Grapevine is the news letter of Sydenham School PTA. It is a joint production of parents and staff and its aim is to keep people informed about school affairs.

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I am sure that most of the parents at Sydenham School are fighting a constant battle to make their housekeeping budgets balance. Some prices go down but there always seem to be more going up. The ILEA is facing just this problem at the moment with the Government giving every indication that for the third year running ILEA will not be given any money whatsoever from them.

Ours is the only education authority in the country which has to find all of its money from local rates. As income tax payers we pay our taxes to fund state education everywhere in the country including London. So we pay twice.

The Government refuses to give ILEA any money because ILEA will not lower its standards which is the only way they can possibly spend as little as the Government wants them to. We are back to 'swings and roundabouts' because although there may be less children in our schools now, and therefore less money is being spent, the increased National Insurance contributions next April will cost ILEA an extra £2 million in 1983/84, and that is only one of many increased costs.

As parents we have already let the Government know we prefer the standards and service we receive from ILEA, the time has come to let them know we will not go on paying twice for our childrens' education. We want ILEA to go on raising the standards of education and we are not prepared to lower them.

It's been quite a busy start to the new school year, and in common with the staff the PTA Committee are all looking forward to a Christmas break.

Our Jumble Sale on October 9th raised £192 and our thanks go to all parents, staff, and girls who contributed jumble or helped on the day.

An innovation we tried this year was to ask new parents when they came to their meeting at the school last July, whether they would like to contribute £5 to PTA funds which would also entitle one parent free to our next major social function. Many parents thought this was a good idea and made a donation. We would like to thank all those parents who should have received an official acknowledgement, but a few parents donated money annonymously and we would like to thank them now.

All funds raised by the PTA do of course, go to the school to pay for various projects, and any other parents who would like to make a donation to the funds can do so at any time by sending contributions into school for the attention of Mr. Luckings, the school secretary, but all cheques should be made payable to Sydenham School PTA.

We hasten to make quite clear, however, that a monetary donation is not a condition of membership of the PTA. There is no membership fee — all parents are automatically members of the PTA as soon as their daughter joins the school.

A big thank you to last year's PTA Committee for all their hard work and fund raising efforts which are very much appreciated, and we are glad to see that manyof them are continuing as members of the new Committee which was elected at the Annual General Meeting of the PTA on November 9. (The new Committee is listed at the back of "Grapevine"). The AGM was followed by a cheese and wine party which turned into quite a lively evening:

The parents are entitled to have four representatives on the School Council. So far we only have two volunteers and one reserve who actually works full time so it is difficult for her to attend meetings immediately after school. Therefore we need two more School Council reps. Medieval Evening

Over 700 people attended Sydenham School's Medieval Evening held on November 17, and thoroughly enjoyed an event which was intended to entertain as well as enlighten. Organised along the lines of similar inter-disciplinary functions, such as the American Evening (1976), Chinese Evening (1979), and the Elizabethan Fayre (1980), the event was based around a period of history and involved many of the School's subject departments. The work of pupils in many lessons this term was centred around the 'Medieval' theme, and not just in their History classes, as was seen by the splendid displays in the main hall on the night. These were "Women's Work" (Careers), "Science in the Medieval Period", "Aspects of Medieval France and Spain", a model Medieval Village built by girls in the Grundig Centre, Musical Instruments in the Medieval Period, the Medieval Monastery (R.E.), and the English Department's extensive story of "Sir Garwain and the Green Knights".

During the evening visitors sipped their mulled wine and tasted medieval food provided by the H.E. Department to the sounds of music from the era. The Dance Department students performed "Dances from Provence" whilst the Drama Department put on their entertaining "Medieval Kings" or "Is a Crown of Thorns a Bed of Roses?".

Outside the main hall teachers, pupils and many guests in period costume mingled with crowds of visitors who had passed under an authentic "Traitors' Gate" with assorted gory heads constructed by enthusiastic young historians. An


Exhibition of "Memorabilia" from Sydenham School's performance of the Chester cycle of Mystery Plays at Southwark Cathedral reminded everyone of the successful drama production of earlier in the year. whilst the Textile Studies Department were able to display a fine tableau of 3rd year pupils in Medieval dress. Visitors were frequently stopped by Medieval-clad youngsters dressed as pedlars or as 'Mystery Kings' of the time. In the foyer many were interested in the exhibition and video-films shown by the evening's sponsors - The League Against Cruel Sports - who compared the Medieval bloodsports of our present time with the times when cockfighting, bull and bear baiting were popular pastimes.

Down the steps of "Traitors' Gate" and across the grounds to the History Huts, people were able to experience torture and punishment in Sydenham's very own 'Dungeon'! Stocks, screams and strange sights in the darkness of what is usually called "Hut 4"! The other main History Rooms changed their names to the Queen Matilda Room and the Wat Tyler Room where visitors saw displays of pupils' work on the Medieval Period and enjoyed two colourful and popular ILEA films "Medieval Society" and "The Peasant's Revolt".

Such an event cannot be conceived, never mind organised, without the commitment, dedication and hard work of very many teachers and girls. Our evening was a tremendous success and is a tribute to everyone who helped to make it so, especially our most appreciative guests. Thanks:

Pyrenees Expedition 1983

Probably not too many people are aware that at Sydenham School we have a group of hard-working dedicated and daring girls and staff who are preparing for their most ambitious project so far. I refer to Sydenham's Mountaineering Group who are busy preparing for an expedition to the Pyrenees Mountains in France in July this year.

The group will consist of 26 students and 10 adults who have been following a training programme of mountain experience during the past five years. Some of the girls have already experienced extremes which vary from the climbling wall at Islington, to the sandstone outcrops of Harrisons Rocks near Tonbridge Wells; from the austere grandeur of the Cader Idris massif in mid-Wales, to the greener fells of Langdale in the Lake District; from the summer in the Isle of Arran to the bitter icy gullies of Coire ant Sneachda in the Cairngorms in winter. Some members have already tasted the delights of hauling themselves and their packs to

the Pyrenees summits of 10,000 plus whilst on their reconnaissance of the area in 1981.

The expedition is principally a climbing one although some work may be carried out on a photographic project, and some studies in geology may be forthcoming.

On an expedition such as this the range of skills required is considerable. The members will be required to rock climb to a high standard, efficiently handle and manage ropes, knots and climbing equipment; confidently use ice axe and crampons; carry out a rescue operation; maintain themselves and their equipment; navigate; camp without tears; walk long distances; adminster first aid; understand the weather and meterological information; and cook!

The expedition will travel in three longwheelbase Ford Transit mini-buses and perhaps one trailer. Their departure on July 28 will be one step nearer to an even greater achievement - a Sydenham School expedition to the distant summits of the South American Mounttains:
