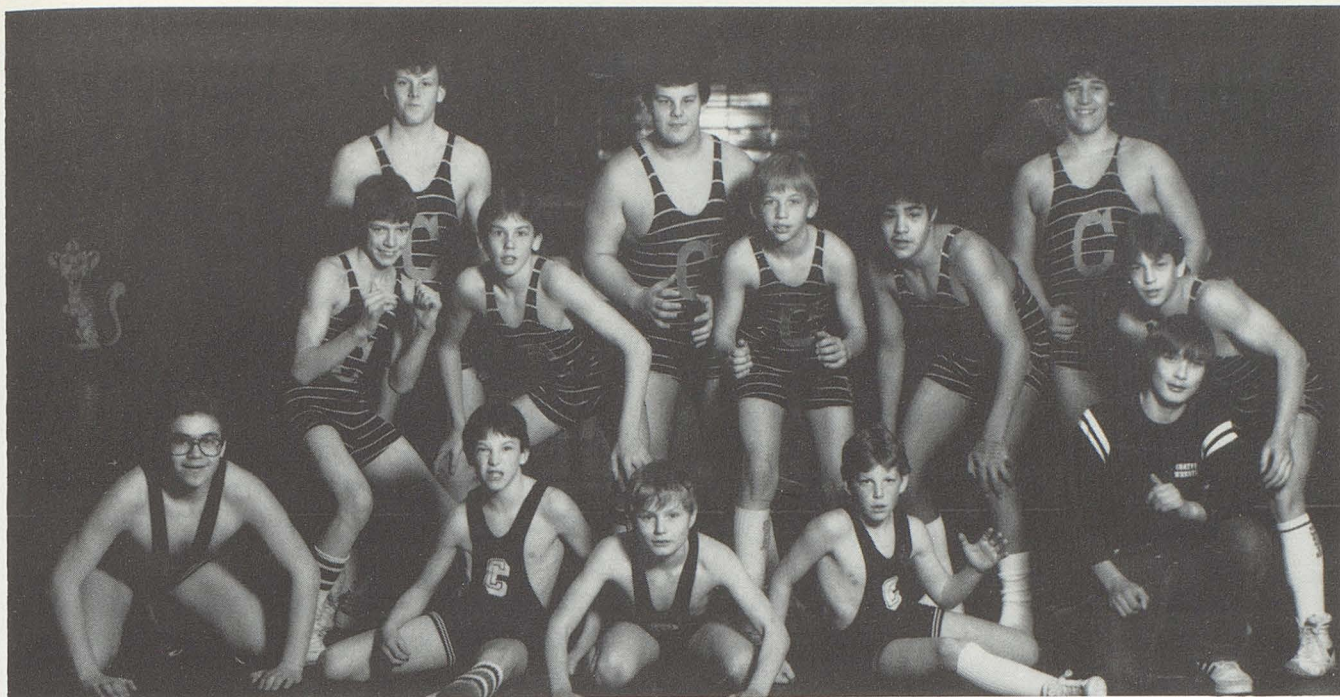

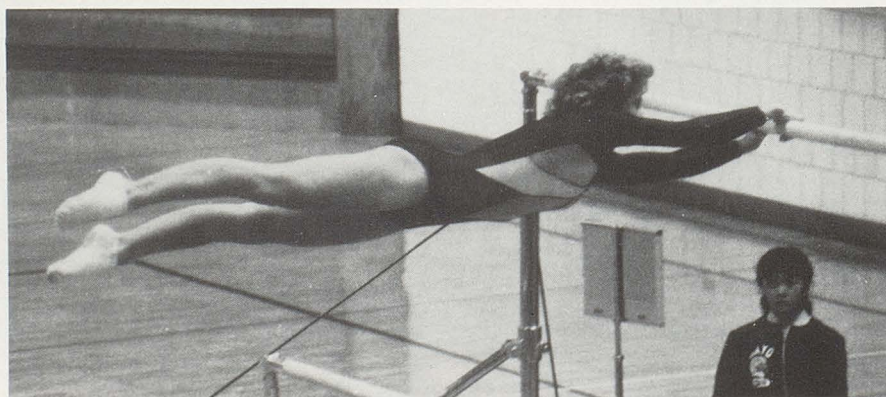
Leaping To Fame

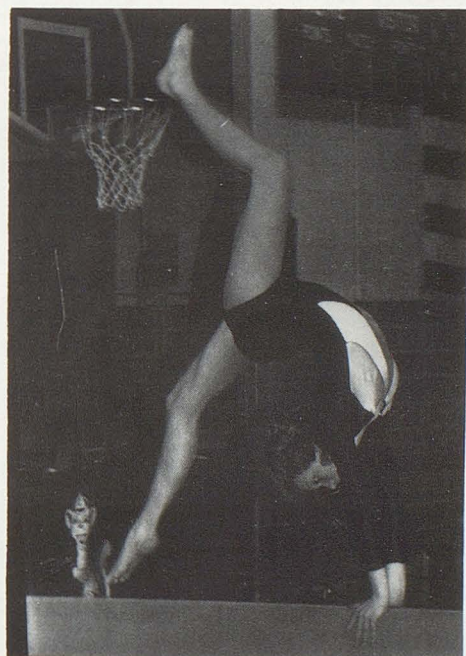
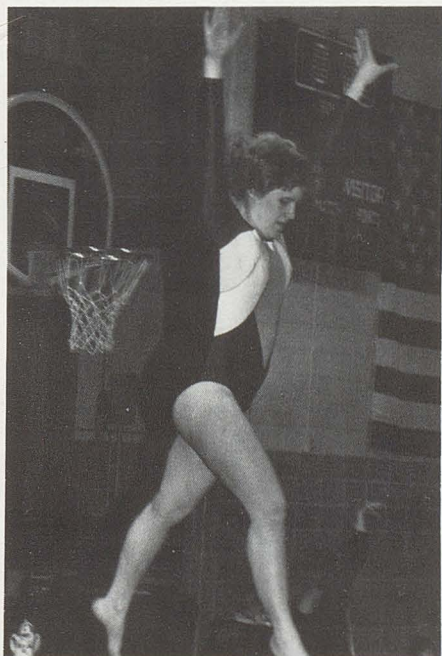

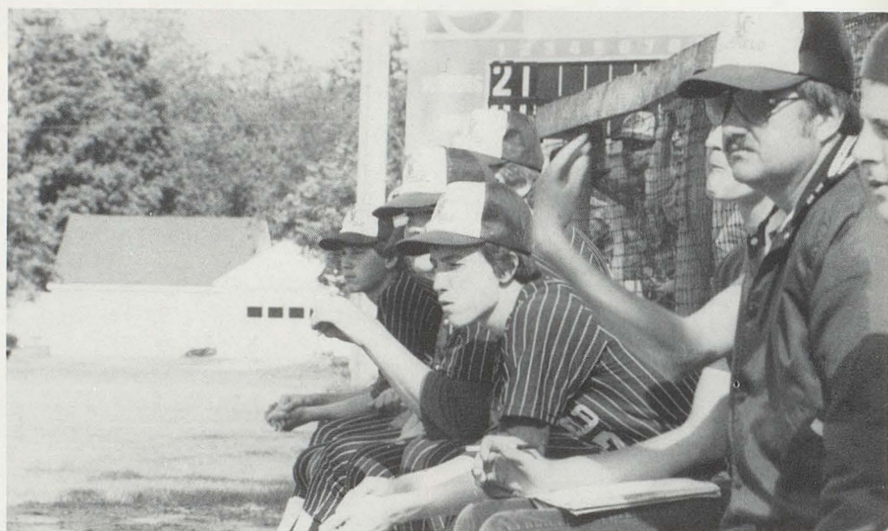
A Great Accomplishment

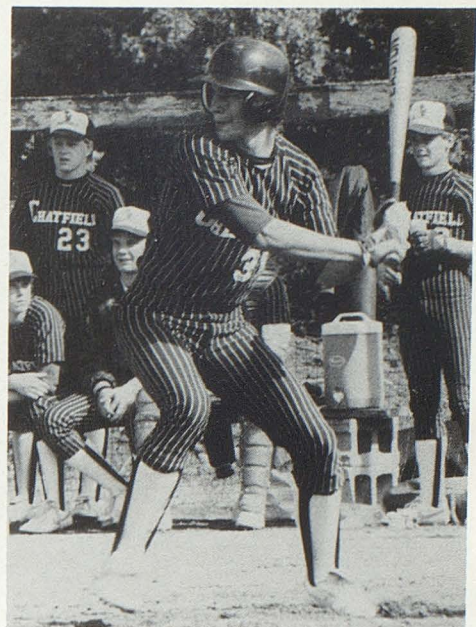

Team Does Tremendously Well

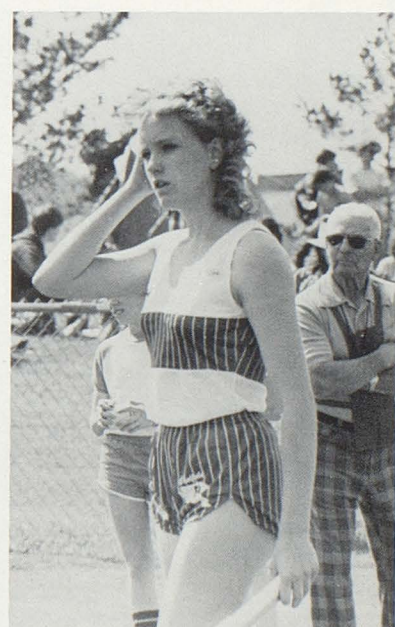

Six Qualify For Region

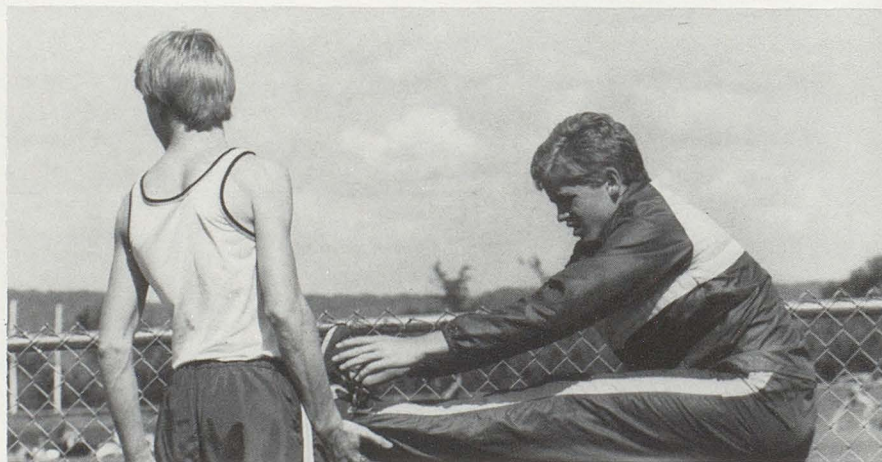
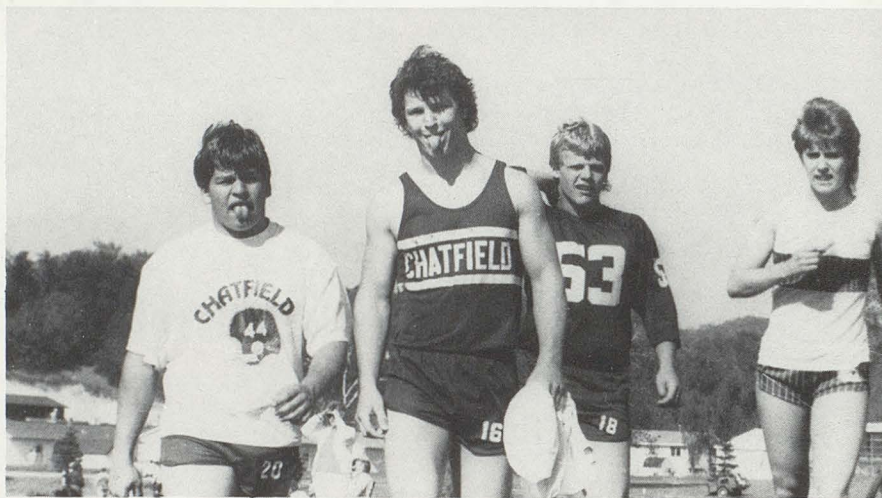

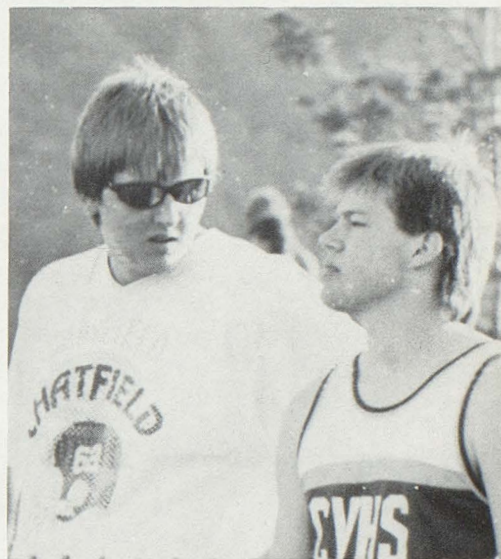
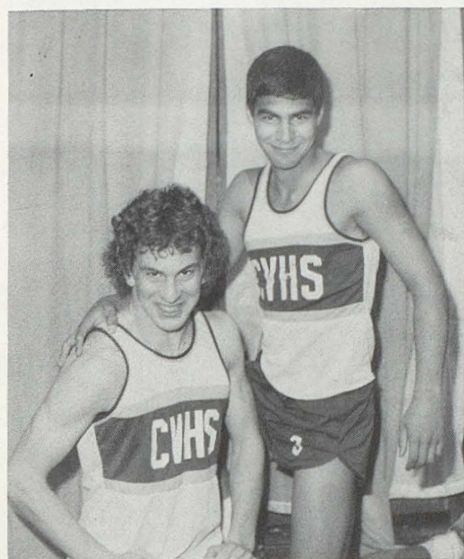
Chatfield's 1600-meter relay-team came in fourth. The Gophers took sixth overall.

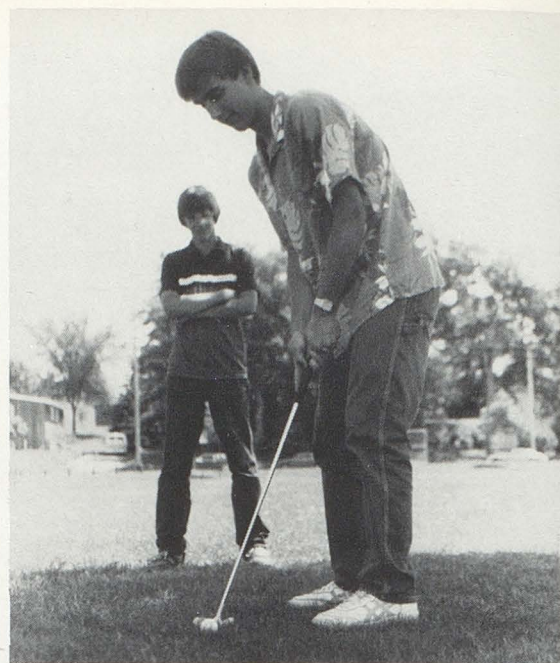

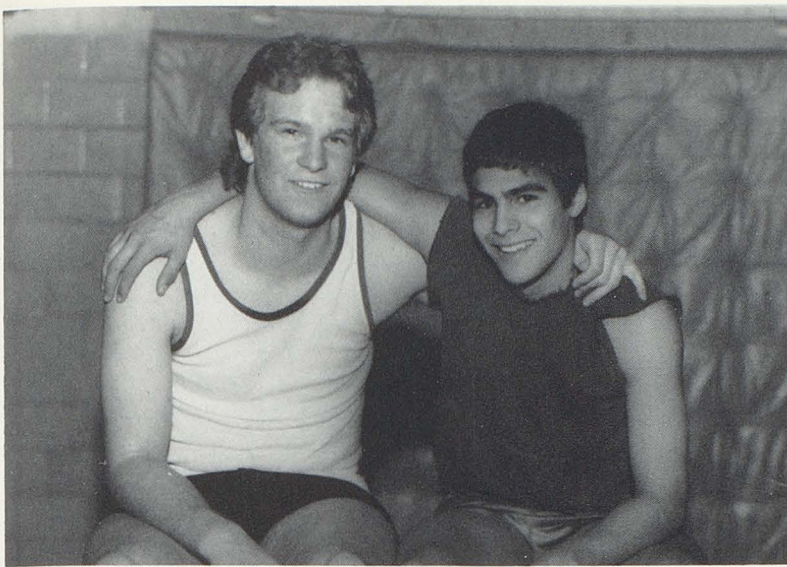
Competition Brings Out The Best

Sophomore Jim Ryan led the team well as he was medalist in four out of the nine regular season meets.

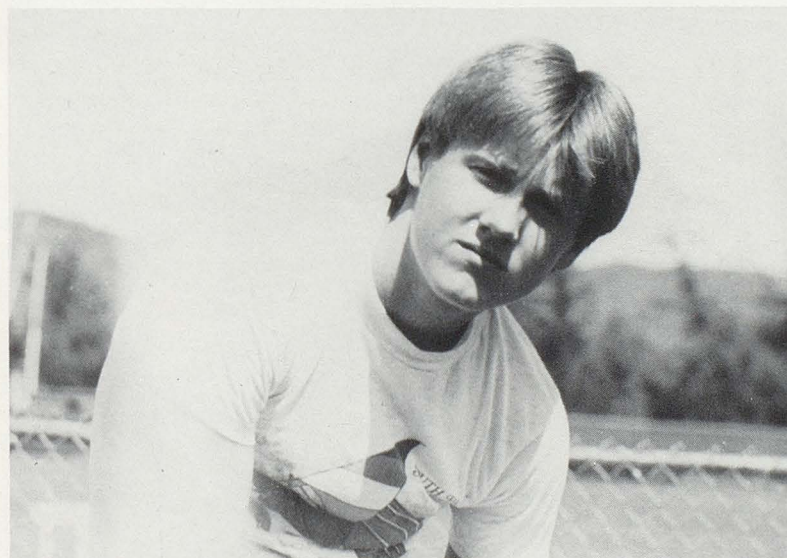

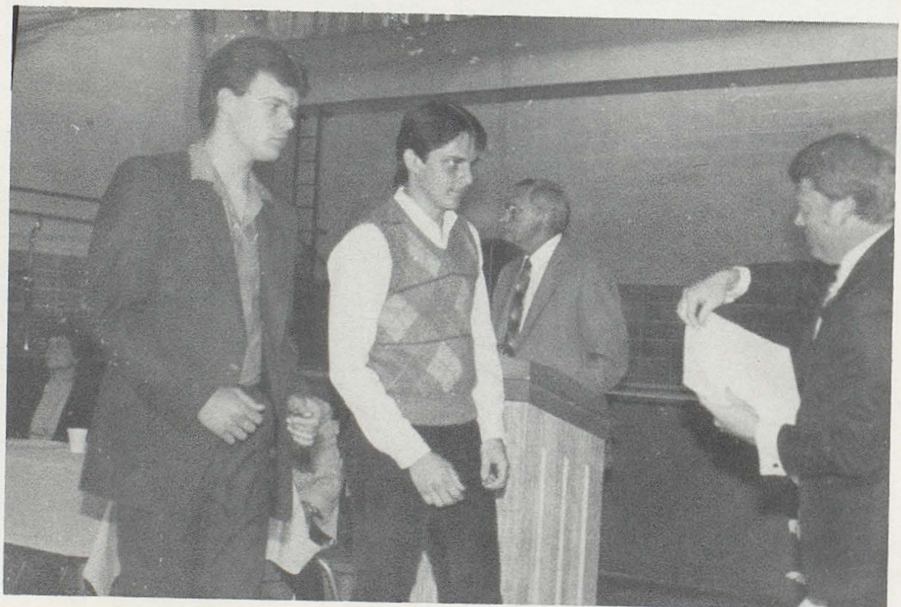
A Special Night For Many

The joys and frustrations of being a teenager will also be confronted. Driving, dating, a busier schedule, work, and more responsibility will all become a part of their life.

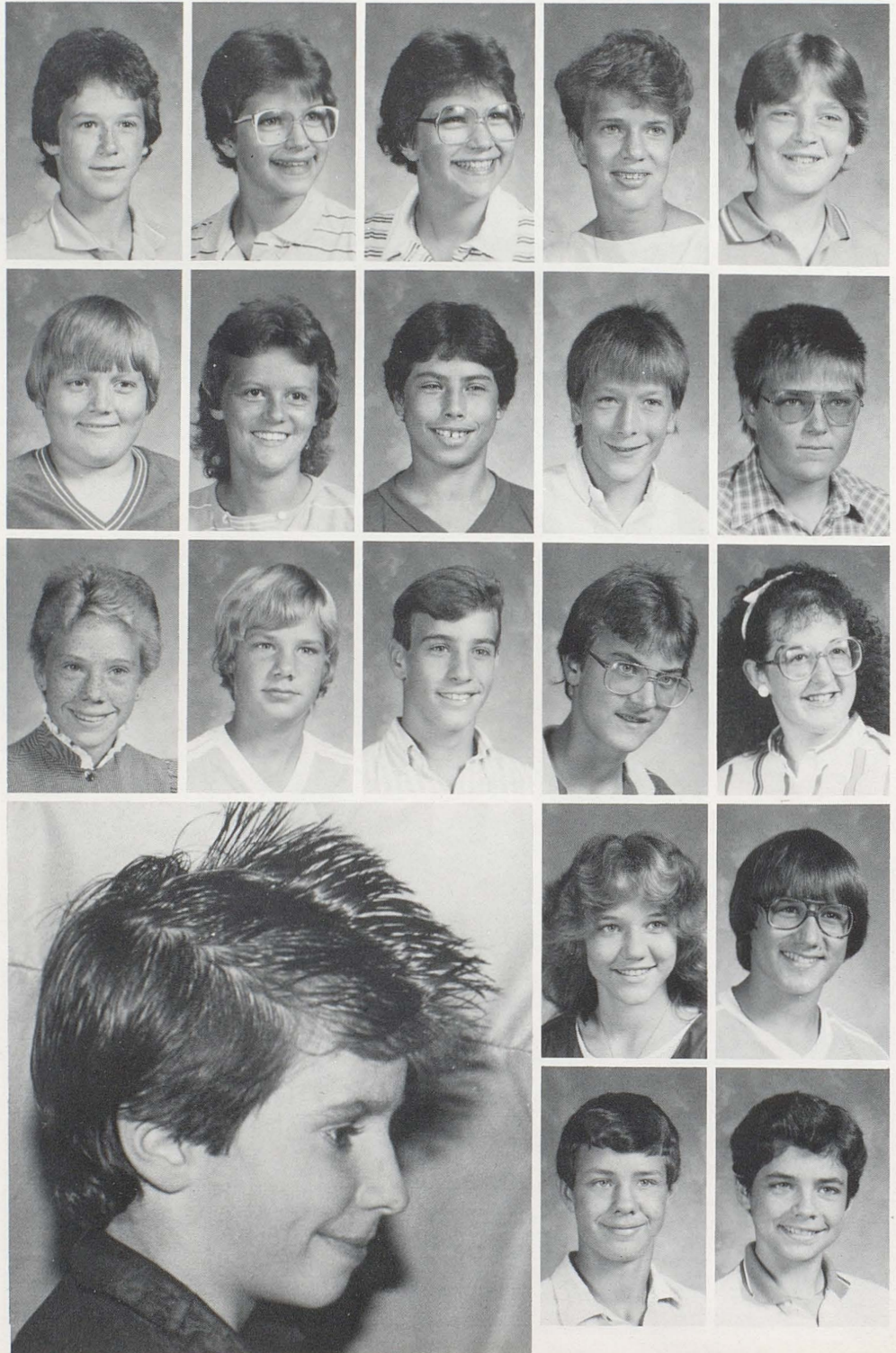

hidden personalities appear. At school, friendships bind closer than ever as classmates get to know and accept each other as individuals with his own unique and special qualities.

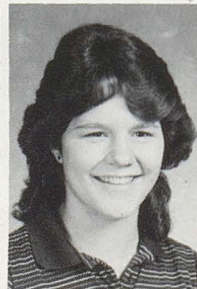
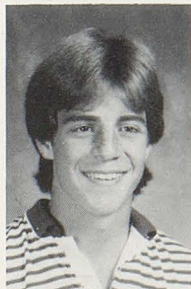
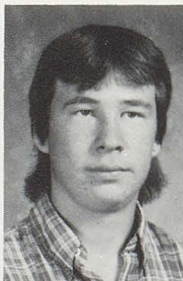
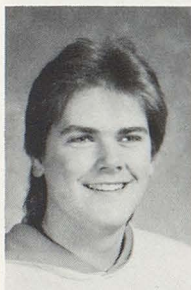
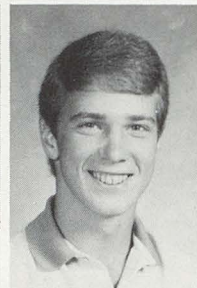
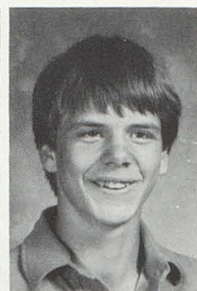
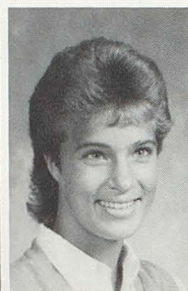
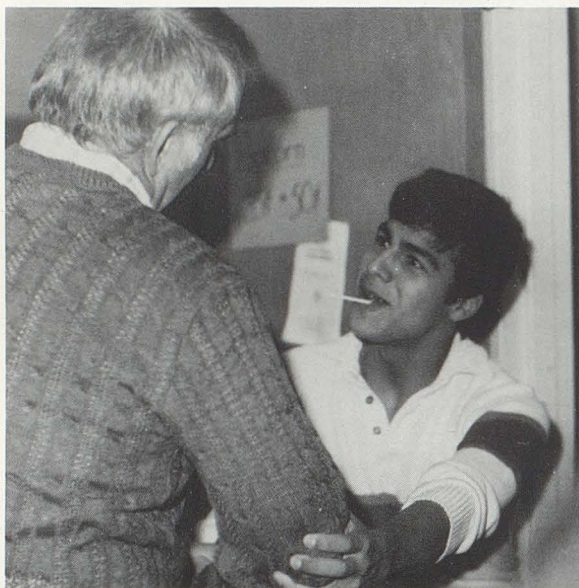
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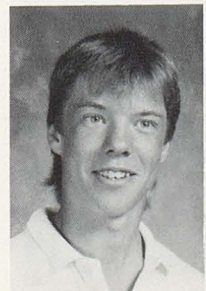
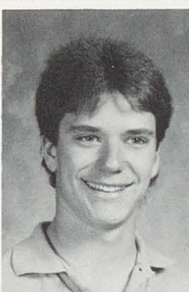
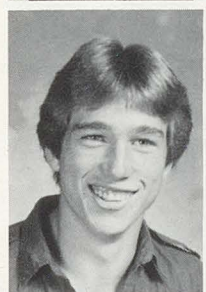
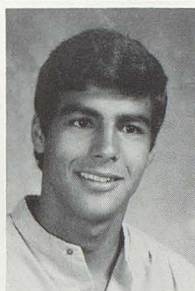
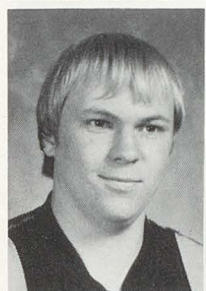
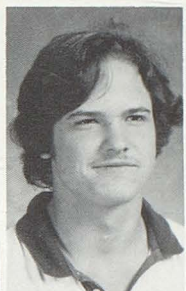
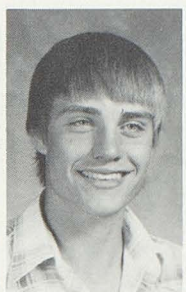
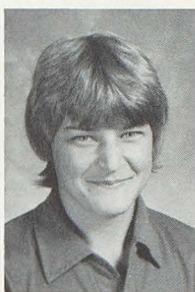
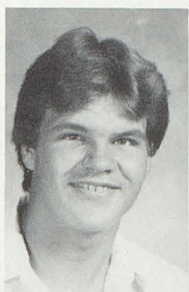

Peter thinks that there are many differences between Germany and the United States. Transportation, clothing, food, and hairstyles are only a few.

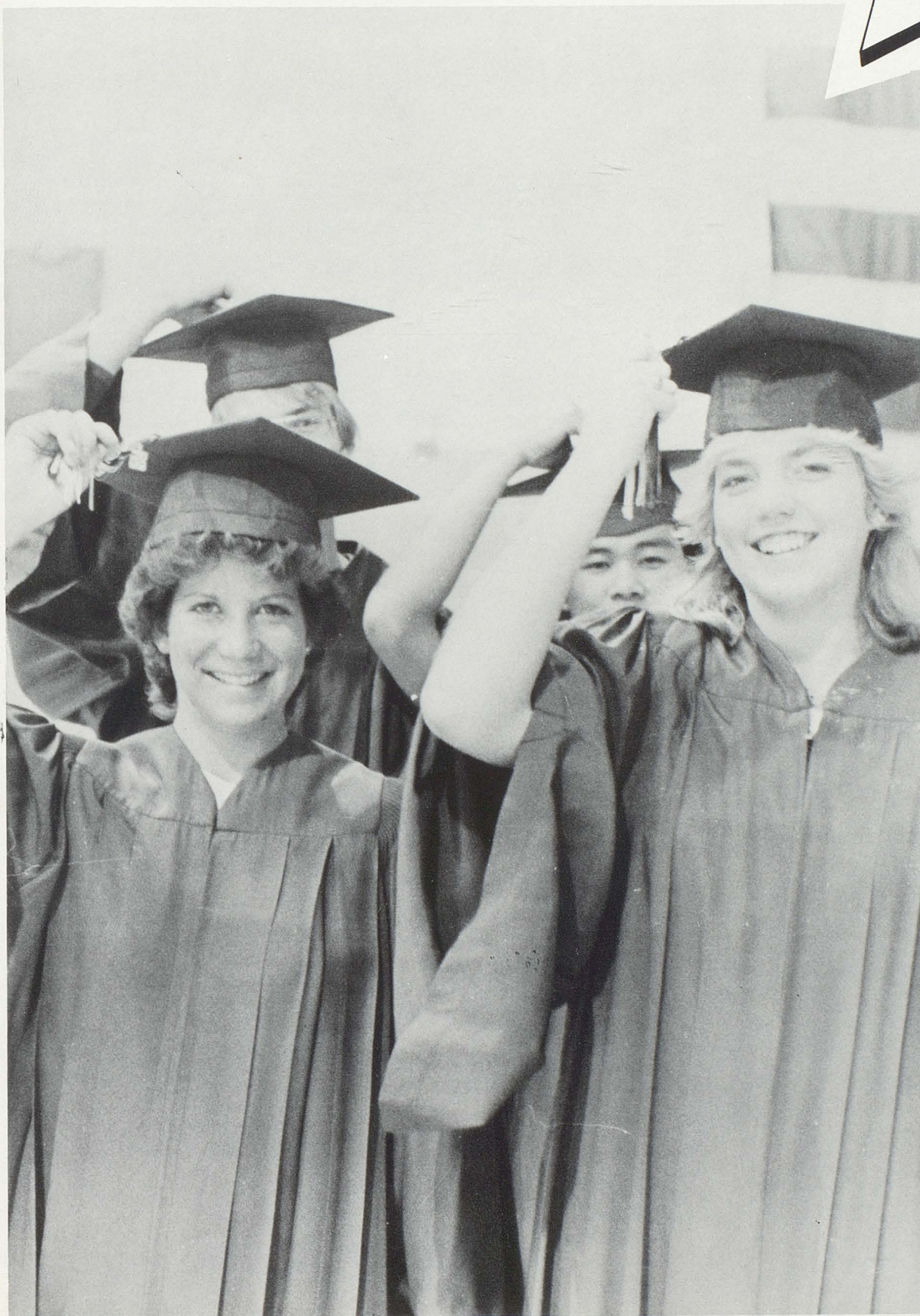
