Over fifty Red Bank Catholic students and Caseys4Life Club members traveled to our nation's capital to participate in the March for Life, January 18, 2019. They embarked on their annual journey to Washington, D.C. with moderators Mrs. Flego, Mrs. DeStefano, and several Red Bank Catholic faculty members who have been organizing this trip since 2011.

However, since 1973 when the decision of Roe v. Wade legalizing abortion was issued by the Supreme Court, people from all over have traveled to America's biggest anti-abortion rally. The theme this year was unique from day one.

The experience begins the night before when students and chaperones gather in the Broad Street Auditorium for a prayer service and movie. Here they are educated in the scientific, political, and moral aspects of the life issue; they broke up into small groups for discussion and

attended a prayer service led by Father Ariel.

At four in the morning, they took a bus to St. Patrick's to start their rally off with Mass. They then proceeded to the National Mall to start their march. The annual rally protests both the practice and legality of abortion and includes speeches from politicians. This year's speakers included Dr. Alveda King, the Director of Civil Rights for the Unborn with Priests for Life; Carl Anderson, the Supreme

Knight of the Knights of Columbus; Archbishop Joseph Naumann, the Chairman of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Pro-life Activities Committee, and many more

We Honor a Career in Service

RBC Honors Alumnus: Jamie Riley

Honor can be defined as a high regard of personal integrity, respect, and privilege. Honor shapes lives everyday, and provides the glue that holds a family, community, and country together. However, the price of honor can be great, and can even cost a person his or her life.

On January 22, 2019, during a training exercise in New Mexico, soldier Jamie Riley was killed. Riley, 21, of Fair Haven was one of two Army soldiers soldiers who died in the crash involving two Stryker vehicles at New Mexico's McGregor Range.

Jamie graduated from Red Bank Catholic in 2015 and enlisted in the Army nearly three years later. During his time in high school, Jamie excelled in football and track and field, and received his third degree black belt in Tae Kwon Do. Jamie's teachers remember him as a driven student whose desire to learn and grow did not stop when the bell rang.

Jamie joined the Army in 2018 and became a Cavalry Scout, a Reconnaissance Soldier stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas. Here he was assigned to the 1st Armored Division, 1st Battalion, 36th Infantry Regiment, and 1st Stryker Brigade Combat Team. Jamie held the value of honor close to his heart every day. He had self-discipline and respected the chain of command and his fellow comrades. He did not let fear or let obstacles beat him; instead, he upheld the Constitution and protected America's freedoms every day.

Jamie's loss was felt throughout the Casey community. Hearts hung especially heavy on February fourth as Red Bank Catholic students and faculty came together to pay tribute to the fallen hero. Students held flags and banners in support of Jamie, Jamie's family, and our troops as Jamie's procession drove down Peters Place on its way to Tower Hill Church in Red Bank. The Casey Family continues to mourn the loss of PFC Jamie Riley.

Military Careers

Jamie Riley was not the only Casey to pursue a career to serve the country. Recent graduates like Paddy Sciortino (RBC '17), Jack Smith (RBC '16), Matt Lamb (RBC '15), and more have taken the path of service after graduating.

Smith and Lamb returned to Red Bank Catholic to speak to students in the Military Careers Club about their experiences, both in high school and what it took to prepare them for their careers in the military. Both are part of the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) program at Penn State University. Sciortino attends West Point University and continues to train at the Army AIT school there. The U.S. Military Academy's mission for college students is to educate, train, and inspire the Corps of Cadets so that each graduate is a commissioned leader of character. Every soldier will be fully committed to the values of duty and honor and prepared for a career of professional excellence and service to the nation as an officer in the United States Army by the time they graduate.

A Call to Serve

As the costs of college continue to escalate, many high school graduates consider enlistment in the military service.

Becoming a successful adult requires the right combination of independence and support; serving in the military provides that combination for many.

Each of the five branches of the military – Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, and Coast Guard – offer training programs immediately after high school. If a student decides to serve, they can receive college credits for their experience which is accepted by more than

2,300 colleges and universities. Moreover, soldiers can receive professional and technical training to meet licensing and credentials for jobs outside the military.

While our nation currently experiences some division, we can all agree on the courage and the dedication it must take to answer the call to serve our country. Jamie Riley and those like him have reminded us of how much we respect them.

Red Bank Catholic started one senior, one junior, one sophomore and two freshmen.

They competed in the Mt. St. Dominic Festival and went 2-1. Moreover, in another non- divisional game, Say Yes To Success Event, the girls beat Xaverian, New York, 71-51.

Despite the tough loss against Red Bank Regional, the girls crushed Camden Catholic in an NJSIAA Non-Public A South game 62-47.

One key non-conference game was against opponent Roselle Catholic. The Varsity girls won 53-40 with the help of freshman guard Justine Pissott's 15 points.

Another big win was against rival Rumson-Fair Haven.

Sophomore Sophia Sabino dictated most of the play for Red Bank Catholic and scored 12 points. The Caseys entered the fourth-quarter with a two-point lead, but an 8-1 run behind 3-pointers from Justine Pissott and Julia Setaro sealed the 42-28 win.

With a team fairly absent of senior leadership, starting only one senior, Sabino was able to fill that role for the Caseys and carry on last year's point guard Rose Caverly's success.

Sabino received First Team All Division for the A Central Division.

Two other standout players were recognized by the Asbury Park Press as well.

The boys' basketball team fought for a successful season, finishing with a record of 9-5 in the division.

Four of RBC's five losses came against teams seeded in the top 12 of the Shore Conference Tournament, and four of the five also came on the road.

The boys learned from their past and went on to compete in the Shore Conference Tournament quarterfinals for the first time since 1994. RBC's defense rose to the occasion during the fourth quarter and both overtime periods to fight off Wall, 74-68, and earn their spot.

An individual game that stands out was their win against Manasquan, 62-50. The Caseys handed the Warriors just their second loss of the season.

Point contributions in the win were from junior Charlie Gordinier with 20 points. Seniors John Duffy scored 15 and Stephen Lubischer added 13 points for Red Bank Catholic.

The Caseys also had four wins in the RWJ Barnabas Health Arena and claimed the WOBM Christmas Classic Championship in December.

Among the teams they defeated were fellow quarterfinalists Freehold Township, Point Pleasant Boro, Middletown South, and Marlboro.

The Caseys' next battle was the NJSIAA State Sectionals.

RBC defeated Bishop Ahr in a thrilller, 53-52, in quarterfinal play of the NJSIAA Non-Public A South Division.

They moved on to the semi-final round against Paul VI, but lost 83-54.

Still, the boys compiled 20 wins and 8 losses total in a fine 2019 season of play.
