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
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Dear Friends,





This summer promises to be a very busy one for Roman Catholic High School. Construction of our newest building, *The Howard Center for the Arts*, is slated for completion by the end of July. This will give us only a few weeks to get all the new classrooms ready for the opening of school. *The Howard Center* contains new music and art rooms, digital photography and piano labs, practice rooms and a Black Box Theatre. The dedication ceremony is

planned for September 18th. More information will be posted later this summer.

Work is also progressing on our new Wellness Center. With the Art Department moving from the McSherry Annex, the vacated space will be repurposed as an expanded weight room. New freeweights and dumbbells, along with 50 different fitness machines have been acquired to form a state-of-the-art weight training facility. Additionally, treadmills, elliptical and erg machines have been purchased to assemble a cardio-room for our athletes and non-athletes alike.

The former band room, located in the attic of the 1890 building, is being transformed into a functioning court room. We have commissioned Strada, an architectural firm which has designed courtrooms for law schools across the country, to repurpose this space for our Mock Trial Program. Roman has one of the largest and most successful Mock Trial programs in Pennsylvania. Having an actual court room setting, will allow our students to hone their legal skills, develop their strategies, and experience the professional setting of a trial.

Work is also planned to upgrade the classroom lighting to LED fixtures, replace the aging air conditioning system, refinish the original hardwood floors and relocate The Forum, Roman's school store, from the parking lot trailer to a room off the cafeteria.

Every alum, friend and benefactor of Roman can take pride in all the work being done to advance the mission of our fine school and set the foundations for continued and future growth. Think about all that is being done with only 11% of our alumni participating in our Annual Appeals. While a few have been incredibly generous, if more alumni begin to participate, so many more students will be assisted and more programs can be developed. Remember, no gift is ever too small to make a positive impact on today's Cahillites! Thank you, in advance, for your support.

Cahillites Named Transformation Scholars for La Salle University

At the start of the second semester, Catholic High signed an agreement with La Salle University which allowed our 10th grade students to apply to the Transformation Scholars Program. This dual-credit opportunity was open to students in both the Philadelphia Public and Catholic High Schools, and only twenty spots were available. Ten of these positions were dedicated to individuals who were first generation college students.

On Thursday, April 26th, La Salle University held a reception for those students accepted into the Transformation Scholars Program for the 2018–2019 academic year. Competition for this program was strong, and seven of the 20 students accepted to join this talented group of individuals are members of Roman's Class of 2020. As a Transformation Scholar, students will be taking one free 100-level course on La Salle University's campus in both the Fall of 2018 and the Spring of 2019 in the company of college students. The students accepted into the program are Eric Helmer, Lawrence Qin, Ryan Frank, John Gentile, Ethan LaFond, Darrel Vandelo, and Jacob Banji-Ajala.

Congratulations Class of 2018

On Friday, June 8, Roman

Catholic High School held the 125th Baccalaureate Mass and Commencement Exercises at the Cathedral Basilica of Saints Peter & Paul for the graduating Class of 2018. The Class of 2018 is made up of 178 students, who were accepted to 126 different colleges and universities both locally and nationally, including Villanova, University of Pennsylvania, Boston College, Fordham, Juilliard School, Haverford and Syracuse. One student will be attending Simon Fraser University in British Columbia, Canada. Over 95% of this year's graduating class will attend postsecondary institutions, and 1% will enter the workforce. Two of our graduates will be serving our country in the military. The Class of 2018 was awarded over \$21 million in a variety of scholarships and grants.

The Roman tradition of high academic achievement was showcased with the Class of 2018. We are very proud and excited to see our students continue their academic pursuits and further strengthen their abilities and talents. Congratulations and good luck to the Class of 2018! Roman A.S.I.S.T.s its Loyal Alumni

The A.S.I.S.T. Program is one of the most special things we do here at Roman.

A.S.I.S.T., (Alumni-Student Intergenerational Service Team), connects Roman's seniors with older alumni in need of additional social interaction. Led by our very own Mr. Edward Keenan '54,this group brings joy to the lives of Cahillite alumni, and most recently, a few of us have had the pleasure to meet and talk with an alum who has lived an amazing life, Mr. Joe Doyle '44. At the age of 93, Mr. Doyle is still as lively and enthusiastic as ever.

Mr. Doyle grew up in Brewerytown, where he attended St. Ludwig German Elementary School. He then enrolled at Roman Catholic, where he was an active member of theater and the Cheerleading team, and he graduated in 1944. Within six weeks of his graduation, he joined the Navy, and he served in the South Pacific during the end of World War II. Once he returned home, he began a career in education. He began teaching at an elementary school, and eventually became a principal. He then taught at a middle school, where he again became the principal. Finally, he taught at Olney High School, where he once again served as an administrator.

Working at each of these schools has given Mr. Doyle an understanding of young people at three different levels of education. He has a few children and many grandchildren, one of whom will be attending Roman in September, continuing the Cahillite tradition in his family. He now lives at Ann's Choice Retirement Community in Warminster.

Meeting Mr. Doyle was an incredible and enlightening experience. I along with fellow senior Julian Massey met him in

He greeted us with donuts, so clearly he's in touch with us hungry high school students. After hearing his story, he showed us his yearbook from the class of 1944, along with his letter he received at graduation. It was so interesting to see what Roman was like during these days and how much it has changed.

It was also amazing to see how responsive and lively Mr. Doyle was. We had a lot of questions about his time at Roman and his life in general, and he answered us like he had just experienced all of these memories vesterday. In addition, he was so articulate and relaxed when speaking with us. It was obvious that his experience as an educator made it easy for him to interact with kids our age. It was also very clear that his love for Roman is still so strong. Every year he attends the Communion Breakfast, and he was very curious to hear how different it is now at Broad and Vine. Speaking with Mr. Doyle is something that I and all of my fellow seniors will never forget.

Thanks to Mr. Keenan, I along with many others, have had the pleasure to meet incredible Roman alums, and that experience is something that we will carry with us for many years to come.

The Spirit of Catholic High

In the storied history of Roman Catholic High School, commentators valuing the student body have, periodically, used the phrase "the spirit of Catholic High." Often, it is used in relation to describe a sporting event or school activity. Some believe it is a pervasive feeling within the student body.

If such a "spirit of Catholic High" has a history (and it does), and it still exists (and it also does), can we define it? What is its etiology?

Certainly, each student's commitment and loyalty to the school as well as the school's own values and purpose are central to a shared spirit. So, too, is a student's willingness to provide service to each other, as family, and to serve others outside the Roman family when called to do so. However, loyalty and service have at least two pre-requisites: a generous heart and a real model/mentor.

Roman Catholic's founder, Thomas E. Cahill, had a magnanimous heart. He has been a model for 128 years of classes of students at Catholic High. The brilliant and life-giving Cahill poured the bulk of his life's resources into an ideal...a secondary school...for immigrant and working class children like himself...a gratuitous gift that continues to this day...a cornerstone in which over six generations of young men have grown in understanding and faith as they search to become the whole man. Catholic High's products flourished. Its models/mentors multiplied.


One such model of development in the early years was the inclusiveness of the creation of the Cahill Club. The Club's very purpose was not only to serve the social needs of graduates but also their former classmates who may have had to leave school so as to work to help their families. The alumni founders put this rule in the by-laws welcoming their former classmates and friends. Is it appropriate to characterize this standard as "once a Cahillite, always a Cahillite?"

inclusive cathedral of row-house residents of Philadelphia exhibited signs of a generous heart a century ago. Those signs endure into the 21st century.

In this century, and for the last 18 years, over 1,000 seniors have contributed to the well-being of many older alumni with disabilities through the A.S.I.S.T program. And, in the last 12 years, over 250 juniors have assisted both adults and children with disabilities attend an Annual Mass at the Cathedral.

The spirit of Catholic High remains intact today.

A Roman Catholic Alum and the Tragedy of the USS Juneau

As I recently read through the various news articles that detailed the discovery of the USS Juneau by the South Pacific research exploration vessel, Petrel, on March 17, 2018, I immediately thought of the conversation I had with my Dad several years ago. Former Roman Catholic High School Alumni President, Paul Pincituro '69, had initially informed me that a survivor of the USS Juneau sinking was a Roman alumnus. I asked my Dad about it, and he told me that one of the ten survivors of the tragedy was not only a fellow Roman alumnus, but was also from his old St. Columba parish in the North Philadelphia neighborhood known as "Swampoodle." I compiled a research file on the ship's sinking because I thought that it would make for a good story someday. Following the news of the discovery of the Juneau, I sorted through my notes in the file, and could almost hear my Dad's voice, and "straight-tothe-point" delivery style as I read them: "They called him "Chick" Wang. Lived on Lehigh Ave. Graduated from Roman in '34. Quarterback. Class President. Naval Officer. Became a doctor." I remembered initially thinking at the time that he never mentioned the Juneau, and that if I researched the story I may be able to reveal some things about the tragedy that my Dad did not know. It was at that moment that the memories from that conversation, as well as my earlier research into the story of the USS Juneau, came flooding back.

As chronicled in Dan Kurzman's riveting book, "Left to Die: The Tragedy of the USS Juneau", on the morning of November 13, 1942, Lieutenant Charles Wang, torpedo officer, had just finished inspecting the damage sustained by the USS Juneau during the previous night's battle. Although the Juneau had taken some hits, she could still fight, and her crew had performed admirably. Wang was resting at his station, eating a sandwich, when "a panicky voice cried into the earphones, "Fish! Torpedo heading toward us!" Seconds later, at 11:01 AM, Friday the thirteenth, it smashed into a magazine, and the Juneau blew up."

Wang was thrown onto the deck by the explosion. As he laid on his back, he opened his eyes and saw the radar antenna "spiraling straight down toward him." It smashed into Wang's right leg, badly breaking it in two places, his bones protruding through the skin. Wang managed to make it into the churning water and clung to the floating nets from the ship. Many of the survivors, most of whom were badly wounded, held on to the nets as well. Others found rafts, or simply floated in the water wearing their life preservers. These survivors eventually consolidated into a large floating group, desperately hoping for a rescue that would not come. As night fell, the wounded began to die, and the despairing cries of George Sullivan could be heard in the darkness as he searched for his four brothers. "Al, where are you?" he repeatedly cried out as tears streamed down his face. "Red, Matt, Frank, answer me! Where are you? It's your brother George.'

The following morning, the sharks began to circle. Screams pierced the air as the sharks tore into the sailors still clinging to the nets. As the days went by, the initial group of about 150, now slowly dwindled down to a handful. The badly injured Wang was in a state of delirium from the pain. Two sailors volunteered to try to take Wang on one of the rafts to the island of San Cristobal some 55 miles away as the large flotilla of survivors was making "little headway because of the waves and the drag of the nets." If they made it, they would try to send a rescue ship for the survivors. Lieutenant John Blodgett agreed, and the men set off for the island.

The next several days would test the limits of human endurance. The blistering sun burned the skin off of their backs, and the extreme hunger and thirst drove some to madness. Some drank seawater, and dove underwater to imaginary "havens" where the sharks finished them off. A despondent and unstable George Sullivan told the group that he was going "to get some buttermilk and something to eat." He swam away before anyone could grab

him, and the men soon heard his pitiful cries of "Help me!" as the sharks tore into him. Only seven men from this larger flotilla of survivors would be rescued. On November 19th, a PBY seaplane picked up five of the men, and the USS Ballard retrieved the remaining two the following day.

Wang and the other two sailors, in a remarkable feat of seamanship, eventually reached San Cristobal on November 19th where they were rescued by natives. The unbearable pain that Wang endured while still helping to navigate the raft to safety endeared him to the two sailors who were with him. "The courage that man showed during those days was something to behold," one of them said.

A total of 687 men from the USS Juneau lost their lives, including the five Sullivan brothers. Only 10 men survived the sinking. Lieutenant Charles Wang was the only officer to survive.

In 1947, Charles Wang married his wife, Marie, at St. Stephen's Catholic Church in Philadelphia. The parents of the Sullivan brothers were special guests. The Wang's raised three daughters, Celeste, Deborah, and Patricia, and Charles went on to a successful medical career as a pathologist. After enduring years of excruciating pain, he finally had his damaged leg amputated in 1980. Wang died in 1985 at the age of 70. He was chosen as one of Roman Catholic High School's "125 Men of Distinction" in 2015.

I asked my Dad if he ever met Charles Wang. He said, "Once. I was just a kid. He came back to Roman during the war. He said that if any of us ever went to war, to try not to be afraid, do what you're told, and listen to your officers." My Dad's eyes then welled up, and his voice cracked as he vacantly stared at a distant memory that only he could see. "He was on crutches…his leg was bad. He told us what happened."

It was at that moment that I realized that there was nothing I would discover in my research of Charles Wang and the brave crew of the USS Juneau that my Dad didn't already know. GOAL!

Victories against Carroll, Ryan, Wood and McDevitt would close out the regular season and land the squad into the 2nd seed with a quarterfinal match-up against





Wrestling program has second consecutive history-making season with first State Medalist

The 2017-2018 wrestling season has been one for the history books for Roman Catholic. Not only did the Cahillites return to States for a second consecutive year, but we also picked up two consecutive postseason Outstanding Wrestler awards from Mike Leyland '18 at the PCL tournament and Jared Johnson '19 at the District tournament, crowning a PCL champ in Leyland and two district champs in Johnson and Malcolm Hunt '18. Hunt will be continuing his wrestling career next year at Ursinus College. Christian Petrucci '18, Dom Galasso '19, and Shaun Buffert '20 also had strong postseasons, each qualifying for the Regional tournament in Bethlehem, PA.

Even with all of the success that others on the team achieved, it was big Mike Leyland who was Roman's MVP. During the season, Leyland made history every time he stepped on the mat as he inched closer and closer to becoming Roman's first 100 match winner, a feat he finally accomplished with a dominant 2:34 pin to place 3rd at the Sam Cali Tournament in New Jersey. However, the highlight of the season came when Leyland qualified for the State tournament in Hershey, PA, for the 2nd consecutive year. This time he became Roman Catholic's first state medalist finishing 7th in the heavyweight bracket, avenging his only in-season loss in the process with a dominant 1-0 victory over North Penn. His medal cements Roman Catholic in the Philadelphia wrestling history books as just the fourth Catholic League School to bring home a PIAA State medal.




Bowling makes second consecutive appearance in the PCL Championship

Track & Field program has break-out season with best-in-the-state speed

Roman's track team had an impressive year that saw them send athletes to the State Championships for both the indoor and the outdoor season. As the season got underway, RCHS track traveled again this year to Ocean Breeze in Staten Island to compete. While taking home a few medals throughout the first couple meets, it was the 4x200 team of Ollie Fisher '19, Karim Dittmar '19, Miles Jowers '20, and Malik Griffin '20 who took home a 4th place finish at the Freedom Games. Their time of 1:31.90 from the prelims was the 9th fastest time run all season long in the entire state of Pennsylvania. Griffin continued a strong season by putting up a second place finish at the Philadelphia Catholic League championships placing second in the 60m dash. The 4x200 took their talents back to New York to run at the New Balance Nationals where they finished 25th in the emerging elite section to cap off the indoor season.

As the weather began to get warmer, the track team started their outdoor season. The sprint team started where they had left off, taking 1st place in the 4x100

and 2nd place in the 4x200 merely a few blocks from Broad and Vine at the Temple Relays. As the year continued, Roman took to the Penn Relays to show off their speed. The 4x100 won their heat, but was unable to get out of the trials. This fueled their fire though as the Cahillites focused their efforts on the Philadelphia Catholic League Championships. RCHS kicked off the day with a 1st place finish in the 4x800 (Brendan Storino '19, Sean Hamilton '20, Joe Uholik '20, and Mickal Haywood '18). The 4x100 also outran every other team placing 1st as well. The sprinters were able to do a quick turnaround as the three athletes took home medals in the 100m (Dittmar 2nd, Griffin 3rd, and Jowers 6th), and then another 2 medals in the 200m (Griffin 2nd and Dittmar 6th). In the 400m Haywood and Gubler were able to secure 5th and 6th places respectively. Roman as a team placed 4th overall, a strong improvement from the previous couple years. There was a strong purple and gold presence at the District 12 finals, and the sprinters again showed their strength taking home the 4x100 title. Griffin and Dittmar pulled down 1st and

3rd overall in the 100m. Griffin also came in first in the 200m, with Jowers (6th) and Fisher (8th) not far behind. The 4x800 narrowly missed a state berth placing 3rd overall. Hamilton, running his third event of the day, also barely missed a state ticket with a 3rd place finish in the 800m. Haywood ran his fastest time of the year in the open 400m-50.81- finishing 5th overall. With all of the points added up, Roman secured an impressive 3rd place finish in the AAA Division. Roman did send a collection of runners again this year to Shippensburg for outdoor states, as the 4x100 finished 11th overall, and Griffin took home a 14th place finish in the 200m and a 15th place finish in 100m.

Roman Catholic Basketball... "Tapping at the Stone" A Review of the 2017-2018 Season

hroughout the 2017-18 Roman Catholic Basketball season, second-year head coach Matt Griffin kept telling his players to keep battling, keep getting better, and stay hungry all the way. He made a point to remind his troops that several media "experts" picked the Cahillites to finish 6th or 7th in the ultra-competitive Philadelphia Catholic League. A constant point that was made in the media was that Roman had no player taller than 6'6". In basketball game programs, you can list size and weight as well as position, but you sure cannot list the size of a man's heart. "Keep tapping at the stone men, keep tapping at the stone," Griffin would say, game after game, as the Purple and Gold embarked on what would be another dream season. The "stone," if you will, was the Catholic League and State Championships.

The season began in Washington DC as the Cahillites took part in the Gonzaga DC Classic for the 3rd time in 4 years. Roman found themselves in the title game against the host, the Gonzaga Eagles, after solid, double digit victories over Riverdale Baptist and New York powerhouse Cardinal Hayes. Despite the loss against a Gonzaga team that spent time ranked in the national top 10, Roman started the season 2-1 with wing Seth Lundy '19 and Lynn Greer III '20 earning spots on the all-tournament team.

The season became rocky in December as Roman fell to Philly rival Imhotep Charter, which finished 5th in the country. Several injuries caused the team to finish 3rd in the Junior Orange Bowl Tournament in Miami, Florida. Again, the team went 2-1, and Greer and senior leader Allen Betrand '18 made the all-tournament team. After returning from the sun and sand of Florida, the team returned to the frigid Philly area to take on North Jersey's Mater Dei Prep. Starting a pattern that would prevail throughout the season, Roman rallied from a 12-point deficit to start the 4th quarter behind Lundy, Betrand, and sharpshooter Hakim Hart '19 to win 59-49. Betrand was named game MVP.

As the new year began, the Cahillites earned victories at West Catholic and Lansdale Catholic while falling by 2 points each to rival Neumann-Goretti and to league favorite Bonner-Prendergast in overtime. After the Bonner game, Lundy told the entire team, "We're not losing the rest of the way." Just like our Super PHOTO: CATHOLICPHILLY.COM

Bowl Champion Philadelphia Eagles, the Cahillites embraced the role of the underdog while bouncing back with wins over a talented McDevitt team and Archbishop Carroll in front of a classic Catholic League packed house. Following a heart-stopping home win against La Salle, Roman kept the streak rolling with blowout wins over Father Judge, Conwell-Egan, and Cardinal O' Hara. The stage was then set for a showdown in Warminster on a Friday night at Archbishop Wood. Revenge was on the mind of the Cahillites as Coach Griffin posted the score of last year's game in the locker room against the defending PCL champs. In another thriller, which included Lundy's second 30-point game of the season, the Cahillites survived two last-second shots by the Vikings to prevail 75-73. Many who were in the stands that night said it was one of the best PCL games they ever witnessed, with each side trading the lead and fighting on every possession. The last regular season game was a 77-71 victory against the Hawks of St. Joe's Prep at Community College of Philadelphia (CCP) which secured the Roman's spot in the playoffs. Prior to the game, Roman Catholic honored living legend Coach "Speedy" Morris '60 for his 1,000th career victory earlier in the



season. Morris' coaching career began at Broad and Vine in 1968 and now spans 50 years in the high school and collegiate ranks. For Coach Griffin's Cahillites, it was now time to win or go home. The PCL playoffs awaited.

On a Friday afternoon, again at CCP, Roman found itself on the wrong end of a double digit deficit against the La Salle Explorers. Down by 15 multiple times and trailing by 9 heading into the final quarter, Roman roared back. Outscoring the Explorers 23-4 in the final stanza, Roman claimed a 56-46 triumph and ended La Salle's quest for the PCL crown. Just five days later, Coach Griffin and the Cahillites found themselves back where their PCL season ended last year in the semi-finals at the world's greatest basketball arena, the University of Pennsylvania Palestra. The foe was St. Joe's Prep and Coach Griffin's former team and coach. With both teams trading the lead in the first half, Roman found itself trailing by four at the break. Coach Griffin and his staff did an outstanding job, telling the team that they had played their worst half of the year but were only down by 4. Roman responded by jumping on the Hawks right away, needing only 2 minutes to retake the lead for good. Roman built a 15 point lead at one point before some late Hawks heroics made the score look closer with the final being 69-66. Notable in this game was how well the team rallied in the second half after Lundy fouled out on a questionable call midway through the 3rd quarter. Senior forward John Kelly '18 did an outstanding job on Prep star Ed Croswell, limiting him to 9 points and only 2 in the second half. Kelly's physical play and never back down attitude was a key throughout the season, as he did many things that do not appear on stat sheets.

On a Monday night, it appeared that every basketball fan in Philly was present in the Palestra. The 9,000 in attendance saw a classic heavyweight battle between the ultra-talented Bonner-Prendie Friars and the gutty, tenacious underdog Cahillites. Both teams threw body blows as B-P ran out to an early 11-3 lead, only to see Roman rally back to lead by two at the end of the 1st stanza. Throughout the next 20-plus minutes, both teams traded baskets and the lead, with Roman rallying from a 5-point hole with 2 minutes left. After a critical Bonner turnover, Roman held for the last shot with 1:38 left. With Greer, Betrand, and Louie Wild '19 sharing ball-handling duties, the entire Palestra crowd stood as Roman attempted call timeout, and Bonner elected not to apply pressure. In a play that will be remembered in the minds of Roman fans forever, Lynn Greer used Seth Lundy's high ballscreen perfectly and drove the lane, finding a cutting Hakim Hart with a no-look pass for a championship-winning layup with 1.1 seconds left. To coin a phrase from a 90's era Whitney Houston hit, it was truly "One Moment in Time." The various photos taken by the media the instant the ball went through the net show the Roman student section with incredulous looks on their faces, frozen forever on film with delirious joy. With one heart-stopping play, Roman Catholic Basketball had captured its 3rd PCL title in 4 years and the 31st overall in the 98-year history of the Catholic League. Showing the true character of this team, the 6'0" Louie Wild fronted the Friars 6'9" Tariq Ingram most of the second half due to foul trouble. Wild frustrated the Bonner big man and effectively took him out of the game.

After a letdown loss to 6A Public League top-dog Abraham Lincoln, the Cahillites regrouped to pursue its third PIAA State Title in the last four years. The question among Roman fans was if this group of players could go through the state playoffs without the size normally seen on a Roman roster. A 1st round victory over Pennridge erased some bitter memories of last year's upset loss in the first round. The stage was now set for an "instant classic" between Roman and Plymouth-Whitemarsh, a team that had been 28-0 and nationally ranked until the District 1 final. Despite being down by 15 points multiple times and constantly looking up at the Colonials, Allen

Betrand's tenacious mentality carried the Purple and Gold down the stretch. Seth Lundy and Lynn Greer made huge plays as well as the Cahillites roared back to stun the Colonials in front of a packed house by a 75-71 score. Several days later, the Cahillites were matched up against Central Bucks West, who stunned defending champ Reading in the previous round. Despite an early ankle injury suffered by Seth Lundy, Roman rode the efforts of Hart, and Betrand to take down the Bucs, 75-56.

Mother Nature then got in the way, as winter storms delayed the semi-finals a full week from the quarter-finals. Roman took a three-hour bus ride to Chambersburg to take on a Pine-Richland team that was a state finalist last season. In front of a very pro Pine-Richland crowd, Roman was able to come back in the final minute to force overtime and pull out a clutch 81-73 victory behind a true team effort. The stage was then set for a true revenge matchup for all of the glory: Roman versus Lincoln for the 6A PIAA crown.

In a game that PCN television commentators said was one of the best they had ever seen, Roman and the Railsplitters traded baskets in a hightempo affair that looked like an NBA pace. Roman led most of the way but could not pull away as Lincoln made several clutch three-pointers to remain in the fight. Behind Lundy's 28, Hart's 26, Greer's 20, and Betrand's 14, Roman exacted some payback to capture the state 6A title. The "stone" was captured; mission accomplished. Congratulations to Coach Matt Griffin who was named Coach of the Year by USA Today and the PA Sportswriters Association. Seth Lundy was named 1st Team All-State, Greer was named to the 2nd Team, Betrand the 3rd team, and Hart the 4th team. For everyone that loves Roman Basketball, it was truly a season to remember.

PAFA and Roman: Expanding Education through Art

As RCHS embarks on a new era of fine arts with the opening of the Howard Center for the Arts, we reflect on and celebrate the 25th anniversary of Roman's partnership with the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts.

t an early age, Thomas Paul Raggio '05 knew that art was his passion. Thomas was immersed in art as a child, but didn't begin his formal training until he began taking classes at Roman as a freshman. At Roman, Thomas studied under Joe Deissroth, who recognized Thomas' talent and zeal. He prompted Thomas to enroll in the After School Studio Art program at Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts (PAFA), a free after school art program offered to Roman students, where he could continue to sharpen his skills. Today, Thomas has showed his work internationally and is professor of Fine Arts at Rutgers University.

Ian Wagner '07 recounts a similar trajectory. By the time he entered his junior year at Roman, Ian had been taking two years of After School art classes at PAFA. The technical composition classes at Roman were a great complement to the artistic expression classes he got at the Academy. "I absolutely loved it, and couldn't wait to increase my skill set," Wagner said. He went on the get his Masters of Fine Arts at PAFA, and is the publisher of six illustrated books and a working artist and graphic designer.

"If it hadn't been for Roman, I never would have become an artist," says Wagner. "I never would have been introduced to the program at PAFA, which led me to become a working artist today."

Since 1994, PAFA has provided free studio art training to Roman students (grades 9-12) and more than 50 other public, charter and parochial schools in Philadelphia. The program offers teens with little access to formal art training the opportunity to build a solid foundation in the fine arts. Students in this model program follow an honors-level curriculum through foundation drawing, painting and life drawing in the great traditions of American art set by Thomas Eakins in PAFA's historic studios.

Thomas, Ian and their colleagues at Roman all brought their eagerness to learn; PAFA supplied everything else. "Most high schools don't have the resources to offer programs at this level," said Raggio. "PAFA supplied students with materials, which made a huge difference. As long as you showed up, you were able to paint and draw with charcoal."

The partnership with PAFA was the brain child of Dan DiLella '69 who was a frequent visitor of the Academy during his time at Roman. As a student and alumni, DiLella has embraced the legacy of Thomas E. Cahill, founder of Roman Catholic High School, who emphasized the importance of giving back to the community.

"Roman Catholic gave so much to me during my formative years, and I have always believed in paying that forward for future generations," said DiLella. In the early 1990s, Dan approached Al Gury, now the Chair of PAFA's After School Studies initiative, about an idea to offer a program that catered to students in the city. The discussion was the genesis for one of the most robust and successful arts programs for students in Philadelphia.

"Roman students have a unique opportunity to learn from all the resources the city has to offer, including its incredible access to arts and culture," said DiLella. "Programs like the one we have with PAFA can open their eyes to a completely new world of opportunity."

The skills Roman students have acquired at PAFA have helped many build professional careers. While at PAFA, Raggio was exposed to life drawing, color theory, and strong compositional studies. He also learned to develop and explain a professional art portfolio, which gave him a tremendous advantage when he went on to apply for arts school.

"It's not just being able to create a portfolio, you need to be able to talk about the art," explained Raggio. "Asking a 17 year old kid to talk about their work is incredibly nerve wracking. But through my experience with [Roman professor] Mr. Deissroth and at PAFA, I learned to do that, which is a huge differentiator for a young person."

Today, as a professor of Fine Arts at Rutgers University, Thomas Raggio tries to pass on the skills and confidence he learned to his own students as they pursue their careers. "Having the right people and experiences in my life at the right moment made all the difference," he says.

Thomas E. Cahill would certainly agree.

The Dynasty Continues...Mock Trial Program wins fifth consecutive City Championship

The Roman Catholic Mock Trial Team continued their recent run of success during the 2017-2018 season. The season began with a trip to New York City where the team competed in the prestigious Empire Tournament, commonly referred to as the "World Championship" of mock trial. The tournament featured over thirty different teams from all around the world. There, Roman competed against teams from Korea, Georgia, Canada, and Oklahoma, and made it to the championship round for the second year in a row. Unfortunately, the team suffered a close loss, finishing second in the world to American Heritage High School in Florida. Joshua Picciotti '18 and Michael Caimi '20 received best attorney and witness awards respectively.

Next up, the program received the state case and had the challenging task of forming five separate teams of talented students (A, B, C, D, and JV), the team, which is the largest in the state, headed to Pittsburgh to compete in the annual University of Pittsburgh tournament. The A Team finished with an undefeated record and captured second place in the tournament and the B Team finished fourth, while the other teams narrowly missed placing. Timothy Krapp '21 and Justin Vespasiani '18 were honored as best witnesses while Joshua Picciotti '18 won best attorney. The following week, the team competed in La Salle University's Blue and Gold Invitational with the C Team capturing second place and the B team recognized as an honorable mention. Anthony Pantalone '19 and Michael Topley '19 were both honored as best witnesses. The team completed its gauntlet of preseason tournaments at the University of Pennsylvania's Ben Franklin Invitational. There the B Team finished in second place and the C

Team finished in sixth. Aidan Cotton '20 and Ryan Frank '20 received a best witness award and Anthony Kafel '20, Anthony Ellerbee '18 and Ryan Frank '20 won best attorney awards.

In March, the team arrived at the tournament that they had been preparing for all season: The City Competition. This tournament hosts a multitude of teams, all hailing from the Philadelphia region, with the winner advancing to the State Competition. The A, B, and C teams fought through tough competition to all advance to the quarterfinals, with the D Team being narrowly defeated in the qualifying rounds. The quarterfinals saw the B and C team pitted against each other, with the B team winning in a split decision (2-1). The A team defeated Germantown Friends B Team to advance as well. In the semifinals, the B Team was narrowly defeated by Saint Joseph's Prep while the A Team defeated Central High School to advance to the City Championship. The City Championship was hotly contested, with both teams being equally matched. In the end, Roman prevailed, beating the Prep and winning their fifth consecutive City Championship. Nicholas Hamilton '19 and Michael Caimi '20 won the best attorney and witness awards in the final round.

With their victory in the City Championship, the A Team advanced to the State Competition in Harrisburg, which features the best teams from Pennsylvania, where they narrowly missed qualifying for the semifinals. Next year, the team will likely continue its run of success thanks to their coaches: Steve Patton '08, John Pensabene, John Prendergast '08, Patrick Prendergast '13, Steven Johnson '10, Nicholas Guth '13, George Zindel '14, Andrew DiCicco '14, Vincent Capitolo '16, and Eric Love '13.

EITC & OSTC Success Story: Elvin Ross III, Esq. '89

This past year, Elvin Ross III, Esq. '89, former Student Council President who founded, Legis Group LLC after working at Morgan, Lewis & Bockius LLP and currently serves on Roman's Board of Directors, joined other individuals in

taking advantage of Pennsylvania's EITC and OSTC programs to shift his families tax dollars to provide tuition assistance to current Roman students.

"EITC and OSTC programs are easy ways for my family to support Roman. Instead of paying my tax dollars to the state, participating in these programs allows RCHS to provide tuition assistance to families of current students. It is one way that we all can help fulfill the mission of the school," Elvin recently stated.

In exchange for their contribution to the BLOCS (Business Leaders Organized for Catholic Schools) scholarship organization, Elvin and his family were awarded a 90 percent credit for their two year commitment to the program. The credit is applied against his family's total Pennsylvania personal income tax liability, not just the tax resulting from trade or business income, and also qualifies as a charitable contribution for federal income tax purposes.

The EITC and OSTC are tremendous tools for Pennsylvania taxpayers to provide much needed tuition assistance to families who want to send their sons to Roman. Taxpayers who discounted the benefit of the program may want to reevaluate their decision. It is possible that, now more than ever, participation in the EITC program would be a prudent decision. Charitable rollover makes it easier to give back

Since graduating from Broad and Vine nearly 60 years ago, Dr. Richard "Doc" Vassallo '59 has regularly been recognized for his service to others and for his many contributions to Roman. He was selected as one of the school's

"125 People of Distinction," was inducted to the Sports Hall of Fame for his athletic achievements, including his record in the hurdles that STILL stands today, and, every year with his foursome, has commanded the leaderboard at the Cahill Cup Classic. Doc is a long time member of the school's Board of Directors, contributing his wisdom to the board's design of the strategic plan that includes the "Vision of Promise" capital campaign.

This father of eight and grandfather of 19 is no stranger to always being resourceful in taking care of what's important to him. This past year, he was able to use a new tax law to satisfy his pledge to the Vision of Promise with an IRA Rollover gift. The Charitable IRA Rollover allows Doc and others who are age 70½ and older to make direct required minimum distributions and transfers of up to \$100,000 per year from individual retirement accounts to Roman without having to count the transfers as income for federal tax purposes. Since no tax is incurred on the withdrawal, gifts do not qualify for a charitable deduction, but may be counted toward an individual's minimum required distribution.

Although Doc and his wife Mary of 52 years did not receive a charitable income tax deduction, their gift was not counted as additional income for tax purposes. EITC (Education Improvement) & OSTC (Opportunity Scholarship) Tax Credit program

What is the tax credit?

The state tax credit program allows businesses and or individuals who pay Pennsylvania taxes to redirect their tax dollars to Roman Catholic High School rather than the state government.

How does it work?

There is a simple, one-page form that you can fill out. From there Roman Catholic and BLOCS will handle the rest. You just have to submit your contribution to BLOCS along with a letter designating your gift for Roman Catholic High School within 60 days of approval. BLOCS will send you a letter verifying you have made your contribution and you send that letter to the state. Then the state will issue your tax credit.

How much is the tax credit?

For a one year commitment you will receive a tax credit for 75% of your contribution. For a two year commitment you will receive a tax credit for 90% of your contribution.

What is the money used for?

All monies allocated to Roman Catholic High School are used to provide tuition assistance to families so that students can have a quality Catholic Education.

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
IN MEMORIAM

Principal, Mentor & Friend Remembering Mr. Robert P. O'Neill

On June 6, 2018, The Roman community suffered a great loss when former principal, Mr. Robert O'Neill, passed away. The Mass of Christian Burial was held at Saint Albert the Great in Huntington Valley, where Mr. O'Neill was an active and dedicated parishioner. In addition to the pastor and pastor-emeritus, the Mass was concelebrated by Rector, Father Bongard '77, and former rectors, Monsignor Beach '67 and Father Brandt. Father Okon, former School Minister of Roman, delivered a moving and compassionate homily.
