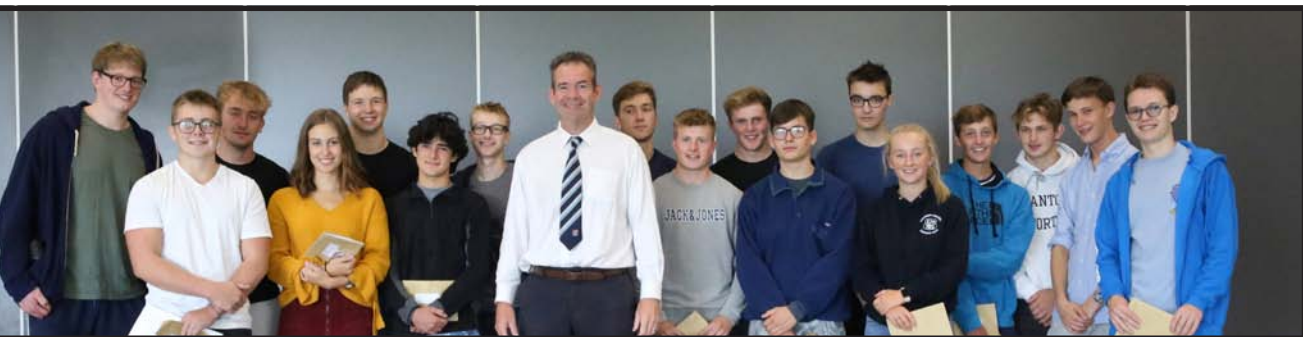

Best ever results!

Headmaster John Green's Academic Strategy for Seaford is paying dividends as Seaford achieved its best ever GCSE and A Level results. With record numbers of students heading for Russell Group and 1st Choice Universities, Seaford also saw record numbers achieve the

top new grade 9 score in their GCSEs. John Green said: "I'm immensely proud of what all of our students have achieved. We've consistently seen improvements each year and it's great to see our best ever results for both GCSE and A Level."

A Levels



THIS is the first cohort to come through to A Level from Year 9, when John Green took up his role as Headmaster five years ago. John's focus on Academic Seaford, his restructuring of the school and the increased focus on ambition for all pupils has had the desired impact.

He explains Seaford's approach. "Seaford's ethos is personal bests for every child and we have various strategies to achieve this. We carefully advise Seaford students when they come into Year 12 on the best pathway for them.

"This could be an academic pathway of purely A Levels, a vocational pathway with BTECs or a combination of the two.

"We want our students to get their personal bests and whichever pathway they have followed we have seen our best ever results. Seaford is proud to offer A Levels and BTECs, and has a variety of different students in our community.

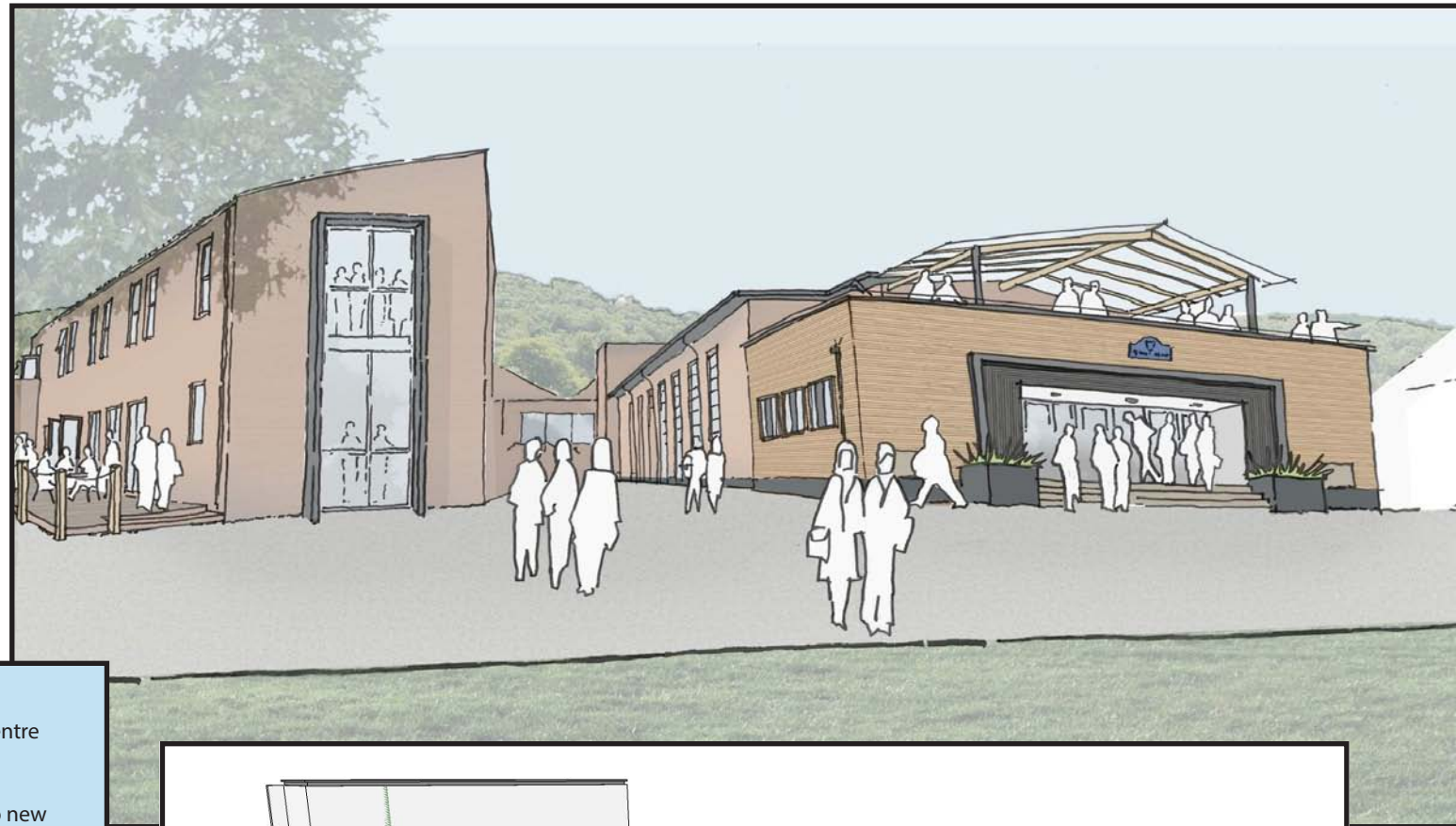
There were performers from right across Seaford – from the Prep School, Senior School and the Sixth Form.

Development news

Fantastic revamps set up key sites for the future



SOME exciting new developments are underway at Seaford as part of the Assembly Hall and Hollington Centre refurbishment plans.

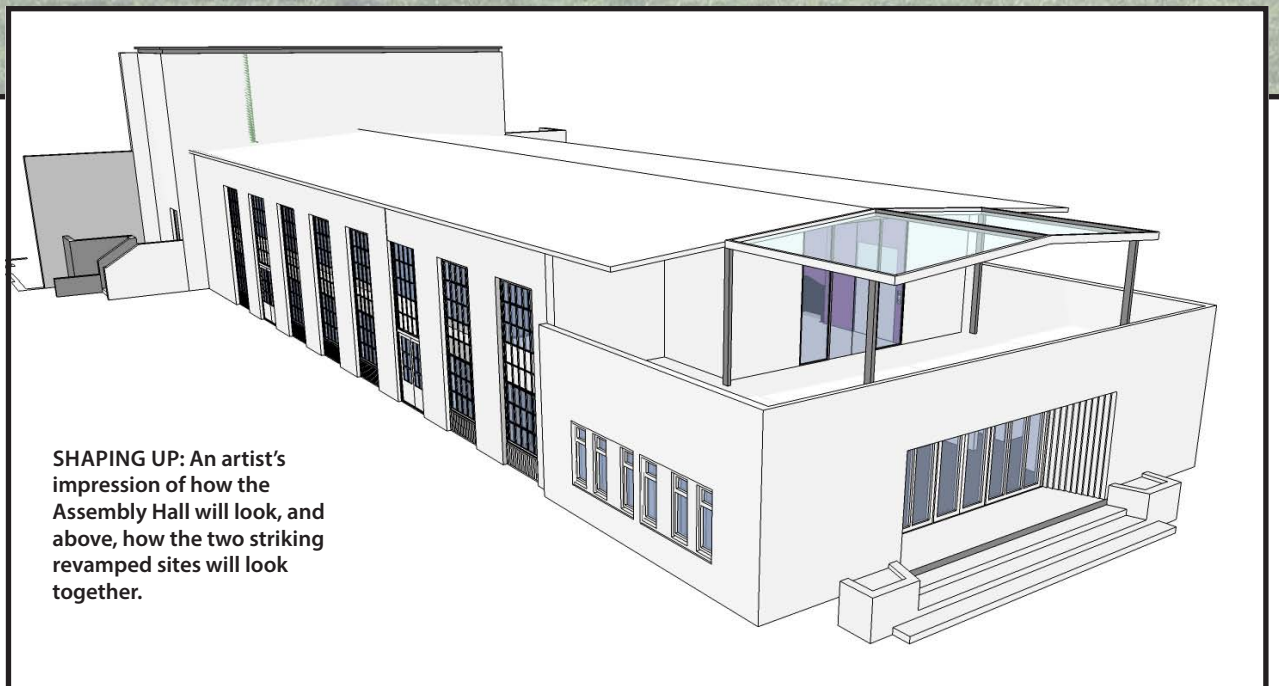
The Old Assembly Hall is being reconfigured and refurbished to provide six new flexible classrooms, two new seminar rooms, a brand new state-of-the-art library, study, office areas, external landscaping and a contemporary new glazed gallery providing superb views of Lavington Park and beyond.

New-look Sixth Form Centre

The Hollington Centre, Seaford's Sixth Form Centre, is being reconfigured and refurbished to create a brand new Year 11 Common Room, dedicated tuck shop, bag drop areas and new Sixth Form Centre that includes social and study spaces.

There will also be a new large Sixth Form dedicated study room with expanded new sports showers/changing facilities and a Seaford Café Bar delivering a coffee shop environment for students and weekend hospitality.

Phase one is already underway with a new mezzanine floor being inserted into the 'old' Assembly Hall and the addition of a new glazed gallery. It is also incorporating the creation of a new library, provision of new study spaces and two new seminar rooms.

Journey honours Seaford's fallen

A GROUP of ten Seaford College staff, parents and former pupils cycled across northern France and Belgium visiting the graves of Old Seafordians who had died in the First World War.

The journey was in support of Help for Heroes and a fitting way to commemorate the centenary of the end of the Great War.

A total of 270 kilometres were covered by bike and minibus over the weekend, taking in 11 cemeteries.

A small cross bearing the school crest was left behind at each grave in a small ceremony, with a reading of the school prayer.

Whether it was the 35,000 soldiers commemorated at Tyne Cot or the few hundred at Tranchett de Mecknes, the graveyards and memorials were always beautifully maintained and provided deeply moving experiences. The visit to the Menin Gate coincided with Belgian's European Day and the special Last Post service reflected the depth of feeling of those involved.

Poignant visit

The cycle ride replaced the annual Seaford to Seaford bike ride as a way of marking the lives and sacrifices made, with the visit to J G Savage – the son of Seaford College's founder – perhaps being the most memorable.

Although this was the biggest event of the term in support of Help for Heroes, a series of other fundraising events took place during the summer.

Headmaster John Green thanked Matthew Pitteway for organising the event, saying: "Well done to everyone involved and thank you for your tremendous efforts on what was undoubtedly a very special experience."

As a way of thanking the hospitals, Seaford held another charity walk, this time raising money for the Royal Brompton and Harefield Hospitals Charity and, in particular, the Harefield Transplant Appeal. An incredible £682.81 was raised and Mrs Reed, Katie and her family passed on a great big thank you to all those children who took part.

Although Katie wasn't able to take part in the walk herself, as she had only just come home from hospital, she met everyone half way and thanked them for their participation and good wishes.

Over the summer Katie has been working on her fitness and has gone from strength to strength. She and Mrs Reed have been going for walks and riding their bikes, going further each time.

Mrs Reed said: "We, the family, are so proud of her and her achievements since her transplant."

Year 13's Elliot Brown has made his debut for the England Physical Disability (PD) Lions cricket team. His is a story of following your dreams and, as we say at Seaford, 'reaching for the heights'.

ELLIOT, who has cerebral palsy, started playing cricket at Seaford in Year 4. He is now the Seaford 2nd team captain and describes the past year as "really good, we only lost one game!"

Alongside playing at Seaford, Elliot also plays for Steyning Cricket Club and has done for a number of years.

He is grateful for their support and the fact that they have always been good with him and his disability. In 2015 Elliot was picked to play for Sussex Cricket Club's disability team, and after three years he joined Middlesex's disability team before he was selected to play for the England PD Lions.

Chris Adams, Head of Seaford Cricket, says he was, "absolutely delighted for Elliot. I know how much it means to him and will mean to him over the coming years to be part of that squad".



Grabbed the opportunity

It was Chris who made Elliot the second team captain. "It's a meaty role," he says. "He has taken it, grabbed it with both hands and sprinted off into the distance with it."

The respect that Chris has for Elliot and his passion and determination is mutual. Elliot credits Chris and Seaford for their support.

"Seaford and especially Chris Adams have been great with me. Being captain has been great, I get to learn how to lead a group – always a useful tool to have," said Elliot.

Since opening its doors in 1884, Seaford College has consistently lived by the motto of 'Ad Alta!' encouraging students to 'reach for the heights'; the school is proud of how students have always flourished to the best of their ability both inside and outside the classroom. And this is clearly the case with Elliot. His aspirations for the future are to "play for England and win a World Cup".

What a great season!

SEAFORD enjoyed a very good season of athletics this year. The athletes' success demonstrated Seaford's strength as an athletic school, particularly in the inter-boys Year 10 and 11, where they won all inter-boys age group matches.

The school's girls are also showing their strength, in particular Year 9, where there are some really good athletes.

This was demonstrated at the Sussex Schools County Finals at the start of June where Seaford did very well as a school, winning 10 medals overall. Jon Thompson, Head of Seaford Athletics, said: "It's a tough competition and we had a good day with some really good performances."

Rupert Blackwell won gold in the inter-boys' javelin and broke the school record in doing so. He said he was "especially happy as the record was set over 50 years ago". Rupert threw 50.3m, with the previous record being about 48.5m. He praised his sports coaches at Seaford for the training and support they give him.

Ollie Beach won gold in the junior boys' discus, Johnny Murray-Jones (Year 9) took silver in the junior boys' triple jump and Joseph Spiby (Year 11) won silver in the discus.

Olivia McDonald won silver in the 3000m. Jon was full of praise for her performance. "It was a great run for her. She's a tremendous athlete". Some of these athletes then

went on to represent Sussex in the Inter County Championships. Jon was anticipating it to be a great experience for the athletes with some very strong counties competing.

Another record was broken at the Diamond League at Hurst with Ollie Beach winning the discus with a huge throw of 41.78m.

LIGHT winds proved to be the undoing of Seaford College Sailing Club's attempt to sail around the Isle of Wight in the annual summer challenge.

Samantha Evans, Head of Sailing, said: "It was the toughest Round the Island Race I have ever competed in and we had everything stacked against us not finishing in our small boat."

The pupils battled through 14 hours of non-stop racing with focus and concentration, showing great resilience in tough conditions.

Despite the low wind, the team finally made it around into the Solent but then the light sea breeze died. Despite the crew's best efforts, sunset came and then the 10pm cut off

time, leaving them no option but to retire just 1.5 nautical miles from the finishing line.

"With these conditions, to be so close to the finish line was a real achievement and we were proud of ourselves for that. The pupils had demonstrated incredible camaraderie and determination," said Samantha.
