GRAND RAPIDS CHRISTIAN SCHOOLS SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Board,

When confirming the qualities represented by Portrait of a Graduate, I requested that a consultant from Independent School Management (ISM) review and provide us with feedback on what we created prior to it being finalized and published. We learned about Portrait from ISM, and it was important to me that the final draft articulated the qualities of Grand Rapids Christian Schools' graduates in a compelling way. I was so pleased to hear from ISM that they strongly supported each one, stating that they both reflected the spirit of who we are as a Christian school institution (they know us well and have worked with us multiple times over the years) and truly articulated a distinct portrait of a GRCS graduate. Justice Seekers was, in particular, highlighted by ISM as a distinctive quality that very few schools either envision or are able to articulate. In ISM's words, *"Schools that envision this as a desired quality in their graduates are few and far between. Justice Seekers reflect your unique mission as a Christian school and calls for your graduates to make an impact in a society that desperately needs seekers of justice now more than ever."*

I am honored to work in a school and with a staff that embraces this and other qualities that are described in Grand Rapids Christian's Portrait. Reading through the principals' and other administrators' reports this month and throughout the year has been a true affirmation and reflection of the focus of our work. That, along with the many things being done in our schools and classrooms in support of our strategic planning goals, is exciting to each of us who is called to serve our students here.

Thank you for honoring our work and bolstering our efforts. Your strategic support encourages us to continue to focus on our mission of preparing effective servants of Christ in contemporary society.

BRAD MOCKABEE — GRCHS PRINCIPAL

Next week, 45 GRCHS staff and students will attend the “Stand Against Racism” event put on by the CRC Office of Race Relations. This event is part of the YWCA’s national campaign to eliminate racism.

Last month, GRCHS staff and students participated in “Coin Wars” to raise money for The Refugee Education Center. The Refugee Education Center “focuses on educating youth as a means to connect refugee families more quickly and completely to the West Michigan community.”

Through the leadership of Jeremy Pyper, our building facility manager, GRCHS has revamped its recycling system to drastically reduce the amount of waste we are producing as a school.

As part of our service learning program, our Spanish department has formed meaningful partnerships with a variety of local schools. We have students that serve regularly at the Bridgeway school for refugees. We also partner with Buchanan, Ken-O-Sha, and Cesar Chavez elementary schools to learn and serve.

ERIC BURGESS — GRCMS PRINCIPAL

During iXplore Week 2019 (April 8 - 12) at GRCMS, our 5th—8th grade students had many opportunities to work for justice and practice stewardship in their classes and activities. Some classes learned about other people and cultures and the impacts people have had on one another over centuries; in other classes, as they prepared to hike and camp, students also thought about the impact of their activities on the environment and people and local economies around the sites that they visited.

The students were challenged during chapels during iXplore Week to think about how — right here and right now — they can be part of God’s Kingdom work. Our guest speakers focused on our “**Build the Kingdom Here**” theme and our theme verse, Micah 6:8, “*He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.*”



Personally, I had the opportunity to travel with the photography class to Detroit on April 11 and 12. As we prepared to leave on Thursday morning — and very intentionally throughout the trip — the teachers (Ms. Tanis and Mr. Greidanus) did a great job of talking with the students about the years of changes in Detroit: its rise to national prominence in the early 20th century with the birth and growth of the automobile industry, the challenges of racial inequality and injustices throughout the city’s history, and the recent rebirth and rejuvenation of the city.

The teachers were very intentional about discussing the importance of the people of Detroit and challenging the students — in the photographs that they had to take for the class as well as in their thinking about what they saw in Detroit — to find ways to see and show the beauty of Detroit and the revival of the city. Even in a class initially focused on photography, they took the opportunity to help our students to think about issues of justice and stewardship as they attempted to get the kids to see how we are all created in the image of God and all responsible for the good of those around us.

GRAND RAPIDS CHRISTIAN SCHOOLS PORTRAIT OF A GRADUATE STORIES

HARRY KNOL — ROCKFORD PRINCIPAL

A great big “thank-you” to everyone who sent in food items for the iXplore middle school service learning opportunity with Kids Food Basket. One recent Monday afternoon, the 5th-8th graders were able to assemble more than 1,200 bags of trail mix with help from Kids Food Basket interns. Our students were able to hear from three of the Kid’s Food Basket Interns about the program and the impact it has in the community. The students listened intently and asked great questions before they started the service project.

Part of RCS’s work is to build within our students an appreciation of the world in which we live and to reinforce



that we are stewards of the resources given us. Every Friday, 5th graders work to gather all the recycle materials and fill the outside containers. As part of iXplore, a group of students built containers to organize the recycle centers at RCS.

Did you know that RCS 6th grade students, under the leadership of teacher Phil Warners, built an entire interpretive nature trail in the woods behind the school? They learn and practice stewardship of natural resources. In addition they work to maintain Belding Road by routinely picking up trash.

For 2019-2020 school year, RCS has chosen as its theme: **Love in Action** and Romans 12:9-21. As we continue to work with The Portrait of a Graduate in both our understanding but also our planned actions to contribute to the development of our students, this new theme will fit well with and support Working for Justice and Practicing Stewardship.

4th Graders formed partnerships with 4th graders at Stocking School in Grand Rapids Public Schools this year. They worked to purchase books and also meet the students.

MARK KROMMENDYK — GRCES IROQUOIS PRINCIPAL

Justice Seeking is a wonderful basis for making decisions and deciding on actions at GRCES. When the decisions we make promote justice we are teaching children to seek justice by modeling it.

One way this plays out is in the choices we make for supporting service opportunities. This year, our final school-wide service opportunity will be partnering with a GRCS parent, Simon Luk, as he raises funds to buy books for a library in a refugee camp in Kenya. Simon and his wife immigrated from this same camp years ago and have remained close to people working and living there. The camp is primarily home to refugees from South Sudan fleeing war and famine. Simon has told his story in chapel here. Simon has a son, Isaiah, in the middle school. The library serves to give young people access to reading materials they need to do school.

Education is seen as a path to better lives by families in the camp. We are blessed to have a direct contact who can ensure money raised will be well used. Simon will be working with the staff service-learning committee to introduce the project. The committee will expect the students to do small things to raise money themselves. Staff will also share justice concepts with the students as part of the project.

ANN BAKKER — GRCES EVERGREEN PRINCIPAL

Team Two students are reading biographies about heroic justice seekers such as Ruby Bridges, Malala, and Martin Luther King. They are finding out that seeking justice often means going “against the grain” and standing up for what you believe in despite what others think.



Team Three students attended Zoo School for a week in March. While at John Ball Zoo, our students learned about conservation, animal care, and other environmental concerns. They came back to school with a deepened desire to care for God’s creation.

There are many ways to ensure a board's strategic function. One way is to ensure policies and procedures are in place that ensure highly talented, strategically-minded board members are identified to fill vacant board seats. Nine years ago, a governance task force charged by the Board of Trustees at that time recommended important changes to our governance policies, and I am pleased to report that those changes have resulted in practices that have been sustained and position Grand Rapids Christian Schools' strategic board leadership going forward.

The changes are reflected in how board members are selected, nominated, and approved. They are reflected in how new board members are "on-boarded" and how board members hold themselves accountable. This month, we will discuss the self assessment board members were asked to complete in August 2017. This assessment, initially taken in draft form, includes an opportunity for board members to reflect on the board as a whole as well as on their own personal contributions and engagement as a member of the board.

At its April meeting, the Executive Committee reviewed the tool; Tim and others will lead a discussion on its purpose and how the results of the assessment will be used in the fall. The self assessment is but one way the board is able to remain diligent and understanding of its strategic role.

As students begin to register for classes for the 2019-2020 school year, we are seeing exciting growth in our computer science and business classes. We've added Intro to Business and Personal Finance classes as well as an upper level AP Computer Science class.

On April 26, we're partnering with Fifth Third Bank for a "*financial empowerment day*." Our marketing and accounting students will take part in this event.

We continue to emphasize career exploration and readiness as we work with students. Students interning in the workplace began through our Winterim program and is expanding to semester courses. Over the last two years, we've had over 200 students intern in over 160 different places!

ERIC BURGESS — GRCMS PRINCIPAL

GRCMS and RCMS hosted the annual iXplore Week from April 8 - 12. Students had the opportunity to take a class or two about a variety of topics: sewing, camping, photography, soccer, the art of illusion, "Down on the Farm," video games, fly fishing, theatre, fashion design, baseball, and creative expression in the form of painting or various "maker" ideas. There were also a couple of different classes on understanding other cultures and foods and activities. This list only scratches the surface of the options and activities in which students engaged. A group of 28 eighth graders and teacher/parent chaperones also went to Gettysburg, PA for the entire week!

One might ask, "Why take an entire week away from our 'regular' curriculum in order to take just one or two classes?" What are the benefits of having time to focus on a topic or two for an entire week?"

What I have learned over the years about iXplore Week is that it not only helps students transition back from Spring Break but, more importantly, it also helps them to learn in greater depth about a topic or two for the week.

This year, GRCMS introduced the option of not only full-day classes but many half-day options as well so that kids could opt for two classes instead of one. The structure of having just one or two classes per day allows students and teachers to take more time and opportunity to do larger projects without hourly or daily breaks (in some cases) and to go off campus to a variety of places both near and (sometimes) far away.

The pace of the week means that we are not rushed for time, and the opportunities for student choice in their classes and learning in multi-age groups are also further benefits of iXplore Week. The week is a ton of extra work and planning for teachers and adjunct staff who come to teach the classes, but they find it to be worth it for the opportunities that the students get to learn about a variety of areas of God's beautiful and unique world.

GRAND RAPIDS CHRISTIAN SCHOOLS STRATEGIC PLAN GOALS

MARK KROMMENDYK — GRCS IROQUOIS PRINCIPAL

One important way we meet this goal is to hire great people. We have offered contracts to three new teachers for the 2019-2020 school year.

Mrs. Eena Wright will be teaching 3rd or 4th grade next year. Mrs. Wright has worked at Rehoboth in New Mexico and has been teaching for Holland Christian the last 4 years. She is nearing completion of a Masters in Ed. Leadership at Calvin.

Mrs. Taylor Asfour will be teaching 3rd or 4th grade next year. Mrs. Asfour has been working here for the last two years as a tech aide, an ESS aide, and an on-call substitute teacher. She has been excellent in each of these rolls, and we are excited to give her an opportunity to take on her own classroom next year.

Mrs. Abigail Hendriksen will be teaching a Spanish Immersion classroom next year. Mrs. Hendriksen has filled two back-to-back maternity leave positions this year and knows us well. She has done an excellent job, and we are excited to have her join us.

ANN BAKKER — GRCS EVERGREEN PRINCIPAL

Classroom Learning Labs provide the context for teachers to experience in-depth, professional growth within a collaborative learning community. We typically schedule five Classroom Learning Labs during each school year for GRCS and RCES classroom teachers. Labs are hosted by GRCS teachers and facilitated by the Reading Coach or the Academic Program Coordinator.

This year, six teachers visited Elizabeth Wolf's classroom to observe and learn about Math 3-Act Tasks, four teachers visited Kate Traylor's classroom to observe and discuss Reading Horizons (phonics), and two teachers visited Vanessa Abreu's classroom to observe Writing Workshop.

We look forward to a Reading Workshop in Judy Rooy's classroom this spring. A Math Workshop Learning Lab was also offered and so many teachers indicated a desire to attend that we will host a Math Workshop Learning Labs in Kate Faber's classroom at RCS and in Graham Schultze's classroom at Evergreen this spring!

Our Eagle Links program intentionally makes connections between students receiving inclusion services and general education students. Bible and Theology teacher Larry Borst has been a fun part of this connection working with students to grow plants in our greenhouse that are native to West Michigan.

As we go through the hiring process, determining the cultural intelligence of our candidates is of great importance. All of our final candidates for each position will be required to take the cultural intelligence assessment from the Cultural Intelligence Center.

On March 15, we celebrated our annual Foreign Language Chapel at GRCMS. All of our songs were sung in Spanish, and verses and other reflections were shared in multiple languages. We celebrated the fact that our GRCMS community represents ten different home languages (including American Sign Language), and students were able to share about the theme verse in the respective

home languages of their families. This chapel provided one unique opportunity for all of our students to represent the diversity of nationalities, languages, and cultures that are a vital part of our GRCMS family.

On March 22, 6th graders had two great opportunities to celebrate distinctive cultural differences and to learn about new things. The 6th graders in the Spanish Immersion Program took a cultural trip to Chicago to experience Hispanic and Latino culture first-hand; they visited a Hispanic art exhibit, visited authentic restaurants, and explored Spanish-speaking portions of the city. The other 6th graders who were back at GRCMS took the afternoon to learn more from guest speakers and student presentations about a variety of cultures around the world and to try out authentic foods that were brought in by the students. In both cases, our students not only celebrated the diversity of God's creation and our GRCMS community but also had experiences to learn and try new things in a hands-on way — not just from reading about it in books!

STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL 5

Ensure a business model for financial sustainability that supports the educational program and advances the mission of Grand Rapids Christian Schools.

JIM PRIMUS — CFO

Through the first nine months of the 2018-2019 fiscal year (year-end June 30), the GRCS Operating Budget is tracking well with respect to both Revenues and Expenses. The 2018-2019 budget includes a contingency of \$250,000, which we use only to address revenue shortfall and/or additional expenses that sometimes occur. Any year-end budget surplus is used to reduce prior years' operational deficits.

The 403(b) replacement plan is scheduled to be available to staff on September 1, 2019. The Christian School Retirement Investment Consortium (CSRIC) has been working together with legal support from Miller Johnson on the details of the plan. GRCS will provide up to a 4% match to eligible staff beginning January 1, 2020. The Plan will have two investment providers, Midwest Capital and GLP, who in May 2019 will begin providing Plan education to eligible participants.

MARK KROMMENDYK — GRCS IROQUOIS PRINCIPAL

At our April PTO meeting, the PTO passed its budget for next year. The PTO uses the funds collected during the current year to fund the coming year programs and expenses. PTO support is a little talked-about but much-appreciated part of our school. Simply stated, the PTO helps move our school from good to great!

Budget highlights from this past school year include:

- Distributing more than \$10,000 to classroom teachers to use at their discretion to support their instruction at the beginning of the year.
- Providing \$5000 towards the purchase of 30 iPads, software, and charging carts.
- Providing \$3000 to purchase books that represent diversity for our classrooms
- Offering \$20,000 to pay for field trips (and we will use every penny!).
- Paying \$4500 to cover expenses associated with field trip transportation.
- Approving \$7500 to pay for noon time playground supervision.

The PTO accepts the responsibility for raising this money in order to make their promises come true. The budget for the 2019-2020 school year is \$65,000.
