Highlights from 2008-09 include:

- Innovative new pre-school and early childhood classes were held at Normandy Park, Hugo Elementary and Tamarack Nature Center.
- In grades K-5, we saw exceptional student growth in reading and math at every level.
 We began our partnerships with the White Bear Center for the Arts and Tamarack
 Nature Center, and we expanded our partnership with MacPhail Center for Music.
- With our middle school students, we saw even more significant academic progress in reading and math. In addition, students enjoyed the opportunity to begin studying Spanish, French or German, as one new part of a restructured and enriched middle school curriculum.
- For students at the high school level, increasing numbers accepted the challenge of college credit classes, with the class of 2009 raising the bar for college credits taken, *Advanced Placement* honors received and taking advantage of the 22 separate college credit courses offered.
- At the district level, White Bear Lake Area Schools received a AA bond rating from Standard and Poor's - putting us in the top 12 of Minnesota's more than 300 school districts by receiving a rating of AA or higher. This affirms our community support for education and our stewardship of these important resources.





The White Bear Lake Area School District is committed to continuously improving instruction for all students and using the data to indicate where improvements should be made. This helps the District be accountable to each student and provides assurance that instruction is appropriate to each student's level of understanding while challenging him or her to reach even further.












Reading Mathematics

In both reading and math, students at all grade levels are showing more than one year of average growth in one year of school.

Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCA)

Results of the MCA-II tests are used to set short- and long-term goals to improve student performance in the classroom and lay the groundwork for success after high school. The MCA-II test is Minnesota's state requirement for testing within the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) legislation.

The 2009 MCA-II results indicate that overall, WBLAS students continue to score above the state averages. The majority of students in the White Bear Lake Area Schools are meeting academic targets, even as the targets are increased each year by the state.

The District has begun work that focuses on intensifying support for subgroups of students who were identified as not making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP).

All students are achieving


All subgroups in WBLAS met state proficiency levels in reading - a substantial accomplishment toward closing achievement gaps among different subgroups of students.

In six of the eight subgroups, WBLAS students met proficiency levels in both reading and math.


Outperforming the state

WBLAS students outperformed the state on the MCA-II in both reading and math.







WBLAS Students State MINNESOTA COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENTS II (MCA-II) MATHEMATICS

Elementary

Elementary age students are offered a range of opportunities and support to meet their full potential.

- In grades 1-2, students are recommended for Primary Challenge based on exceptional performance in the classroom and a readiness for advanced learning. These students meet with a building resource teacher once a week for accelerated instruction in literacy and math.
- In grades 3-5, identified students receive gifted services through the REACH Program in the form of pullout classes, online learning opportunities, and independent projects. The REACH Program offers gifted students an advanced, rigorous curriculum integrated with technology and real world experiences.

Middle School

- Challenging classes are offered for all middle school students. Rigorous advanced classes are available in math, language arts, science and social studies.
- · Students have the opportunity to take Spanish, French or German during each of their middle school years.

High School

- For the 2009-10 academic year, the District added initiatives to prepare all students for college.
- Foreign languages White Bear Lake Area High School students can study up to six levels of Spanish, French and German. In addition to four levels of high school foreign language, students are offered two University of Minnesota College in the Schools foreign language classes. Three levels of American Sign Language also are now available.
- College-level classes White Bear Lake Area High School offered a total of 22 college-level courses to students in 2008-09. This is the highest number of college course offerings in our area.
- · Based on AYP data, the District's graduation rate is 97.2%, compared to a statewide rate of 91.6%. The AYP graduation rate is determined by dividing the number of graduates by the total number of graduates and drops (number of students in grades 9-12 reported as having dropped and not found as re-enrolled anuwhere in the state).




High Ranking

White Bear Lake Area Schools ranked number two in the state for *College in the Schools* (CIS) courses offered through the University of Minnesota for 2008-09. Nine CIS courses were available.


Advanced Placement (AP) Classes

The *Advanced Placement* (AP) program is a national program administered through the College Board that allows students the opportunity to pursue college-level classes while in high school. Qualifying test scores are accepted as credits earned by colleges and universities across the nation and internationally.

In 2008-09, 285 White Bear Lake Area High School student exams had scores of three or higher on AP tests, a score for which many colleges across the nation grant college credits.

There has been a positive trend in the number of students enrolled in *Advanced Placement* classes who are sitting for the AP exams: approximately 10% more students took AP exams in 2008-09 than in 2007-08.

College in the Schools (CIS)

College in the Schools classes are introductory-level college courses offered by the University of Minnesota. A total of 316 White Bear Lake Area High School juniors and seniors were enrolled in the program for the 2008-09 academic school year and earned a total of 1,356 University of Minnesota credits.

AVID Program

Planning is in place for the AVID (*Advancement via Individual Determination*) program which will offer rigorous instruction in academic "survival skills" and college-level skills to high school students.







ACT

The ACT is the most commonly taken college entrance test in Minnesota, required by most Minnesota colleges. White Bear Lake Area Schools encourages all students to take the ACT test.

There is a strong relationship between taking challenging courses, such as honors, AP and CIS classes, and increased scores on college entrance tests.

WBLAS student Ellen Duthoy was one of only two Minnesota students to score a perfect 36 on the ACT Composite in October 2008.


WBLAS student Emily Brown earned third place in the National History Day competition in 2008-09.

ACT COMPOSITE




The mean ACT Composite for the top 50 WBLAS graduating students is 30.5. The mean ACT Composite for the top 100 WBLAS graduating students is 28.7. The national mean is 21.1. The range of scores is 0-36.

SAT

The SAT college entrance exam required by many nationally competitive colleges and universities is taken by fewer students in the District than the ACT. It is not generally required of colleges or universities in the Upper Midwest.





Curriculum

Throughout the 2008-09 school year, curriculum committees worked to plan new social studies and mathematics elementary curriculum to be implemented in the 2009-10 school year.

The Community Curriculum Advisory Committee (CCAC) serves to convey community beliefs and opinions as they relate to curriculum issues. The committee includes parents, students, teachers, administrators and community members who are interested in sharing information about the educational values and beliefs held in the White Bear Lake Area School District. Being a member of CCAC provides an opportunity to serve as a sounding board for the community, to gain knowledge about the District's curriculum and its development, and to positively influence change within each curriculum area based on knowledge, research and community needs.

Smaller Class Sizes

Passage of the levy in fall 2007 allowed the District to reduce class sizes in each grade for the 2008-09 academic year. Programmatic improvements for the 2009-10 school year also included lower class sizes; kindergarten class sizes average 18 students per classroom.

Extended School Day

The District studied several programmatic improvements during the 2008-09 school year, including extending learning opportunities and in-class time.

- Due to the six period day schedule implemented in the fall of 2009, high school students spend 23% more time in each course and an additional 483 hours throughout four years in the core content areas.
- High school students are able to take zero hour, after school classes and online learning offerings.
- The length of both the elementary and middle school days were increased to extend learning time for students.


Safe Schools/Healthy Students Grant

The White Bear Lake Area School District was awarded a Safe Schools/Healthy Students grant through a Suburban Ramsey Family Collaborative initiative. The grant provides nearly \$5 million total through four years. Initiatives to be funded by the grant include support and assistance programs and training, implementation of additional security measures, and crime and violence reduction and risk prevention.

Transition Support for Students

- WEB Program In 2008-09, Sunrise Park Middle School eighth graders served as mentors to incoming sixth grade students through the school's WEB (Where Everybody Belongs) program. The program expanded to include Central Middle School during the 2009-10 school year.
- C.A.M.P. In the spring of 2009, members of the White Bear Lake Area High School Student Council initiated a Cross-Aged Mentoring Program (C.A.M.P). The project, created to welcome ninth grade students to North Campus and eleventh grade students to South Campus, was implemented successfully during the fall of 2009.







Teachers across the District have thrived with the technology added to their classrooms, allowing them to facilitate lessons using interactive white boards and other innovative teaching methods. Students will benefit from the installation of 76 new interactive SMART Boards, bringing the District total to 269 for the 2009-10 school year.

In fall 2008, the District sent a cohort of teachers and administrators to the T+L Conference, presented by the National School Boards Association (NSBA). The cohort committee continued to be involved in technology initiatives throughout the year.

Schools communicate with families through an online portal, allowing families to be more informed about their students' educational experiences. Families receive important notices instantaneously via different modes of communication through an electronic alert system. An online food services program allows families to make electronic deposits into lunch payment accounts.

Ongoing technology and data utilization initiatives allow principals and teachers to assess students' individual needs and differentiate curriculum specific to each learner.




Technology Grants

- Ingenuity Grants The 3M
 Corporation awarded District staff members with grants to add new technologies to their classrooms.
- Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Grants The H.B. Fuller Company Foundation awarded STEM Mini-Grants totaling nearly \$18,000 to five District teachers from Central and Sunrise Park Middle Schools. The grants were used to provide materials to support classroom instruction and student work.
- Project Lead the Way The District was awarded a grant of \$60,000 to be distributed over a three year period to support implementation of *Project Lead the Way*. The project will introduce and prepare middle and high school students for engineering and technical careers through partnerships with institutions of higher education and the private sector. The District is completing the certification process and could be eligible by the end of the 2009-10 school year to grant students college credit.
- SMART Board Grants The White Bear Lake Area Educational Foundation presented the District with \$65,000 to fund the purchase


Financial Management

The District received a AA bond rating from Standard and Poor's. WBLAS is one of only 12 school districts in Minnesota to receive a rating of AA or higher.





Partnerships

The White Bear Lake Area School District worked in partnership with a variety of community organizations in 2008-09. The partnerships continue during the 2009-10 school year.

- White Bear Center for the Arts Every elementary student received art lessons during the school year through a partnership with the White Bear Center for the Arts.
- YMCA Through a partnership with the YMCA, District elementary students received water safety lessons during the school year. Extended Day participants received summer swimming lessons.
- MacPhail Center for Music Birch Lake Elementary partnered with MacPhail Center for Music to offer an enhanced music program to the school's students. Additional after-school and weekend music lesson opportunities also were offered to the whole community.
- Tamarack Nature Center Otter Lake Elementary partnered with Tamarack Nature Center to provide students with experiential learning on environmental issues throughout the school year. The Early Childhood Program also benefits from a partnership with the Center, which serves as a program site.
- EMID The District's involvement in the East Metro Integration District (EMID) offers interdistrict partnerships, a multicultural resource center, and networks and advisory groups. The partnership makes available various student and educator programs.
- Community partnerships The District partnered with various municipalities throughout the year to provide fitness classes and sporting activities throughout the area.
- Volunteers WBLAS is fortunate to have thousands of hours of volunteer help. Volunteers do everything from playground supervision, offering reading help, assisting with field trips and helping in classrooms.
