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Can you tell me how to get, how to get... considered to meet Big Bird and appear on Sesame Street?

For consideration for your child to appear on Sesame Street and meet Big Bird, read the below directions carefully and follow them. There is insufficient time for back and forth correspondence, so please double check that you follow the directions before submitting.

1) Please complete the attached release with your child's information and the parent or guardian's signature. Please type or write legibly, but actually sign it. *Typed, printed, or electronic signatures can not be accepted*. Scan and email the questionnaire with a current photo of your 6-11 year-old child by May 13, 2019 to RoadTrip.submissions@sesame.org. Save the questionnaire with the name of your city, followed by the child's first and last name and questionnaire.pdf (for example Chicago_Carolyn_Volpe_questionnaire.pdf). In addition, email only one photo where we can clearly see your child without anyone else in the photo. Save the photo with the name of your city, child's name, and photo (for example Chicago_Carolyn_Volpe_photo.jpg). To reiterate, your email should contain only 2 attachments- the PDF of the signed and completed questionnaire and a JPG with a photo of your child. Both files should be saved with your city and child's name. *At this time, we are not considering anyone older or younger than ages 6-11*.

2) Once we receive your signed release and child's photo, you may be invited to sign the performer release and create and send a short video of your child to our portal. Instructions to submit the video will be emailed to you after we receive the photo and release. The video should be no longer than 90 seconds. **Do not send a video or a link to a video to the above email address as they will be automatically deleted.**

If invited to submit a video, please have the child say his or her name, age, city or town where they live, what they like to do or play, any sports or instruments, and their favorite places to go or play in their town or city. They can also talk about their family, pets, and friends and what they like to do or eat when they are together.

The videos do not need to be professional quality. Videos taken with a cell phone are fine as long as we can see and hear the child clearly. Try to keep the cameras horizontal (landscape) and steady. Name the files with the name of your city followed by your child's name (for example, Chicago_Carolyn_Volpe.mov).
