
ADMISSIONS & FINANCIAL AID

Synapse admissions attracts families up and down the San Francisco Bay Area peninsula. Our admissions team processed a record number of applications all the while maintaining our personalized and authentic approach to assessing applicant student and family fit. We reached enrollment of 255 students for the 2018–2019 school year.


We also had our largest graduating class to date, moving on to a wide range of independent, boarding, charter and public high schools throughout the Bay Area and beyond. This year, the average award for financial aid was increased by 27% and our overall financial aid budget increased by 34%. Increasing aid to new and current families resulted in expanded accessibility for a more diverse group of tomorrow's change makers.

We extended our outreach in the area of diversity by partnering with Peninsula Bridge—a program that transforms the lives of highly motivated, low-income students by preparing them for academic success. The investment of our donors makes it possible for our young school to increase in *diversity*.

PROGRAM IMPACT

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Synapse takes a mission-driven approach to teacher professional development. All Synapse staff are trained in Project Based Learning by the Buck Institute, Emotional Intelligence by Six Seconds, and Design Thinking by IDEO. Teachers are funded to attend workshops and conferences. Staff provide professional development to others by presenting at conferences across the country, including the NAIS conference in Atlanta. Finally, Synapse attracted visitors from 15 different schools from around the world who came to learn from our innovative approach to teaching and learning.

INTERACTIVE LAB

For our annual Interactive Lab, students transformed our school with exhibits, many hands-on, to share with our community. It was a showcase that highlighted the process of student learning at Synapse and featured our annual theme of Transformation and our change maker, Dolores Huerta, who joined us in person! We were humbled by her words of wisdom, passion, and lively spirit. Dolores spoke to students, taught us to hula dance, toured student work while asking poignant questions, and then spoke to our parents. We ended the day feeling inspired and motivated to be change makers!

CHANGE MAKER LAB

At Synapse, we have established a community-driven maker culture, inspired by empathy, which brings together cross-disciplinary and collaborative problem-solving. Synapse has developed two Maker Spaces for students, staff and parents to experience innovation through MAKING! Our Mini Change Maker Space offers opportunities to create using glue guns, paint and recycled materials. The larger Change Maker Space offers more advanced opportunities using power tools, wood, 3D printers, laser cutters, sewing machines and more. Both spaces are modular and flexible.

Josh Rothhaas and Katie Richmond, founders of Project Ember, joined us this year to train teachers and students and to build out the Change Maker Space. With their guidance, Middle School teachers and students prototyped unbelievable projects!



ANNUAL FUND

The Annual Fund that fuels the engine of our school program represents the largest source of non-tuition revenue for the school and is the backbone of our fundraising efforts. It provides funds that sustain our exceptional program—from teacher salaries to financial assistance, supplies for classrooms to sports transportation. Synapse reached 100% participation in our 2017 Annual Fund. This is a testament to the profound support we have received from our Board, staff and parents. We want to express our deep appreciation to everyone who contributed.

SPRING BENEFIT SUPPORTING FINANCIAL AID

Each year, the spring benefit event brings the entire community together to celebrate our special school and to raise funds to support a worthy initiative. This year's goal was to raise an additional \$125.000 towards financial aid. We believe that socio-economic diversity enriches the educational experience for all students. It is our goal that prospective families not let the cost of a Synapse education deter them from applying and that sufficient aid be available to support current families.

Our 2018 Spring Benefit "Back to the '80s" was a totally tubular success. The event was attended by over 250 Synapse community members and surpassed our goal, raising \$189,000.



2018 FINANCIALS

Synapse School ended the fiscal year with a balanced budget. Revenue sources for the school include tuition and philanthropy. Thanks to strong leadership by our Head of School, CFO and Board of Directors, expenses were carefully monitored, such that Synapse concluded the year with a surplus, which was allocated to replenish reserves. Synapse underwent its first annual financial audit for FY2017. The audit was completed with no management comments or findings.

Synapse is thriving with a solid balance sheet, and the Board will continue to partner with the Head of School to preserve the financial health of the school. Thank you to our entire community for your unwavering support and generosity.

* Revenue sources for the school include tuition and philanthropy. The school was audited for the first time based on results from the 16/17SY. That audit indicated no material weaknesses and showed the school is in good financial standing. The Head of School, Board and CFO continue to work together to strengthen the financial position of the school.


