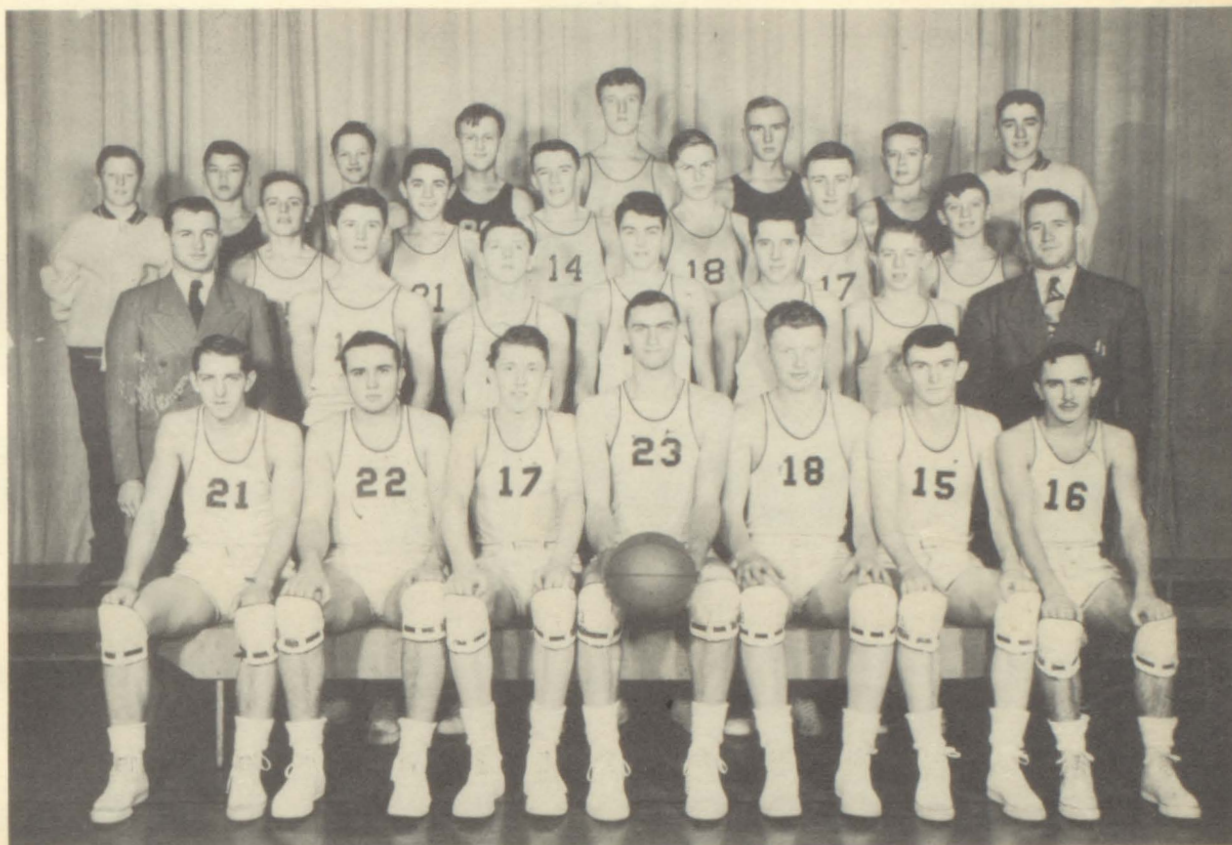
The Gophers split the last two home games by losing to Stewartville 13-0 and blank-ing Caledonia 26-0 to finish the home stand.

1949-50 BASKETBALL

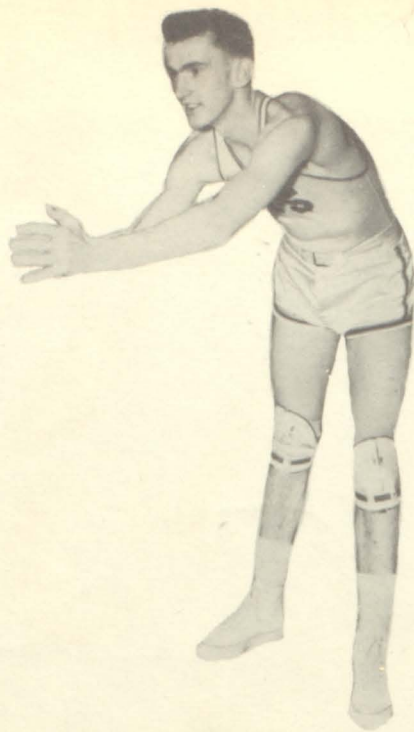
