### New Vice-Principal, Student Life for the Junior School in September 2019

One of the main strategies of our strategic plan, *Driven to Make a Difference*, is to “Equip each student for their path ahead” by ensuring that our students develop a strong sense of belonging and well-being at Southridge. A key step in moving towards this strategy is to ensure that we have the organizational leadership structures in place to support our work in both the Junior and Senior Schools. The first part of this process involved aligning the role of Vice-Principal, Learning across both the Junior and Senior Schools in September 2018. The next step is to ensure that we have the same alignment across both schools for the role of Vice-Principal, Student Life.

Student Life at Southridge encompasses many things that relate to the daily life of our students across the school year. Support for student behaviour and discipline, student safety and supervision, opportunities for students to engage in experiences to support their social and emotional development in and out of the classroom (e.g. co-curriculars, outdoor learning opportunities, trips), student leadership, service and action initiatives that support local and global engagement, and special community building events and celebrations, such as feasts and special days in the school are just some of the aspects that fall under the umbrella of student life. As a member of the Junior School Leadership Team, the Junior School Vice-Principal, Student Life will contribute to the implementation of the Kindergarten - Grade 7 vision for student life, and will also work collaboratively with Mr. Darren Jones, Senior School Vice Principal, Student Life to explore and enhance opportunities to further develop and strengthen the continuity of student life across our K-12 continuum.

We are delighted to inform you that Mr. Steve Anderson will assume the role of Junior School Vice-Principal, Student Life in September 2019. Mr. Anderson brings to the role 19 years of experience at Southridge, starting as a Grade 5 MYP teacher before specializing in Math and Design as a Grade 7 MYP teacher and MYP Math Coordinator. Since 2012, Mr. Anderson has also been the Junior School Educational Technology Leader where he has been responsible for leading the integration of technology across the K-7 program, coordinating the student laptop program for Grade 5-7 students, supporting teachers, students, and parents from Kindergarten to Grade 7, as well as contributing to the K-12 Technology Committee. Mr. Anderson has also supported the co-curricular program as the sponsor teacher of the Junior School Tech Team and has also

received his Masters in Educational Leadership in 2018 through Vancouver Island University and also completed the ISABC Leadership program in 2017. Please join us in congratulating Mr. Anderson in his new appointment. We look forward to the energy and insight he will bring to student life at Southridge.

## Junior School News

### Summer Dress in effect on Tuesday, April 23

Summer Dress will be in effect from Tuesday, April 23 through to Friday, October 11. **Please note that white tights are not a part of summer uniform options.** On chilly spring days, students wishing to wear tights should wear black tights with their kilt or tunic. Please see the chart below for permitted Summer uniform options. Further details can also be found in your child's Prep Book. Thank you for your support in ensuring your child adheres to uniform expectations.

**Regulation Summer Dress:** worn daily beginning on the Tuesday following Easter Monday through to the Friday before Thanksgiving, as follows:

Choice of:

- Green vest
- Green cardigan
- Pullover green sweater
- Navy blazer

Choice of:

- Grey dress pants with grey socks (black belt optional)
- Tunic (K- Gr. 3) or kilt (Gr. 4-7) hemmed no higher than 8 cm above the knee with black knee socks or footed black tights
- Black walking shorts with white knee socks or white lace/logo-free ankle socks
- Black skort with white knee socks or lace/logo-free white ankle socks

**Please note:** only white socks may be worn with the skort or shorts; black socks and black or white tights are not permitted to be worn with the skort or short.

Choice of:

- White, button-down dress shirt
- White or light blue, Southridge-crested golf shirt

**Please note:** The summer shirt may be untucked if the hem is no longer than 8 cm below the waist.

All black, polishable **leather** shoe with black molded outer sole and no obtrusive logo (heel no higher than 5 cm including sole). (Please note suede, synthetic materials, and canvas are not appropriate for uniform shoes.)

The school will be closed for Easter on **Friday, April 19** and **Monday, April 22**. Classes will resume on Tuesday, April 23 with a **regular 8:00 am start time**.

*“On April 6, 2018, Canadians were heartbroken to hear the news of the Humboldt Broncos bus crash. Of the 29 passengers, sixteen lost their lives and thirteen will all bear physical and emotional scars for life.”*


**Logan Boulet’s Story**

Logan Boulet made the decision to be an organ donor just weeks before his passing in the tragic Humboldt Broncos bus crash in April 2018. Logan was inspired to register his decision to donate by his coach and mentor, Ric Suggit, who had died in 2017 and was an organ donor.

After Logan registered his decision, he took the wise and necessary step of sharing his decision with his family. The act of registering his choice and sharing that decision with his loved ones helped his family support his wish to donate his organs for transplant and research.

The details of this tragic event have reached a wide audience. “The Logan Boulet Effect” has inspired more than 100,000 Canadians to become registered organ donors. Logan’s family continues to share their story, making an essential contribution to nationwide public awareness of organ and tissue donation.

Help us and the Boulet family spread the word about the importance of organ donation and honour Logan’s legacy by participating in national [Green Shirt Day](#) on April 7 and April 8, and recognizing National Organ and Tissue Donation Awareness Week (NOTDAW) from April 21 to 27.

## Having the Money Talk: Raising Financially Prepared Teens

Every parent at some point probably has "the talk" (as in, the birds and the bees) with their teen, but not every parent attempts "the money talk." At times it is because some parents fear that talking about money with their teens will open up a Pandora's Box of other problems. The reality, however, is that not talking openly about money can create false expectations which can lead to fear and/or entitlement.

As teens transition into university and life after high school in the "real world", it is an ideal time to lay the vital groundwork for a stable financial foundation so that teens will have confidence around money and mature into adulthood with a healthy relationship with their finances.

Teens are often ill-equipped with basic financial literacy skills that can often make the difference between being able to live on their own and make wise choices about money or constantly being dependent on the bank of mom and dad for their day to day survival.

Taught by experts and pioneers in the field of heirs and beneficiary education, this workshop provides a safe space to teach principles and concept to help parents have the money talk.

Alphil co-founded the Financial Literacy Counsel (FLC) in 1999 out of a passion and a commitment to financially preparing generations through financial education and financial counselling.

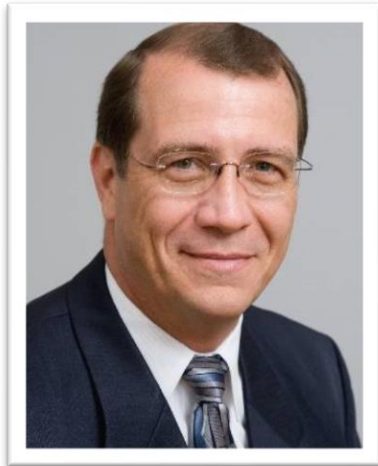

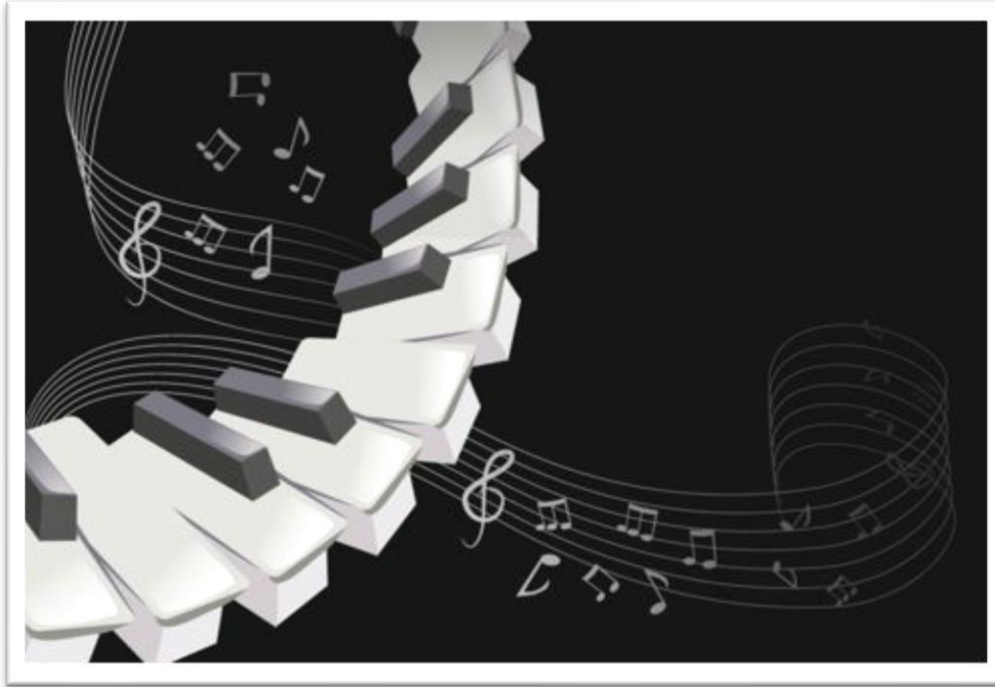

**RE: BC Government’s Measles Immunization Catch-Up Program For School-Aged Children from April to June 2019**

As you may have heard, the BC Government has announced an initiative to catch up all school-aged children (K-12) with measles vaccines. This is an opportunity for unimmunized and under-immunized children to catch-up on their vaccinations. There is no measles outbreak within our region; however, we are working with the province, our health-care partners and school districts to increase immunity amongst B.C.’s school-aged children.

Most people in Canada are protected against measles infections through immunizations. Two doses of either measles, mumps and rubella vaccine (MMR) or measles, mumps, rubella, and varicella vaccine (MMRV) is 99 per cent effective at preventing measles. Children receive one dose of MMR at 12 months of age followed by one dose of MMRV starting at four years of age. Starting in April, the Fraser Health Public Health team will send letters to parents of children in kindergarten through Grade 12 who do not have up-to-date measles vaccinations. Parents will be provided with instructions on where and when they can go to receive measles vaccination for their children. Thank you for your patience while we review Fraser Health immunization records over the coming weeks.

**Only students who are not up-to-date with MMR or MMRV based on public health records will receive a letter outlining what measles vaccine they need and any other vaccines they are missing. The letter will give instructions as to where the student can receive the measles vaccine and other vaccines if needed. This letter will include the student’s immunization record and should be kept in a safe place for future immunization reporting. If you receive a letter, but have documented vaccine elsewhere, this documentation must be sent to public health according to the instructions below.**

If your child was immunized by Fraser Health Public Health, it is not necessary to request your child’s immunization records at this time. However, if your child was **not** immunized by Fraser Health Public Health in the past and received their immunizations from their family doctor, nurse practitioner or a pharmacist, please e-mail their immunization records to: [reportimmunizations@fraserhealth.ca](mailto:reportimmunizations@fraserhealth.ca)

If you have any questions, please contact your local Public Health Unit listed below.

Students who are considered to be up-to-date according to public health records will not be receiving a letter. If you do not receive a letter for your child/children by July 2019 and believe that they are not up-to-date with their immunizations, please contact your local Public Health unit listed below.
