From the Head of School John Melton

On Friday, May 25th, Fuqua School's twenty-fifth graduating class made its way across the stage on the bell tower lawn. With 17 of the 40 seniors coming from legacy families, this class represented the best of our past and inspiration for the future. Lauded for their impressive accomplishments both in and out of the classroom, this group of leaders, scholars, artists, athletes, and engaged citizens possessed enormous "boundless individual potential", and they are poised to do great things in college and in life. Along the way, they were challenged and nurtured by a committed and compassionate group of faculty and staff who routinely go above and beyond for the betterment of our students. This is the Fuqua way!

Over the years it has been exciting to watch Fuqua School evolve and witness the positive impact of our school and our graduates on the local community and the world beyond Farmville. In order to sustain and grow this positive influence, we must always be planning for the future. In November of this year, we convened a group of faculty, trustees, administrators, and parents to gather input from the entire school community and work with a consultant to craft a new strategic plan. This group's work to identify the most imperative strategic initiatives for the next 5-7 years will allow us to better manage the challenges and maximize the opportunities that lie ahead for our school. This time last year I was sharing the preliminary details of our facilities improvement plan, designed to address the most critical needs of our campus with an eye towards energy and maintenance savings. I am thrilled to report that this almost \$2 million facilities improvement project is complete! While new roofs, higher efficiency LED lighting, and state of the art heating and cooling systems may not be very flashy, they were our greatest need, and now we can begin focusing on the other aspects of our facility that need attention. In fact, we also made some progress on this front late in the year. A spring fundraising campaign to promote school safety and enhance our academic program generated financial support for replacing the bleachers in Gilmer Gym and building the Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math (STEAM) lab in the lower school commons. These two capital improvements will offer greater safety and comfort for spectators in the gym and a more current and interdisciplinary teaching space in the lower school commons, respectively.

We also benefited greatly from new partnerships. The three-way collaboration between the Fuqua School Falcons, the Prince Edward County High School Eagles, and Habitat for Humanity to build a new home for an eligible family in Prince Edward County was affectionately dubbed "the birdhouse build" as both school's mascots are raptors. This opportunity to serve as a good neighbor in collaboration with other stakeholders in our community gave our students a very tangible way to embrace the Fuqua School Values of responsibility, kindness, compassion, respect, commitment, and cooperation. Moreover, at the conclusion of the school year, Fuqua School became a GRASP member school, thereby establishing a pathway of financial support for families who seek a Fuqua School education but cannot afford full tuition.

Finally, the new "red" team vs "black" team schoolwide competition came alive in our 25th year with numerous opportunities for these two teams to engage in friendly and spirited competitions throughout the year. In the end, "black" team students in grades preK-12 prevailed by accumulating the most points and earning bragging rights for the next year.

We all share the responsibility of nurturing this school. The Birdhouse Build Fuqua FALCONS & Prince Edward EAGLES



Prince Edward County High School Eagles and Fuqua School Falcons joined together to build a new home with a local family: "The Birdhouse Build". John Melton, Head of School for Fuqua School, states, "Recent public - private partnerships have benefited Farmville in many ways, and Fuqua School is excited to be part of this community-based collaboration with Habitat for Humanity and Prince Edward County Public Schools. By working together to provide affordable quality housing, students from our community will join in a cooperative effort that will benefit everyone and demonstrate the type of leadership critical to the future of our town and our county."

The home build is underway and students from both schools have already been and will continue to be involved in the build process.

The mission statement for Habitat focuses not just on building homes, but also building community. As the schools and the students work side by side with the common goal of helping their neighbors, our community will benefit from the newfound relationships and the shared pride in reaching a worthwhile goal. Habitat is excited for not only the hands-on building experience the students will attain, but also the creative opportunities this will allow for teachers across all grade levels to

incorporate unique learning environments for their students into their instruction. Affordable housing is a critical issue affecting not only our entire country but our local community as well. Many individuals and families are faced with tough decisions when it

comes to housing. For those who choose to pay what they can afford on their earnings, they are often forced to live in substandard housing with major concerns regarding health, safety, and general well-being. For those who pay for more adequate housing, the result is that they often become housing cost-burdened, where a major portion of their income goes toward housing costs, leaving little for other important items, such as healthy food, doctor's visits, and school supplies.

The hope is that the future leaders coming out of Prince Edward and Fuqua will become the next champions for safe, decent, affordable housing, as they begin to understand the reality of many in our community and take a step to make a difference in the lives of their neighbors.





Lower School Adventures

Fuqua's Own Authors and Illustrators: The fifth graders have been very busy this year writing and illustrating their own original books. The children first developed their stories and were then visited by local artist, Audrey Sullivan, owner of Red Door 104, to create illustrations. Ms. Sullivan began with teaching the students about storyboards, sketching out basic illustrations and how to determine what parts of a story are best for creating illustrations. Ms. Sullivan worked both with the group and individually with the children to hone in their artistic abilities. She worked closely with Mrs. Krystal Tucker, fifth grade teacher, in assisting the children as their stories took shape and as the illustrations became more apparent.

What Did They Read?: The Lower School students were fortunate to have special visitors in honor of the legendary children's author, Dr. Theodore Seuss Geisel's 114th birthday. Law enforcement officers from the Farmville Police Department read to our PK, kindergarten and first grade students. What did they read??? Dr. Seuss books, of course!





"Seuss" Games with the Tigers: 2/3 classes attended Dr. Seuss's Birthday Bash at Hampden-Sydney College. The day began with students playing all types of "Seuss" games in the Kirby Field House. In addition to the games, there was a bouncy house and slide to enjoy. They also got to meet the Hampden-Sydney mascot, the Tiger. H-SC students read to the children and gave each student a new Dr. Seuss book to take home.

Celebrating Ag Day with Virginia Tech: Students in grades 2-5 enjoyed a visit to the Virginia Tech Extension Office in Blackstone to celebrate Agriculture Day. Students learned about the impact agriculture has on their everyday lives. Many students have a family history of working in agriculture and they enjoyed making connections between their personal family farms and what they learn in class. From learning how to bake bread, to replicating animal cells and extracting DNA from strawberries, to farm crops and animals, to learning how foresters determine a tree's age, the children learned so much more than they could ever learn from a textbook!

Gathering STEAM: The Lower School's STEAM Club is a new club that began during the 2017-2018 school year. This after-school club allowed students the time outside of the classroom to explore **science**, **technology**, **engineering**, **art and mathematics**. The club introduced students to coding, the world of Ozobots, stop-motion video, pendulum painting, putt-putt course design and construction, the Global Monster project, and, of course, exploring LEGO® robotics.

D.A.R.E. To Do What's Right: The 5th grade classes joined together with the Farmville Police Department to participate in the D.A.R.E. program. This 10-week program taught students how to be responsible for doing what's right for themselves and their friends and family. They also learned about healthy habits and how the choices you make can impact your life. The program culminated with a graduation ceremony and breakfast with our local police department.





Read with Me: In January, the "Shared Stories" Program began at the lower school. This program aligns a picture book with one of Fuqua School's Core Values. This book is read to classes during the month the value is being highlighted, and the teachers present discussion questions to stimulate student conversation after the read. While having multiple benefits, one important benefit is the interaction between students around core values can have a really positive impact on their grasp of the true meaning of the value, the impact it plays upon themselves and others, and how the value positively impacts our school culture.

Protecting Mother Earth: Upper school students in Mrs. Kelly Atkinson's Environmental Science class visited the lower school to talk about Earth Day. The main focus of this celebration was the importance of recycling. Mrs. Atkinson and her students discussed why we recycle and how recycling benefits our earth. Some of the activities included jump roping with plastic bags, creating a craft out of old egg cartons and coffee filters, and planting flowers around the lower school campus. To conclude this event, students signed a pledge to take care of the earth.

Middle School Making Its Mark

The Nation's Capital: The 8th grade civics/economic class traveled to Washington, D.C. in May. Students were divided into groups of four, and given folders with maps, directions, and a task-driven scavenger hunt that included elements from the course and details designed to keep students collaborating, and of course, having fun! Before embarking on the day, groups strategized about their itinerary in an effort to maximize their time and complete the most items on their hunt. The following week, groups worked together to create a movie about their trip.

Virginia Children's Book Festival: Fuqua's middle school traveled to the Virginia Children's Book Festival hosted by Longwood University. Students first went to Jarman Auditorium, where they heard children's author, Todd Parr, speak about his writing process, and how to get started as an author. Next, students traveled to Greenwood Library to see Alexander London share stories about his own middle school experience, and how he turned his innate ability to tell stories into a career. To close this great trip, students listened to Jarrett Krosoczka talk about his illustrations for his stories, and many of our students had the opportunity to draw with Krosoczka.





Advisory Makes Its Mark: Middle School Advisory Board, where our Fuqua family learns, grows, and bonds together, is well underway! All middle school students attend advisory every week, where they get the chance to discuss grades, goals and social and emotional challenges. The Advisory Board promotes Fuqua School values through various activities, discussions and problem-solving challenges to help the students navigate through the middle school years.

Heart for the House: Middle School students worked diligently during Homecoming Week for their second annual Heart for the House. The event began with middle schoolers reading *Only One You* by Linda Kranz in their advisory groups and discussing ways they can make their campus and community a better place. Students made cards for nursing home residents, sanded and painted benches, and began the transformation of the old faculty workroom into a study and collaboration room for students. The group members finished the event by completing their own fish-rocks, which was inspired by their reading earlier in the day and set out along the middle school's fish pond.



Games, Life Skills & Music

Reindeer Games: This December began a new tradition for middle schoolers. The first annual "Reindeer Games" was held as a winter-holiday field day event. The event was filled with fun and surprising games and challenges and included a delicious breakfast hosted by middle school parents. The winning advisory group, Mrs. Kathy Andrews's group, won the reindeer championship belt that will be passed on with each Reindeer Games.

Life Skills: Dylan Pritchett, author and storyteller from Williamsburg, Virginia visited the Fuqua Middle and Lower School students. Pritchett is known for weaving African and African-American culture into his storytelling. His stories have great meaning, where his listeners are given a chance to learn new life skills and valuable life lessons that incorporate the core values we learn every day at Fuqua School.





Let's Go to the Hop: One important decision the Middle School SCA must make is themes for their Middle School dances. Their last dance of the year was selected as a 50's sock hop theme. Cheeseburger sliders, French fries, and ice cream were served. Parents did a great job on the life-like decorations. But, of course, a dance wouldn't be a dance without music. Toward the end of the dance, everyone did the twist, in honor of Mrs. Andrews. This was her favorite song and her last middle school dance before retirement.

Music in the Parks: The Fuqua Middle School Concert Band competed at the "Music in the Parks" competition in Williamsburg, VA. The group won first place in their category and also received the highest possible rating of superior. The group also received the Esprit de Corps Award. This award was given for the attitude, pride and cooperation they demonstrated while participating in the competition. Our middle school concert band is a combined ensemble of our 6th grade band class and our Junior Band. Students worked hard to master their individual parts and worked together to create the best possible music.

Upper School—Learning Off-Campus

Learning from Our Community: An intentional campaign to expand our off-campus opportunities for our students with internships at local businesses, college courses, online courses, and independent project-based courses began at the Upper School this year. Students were connected to businesses and individuals that would fulfill the students' goals and speak to their passions. These internships were as varied as the students themselves: farm equipment retailers, local attorneys, physical therapists, automotive repair, food service, regional hospitals, and informational technology. As our Falcons learned from our community, they developed their potential and took their first steps into their own futures. We also expanded our relationship with Hampden-Sydney College and other educational options locally and through online institutions. Students took many courses that spoke to their passions and goals—courses that weren't available on our own campus like AP Psychology, German, Philosophy, and Welding, among many others. This initiative opened up college campuses to more of our students and prepared them for a world beyond Fuqua.

Competingl: Fuqua students excel at competition whether it is on an athletic field or in an academic setting. Fuqua has five academic teams: Battle of the Brains, Debate, Envirothon, Model United Nations, and Youth and Government. Every fall, public and independent schools from across central Virginia gather at the CBS television studios in Richmond to test their knowledge, their competitiveness, and their buzzer speed in the Battle of the Brains. Fuqua's Battle of the Brains team has qualified for the televised tournament for many years. The Fuqua School debate team competes in the Virginia Catholic Forensic League, which includes public and private schools. Another successful academic team is Envirothon which has competed at the state level the last several years. Envirothon, a natural resources

competition for high school students, consists of written tests in the areas of aquatics, wildlife, soils, forestry and a special topic. The Model United Nations is sponsored by Hampden-Sydney College and is a 3-day conference giving students the opportunity to participate in an academic simulation of the United Nations. The Model United Nations aims to educate participants about current events, international relations, diplomacy, and the United Nations agenda. Last but certainly not least is Youth and Government which sent thirty students to participate in The Virginia YMCA's 71st Model General Assembly Program (MGA). MGA is designed to introduce students to the legislative process of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Students take on the roles of Senators, Delegates, or elected officers while freshmen and sophomores participate in the underclassman legislature program. Our delegation was very successful this year; Fuqua won two of the six elected offices for the 2019 MGA session. Fuqua was the only school to win two elected positions.

These graduates hold the distinction of being the 25th graduating class from Fuqua School, and they have acquitted themselves well. These graduates now take all that they have learned as Falcons and move into the greater world around them.
















Start with Art, Learn for Life





