Impact by Telephone: Gifts can be made over the phone via credit card by calling (215)-627-5487.

Double your Impact: Match your gift! Many companies offer matching gift policies that can double (or more) a contribution made to Roman by one of its employees. Check with your human resources department or the Office of Advancement to find out if your employer will match your gift.

Plan your Impact: There are a variety of estate and planned giving opportunities, including gifts of securities, bequests, retirement assets, charitable trusts, insurance, IRA rollovers, stocks and annuities, retained life estate and other assets.

Sustain your Impact: Decide how much you want to contribute and your bank will automatically deduct your gift from your account on a monthly basis. A modest gift given every month can equal a significant gift by year's end.

EITC / OSTC Program: Pennsylvania's Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) programs allow businesses and individuals to direct the monies they pay in taxes to go towards providing financial aid and scholarships for Roman students. One of the biggest surprises for our alumni is the cost of tuition today. As the chart shows, previous to 1967, attending Roman was absolutely FREE! Over the years, there has been a steady, substantial increase in tuition. This is due to many factors, such as the decline in the number of priests, and religious brothers and sisters who used to staff our schools. Additionally, in the past, parishes were assessed a fee for every one of their students enrolled in a Catholic High School. That assessment was phased out several years ago. Our families are now responsible to bear the entire cost of educating their son.

The Administration at Roman does their best to keep expenses in check and our Office of Advancement has worked tirelessly to raise additional sources of income. Yet, as a diocesan school, Roman has always been required to charge the tuition amount set by the Office of Catholic Education.

That is why your support of the Roman Fund is so critical. Think about the tuition your parents paid for you, and what we ask of our parents today. Would you possibly consider helping them out? All monies donated to the Roman Fund help us help our students remain at Roman.
