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HALDANE WELCOMES CONGRESSMAN MALONEY FOR TOWN HALL



By the time the second bell rang for the start of the lunch period on Monday, February 4th, high school room 126 was packed with students, teachers, and members of the local press, all gathered for Representative Sean Patrick Maloney's first student town hall. Representative Maloney briefly talked about the day-to-day functions of Congress, before opening up the floor for student questions.

Students asked their Congressman a wide variety of questions, from the recent government shutdown to the importance of youth involvement in politics today. He talked about how our generation is taking the reins on political activism and change in our country, and the importance of civic involvement. He said, "There's a lot of things we need to do better in this country, and it's not all on people like me, it's on people like you. People like me are only as strong as the people who send them to Washington. This is a team sport".

The first question asked was on the government shutdown, and Representative Maloney explained how the shutdown occurred, and what he was doing as a member of Congress to limit the shutdown. He elucidated students on how budget bills and funding for the Federal Government are passed, in this recent case, through 12 budget bills, one of which contained the controversial element of border security funding.

Sean Patrick Maloney also told students that he, along with several of his Congressional colleagues, refused to accept payment for the thirty-five days of the partial federal government shutdown. Maloney said that by this action, he was "standing in solidarity with those who were furloughed". In more recent weeks, Sean Patrick Maloney voted in favor of a spending bill, H.J.Res. 31: Making further continuing appropriations for the Department of Homeland Security for the fiscal year 2019. The bill prevented another government shutdown,

and fully funded border security, but only provides funding for additional fencing at the border, rather than a border wall.

He then answered a question about Trump's tweets and discussed how social media, particularly Twitter, has become a medium of political announcements, rather than the traditional press release. He responded, "Tweeting is obviously a new thing in Presidential history, but it's not that weird when you think about it; The President's tweets are weird..", stirring up some laughter in the room. He proceeded to answer questions about current legislation he is working on, including reform of Congress, campaign finance, and even the current Mueller investigation into the current administration, considering that Representative Maloney was just placed on The House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence. Overall, Congressman

Maloney talked the most about student civic involvement, emphasizing its importance in improving the state of our nation.

The event certainly procured great excitement from many, students and teachers alike. Government and Politics teacher Ms. Seidman, who organized the forum, said: "I was really excited to have him (Sean Patrick Maloney) as a guest speaker, and I think he did a really good job running it as a town hall, and I think it resonated with a lot of students".

Senior Reid Sandlund remarked, "It was great to have the opportunity to receive direct answers from him. He was articulate with his points and had an interesting perspective on current politics, so I'm glad he was willing to come in and speak with us".

Junior Anneke Chan commented about the event, "It's really important for adolescents to be exposed to politics and the way in which it can affect their lives. Having accessibility to knowledgeable and experienced individuals like Sean Patrick Maloney can be greatly beneficial to this which is why I'm grateful he came in and spoke with us".

This season has been an interesting one, especially with the controversy surrounding the director of nominated film Bohemian Rhapsody, as well as the absence of a host at the Academy Awards following the controversy surrounding Kevin Hart. However, despite this, this awards season has brought recognition to many deserving movies and acknowledgment to deserving music. Here are some of the most notable songs and films, all of which received numerous awards.

Movies

Bohemian Rhapsody (dir. Bryan Singer; star. Rami Malek) A musical celebration, Bohemian rhapsody follows the rise of Freddie Mercury and Queen as they achieve worldwide success. The movie itself has been successful as well, winning Best Motion Picture Drama at the Golden Globes and awards for Film Editing and Sound Editing at the Oscars. The star of the film, Rami Malek, received much critical acclaim for his performance as Freddie Mercury, winning awards for Best Performance by an Actor in a Motion Picture Drama at the Golden Globes and Actor in a Leading Role at the Oscars.

A Star Is Born (dir. Bradley Cooper; star. Lady Gaga, Bradley Cooper)

The story of a famous musician who discovers and falls in love with a struggling artist, A Star Is Born is an uplifting drama that ends in tragedy. Lead actors Lady Gaga and Bradley Cooper received Best Actor / Actress nominations at both the Golden Globes and Oscars, and the movie itself was nominated for Best Picture at both shows as well. The drama received a total of eight nominations at the Oscars and five at the Golden Globes, but only won a total of two awards for its chart-topping single, Shallow.

Black Panther (dir. Ryan Coogler; star. Chadwick Boseman) The first Marvel movie starring a black superhero, Black Panther is the story of the prince of Wakanda returning home to become King following the death of his father. The movie received awards for Costume Design, Original Score and Production Design as well as a nomination for Best Picture at the Oscars. Although the picture did not win in any categories at the Golden Globes, it received nominations for Best Motion Picture Drama, Best Original Score, and Best Original Song.

BlacKkKlansman (dir. Spike Lee; star. John David Washington, Adam Driver) BlacKkKlansman depicts the true story of the African-American who attempted to infiltrate and expose the Ku Klux Klan with his white colleague during the early 1970s. Although it only received one award total. the award for Writing - Adapted Screenplay at the Oscars, the picture received two Best Picture nominations and ten nominations across both shows. Actors John David Washington and Adam Driver were both recognized for their performances, with Washington receiving a nomination for Best Performance by an Actor in a Motion Picture Drama at the Golden Globes and Driver receiving a nomination for Actor in a Supporting Role at the Oscars. Spike Lee was also recognized through two nominations for Directing.

Music

This is America (Childish Gambino) Although Donald Glover did not attend the Grammys, his song This Is America won him four awards, including record of the year.

Invasion of Privacy (Cardi B) Also nominated for album of the year, Invasion of Privacy made Cardi B the first solo female to win the award for best rap album.

God's Plan (Drake)

Attending the Grammys for the first time in years, Drake took home the award for best rap song for God's Plan, also nominated for record of the year and song of the year.

Sweetener (Ariana Grande)

Despite her absence from the show following controversy regarding her cancelled performance, Ariana Grande won best pop vocal album for *Sweetner*.

PATRIOTS DEFEAT RAMS FOR SIXTH SUPERBOWL TITLE

The 2018 NFL season came to an end on February 3, 2019, with the New England Patriots beating the Los Angeles Rams, 13-3 in Super Bowl LIII. The game, played in Atlanta, GA, featured the perennial contenders, New England Patriots, and the Los Angeles Rams, appearing in their first Bowl since 2000, when they defeated the Tennessee Titans. The Rams had a very successful regular season, finishing with an impressive record of 13-3, clinching the NFC West. The Patriots had a somewhat substandard record, compared to previous seasons, finishing at 11-5, clinching the AFC East for the tenth

consecutive season, an NFL record.

New England Patriots quarterback, Tom Brady, earned his sixth Super Bowl championship, along with head coach Bill Belichick, also earning his sixth. However, it was a different Patriots player that ultimately led his team to victory, earning Super Bowl MVP: wide receiver Julian Edelman. He totaled 10 receptions for 141 yards, becoming just the seventh wide receiver to be named Super Bowl MVP. "It just matters that we won," Edelman said. "It was a crazy year. We had a resilient bunch of guys. It was unreal. I'm pretty ecstatic," Edelman added. "I'm physically and emotionally pooped", saying this during a post game interview, with NESN. Edelman's strong showing, as well as the defense playing stellar, limiting the NFC's highest scoring team, the Rams to just 3 points. Reporters, cameras, and other members of the media immediately swarmed Brady as soon as he took one final kneel to end the game. "We made the plays when we had to, and did just enough to beat a really good football team over there (Rams)."

Super Bowl LIII had fewer viewers than in recent

years, drawing 98.2 million people to watch the big game. In fact, it was the lowest watched since Super Bowl XLII. Many people called this year's game "boring", as was the Pepsi halftime show, featuring Maroon 5, Travis Scott, and Big Boi. This game almost certainly defined Tom Brady as the greatest quarterback of all time, solidifying his legacy in NFL history along with the greatest coach of all time, Bill Belichick. But not to be overlooked are the Los Angeles Rams. Even though they're coming off defeat, they look to have a bright future in the years to come, as is the case for many more NFL teams in 2019.

The Power Grab: How Janus vs AFSCME is the continuation of a conservative takeover

In February of 2019, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ken.) described a bill to redefine election day as a national holiday as "a power grab" for the Democrats. This was not incorrect as of course the bill would empower millions of busy voters to head to the voting booths every November-further constructing the Democratic base. However, the irony in this statement is that, systematically, the conservative movement has sought to root out all liberal and democratic causes within the government. Look no further than our judiciary. Ignore the nominations of Brett Kavanaugh and Neil Gorsuch-- the high seats of Trumpian politics; look to court rulings like Janus vs AFSCME which seek

daily to lessen the power of unions and their constituents across the country.

Janus vs AFSCME was the suit that ruled that, on a first amendment basis, Union members are not required to pay their dues if the Union supports a cause or candidate that doesn't align with their personal values, and overturned the Supreme Court ruling in the Abood vs. Detroit Board of Education, which granted such. This was reflective of President Trump's power within the Judiciary. His appointment of clearly partisan Judges and Justices, like Brett Kavanaugh, (who misleadingly accused the Clinton family and the Democratic Party of scheming against him in front of a Senate panel, a clear breach of judicial nonpartisanship) shall leave a legacy on the American Judiciary; a legacy that could affect teachers.

Leisa Lundberg, a special education teacher from Queens and a card-carrying UFT member, (the United Federation of Teachers) said in an interview that "publicsector unions across the country, could lose tens of millions of dollars and see their effectiveness diminished." She went on to quote Justice Elena Kagan's dissent for Janus vs AFSCME: "[the ruling] prevents the American people, acting through their state and local officials, from making important choices about workplace governance. And it does so by weaponizing the First Amendment, in a way that unleashes judges, now and in the future, to intervene in economic and regulatory policy."

However, ironically, Ms. Lundberg continued by stating that the ruling has had little effect on New York teachers and the UFT: "Ultimately, what this ruling does is allow non union members, who don't pay their dues, to reap the same benefits as due-paying members. The intention of the conservative groups who funded this lawsuit was to bankrupt Unions by allowing people to not pay their dues... This ruling seeks to debilitate public employee unions and take away their power to advocate for their members by undermining their funding structure." She finished by saying that "the UFT is standing strong and is well positioned to fight this. They won't be backing down."

Janus vs AFSCME is only the edge of a long string of court rulings that reflect the ultraconservative policies of the present presidential administration. It has become clear that the Trump Administration has become presumptuous in its attempts to radically change the liberal foundations that were constructed by previous administrations.
