

Originally from warm Georgia,

I have been at MSSM for 3 years. This is my second year as camp director and before that, in 2017, I was an instructor and taught Magnetic Levitation Trains (where we learned about magnets and then built a MagLev train and raced them.) The other class was Spy Technology. Though a bit ambitious, it went over well. Using a prototyping device called the Arduino, we made laser trip wires, motion detectors, RFID tags, pressure sensitive fabric, and even humidity detectors. It was a great introduction to the Arduino and it had the effect I wanted from a number of kids. Some of them nearly exploded and said. "WOW This exists? I am going to build a new thingy widget when I get home."

That's what the camp is all about. We don't make anyone an expert in programming or engineering or calculus, but we introduce new STEM ideas to them and hope to get them interest-

ed in these fields. There's a huge shortage in Maine and the U.S. for anyone, but especially women, in STEM fields. Luckily this year Aroostook county was highlighted by NASA Astronaught, Jessica Meir, a 1995 Caribou High School graduate. Meir is scheduled to launch to the International Space Station on board Soyuz MS-15 in September 2019, as a member of Expeditions 61 and 62.

Part of my job is walking around taking photos of all the classes. I both love and hate this part because I want to stay and participate in each of them. In fact, the only thing I don't like about the camp, is that I can't join all the classes. They all look so much fun.

We have some new ideas this year and have made some camper-suggested changes and we truly believe this will be the best camp so far. Thanks!

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
Summer Camp Instructors



Why is STEM education

So Important??



STEM education helps to bridge the ethnic and gender gaps

According to the Department of Commerce, STEM occupations are growing at 17%, while other occupations are growing at 9.8%. STEM degree holders have a higher income even in non-STEM careers. Science, technology, engineering and mathematics workers play a key role in the sustained growth and stability of the economy, and are a critical component to helping the United States win in the future. STEM education creates critical thinkers, increases science literacy, and enables the next generation of innovators. Innovation leads to new products and processes that sustain our economy. This innovation and science literacy depends on a solid knowledge base in the STEM areas. It is clear that most jobs of the future will require a basic understanding of math and science. Despite these compelling facts, mathematics and science scores on average among students are lagging behind other developing countries.

STEM education helps to bridge the ethnic and gender gaps sometimes found in math and science fields. Initiatives have been established to increase the roles of women and minorities in STEM-related fields. STEM education breaks the traditional gender roles. In order to compete in a global economy, STEM education and careers must be a national priority. Each and every decision made uses an aspect of STEM to understand the implications.

Summer Camp is Always Evolving - Three Changes This Year



Three Longer Classes Plus One >> Instructors have said they wanted longer classes to get more involved with the topic. We cut one of the classes and made three 75-minute classes. The "plus one" is a new addition called "Instructor's **Passion**" where they can teach anything that interests them. It could be basic Japanese, 360 Video, Intro to Guitar, Costume Making, etc.

More Down Time to Just Chill >> Some breaks are longer and there's an entire hour in the afternoon to unwind after classes before the fun afternoon actitivies start.

New Afternoon Activities >> We built a GaGa Pit last year (sadly after camp ended) and this year we've added a Disc Golf course around the campus. There are two courses and campers will throw a frisbee using golf rules. Maybe the target is a pole or soccer goal.

Things to Bring and to NOT Bring to Camp

Peanut Products

We always have a few campers with severe peanut allergies and this is the hardest thing to restrict. It's best not to send too many snacks with the campers since we provide them daily during one break and also have a trip down to Mlke's Family Market for them to buy stuff. If you do send snacks, please check the label carefully for peanut products. We have to confiscate them at the beginning of camp when we find them for the health and safety of all our campers.

Electronics

We are trying to get campers to meet new people and learn new things. Plus there's a chance expensive laptops could break or get misplaced.

Cell phones aren't prohibited, but are discouraged. They are prohibited in the academic building during class, unless requested by an instructor.

We do prohibit any large game system like PS4 or Xbox. Camp is about meeting people and there simply isn't enough time to sit in front of a TV playing video games.

Sugary Food & Money

Sugary and caffeinated food and drinks: Kids need a good night's sleep and will have roommates.

Large Amounts of Money: There's only one time and place to spend money at camp and that's the trip down to Mike's Market. They only need \$10-\$20 for that. We can hold their money if they need more for snacks on the bus trip back home. We provide a bagged lunch. There is also a stop at McDonald's in Newport for bus riders TO camp.

Address for Postcards

We will have some stamped postcards for campers to write home, but in the past they have just written "mom" and we had to delay the sending of them to get the correct address. Type out a list of address you think your camper might want to send a post card to.

Clothing for Theme Days

It's not mandatory, but many campers do dress up on the theme days. There are prizes for camp families that have the most participants.

Monday - Camp Pride (wear the camp shirt we provide) **Tuesday** - Sports Day

Wednesday - Wacky Wednesday

Thursday - Super Hero day to counter Monster Night. (The staff give challenges while dressed as monsters.)

Friday - Has been Formal Friday in the past, but not many campers want to dress formally at summer camp.

Things for the Room

You can bring a small fan, but a large fan on the bus might be a problem with limited space. Campers can also bring alarm clocks and radios, but remember campers are sharing a room with at least one roommate.
