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

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Speech Celebration – Grade 1-3 – June 18th

We need to begin preparing for the PYP Speech Celebration. All students in Grades 1, 2 and 3 will participate.

The goal for the students is for them to gain confidence and feel successful speaking in front of an audience. It is not a speech competition at the PYP level, but a celebration of all the students' courage! It takes tremendous courage to present in front of a crowd of people. The students will present their speeches first to each other, then to other classes and finally to the parents.

The Speech Celebration will take place on **Tuesday**, **June 18**th in the morning. The MYP Competition will be happening the same day in the afternoon. Since we only have the morning it is imperative that the presentations are all <u>less than one minute long</u>.

The emphasis is on oral presentation. Please help your child to work on volume and expression. The students will need to learn it well so they can say it without stumbling. They

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need to practice speaking clearly and interestingly *without the use of props.* We want the children to use facial expression, hand gestures and varied tones of the voice.

Some tips:

- Please begin with: Good Morning parents, teachers and students....
- **Do not begin the speech with**: My name is... or My speech is about... Instead just get right into the topic with an interesting opening.
- End with something interesting.
- End with Thank you; practice counting silently to three so they don't run off the stage.

We will begin practicing by having the children read their speeches to the class in loud, clear voices with good pacing. They should begin memorizing it.

She will be heading to the Fraser Valley Championships on her quest to repeat at BCs at the end of the month.

Cambodia - Service Learning opportunity - 2020

It may seem like a long way off, but it is time to start planning for our annual Spring Break service learning trip for 2020! While we had penciled in a return to Uganda in 2020 on our long range travel calendar, we have had to modify our plans for a number of reasons. The Uganda trip may reappear on our trip calendar in 2021 or beyond, but for now, I am very happy to announce that we will be offering another opportunity to visit Cambodia in March of 2020!

We have sent two groups to Cambodia now (2017 and 2019), and the feedback has been exceptional. This trip offers a rich mix of historical, cultural, and service based activities. Living in homestays and working on an island in the Mekong River has been the main highlight for our students on both trips, but exploring the ruins at Angkor Wat, reflecting at the Khmer Rouge killing fields, learning at the landmine museum, and experiencing the S21 Holocaust museum have also been eye-opening opportunities for our travelers. While it is not a five-star luxury trip by any stretch, the food is fantastic, the people are warm and welcoming, and the experiences and sites have been transformative.

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University Counselling Gets Busy with Spring Events!

Sage Advice from An Expert in University and College Admissions

A couple of weeks ago, Southridge welcomed Peter Van Buskirk, author and motivational speaker with "Right Fit". He presented "Cracking the Code" a customized presentation of the US college/university admissions process for international students. Whilst much of presentation focussed on applying to the United States, the advice he gave to parents and students that night is relevant and pertinent to all, regardless of where you go to pursue post-secondary education.

Here is a summarized version of the tips he shared:

- 1. The first big question to answer is what constitutes a good education and define why you want to study a particular subject. Know also, why you want to go to a particular university.
- 2. Define priorities for what education means to you as a student and not what Dad or Mom want

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- 3. Vital for each student to take control and not be content to let other people do the college/university research for you.
- 4. The technical part of the application process is important but it's not the crucial part of college/university admissions.
- 5. Defining a "good fit" is what all university counsellors will talk to students about but it requires work to determine personal requirements for that "fit". Do NOT rely on reputation as described in rankings. Rankings are fiction – burn them!

Questions to consider for "Best Fit"

Which institution provides you...

- 1. a program of study that meets your needs?
- 2. a style of instruction that is consistent with the way you like to engage in learning...exams versus papers versus major project for your full year assessment? Which do you prefer? What do you do well in?
- 3. a challenge in a manner consistent with your ability and preparation?
- 4. a sense of community that feels like home?
- 5. a place that values you for what you have to offer?

Advice about the Holistic admissions evaluation process

Courses, grades, scores – how have you used the Southridge curriculum to grow your academic abilities?

Remember that tests (SAT & ACT) exist for one purpose. They are not intelligence tests. They are used only for admission purposes.

1/3 of U.S. universities no longer require entrance tests or they make it optional. Don't send results if they are optional.

Invest in your talent – <u>don't dabble in everything</u>! Grow what you like to do and what gives you joy in life

When writing your essays, diversity and authenticity becomes important – through what lens have you seen life? Speak to competencies such as creative and critical thinking and problem-solving skills and refer to the social/economic/spiritual/geographic background that informs your understanding of self.

Tips to help you research your right fit and to get ready for applications:

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- 1. Show up at info sessions. When a university visits your school, attend and speak to the representative as they may be the one who will read your essays and statements.
- 2. Talk to the reps at fairs and sessions, ask them questions and fill out their information cards
- 3. Go visit the campus before you apply. Ensure you book a visit and tour with an ambassador and tour guide. DO NOT DO A DRIVE-BY!
- 4. Alumni interview. If you have a chance to talk to an alumnus from your university of interest. Do it and ask questions.
- 5. Demonstrate intentionality as a candidate.

Biggest Mistakes made at the time of application:

- 1. Failure to appreciate the nature of the competition for a particular program and university.
- 2. Inability to manage expectations.
- 3. Lack of intentionality in preparing application leaving the mechanics of the application until the last minute.
- 4. Failure to prove the sincerity of interest in attending the college.
- 5. Inattentiveness to the importance of staying strong throughout senior year especially after offer(s) have been made in late winter or early spring.

Mr. Van Buskirk spoke for a full two hours and held everyone's attention for the entire presentation. Ms. Livingston and Mrs. Becker will be recapping more of this at the Grade 12 Information Night which will be on Wednesday, June 5th at 7pm in the Senior School Great Hall. All Grade 11 students and their parents are encouraged to attend.

Exciting changes are coming to the Southridge House system in September 2019

The House system at Southridge has had a few changes over the years, and it's about to have another one!

The school started with two Houses – the Eagles and the Orcas – who competed yearly for the Eagle/Orca cup. As the school grew, it saw a need to expand the House system, ultimately deciding to separate the Junior and Senior Schools into four Houses each. Students were asked to submit their naming suggestions to a selection committee, and in September 2000, the eight Houses we currently know were born.

The Junior School Houses (Hawks, Ravens, Chinooks and Otters) were inspired by the original houses (two birds and two sea animals), and BC's indigenous history. The Senior School chose weather systems after our Southridge Storm athletics: Hurricane, Thunder, Blizzard and Lightning.

Until now, the Junior and Senior Schools have competed and earned points separately. In alignment with our strategic plan, and our goal of creating more full school experiences from Kindergarten to Grade 12, we are now thrilled to be relaunching our House system as a full K-12 experience. Starting this September 2019, the entire school will be divided into four Houses, each with their own distinct logo and colour: Blizzard (white), Hurricane (red), Lightning (gold) and Thunder (black)! Our four new House logos were made possible as a gift to the school by Search + Rescue Marketing, who were inspired by

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designs submitted by students across the school. Thank you to the Moreno family for making this gift possible! We are super excited to reveal the new logos to you today.

You're likely wondering by now how students will be assigned to Houses, and when they can get their new t-shirts! Senior School students will remain in their current Houses, and their Junior School siblings will join them as part of that same House. Junior School students who do not have a sibling in the Senior School will be reassigned to a new House (Hurricane, Blizzard, Lightning or Thunder). Staff and faculty will also be placed in Houses, and parents are encouraged to also consider themselves part of the same House as their children.

New House t-shirts will be given to all students from Kindergarten to Grade 12 in September. A huge thank you to the Gu Family for providing the t-shirts and ensuring all students have new House shirts next year. We are so grateful for this generous gift!

What an awesome way to start the 25th year of Southridge – with a united school! We can't wait to see the fun and excitement this new era in the history of the Southridge House system brings!
