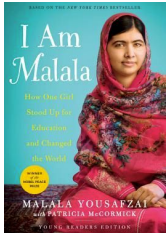




Required High School Class Summer Reading

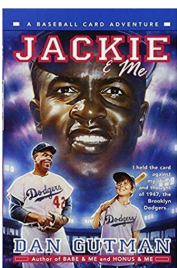
All students must select and read **at least one** of the texts below.

***Spy Factory Series* by Steven Stickler (choose one)**



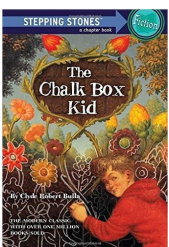

***The Baseball Card Adventures* by Dan Gutman (choose one)**



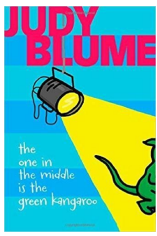

***The Chalk Box Kid* by Clyde Robert Bulla**



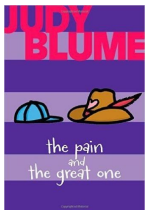

The One in the Middle is a Green Kangaroo by Judy Blume



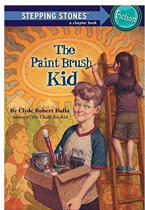

The Pain and the Great One Series by Judy Blume (choose one)



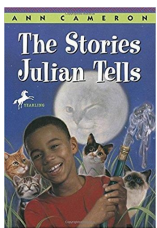

The Paint Brush Kid by Clyde Robert Bulla



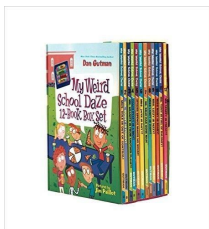
