Online Safety Contract

<p>1. I will not send or post personal information anywhere online— including social media websites and chat rooms—without a trusted adult's permission. This includes any information belonging to me or my parent(s) or guardian(s), such as our names; ages; genders; pictures; phone numbers (home, cell, school, or work); and addresses (home, school, work, or email).</p> <p>2. I will create online passwords that are hard to guess, but easy for me to remember. To avoid having my passwords stolen, I will never reveal them to anyone except my parent(s) or guardian(s)—not even my best friend.</p> <p>3. I will not respond to any messages that make me uncomfortable. I will show such messages to a trusted adult right away. I will contact an authority immediately if I see anything that suggests someone is going to harm themselves or others.</p> <p>4. I will stand up for student safety by telling a parent or trusted adult about anything that threatens my safety or the safety of others.</p> <p>5. I will not meet in person with someone I first met online without a parent or guardian's permission.</p>	<p>6. I will not send or post an insulting or rude message.</p> <p>7. I will not attempt to disable filtering or monitoring software, recognizing that it is installed to keep me, and my computer, safe.</p> <p>8. I will not open emails, files, links, pictures, games, or apps from people I don't know. I will always ask a trusted adult first.</p> <p>9. I will not download any software—including songs, videos, games, or apps—without appropriate permission from the content's owner. I will not use the Internet to plagiarize the works of others and will properly cite any online source I reference in my own school assignments.</p> <p>10. I will not believe everything I read on the Internet. When I am unsure of the validity of the information I access, I will check the source of the information and confirm it with a trustworthy adult, such as a parent, teacher, or librarian.</p> <p>11. I will appropriately limit the time I spend online and make time for other recreational activities.</p> <p>12. I am allowed to use the Internet for _____ minutes; I will then do something else.</p>
