As we come to the last two months of the school year, we are pleased to report that we have had a great year with many accomplishments. We experienced many successes and much progress on new innovations from our strategic plan. These successes enhanced the learning opportunities for our students as well as improved the effectiveness and health of the District. We would like to share some of these highlights.

Highest State Recognition of Our Schools

In November the State Report Card for our schools and District reported that all schools received an "Exemplary" designation as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). There are four possible designations and each one of our schools received the highest rating by the State.

Construction of New Wood Oaks STEAM/Applied Technology Lab

We completed our designs and bidding process for the new Wood Oaks STEAM/Applied Technology Lab. Work will commence in June and be completed by fall. The new space will house the school's Applied Technology program, STEAM electives, and the Broadcast studio. Please be sure to review the architectural renderings of our new space on Page 2. Collective Bargaining Agreement With Our Faculty Association

New Wood Oaks STEAM Lab

Construction will begin this summer on an innovative STEAM/ Applied Technology Lab at Wood Oaks Junior High School.

The Lab will house the school's Applied Technology program, STEAM electives, and the Broadcast studio. The lab will include flexible seating for students, ample counter space for 3D printers, a "brainstorming hub," equipment storage, projection systems, and robotics game tables.

The new lab, which replaces the home economics room and a classroom, will meet the future needs for students living in the constantly-changing world of technology.

The new lab will be utilized by all Wood Oaks students since technology classes are part of the school's Unified Arts program.

Staff Focusing Professional Learning on Social-Emotional Learning Topics

Members of the District 27 staff have been involved all year in professional learning related to the topics of Social-Emotional Learning (SEL.)



SEL is the process through which children and adults understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions.

District 27 staff is in the second year of extensive professional learning in the area of SEL. Last year, staff attended sessions on



mindfulness. This year, staff was involved in one of five strands of study, including growth mindset, mental health and wellness of students, mindfulness, executive function, and learning differences for boys and girls. Additionally, all three schools have devoted after-school time to SEL topics.

The staff will continue their studies during the 2019-2020 school year.
