SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

New Hanover County Schools is committed to a rigorous and comprehensive plan to continually improve educational outcomes for all students, close achievement gaps, increase equity, and improve the quality of instruction so that students are prepared for success in postsecondary education and the workforce.



In the 2017-2018 school year, NHCS' graduation rate reached its highest rate to date at 86% with significant improvements for the Students with Disabilities, the Two-or-More Races and the English Learner student groups. NHCS surpassed the state's performance on all End-of-Grade (EOG) and End-of-Course (EOC) assessments. There were significant increases in district-wide English Language Arts and Mathematics scores in Grades 3-8, with percent increases reaching 7.3% and 8.3% respectively. We have significantly increased our performance and graduation rate from last year and will continue to focus on improvement in all areas. I give credit to all the schools for working to improve the success for all students.

- Instituted the CLASS (Connecting Libraries and Schools for Success) Project, a partnership between NHCS and the New Hanover County Public Library, to provide all students with virtual library cards to enable easy access to library resources from home, school, and any NHC Public Library branch.
- Announced the creation of the Future Teachers Career Academy (FTCA), a
 joint initiative with UNCW's Watson College of Education, to begin instruction in
 the fall of 2018 at Isaac Bear Early College to give high school students an early
 opportunity to work toward becoming teachers.
- The NHCS districtwide graduation rate increased to 86%.
- NHCS surpassed the state's performance on all End-of-Grade (EOG) and End-of-Course (EOC) assessments.
- Volunteers contributed 215,304 service hours to NHCS valued at approximately \$5 million.
- NHCS conducted a Safety Summit in partnership with local health and safety officials and members of law enforcement in respose to concerns about school safety and security.

Divisions and Departments

- The NHCS Public Relations Division earned a Golden Achievement Award by the National School Public Relations Association.
- Child Nutrition earned the Turnip the Beet Award, Going the Distance in Innovation Award and Superior Site Award for the Summer Food Service program. Additionally, they have an average system-wide cafeteria sanitation grade of 99%.



Twenty-three new National Board Certified Teachers and 15 additional educators renewed certification to rank 23rd in the nation and sixth in the state for the total number of NBCTs.

- NHCS was awarded a \$1.5 million grant for anti-bullying training and support at five district middle schools.
- Four NHC schools were selected for the TrueSchool Innovation Fellowship, valued at \$15,000 each, for a national literacy improvement initiative.
- New Hanover High School was the State Championship winner in Baseball.
- Hoggard High School graduated its first class of the International Baccalaueate Diploma Programme.
- Isaac Bear Early College High School and Wilmington Early College High School earned 100% and 98% graduation rates, among the highest in the state for high schools.

Students

- Last year, NHCS had the most students invited to attend Governor's School
 in the district's history. Each NHCS high school, including the early colleges, was
 represented.
- Sanya Shah, a senior from Hoggard High School, was awarded the prestigious Morehead-Cain Scholarship to attend the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
- Zane Dash, a sophomore at Isaac Bear Early College, was announced as a winner at the North Carolina Science and Engineering Fair (NCSEF) competition, representing NHCS at the INTEL International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF).
- Regan Williams, a Roland-Grise Middle School student, was selected as one of 30 finalists in the Broadcom MASTERS® national STEM competition.
