Middle School Summer Reading Assignment

Dear Parents and Guardians of Future West Bloomfield Middle School Students:

As a student in the West Bloomfield School District, your child is expected to participate in the West Bloomfield Middle School Summer Reading Assignment. Research shows that continual reading is a predictor of future academic success.

Incoming 6th graders are expected to read <u>two</u> books:

- Required Book: Things Not Seen by Andrew Clements: 690L
- Choice Book: This choice could come from the list below <u>**OR**</u> students may choose any other book that they are interested in reading. The choice book should reflect the student's interests, reading level, and be suitable for a middle school student.

Below is a list of suggested titles for choice books along with their lexile ratings. Students are encouraged to choose books that are within their Lexile range; however, a Lexile score is not the only indicator when choosing a book. Lexile levels are merely a suggestion of the level of vocabulary and difficulty of the text. Interest in the novel topic can play a significant part in a student's success with a book. Also, if you are willing to read the text with your student or listen to an audio version of the book, the Lexile level may not be an issue.

Suggested Titles:

- Letters from Rifka by Karen Hesse: 690L
- *Heat* by Mike Lupica: **940L**
- Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone by J.K. Rowling: 880L
- Where the Red Fern Grows by Wilson Rawls: 700L
- Are You There God, It's Me Margaret by Judy Blume: **590L**
- Phantom Tollbooth by Norton Juster: 1000L
- Eight Keys by Suzanne La Fleur: 590L
- Diary of a Young Girl by Anne Frank: 1080L
- Wonder by R.J. Palacio: 790L
- How to Survive Middle School by Donna Gephardt: 660L

For each book read, students must complete an assignment.

Required Book:

- Complete a Reading Notes Form (see attached).
- Bring completed Reading Notes to school on the *first day of school*.
- Participate and collaborate in a discussion about this book in class at the beginning of the school year.

Choice Book:

- Complete the Choice Book One-Pager Assignment (see attached).
- Bring completed One-Pager to school on the *first day of school.*
- Be prepared to present the One-Pager to your class.

Things Not Seen Assignment Reading Notes

As you read *Things Not Seen* this summer, you are required to take reading notes. Taking reading notes allows you to **record your thoughts as you read**. Using the 3-column notes chart attached take 15 notes on the book. You might think of this as 5 notes from the beginning of the book, 5 from the middle, and 5 from the end.

To record your thoughts, you might:

- Make connections
 - \circ Text-to-self
 - Text-to-text
 - Text-to-world
- Make inferences and predictions
- Note descriptive text that creates a picture in your mind and helps to bring the story alive
- Ask questions

Here are a couple examples:

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Choice Book Assignment One-Pager

A **One-Pager** is a way of responding to a piece of literature on a single sheet of paper. It represents your own written and graphic interpretation of what you have read. Two examples of one-pagers are pictured at the bottom of this page.

Directions:

- Must be on standard sized, **unlined** paper
- Must fill the entire page
- Writing must be in ink or typed...**no pencil**
- Include the title and the author of the book
- Use colored pencils, pens, or markers

The following elements may be arranged on the page in any way you choose:

- 1. Must have **two or more excerpts** from the reading. (Passages that you like or think are important)
- 2. Must have a **graphic representation**: drawing, magazine picture, or computer graphic that ties to the book you read and the quotes you chose.
- 3. Must include a one paragraph **personal response to what you have read**. Include things such as:
 - A brief description of what the book is about
 - Your overall opinion of the book and why
 - Who might enjoy reading this book
 - Your rating of this book on a scale of 5 stars
- 4. Make sure your final product is one you would be proud to share with your classmates and display in your school.
