# DESIGNING PATHWAYS

School Board approves ballot question for building and safety upgrades

# "I BELIEVE THIS IS IN THE LONG TERM BEST INTEREST OF STUDENTS, THE DISTRICT, AND THE COMMUNITY." – Superintendent Dr. Josh Swanson

At their Dec. 10 meeting, the school board approved placing a question on the ballot to cover improvements from the Designing Pathways process. After three years of planning, public input and research, the improvements include updates to learning environments and security, including:

- 1. Transition 4-year-old preschool to the elementary schools to ensure more children are prepared for kindergarten. This would enable the district to serve more preschoolers as well as strengthen the link between preschool and kindergarten.
- 2. Transition 6th graders from the elementary schools to a more age-appropriate environment at the middle school tailored to their academic needs. Making Central Middle School a grade 6-8 building would offer a more cohesive three-year program and align Eden Prairie with the middle school model used in most of the metro area.
- 3. Improve safety and security across all eight schools by adding protective glass, lock down equipment, internal communication systems and exterior entry security. While all schools currently have secure entrances, these improvements would add

additional security layers to each building for student and staff safety.

4. Redesign classrooms across the district to support a more flexible and personalized learning environment to develop skills employers and colleges demand; collaboration, creativity, communication and critical thinking. By providing spaces for students to learn in oneon-one, small group and large group settings, programs could be better tailored to meet individual learning needs.

The improvements would require a community vote to approve a \$39.9 million bond to fund the construction and materials needed. If approved by voters, the cost of the proposal would be \$6.50 a month on a \$350,000 home.

"I believe this is in the long term best interest of students, the district, and the community," said Superintendent Dr. Josh Swanson. "We would also maintain our commitment to financial responsibility by keeping our taxes among the lowest in this area."

The board is expected to vote to officially approve bringing the ballot to voters at a spring 2019 special election at an upcoming board meeting.

Ends Policy 1.1.1 states the expectation that "each student is reading at grade level by the end of third grade." Why is this an important outcome for our district? Third grade is viewed as a pivotal year for reading. Up to that point, students are learning to read; following that, they are reading to learn. As a district, we keep class sizes small in K-2 to give each student optimal opportunity to learn important reading skills. Reading by third grade has been correlated with higher student achievement, higher high school graduation rates, and greater career success.

During our recent monitoring of End 1.1.1, our Superintendent asserted: "Over the past three years, we have seen an increase in literacy achievement as measured by a triangulated measurement of three assessment methodologies. This year we met the 2017-2018 target of 78.2% of students proficient in two of three measures. This is the first group of students to have experienced the reduced class sizes from the referendum and our results have climbed from 71.8% to 78.2% since implementing this measure."

Our district remains committed to each student reaching their highest potential, and reading is a key that opens up the world of learning.

## Enrollment increase seen for first time in decade

After nearly 10 years of declining enrollment, Eden Prairie Schools has officially increased its student enrollment. The official October 1 enrollment count reported to the Minnesota Department of Education was 8,797 students (178 students higher than predictions indicated and 71 students higher than last year).

"We believe one of the largest reasons for the increase is due to more resident students and families choosing to stay in Eden Prairie," said Superintendent Dr. Josh Swanson. "We have outstanding opportunities in this district with 99 percent approval ratings of our high quality staff, small class sizes in our lowest grades, and the best college enrollment rates in the area."
