The show wove popular music, traditional Syrian dance and melody, and standard choral music into an 18-minute performance by the 21 singers and seven instrumentalists of *Amped Up*.



Appointment of NEW PRINCIPAL



The Lyme-Old Lyme Schools are pleased to announce the appointment of Kelly Enoch to the position of Principal of Mile Creek Elementary School. Mrs. Enoch will replace Dr. Patricia Downes who is retiring after 30 years of service to the district as both a teacher and an administrator.

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World Language K-5





It is said that we all smile in the same language. All students in kindergarten through 5th grade are given the weekly opportunity of a lively elementary world language lesson. Students learn about the importance of connecting with others through language and understanding the value of global citizenship in our changing world. Young students begin to build proficiency and knowledge of Spanish vocabulary in order to express themselves in various units of study such as the calendar, classroom, body, family, foods, weather, clothing and the community.

This year, the topic of animals was a favorite for grades K-3 as our Spanish lessons also related to their classroom visits to the zoo, beach and local museums. Young students donned animal masks to express themselves verbally, played charades to recall vocabulary and listened to stories, in addition to reading and writing activities.

Themes of study throughout the year connect to calendar events and cultural holidays as well, in order to build competency and to interact with cultural understanding. Fourth graders enjoyed games related to the body, labeling skeletons and describing clothing, while comparing and contrasting holiday customs. A favorite event this year to recognize the success of our 5th graders was a culminating "Taco Fiesta" to coincide with Cinco de Mayo. It was an opportunity for "real-world application" of knowledge, while students used language related to food and manners.

Each year elementary students develop further language proficiency within the novice level through lessons related to the "Five C's" of Communication," based on the state standards and recommendations of the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages, with the long-term goal of students not only being college/career-ready, but "world-ready." If language and communication are at the heart of the human experience, it can only begin with smiles!
