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MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This section of the annual financial report of Lake Technical Center, Inc. (the "School") presents management's discussion and analysis of the School's financial performance during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015. Please read it in conjunction with the School's financial statements, which follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The School's net position increased compared to the prior year.
- For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, the School's revenues exceeded expenses by \$958,372, which is a decrease from the prior year when revenues exceeded expenses by \$1,410,283.
- As described in Note 1 to the financial statements, in 2015, the School adopted *GASB Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 27, GASB Statement No. 71, Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 68 and GASB Statement No. 45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions*, which had a significant effect on the School's net position.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual report consists of three parts – management's discussion and analysis (this section), the basic financial statements and required supplementary information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the School:

- The first two statements are *government-wide financial statements* that provide both long-term and short-term information about the School's overall financial status.
- The remaining statements are *fund financial statements* that focus on individual parts of the School, reporting the School's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements.
 - The *governmental funds* financial statements tell how general school services were financed in the short term, as well as what remains for future spending.

The financial statements also include *notes* that explain some of the information in the financial statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of *required supplementary information* that further explains and supports the information in the financial statements.

This document also includes the following information required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") Circular A-133: schedule of expenditures of federal awards, independent auditor's report on compliance for each major program and on internal control over compliance required by OMB Circular A-133 and the schedule of findings and questioned costs. In addition, it includes the independent auditor's report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance and other matters based on an audit of financial statements performed in accordance

with *Government Auditing Standards*, as well as the management letter required by the Rules of the Auditor General, Chapter 10.850.

The following table summarizes the major features of the School's financial statements, including the portion of the School they cover and the types of information they contain. The remainder of this overview section of management's discussion and analysis explains the structure and contents of each of the statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements report information about the School as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net position includes all of the School's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities, regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two government-wide financial statements report the School's net position and how it has changed. Net position – the difference between the School's assets and deferred outflows of resources and its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources – is one way to measure the School's financial condition. Over time, increases or decreases in the School's net position is an indicator of whether its health is improving or deteriorating, respectively. To assess the overall financial condition of the School, one needs to consider additional nonfinancial factors such as changes in the School's student base.

The government-wide financial statements of the School are generally divided into three categories:

- *Governmental activities* – most of the School's basic services are included here, such as instruction and school administration. Funds received through the Florida Workforce Development Education Fund, Florida Education Finance Program ("FEFP") and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.
- *Business-type activities* – in certain instances, the School may charge fees to help it cover the costs of certain services it provides. The School currently has no business-type activities.
- *Component units* – there currently are no component units included within the reporting entity of the School.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the School's most significant funds, not the School as a whole. A fund is a self-balancing set of accounts which the School uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending for particular purposes. Some funds are required by state law, and the School may establish other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes, such as for federal grants.

The School has one type of fund:

- *Governmental funds* – most of the School's basic services are included in governmental funds, which focus on (1) how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental funds statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps one determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the School's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the government-wide statements, we provide additional information on the subsequent page that explains the differences between them.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE SCHOOL AS A WHOLE

Net Position

The School's net position as of June 30, 2015 and 2014 is summarized as follows (see table below).

The increase in restricted cash is primarily due to the net increase in the restricted net positions as noted below. The increase in capital assets, net and the related net investment in capital assets increased due to the purchase of assets related to construction in progress, net of current year depreciation expense on furniture, fixtures and equipment and vehicles.

Current and other liabilities decreased due to a decrease in amounts due to the School Board for payroll and related costs provided during fiscal year 2015, as well as the result of the timing of payments at year end. The adoption of GASB 68 and GASB 71 in fiscal 2015 required the School to record its pro-rata share of the Florida Retirement System and Health Insurance Subsidy net pension liabilities. The adoption of GASB 45 in fiscal 2015 required the School to record its pro-rata share of the School Board's other postemployment benefits obligation. Upon adoption, certain 2014 balances were restated. The changes in deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources and long-term liabilities are all related to the remeasurement of the net pension liability and the other postemployment benefits obligation for fiscal 2015.

Net position restricted for student financial aid decreased due to an increase in current year expenditures related to student financial aid. Net position restricted for Targeted CTE program expenses decreased due to current year activity. Net position restricted for center for advanced manufacturing increased due to an excess of revenue over expenditures. The change in unrestricted net position is due to the result of current year operations.

Certain reclassifications were made in the 2014 amounts to conform to their classifications in fiscal year 2015.

Change in Net Position

The School's total revenues decreased by 1% to \$10,200,123, and the total cost of all programs and services increased by 4% to \$9,241,751 (see table below).

Revenue from federal sources increased due to more federal funding being awarded to the School in the current year, primarily Pell grants awarded to students. The decrease in state sources was primarily due to a decrease in workforce development funds received in the current year. The increase in local sources was primarily due to an increase in student tuition and fees received in the current year.

Instruction and instruction-related services increased due to an increase in salaries and the related benefits, equipment and professional fees. Board expenses increased due to an increase in insurance premiums as well as professional fees and technical services. Fiscal services increased due to an increase in salaries and the related benefits. Central services expense increased due to the increase in supplies, purchased services and professional and technical

services. Operation of plant expenses increased due to an increase in salaries and the related benefits, as well as an increase in purchased services. Maintenance of plant expenses decreased due to a reduction in repairs and maintenance expenses in the current year.

Certain reclassifications were made in the 2014 amounts to conform to their classifications in fiscal year 2015.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE SCHOOL'S FUNDS

As the School completed the fiscal year, its governmental funds reported a fund balance of \$7,427,648 which was an increase from the prior year. Both revenues and expenditures varied for the same reasons described above.

General and Special Revenue Fund Budgetary Highlights

Over the course of the fiscal year, the School revised its budget once. This budget amendment was due to:

- Changes made during the fiscal year to account for variations in student enrollment.
- Increases in appropriations to prevent budget overruns.

Actual general fund revenues were approximately \$10,000 above the final budgeted amounts. Actual expenditures were approximately \$71,000 below budgeted amounts, primarily due to the fact that the School budgeted for salaries, professional fees and other purchased services costs which were not incurred.

Actual special revenue fund revenues and expenditures were approximately \$21,000 below budget due to less federal funds received than anticipated.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At the end of fiscal 2015, the School had invested \$501,560 in capital assets, including land available for sale, furniture, fixtures and equipment, motor vehicle, computer software, and construction in progress (see table below).

This year's major capital asset additions included the following:

- Construction in progress – \$193,149

The School's fiscal year 2016 capital budget includes spending related to the construction of the new Center for Advanced Manufacturing. More detailed information about the School's capital assets is presented in Note 3 to the financial statements.

Long-Term Liabilities

As of June 30, 2015, the School had \$45,564 in borrowings outstanding, as compared to \$68,343 in the prior year. The decrease in the capital lease obligation is due to payments made in fiscal 2015. More detailed information about the School's long-term liabilities is presented in Note 4 to the financial statements.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET

The following economic indicators were taken into account when adopting the general fund budget for fiscal year 2016:

- No change in tuition and fees revenue, with student enrollment remaining consistent with the prior year
- Decrease in Workforce Development Funding
- Increase in Performance Based Incentive Funding related to industry certifications

Amounts available for appropriation in the general fund are \$7,680,323, a decrease of approximately 7% from the 2015 actual revenues of \$8,238,796. Budgeted expenditures are expected to increase approximately 1% to \$7,568,135 from 2015 actual expenditures of \$7,494,617.

If these estimates are realized, the School's general fund balance is expected to increase by the close of fiscal 2016.

Independent Auditor's Report on Basic Financial Statements and Supplementary Information

To the Board of Directors of Lake Technical Center, Inc., a Charter Technical Career Center and Component Unit of the District School Board of Lake County, Florida

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Lake Technical Center, Inc. (the "School"), a charter technical career center and component unit of the District School Board of Lake County, Florida, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Lake Technical Center, Inc., as of June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Changes in Accounting Principle

As described in Note 1 to the financial statements, in 2015, the School adopted *GASB Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 27*, and *GASB Statement No. 71, Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 68*. In 2015, the School also adopted *GASB Statement No. 45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions*. Our opinion is not modified with respect to these matters.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 1 – 9, the budgetary comparison information on pages 40 – 41, the pension information on pages 42 – 43, and the other postemployment benefit information on page 44, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management

and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated January 26, 2016 on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

1 ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

Lake Technical Center, Inc. (the "School") is a not-for-profit corporation organized pursuant to Chapter 617, Florida Statutes, the Florida Not-For-Profit Corporation Act and Section 1002.34, Florida Statutes. The governing body of the School is the not-for-profit corporation Board of Directors, which is composed of no less than five and no more than nine members. Effective July 1, 2004, the School converted from a traditional public technical center to a charter technical career center. The School operates under the name of Lake Technical College.

The general operating authority of the School is contained in Section 1002.34, Florida Statutes. The School operates under a charter of the sponsoring school district, the District School Board of Lake County, Florida (the "School Board"). The current charter is effective until June 30, 2019 and may be renewed by mutual written agreement between the School and the School Board. At the end of the term of the conversion charter, the School Board may choose not to renew the charter under grounds specified in the charter. In this case, the School Board is required to notify the School in writing at least 90 days prior to the charter's expiration. During the term of the charter, the School Board may also terminate the charter if good cause is shown. In the event of termination of the charter, any property purchased by the School with public funds and any unencumbered public funds revert back to the School Board. The School is considered a component unit of the School Board and meets the definition of a governmental entity under the Governmental Accounting Standards Board's ("GASB") accounting guidance; therefore, for financial reporting purposes, the School is required to follow generally accepted accounting principles applicable to state and local governmental units.

Criteria for determining if other entities are potential component units of the School which should be reported with the School's basic financial statements are identified and described in the GASB's *Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards*. The application of these criteria provides for identification of any entities for which the School is financially accountable and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the School are such that exclusion would cause the School's basic financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. Based on these criteria, no component units are included within the reporting entity of the School.

Basis of presentation

The School's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the GASB. Accordingly, both government-wide and fund financial statements are presented.

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**NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
(continued)**

The government-wide financial statements report information about the School as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net position includes all of the School's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The government-wide financial statements of the School are generally divided into three categories:

- *Governmental activities* – most of the School's basic services are included here, such as instruction and school administration. Funds received through the Florida Education Finance Program ("FEFP"), the Florida Workforce Development Education Fund and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.
- *Business-type activities* – in certain instances, the School may charge fees to help it cover the costs of certain services it provides. The School currently has no business-type activities.
- *Component units* – there currently are no component units included within the reporting entity of the School.

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the School's most significant funds, not the School as a whole. A fund is an accounting entity having a self-balancing set of accounts for recording assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, revenues, expenditures, and other financing sources and uses. Resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based on the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

The funds in the financial statements of this report are as follows:

Governmental Funds:

- General Fund - to account for all financial resources not required to be accounted for in another fund.
- Special Revenue Fund - to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources and state and federal grants that are restricted by law or administrative action to expenditure for specific purposes.

For purposes of these statements, the general and special revenue funds constitute major funds. There are no other governmental funds.

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**NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
(continued)**

Basis of accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenses/expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The government-wide financial statements are presented using the accrual basis of accounting and an economic resources focus. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues and expenses are recognized when they occur.

The modified accrual basis of accounting and current financial resources focus is followed by the governmental funds. Under the modified accrual basis, revenues are recognized when they become measurable and available. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay current liabilities. The School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within sixty days of the end of the fiscal year. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, expenditures are generally recognized when the related fund liability is incurred. The principal exceptions to this general rule are: (1) interest on general long-term debt is recognized when due and (2) expenditures related to liabilities reported as general long-term debt are recognized when due.

Budgetary basis accounting

Budgets are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. During the fiscal year, expenditures were controlled at the fund level.

Recently adopted accounting standards

During 2015, the School adopted *GASB Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 27*, and *GASB Statement No. 71, Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 68*, which revised and established new financial reporting requirements for most governments that provide their employees with pension benefits. The effect of this change was to increase 2015 income by \$128,254. During 2015, the School adopted *GASB Statement No. 45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions*, which requires public employers sponsoring and subsidizing retiree healthcare benefit programs to recognize the cost of such benefits on an accrual basis. The effect of this change was to decrease 2015 income by \$26,257.

Deposits

Cash deposits are held by banks qualified as public depositories under Florida law. All deposits held by qualified public depositories are insured by federal depository insurance and collateralized with securities held in Florida's multiple financial institution collateral pool as required by Chapter 280, Florida Statutes. In addition, the School has deposits in an institution that is not considered a qualified public depository. These funds are collateralized in excess of the federal depository insurance limits by pledged securities in the name of the School. The School's cash consists primarily of demand deposits and certificates of deposit with financial institutions.

Capital assets and depreciation

Expenditures for capital assets acquired for general School purposes are reported in the governmental fund that financed the acquisition. Purchased capital assets are reported at cost, net of accumulated depreciation, in the government-wide financial statements. Donated assets are recorded at fair value at the date of donation.

Donations are defined as voluntary contributions of resources to a governmental entity by a non-governmental entity. Donated capital assets shall be reported at fair market value at the time of acquisition plus ancillary charges, if any. Fair market value is the amount at which an asset could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties. According to applicable guidance, long-

lived assets and assets available for sale should be tested for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that its carrying amount may not be recoverable. During the fiscal year, the School did not record an adjustment to the fair value of its long-lived assets or assets available for sale.

Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, which are as follows:

Long-term debt

Long-term obligations that will be financed by resources to be received in the future by the general fund are reported in the government-wide financial statements, not in the general fund. Information relative to long-term debt is described in Note 4.

Compensated absences

Compensated absences (i.e. paid absences for employee vacation leave and sick leave) are recorded as expenditures in governmental funds when leave is used or when accrued as payable to employees entitled to cash payment in lieu of taking leave. In the government-wide financial statements, compensated absences are recorded as an expense when earned by the employees. The full balance of the liability for compensated absences is classified as a long-term liability that is due within one year in the government-wide financial statements as the amount of vacation and sick time to be used after the following year cannot be reasonably estimated.

Revenue sources

Revenues for current operations are received primarily through the Florida Workforce Development Education Fund. Funding is generated based on student enrollment and program outcomes as provided by law. In addition, students are required to pay registration and other fees for course enrollment.

In addition, the School receives funding for current operations from the School Board pursuant to the funding provisions included in the School's charter. As such, the School's revenue stream is largely dependent upon the general state of the economy and the amounts allotted to the Florida Department of Education ("FDOE") by the state legislature. In accordance with the funding

provisions of the charter and Section 1002.33(18), Florida Statutes, the School reports the number of full-time equivalent students and related data to the School Board.

Under the provisions of Section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, the School Board reports the number of full-time equivalent students and related data to the FDOE for funding through the FEFP. Funding for the School is adjusted during the year to reflect the revised calculations by the FDOE under the FEFP and the actual weighted full-time equivalent students reported by the School during the designated full-time equivalent student survey periods. The School Board receives an administrative fee from the School equal to 5% of all FEFP funding received, plus a fee based on the annual salaries of all employees in the collective bargaining agreements processed by the School Board. These fees are reflected as a general administration expense/expenditure in the accompanying statement of activities and statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances - governmental funds.

The School also receives federal awards for the enhancement of various educational programs. This assistance is generally received based on applications submitted to and approved by various granting agencies. For federal awards in which a claim to these grant proceeds is based on incurring eligible expenditures, revenue is recognized to the extent that eligible expenditures have been incurred.

Income taxes

The School is an organization exempt from income taxation under Section 501(a) as an entity described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Accordingly, no provision for federal income taxes is included in the accompanying financial statements.

The School has adopted guidance related to accounting for uncertainty in income taxes, which prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement attribute for financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position that an entity takes or expects to take in a tax return. This guidance is applicable to not-for-profit organizations that may be conducting unrelated business activities, which are potentially subject to income taxes, including state income taxes.

The School assesses its income tax positions, including its continuing tax status as a not-for-profit entity, and recognizes tax benefits only to the extent that the School believes it is "more likely than not" that its tax positions will be sustained upon an examination by the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") or the applicable state taxing authority. Accordingly, there is no provision for federal income taxes in the School's financial statements, as the School believes all tax positions, including its continuing status as a not-for-profit entity, have a greater than 50% chance of realization in the event of an IRS audit. State income taxes, which may be due in certain jurisdictions, have been assessed following the same "more likely than not" measurement threshold. With few exceptions, the School is no longer subject to U.S. federal, state and local income tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2011.

Fund balance spending policy

The School's adopted spending policy is to spend from restricted fund balance first, followed by committed, assigned, then the unassigned fund balance. Most funds were designated for one purpose at the time of their creation. Therefore, expenditures made out of the fund will be allocated to the applicable fund balance classifications in the order of the aforementioned spending policy. If expenditures are incurred that meet the purpose of more than one fund, they will be allocated to restricted fund balance first and then follow the order above. Funds can only be committed by formal action of the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors has delegated authority to assign funds to the governing body or by an official body to which the governing body delegates the authority. Under the School's charter, the School is required to develop a fund balance reserve of \$30,000 for terminal employee benefits. The School is also required to maintain a minimum fund balance within the general fund at the percentage of the total annual operating fund revenues from the general fund that is equal to the percentage defined by the School Board's policies for the school district. The School is in compliance with these requirements as of June 30, 2015.

Use of estimates

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities as of the date of the balance sheet and affect revenues and expenses/expenditures for the period presented. Actual results could differ significantly from those estimates.

Subsequent events

The School has adopted guidance that requires the disclosure of the date through which an entity has evaluated subsequent events and the basis for that date (that is, whether that date represents the date the financial statements were issued or were available to be issued). The School has evaluated subsequent events through January 26, 2016, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

2 ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable included in the accompanying financial statements consists of various small balances as of June 30, 2015. Based on the collectibility of funds, in the opinion of management, an allowance for doubtful accounts is not considered necessary.

4 CAPITAL LEASE OBLIGATION

The School entered into a capital lease agreement for its VoIP phone system on July 1, 2012. The capital lease is collateralized by the related equipment; due in annual installments of \$22,779, including interest at 0.0% and matures August 2016. The economic substance of the lease agreement is that the School is financing the acquisition of the equipment through the lease agreement, and, accordingly, the asset and corresponding obligation are recorded in the School's Statement of Net Position.

5 CAMPUS FACILITY

Title to the school building and facilities and other capital assets acquired prior to July 1, 2004 remains with the School Board. Florida Statutes provide that the use of the school building and facilities be furnished to charter technical career centers on the same basis as made available to other public schools in the district. No rental or leasing fee may be charged by the district school board to the charter technical career center or to the organizers of the charter technical career center.

In management's opinion, the value of facilities utilized by the School is significant; therefore, any substantial changes in Florida Statutes related to facilities use by conversion schools could have a material effect on the School's operations.

6 DUE TO THE SCHOOL BOARD

The amount due to the School Board as of June 30, 2015 of \$549,904 is comprised of \$628,440 in payroll and in other services expenses paid by the School Board on behalf of the School, as well as \$131,818 in other expenses. In addition, \$210,354 in amounts due to the School from the School Board for the performance incentive related to the Workforce Targeted CTE Program has been offset against the amount due to the School Board.

7 PREPAID TUITION

As of June 30, 2015, the School has \$44,707 in prepaid tuition, which consists of tuition fees collected in advance for various programs. These amounts will be recognized as revenue upon the commencement of the programs or when expended.

8 RISK MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Workers' compensation coverage, health and hospitalization, general liability, professional liability and property coverage are being provided through purchased commercial insurance with minimum deductibles for each line of coverage. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not historically exceeded commercial coverage.

10 PENSION PLANS

Pension plan descriptions

The Florida Department of Management Services, Division of Retirement (“Division”), is part of the primary government of the state of Florida and is responsible for administering the Florida Retirement System Pension Plan and Other State-Administered Systems (“System”). The School participates in two defined benefit plans administered by the Division. Beginning with the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014, the Division issued a publicly-available, audited comprehensive annual financial report (“CAFR”) on behalf of the System that includes financial statements, notes and required supplementary information for each of the pension plans. Detailed information about the plans is provided in the CAFR which is available online at www.dms.myflorida.com/workforce_operations/retirement/publications.

The Florida Retirement System (“FRS”) Pension Plan is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer qualified defined benefit pension plan with a Deferred Retirement Option Program (“DROP”) available for eligible employees. The FRS was established and is administered in accordance with Chapter 121, Florida Statutes. Retirees receive a lifetime pension benefit with joint and survivor payment options. FRS membership is compulsory for employees filling regularly established positions in a state agency, county agency, state university, state community college, or district school board, unless restricted from FRS membership under sections 121.053 and 121.122, Florida Statutes, or allowed to participate in a defined contribution plan in lieu of FRS membership. Participation by cities, municipalities, special districts, charter schools and metropolitan planning organizations is optional.

The Retiree Health Insurance Subsidy (“HIS”) Program is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan established and administered in accordance with section 112.363, Florida Statutes. The benefit is a monthly payment to assist retirees of the state-administered retirement systems in paying their health insurance costs. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014, eligible retirees and beneficiaries received a monthly HIS payment equal to the number of years of service credited at retirement multiplied by \$5. The minimum payment is \$30 and the maximum payment is \$150 per month, pursuant to section 112.363, Florida Statutes. To be eligible to receive a HIS benefit, a retiree under one of the state-administered retirement systems must provide proof of eligible health insurance coverage, which can include Medicare.

Employee contributions required pursuant to section 121.71(3), Florida Statutes, are accounted for by the FRS as employer-paid employee contributions and are treated as employer contributions under 26 U.S.C. s. 414(h)(2) allowing these contributions to be deducted on a pre-tax basis. Pension expense reported by the School does not include these amounts. Total employer contributions are determined on a uniform basis (blended rate) as required by Part III of Chapter 121, Florida Statutes. Employer contributions reflected in the financial statements represent contributions to the defined benefit plans and do not equal total blended contributions remitted by the employer.

Information about the employer's proportionate share of the collective net pension liability

Assumptions and other inputs

Actuarial assumptions for both defined benefit plans are reviewed annually by the Florida Retirement System Actuarial Assumptions Conference. The FRS Pension Plan has a valuation performed annually. The HIS Program has a valuation performed biennially that is updated for GASB reporting in the year a valuation is not performed. The most recent experience study for the FRS Pension Plan was completed in 2014 for the period July 1, 2008, through June 30, 2013. Because the HIS Program is funded on a pay-as-you-go basis, no experience study has been completed for this program.

The total pension liability for each of the defined benefit plans was determined by an actuarial valuation as of July 1, 2014, using the entry age normal actuarial cost method. Inflation increases for both plans is assumed at 2.60%. Payroll growth for both plans is assumed at 3.25%. Both the discount rate and the long-term expected rate of return used for FRS Pension Plan investments is 7.65%. The plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current active and inactive employees. Therefore, the discount rate for calculating the total pension liability is equal to the long-term expected rate of return. Because the HIS Program uses a pay-as-you-go funding structure, a municipal bond rate of 4.29% was used to determine the total pension liability for the program. Mortality assumptions for both plans were based on the Generational RP-2000 with Projection Scale BB tables.

The following changes in actuarial assumptions occurred in 2014:

- FRS: As of June 30, 2014, the inflation rate assumption was decreased from 3.00% to 2.60%, the real payroll growth assumption was decreased from 1.00% to 0.65%, and the overall payroll growth rate assumption was decreased from 4.00% to 3.25%. The long-term expected rate of return decreased from 7.75% to 7.65%.
- HIS: The municipal rate used to determine total pension liability decreased from 4.63% to 4.29%.

The total pension liability for each plan was determined by the plans' actuary and reported in the plans' valuations dated July 1, 2014. The fiduciary net position used by the actuary to determine the net pension liability (as shown above) was determined on the same basis used by the plan. Update procedures were not used.

At June 30, 2015, the School reported a liability of \$1,600,326 for its proportionate share of the net pension liabilities. The School's proportionate share was calculated using accrued retirement contributions for employers that were members of the FRS and HIS during fiscal years 2013 and 2014. The proportion calculated based on contributions for each of the fiscal years was applied to the net pension liability and other pension amounts applicable to that fiscal year to determine the School's proportionate share of the liability, deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources and associated pension expense. In accordance with GASB 68, paragraph 71, changes in the School's proportionate share of the net pension liability are recognized in pension expense in the current measurement period, except as indicated below. For each of the following, a portion is recognized in pension expense in the current measurement period, and the balance is amortized as deferred outflows or deferred inflows of resources using a systematic and rational method over a closed period, as defined below:

- Differences between expected and actual experience with regard to economic and demographic factors – amortized over the average expected remaining service life of all employees that are provided with pensions through the pension plan (active and inactive employees).
- Changes of assumptions or other inputs – amortized over the average expected remaining service life of all employees that are provided with pensions through the pension plan (active and inactive employees).
- Differences between expected and actual earnings on pension plan investments – amortized over five years.

Contributions to the pension plans from the School are not included in collective pension expense. The average expected remaining service life of all employees provided with pensions through the pension plans at June 30, 2014, was 6.3 years for FRS and 7.2 years for HIS.

Defined contribution plan

Effective July 1, 2002, the Public Employee Optional Retirement Program (“PEORP”) was implemented as a defined contribution plan alternative available to all FRS members in lieu of the defined benefit plan. Employer contributions are defined by law, but the ultimate benefit depends in part on the performance of investment funds. The PEORP is funded by employer contributions that are based on salary and membership class (i.e.: regular class, reemployed retiree, etc.). Contributions are directed to individual member accounts, and the individual members allocate contributions and account balances among various approved investment choices. The School had no PEORP participants during fiscal 2015.

11 POSTEMPLOYMENT HEALTH CARE BENEFITS

Plan description

The Postemployment Health Care Plan is a single-employer defined benefit plan administered by the School Board for which employees of the School may participate. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 112.0801, Florida Statutes, former employees who retire from the School or School Board are eligible to participate in the School Board’s self-insured health and hospitalization plan for medical and prescription drug coverages. The School Board subsidizes the premium rates paid by retirees by allowing them to participate in the plan at blended group (implicitly subsidized) premium rates for both active and retired employees. These rates provide an implicit subsidy for retirees because, on an actuarial basis, their current and future claims are expected to result in higher costs to the plan on average than those of active employees. The Postemployment Health Care Plan does not issue a stand-alone report and is not included in the report of a Public Employee Retirement System or another entity.

(continued)**

Funding policy

The School Board plans to fund this postemployment benefit on a pay-as-you-go basis. The plan as established by the School Board, would require this Board's action to amend. For the 2014 - 2015 fiscal year, 88 covered participants of the School received postemployment health care benefits. The School provided required contributions of \$15,556 toward the annual other postemployment benefits (OPEB) cost, comprised of benefit payments made on behalf of retirees for claims expenses (net of reinsurance), administrative expenses, and reinsurance premiums, and net of retiree contributions.

Annual OPEB cost and net OPEB obligation

The School Board's annual OPEB cost (expense) is calculated based on the annual required contribution (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with parameters of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 45, *Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions*, and then allocated to the School. The following table shows the School's annual allocated OPEB cost for the year, the amount actually contributed to the plan, and changes in the School's net OPEB obligation for Postemployment Health Care Benefits:

Funded Status and Funding Progress

As of June 30, 2014 (as restated), the actuarial accrued liability for benefits for the School's allocated portion was \$250,669, and the actuarial value of assets was \$0, resulting in an unfunded actuarial accrued liability for the School's allocated portion of \$250,669. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active participating employees) was \$2,482,746 for the 2014-15 fiscal year, and the ratio of the unfunded actuarial accrued liability for the School's allocated portion to the covered payroll was 10.10%.

Actuarial method and assumptions

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment and termination, mortality, and the healthcare cost trends. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future.

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan provisions, as understood by the employer and participating members, and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and participating members. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

The School Board's initial OPEB actuarial valuation as of October 1, 2007, used the entry age normal cost actuarial method to estimate the unfunded actuarial liability as of June 30, 2008, and to estimate the School Board's 2007-08 fiscal year annual required contribution. This method was selected because it produced the lowest OPEB liability and annual cost. Because the OPEB liability is currently unfunded, the actuarial assumptions included a 4 percent rate of return on invested assets, which is the School Board's long-term expectation of investment returns under its investment policy. The actuarial assumptions also included a payroll growth rate of 4% per year, and an annual healthcare cost trend rate of 16% initially for the 2007-08 fiscal year, reduced by 6% in the first year and 0.5% thereafter to an ultimate rate of 5.58% after ten years. The unfunded actuarial accrued liability is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll on a closed basis. The remaining amortization period at June 30, 2015, was 23 years.

12 RESTRICTED NET POSITION

Restricted net position represents amounts that have been collected or received by the School for specific purposes and are restricted as to the use of such funds. Included in restricted net position is \$160,872 held by the School for student financial aid, \$108,387 held for targeted CTE program expenses and \$1,421,407 held for the center of advanced manufacturing. In addition, the School has \$514,203 for financial assistance and scholarships, of which \$328,000 is nonexpendable. These funds are also classified as restricted cash in these financial statements.

13 COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Grants

The School participates in state and federal grant programs, which are governed by various rules and regulations of the grantor agencies. Costs charged to the respective grant programs are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor agencies; therefore, to the extent that the School has not complied with the rules and regulations governing the grants, refunds of any money received may be required and the collectibility of any related receivable as of June 30, 2015 may be impaired.

In the opinion of the School, there are no significant contingent liabilities relating to compliance with the rules and regulations governing the respective grants; therefore, no provision has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements for such contingencies.

Legal matters

In the normal course of conducting its operations, the School occasionally becomes party to various legal actions and proceedings. In the opinion of management, the ultimate resolution of such legal matters will not have a significant adverse effect on the accompanying financial statements.

Beneficial interest in trusts

The School has been notified that it has been named the beneficiary of two related educational trusts whereby the School will receive the balance remaining in the trusts on their termination (split-interest remainder trusts). The future benefit to be received on the termination of these trusts has not been recorded in the government-wide financial statements because sufficient information was not available to calculate the present value of the future benefit to be received.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Lake Technical Center, Inc. (the “School”), a charter technical career center and component unit of the District School Board of Lake County, Florida, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School’s basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated January 26, 2016.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the School’s internal control over financial reporting (“internal control”) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the School’s internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the School’s internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity’s financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.



Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the School's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance.
