

#### **Children's Literacy Foundation Grant**

n mid March, we found out that BCEMS has been awarded a Children's Literacy Foundation (CLiF) Grant. The Foundation's "year of the

book" provides \$25,000 worth of literacy programs, support, and new children's books over one school year to help build a culture of literacy in elementary schools across New Hampshire and Vermont. For Barre City Elementary and Middle School, the focus will be on engaging young learners in the 1st and 2nd grades to become lifelong readers. Some of the supports we will receive will include author visits and book donations to students and families. Three cheers to **Library Specialist Lindy Johnson**, who worked tirelessly to get this grant for Barre City students.

#### **ECI-Outdoor Classroom**

ECO or Educating Children Outdoors is a new program being offered here at BCEMS. The program provides the opportunity for students to be immersed in nature and to make connections with their natural communities. Currently, five elementary classrooms are participating in some type of ECO program; two first grades and three kindergarten classes. The classes spend about half of their day, once a week, outdoors in a forest or field setting learning about nature.

So far this year, classes have learned about animals that live in Vermont by being exposed to their furs, tracks and skulls. River otters, red squirrels, and gray squirrels have been topics of more in-depth study. Camouflage and how animals survive the winter have been taught as well. In addition to animal topics, the classes have studied trees, plants and leaves.

Upcoming lessons for the end of the year will include stream invertebrates, dandelions, and frogs. Throughout the whole year, students learn about stick and fire safety and how to care for themselves, others and the earth. Often sessions end with a cup of hot tea made in a Kelly Kettle and quiet minutes listening to nature in "sit spots". Teachers who are implementing the program have been trained through the North Branch Nature Center by participating in a summer course titled Educating Children Outdoors I and II.
