



Time	3 hours (+ 50 minutes for optional essay)	2 hours, 55 minutes (+ 40 minutes for optional essay)
Sections	Reading, Math (up to Trig, formulas provided), Writing Language, optional essay	English, Math (up to Trig, no formulas provided), Reading, Science (overall skills), optional essay
Types of Questions	Evidence-based, focused on real world situations, practical	Curriculum-based, straightforward, long questions but easier to decipher

Standardized Testing

Required

- SAT or ACT with writing
- SAT subjects tests, depending on university and major



Recommended

- SAT subject tests depending on university and major
- Eligible to take a subject test after completion of Honors/AP course
 - UC's do not require SAT subject tests, but do recommend for certain majors





Naviance Activity

- The "Strengths Explorer" assesses your student's strengths and weaknesses based on their self-reported thoughts/feelings/actions.
- The results and activity will help your student understand their strengths and explore the career pathways associated with them.
- Your student can also use these results to help tailor their courses!

Professional Support Services



Overview

The Professional Support Services pathway represents a variety of highly specialized occupations that are critical to education and training systems. Counselors, psychologists, social workers, speech pathologists and audiologists assist people with personal and family needs, mental health assistance, educational goals and career decision making.

Employment Outlook

Overall employment in the Professional Support Services pathway is expected to grow faster than the average for all occupations through 2024.

Credentials

Training requirements for careers in these highly specialized professions depend on the type of work performed. Most of the careers in the Professional Support Services pathway require a bachelor's degree, and many require a master's or doctoral degree.


