My Reflections

My teaching career started 20 years before coming to Southridge. I have always wanted to be a Grade 1 teacher since I was 6 years old. I started by teaching my younger brother how to read "The Big Blue Truck" (I was never successful in getting him to read it fluently no matter how many times we read it).

When I started teaching Grade 1, I had to hand draw and print worksheets for students on special paper to run off on a Gestener machine. Now we have fancy colour printers and copiers; however, instead of 10 worksheets a day, I give them boxes to build with and toasters to pull apart.

When I first started teaching, just like other new teachers, I had every minute planned. Now I consult with the students about what they are interested in and incorporate their passions, letting the day sometimes take new turns.

I started teaching with the kids in rows facing the front. Now they choose where they sit. Centers consisted of more work, usually challenges for those who completed the seatwork. Now centers are stations with activities to explore and discover things, and we do it before seatwork. I believe that the stations promote curiosity, learning through play, and joy. Students are then primed for further learning, read to relax, and can complete seat work calmly.

However, as I was reflecting on my teaching over the years, I realized that some things have not changed, like the way I feel about children. From my first day teaching, I realized I needed to make learning meaningful. I also have always believed in the child and that all students are eager to learn and want to have the same opportunities as others. I needed to find individual ways to help all children to be successful on any material or task presented. Throughout my teaching career, I have always remained committed to two ideals: 'hands on learning' and 'all students can learn'.

I really appreciate working at Southridge. It has provided me with the opportunities to explore, read, and go to workshops to continue developing my theories and skills as a teacher. I am so grateful to the school for being open to new ideas and allowing my 'spirit to soar', supporting me with resources and giving me autonomy in my classroom.

I am also appreciative of being involved in Southridge's journey from the very beginning. It was so exciting to be part of a start up school. As I reflect about my time here at Southridge Junior School, I think of it along the lines of child development.



When Southridge was in the infant stage, Mr. Brown, our first headmaster, was a charismatic, powerful, and brilliant man. In those early years, he brought the people to Southridge. He also believed a staff that came together in the staff room was important, so he made treats a part of break every day to get everyone out of the classroom and talking to each other. He also empowered his staff to take leadership roles, so being unfamiliar with primary students, he appointed me as the head of the primary division K-3. But he also made a head of music, French, PE, IT etc.

Next, during our toddler stage, we welcomed Liz Tuck. She is brilliant and very talented; she is musical, artistic, and brilliant with languages. She took on the role of the primary musical and wrote, directed, and produced the most amazing plays. She brought energy, spark, and colour to the school just like a toddler brings joy to a family.

While, the school was growing Drew Stephens joined Southridge, as we reached our middle years. We were now in the stage where it was important to put policies in place. As we grew larger, it was important to establish some ground rules and policies to ensure fairness for all members of the community and Drew was the person to do just that. We needed to put values in place before we hit the teenage years.

Laurel Middelaer came when we were in our teenage years. Laurel made everyone feel valued and an important part of the community. Someone once told me that when all the children feel they are their mom's favourite, then they have done their job. That is what Laurel did for the community; she made everyone feel loved and significant. It is important that our teenagers feel this connection.

Tanya joined us during the time of change. We have reached early adulthood. We are a mature school and ready for change. Education in the province and PYP have all undergone huge curriculum changes, making it a very exciting time to be a teacher. Tanya is just the person to facilitate all these changes. She has the vision, intelligence, and imagination to help students, teachers, and parents reach our potential.

I want to thank everyone for the opportunity you gave me to teach your children. You send your children to school with a backpack filled with the values of enthusiasm, curiosity, integrity, and caring that helps them embrace the love of learning, making teaching a pleasure. Over the years your support has meant so much to me, and it is your support and your children that have made my job the best job in the world.

I feel so lucky to have been on this journey with Southridge. I know I am leaving while I am still passionate and enthusiastic for learning and experimenting with education, but this passion and enthusiasm will help me embrace the next adventures of being a grandparent and travelling. I am sure to be back on Country Fair days, and who knows how else I may still be able to contribute to education and our community.




