

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



MEET THE NEW LEAD ERSHIP TEAM AT SERRA

President Barry Thornton, Ed.D.

According to Serra President Barry Thornton, Ed.D., "We do something profoundly special and unique here at Serra. It's amazing to watch our boys grow into young men of integrity who are spiritually, emotionally and academically ready to go out into the world."

Thornton assumed office earlier this month. He accepted the position after a six-month, nationwide search.

"I can't wait to tell our story," said Thornton, the former principal of

Serra who has worked at the school since 1996. "I am honored and humbled . . . I have a passion for this incredible community."

"Dr. Thornton brings an unbridled passion for Serra that is contagious," said Pamela Lyons, Archdiocese of San Francisco superintendent of schools. "After his many years of service to Serra he knows the school community intimately, yet will bring a fresh perspective to his new role."

Thornton started at Serra as a theology teacher in 1996, eventually becoming the dean of studies in 2002 and principal in 2008. He has been a tireless advocate for Serra's outstanding college-prep program and describes himself as having "a global view of the world." His natural curiosity and thirst for learning inspired him to earn an Ed.D. in Catholic Educational Leadership from the University of San Francisco. His thesis was titled, "Choices and Values in Catholic High School Education: A Study of Parent Decision Making in the San Francisco Bay Area."

Working with Serra's Academic Leadership Team, Thornton developed a robust and systematic professional development program for teachers that facilitates students' academic success and college access.

"I am proud of our teachers' ability to incorporate critical thought, innovative technology and engagement strategies geared to teaching boys," Thornton said.

In addition to being proud of Serra's strong academics, Thornton stressed the importance of the school's values-based program for young Padres. This includes leadership opportunities, student-led liturgies, a life-changing service immersion program, Kairos retreats and the implementation of the Mission and Brotherhood Program, which examines teen

issues and stresses the importance of becoming young men of respect, inclusion, integrity and compassion.

"We want our Padres to know what it means to be a man of compassion, someone who uses his gifts to serve others," explained Thornton, a former Peace Corps volunteer. "Our teachers, counselors, coaches and staff members mentor our boys in a faith-based community. High school can be a confusing time."

As the new president, Thornton has his sights set on continuing to enhance Serra's campus facilities to provide an engaging learning environment. He was a key member of the planning committee in the design and implementation of Serra's beautiful Center for the Arts and Sciences, a \$21 million facility. Thornton's background as a Pacifica associate city planner during the late 1980s provided him with a solid grasp of zoning laws, permits, commercial development proposals and all that is required for new construction and building renovations.

Thornton and his wife, Susie, are residents of San Mateo who enjoy the local community. Susie is an English teacher at Borel Middle School.

Principal Charlie McGrath, M.Ed.

These are the wise words of Charlie McGrath, Serra's new principal. McGrath was the assistant superintendent of the Catholic Diocese of Madison, WI, before accepting the position at Serra. The energy of Serra's student community drew him back to the high school environment.

"I'm excited to join the Serra community to continue its tradition of excellence and work with the boys throughout their high school experience," said McGrath, who has relatives in the San Francisco Bay Area. "I look forward to being part of the great things happening at Serra, as it continues to meet the needs of families who want their boys to be educated in an exemplary school environment."

McGrath began his career as a campus minister and theology teacher at St. Michael's Catholic Academy in Austin, TX. He later moved into administration as an assistant principal and principal at John Carroll Catholic High School in Birmingham.

"Charlie brings exceptional leadership skills to Serra," said President Barry Thornton, Ed.D. "His tenure at John Carroll High School was marked by innovative academic programs, cutting-edge technology changes and student success in accessing a wide range of college choices."

Growing up on the East Coast of Canada in Newfoundland, McGrath's small-town roots taught him the importance of a welcoming environment and an open-door policy. He grew up near the ocean, and he is looking forward to living near the water once again. McGrath described himself as an active listener who wants to get to know his students and parents.

"I'm a hands-on leader," he said. "Everyone I deal with should feel valued and welcomed. My goal as principal is to be sure that every student will grow to become a successful young man while feeling valued, safe and respected. We have to give our boys space to figure things out and the parameters to explore their own hearts, minds and souls. It's not easy trying to navigate through today's world. The question is, 'How can we continue to be faith filled and faithful to our work in Catholic education?'

"Charlie's colleagues praised his ability to listen deeply to the needs of the students and skillfully guide the community to respond," Thornton noted. "Through this process, he was able to implement changes that met the needs of the students at John Carroll, including a revised schedule and academic programs in STEM, performing arts and social justice."

Noting the critical importance of supporting the faculty and staff, McGrath said he has a responsibility to provide the resources and skills necessary for his colleagues to thrive in a college-prep environment.

"Ongoing professional development for faculty and staff members

supports their ability to accommodate the individual learner, to affirm the gifts and talents of students and to measure student progress," he explained "Highly qualified teachers support a learning environment that nurtures creativity and imaginative thinking."

Also important to McGrath is the concept of reflective practice. He explained, "In a high-speed world with so many pressures to respond in 140 characters to what you think and feel, it's important to discover who we are, where we are going and where God is in all of this. Where is he leading us?"

McGrath particularly admires the Padre brotherhood and said it's important for Padres to walk with each other on their life paths.

"You're only as strong as your weakest brother," said McGrath, who has a master's degree in educational administration and a bachelor's degree in religious studies and philosophy. "We are all responsible for caring for our brothers. That's the added value of a Serra education. Catholic schools, in cooperation with families as the primary educators, educate the whole child-body, mind and spirit-by providing an excellent education rooted in Gospel values. Serra brings faith, culture and life together in harmony."

"I am excited about our partnership to lead Serra forward as a preeminent Catholic college preparatory school in the Bay Area," Thornton said. "Charlie's deep experience and educational background have prepared him for his new role at Serra-to guide boys as they grow into young men of integrity, respect, inclusion and compassion."

Class Valedictorians



Three exceptional seniors represented the Class of 2019 as class valedictorians. They worked hard in many areas and enjoyed serving their Padre brothers.

Juliano Rodriguez '19, who gave the valedictory address on graduation day, will attend UCLA. An outstanding pitcher on the baseball team, he also had an offer to play baseball at Santa Clara University. He was a member of Serra's Executive Student Council, the Campus Ministry Leadership Team and the Big Brothers program. In addition, Rodriguez participated in immersion trips to Puerto Rico and East Los Angeles.

Nick Lochrie '19 spoke at the Senior Academic Awards Night. A political aficionado, Lochrie will study international affairs at George Washington University while participating in the Politics and Values Program. This selective program covers political theory, American politics, comparative politics and international relations at an accelerated pace. Lochrie also earned the university's \$25,000 per year Presidential Academic Scholarship. Serra's Shea Award was established in 1966 in honor of James P. Shea '58, who fought in the Vietnam War and was killed in action.



Galvin Yuan '19 will pack his bags for New York this fall to attend the Manhattan School of Music, a world-renowned music and theatre conservatory. An excellent student, Yuan earned MSM's President's Scholarship—a prestigious distinction awarded to a small number of incoming students. He will study in MSM's musical theatre program, which boasts Tony Award-winning faculty members.

Yuan has been a regular on the Tri-School Productions stage at Serra, performing in eight plays and musicals that tested and developed his acting skills. He also was one of the first Serra students to take Serra's new Drama 2 course.

"In class, Galvin was driven by his absolute love of this art," said Visual and Performing Arts Chair Lawrence Long. "He was the first to recognize when that drive wasn't enough, and his discipline and self awareness helped him to make major breakthroughs. Galvin was a model to his peers."



Offstage, Yuan took advantage of Serra's extracurricular activities. He was a member of the executive student council, president of the Tri-M Music Honor Society, president of Serra's chapter of the International Thespian Society, manager of the swim team and a member of the Men's Chorus. Through Campus Ministry, he served as a

Kairos Leader and a member of the Encounter student leadership team.

"Going on Kairos was transformative," Yuan said. "That was when I realized we all share common experiences in life and we are more similar than different. I was inspired to come back senior year as a Kairos leader, and I found it even more rewarding the second time around."

Yuan also has impressive skills in an unusual sport that requires focus, form, consistency and attention to detail. An exceptional archer, he was a member of Team USA's Junior Dream Team. Yuan trains in San Diego four to five times per year, and he was ranked 10th in the country last year.

"Attending Serra helped me to become the person and artist I am today," Yuan said. "Through Tri-School Productions, I realized my love for theatre and that inspired me to apply to MSM and pursue my passion in New York. I am incredibly grateful for the support and opportunities I had at Serra, and I can't wait for my Padre brothers to see me on Broadway!"





Arman Popli '19

A cappella singer, mock trial lawyer, wrestling co-captain, student body president and standout student—to say that Arman Popli made the most of his four years at Serra is an understatement. Popli also performed in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, played four years of JV and varsity tennis, and carried four AP classes and an advanced math course at Skyline College.

One of Popli's proudest moments was receiving the Graduation Service Medal, which is given to the senior who has shown exceptional service to the Serra community and who has demonstrated the ideals expressed in the school's mission statement and philosophy.

"Arman showed outstanding leadership as the student body president," said Student Activities Director Mike Langridge '91. "He led his classmates through some stressful times this year, while also developing consensus on the executive council when there were often strong differences of opinion. There was no doubt that he deserved the Graduation Service Medal."



Popli will attend Northwestern University in the fall, where he plans to study political science and eventually get into politics. Inspired by history teachers Kevin Carey '93 and Patrick Duggan '71 to ask questions, delve deeper into thorny issues and back up positions with evidence, Popli developed a love for learning about current events, economics and politics. He supplemented his classroom education with real-world experience as an intern for Assemblyman Kevin Mullin '88 and Congresswoman Jackie Speier (Mercy '68). He also hopes to hone his quantitative skills in college. Brian Wilbur's AP Stats class showed him how valuable statistics can be in understanding economics, polling data and political predictions.

In addition to outstanding teachers, Popli credits the Serra brotherhood and his mock trial coach, Dominic Campodonico '86, for asking him try new things and teaching him the value of humility and teamwork. It was Campodonico who pushed Popli to take on an attorney role in mock trial and later encouraged him to run for student body president. As Popli became an upperclassman, he was eager to pass along words of advice and encouragement to younger Padres.

"The opportunities are here at Serra," he noted. "Young Padres should seek out anything they might be interested in and give it a try."

How do all of Popli's varied interests fit into his longrange plan? Well, any successful politician needs a wide range of experiences to be relatable, likable and effective. Who wouldn't vote for a smart guy who can sing, wrestle and argue while playing tennis?





Aidan Herrera '19

Aidan Herrera '19 had an amazing journey at Serra—one that was, in many ways, unexpected. He took risks, tried a new language, pushed himself to take AP courses and threw himself into all of the behind-the-scenes work of putting on theatrical productions. Herrera graduated with two graduation medals (dramatic arts and world languages) and a number of commendations. He will attend Creighton University in the fall as one of just 40 incoming freshmen named a Dean's Fellow.

Herrera, who hopes to become a pediatrician, will study medical anthropology in college. His inspiration to pursue this major began in Dr. Tara Mann's AP biology class—the hardest class he took at Serra. Herrera loved the study of diseases, such as sickle cell anemia and malaria, and how they interact with culture and geography. Medical anthropology draws upon social, cultural and biological factors to understand illnesses and their healing processes.

Herrera found more than his major at Serra. He also enjoyed working on sets, lights and sound for Tri-School Productions. He worked on the stage crew for four years and was the stage manager for three years. Herrera's proficiency and interest in electronics propelled him to become president of the Audio/Visual Club, where he served as an on-site sound and technology expert during school rallies, Masses and events. At the end of the year, Herrera was awarded the Graduation Dramatic Arts Medal for his outstanding work.

He recently spoke to incoming Serra freshmen and urged them to make the most of their Serra experiences. "Serra can be whatever you want it to be," he said. "I discovered theatre, a future college major and German. I traveled to Washington, D.C. and met U.S. representatives on the steps of the Capitol. I found role models and met friends I will have for the rest of my life. I was challenged. I failed. I succeeded. My fellow Padres, make the most of your time at Serra."

An Artful Exit: Sister Celeste Pursues a New Path

She's known for her passion for art and her compassion for others. She is a Sister of Mercy, a gifted artist and a loving spiritual director. Sister Celeste Nuttman, R.S.M., retired from teaching in June after 12 years of service to the Serra community. She will be missed.

"It's a time in my life for change," Sister Celeste said. "I'm going to focus on spiritual direction, so I'll be using my gifts in a different way. I really enjoy companioning people on their spiritual journeys, helping them to discover the spirit of God in their lives. God loves us so much and it's a privilege for me to stand on that holy ground with my spiritual direction clients."

Sister Celeste also will be able to focus more on her artwork and take on more commissions for St. Thomas Apostle Church (and others). She said she will miss the energy of the Serra community.

"I loved teaching art at Serra—I enjoyed seeing the students look at the world in a different way through art. I encouraged our Padres to notice more intensely what was around them. They have wonderful imaginations, and I used a method of teaching that helped my students to recognize their value, the value of others and of all creation."

"Sister Celeste has been an integral part of shaping the Art Department for the past 12 years," said Serra ceramics teacher Clara Lonardo. "She is an immensely talented artist and an inspiration to all around her. We will miss her luminous presence and wish her all the best."

This year marks Sister Celeste's 55th year as a Sister of Mercy. She entered the convent in 1964, just after she graduated from Mercy High School, Burlingame. Sister Celeste's art has been exhibited all over the country, and she has won many awards for her colorful stained glass and vesture designs. A particularly memorable moment was when she designed the transformation of Candlestick Park in 1987 for the Papal visit of John Paul II. She also helped to establish the Burlingame Sisters of Mercy as a public sanctuary community for Guatemalan and El Salvadoran refugees.

"Creating art enables me to visualize and express my sentiments," said Sister Celeste, the author of two books,

Mandala Meditations and Reflections with Rumi and Hafiz. "It helps people to hone their creative spirit and energies. Over the years, I have witnessed the importance of a deep prayer life. The Mercy sisters have challenged me to think critically, to act with loving kindness and justice, to be open to change, to trust the gifts of God in me and in others, to deepen my love of creation, to pray and act with energy and passion, and to give with all my heart. They have been the face of God for me."

"Sister Celeste is a true grace to the Serra community," said Director of Campus Ministry Billy Byrnes. "She has such a pastoral presence about her that makes one feel welcomed, worthy and loved. Sister is a gifted artist and a wonderful teacher, but I would argue that one of her greatest gifts to Serra has been her spirituality and commitment to the faith lives of our students. She was a regular on Kairos retreats and assisted in all of our Campus Ministry programs. I will miss her passion for justice, her willingness to share her faith with our community, her ability to affirm those around her and her deep love of Christ. Sister Celeste embodies the beauty of the Mercy charism in all that she does, and Serra is a better place because of it."

Bay Scholars Club Spreads Messages of Goodwill

For many, the adage "pay it forward" reminds them of a Hollywood blockbuster from 2000, in which a wave of human kindness was created through a middle school student's assignment to discover a way to better the world. Random acts of kindness without reactive expectations were the way the main character created this altruistic phenomenon in the feel-good movie.

To a growing group of nearly 30 Serra Padres, the "pay it forward" concept means more. It is the essence of the Bay Scholars Club, which unites students who are Bay Scholars scholarship recipients. According to Bay Scholars Club Moderator Maryann O'Leary, Serra's director of tuition and financial aid, the service club's goal is clear.

"Our goal is to make sure students recognize that someone is investing in their education and doesn't want to be paid back for it," she explained."They simply want to pay it forward."

The club helps students to understand that receiving aid is a positive thing they should take pride in, rather than being embarrassed. "We have to overcome the stigma that this is anything shy of being positive," O'Leary said.

The club meets quarterly. A recent service project was on April 28, global Pay It Forward Day. Students plastered messages of goodwill around Serra's campus in the form of handmade posters. Dotting the walls in between class composites and spring concert advertisements were messages of spreading kindness and inspiring others.

"My goal as co-president is to provide more awareness of what our group is," said Devante Guel '21. "I would also like to set up a week of 'pay it forward,' where Padres do nice things for people. Mrs. O'Leary has helped us to respect Bay Scholars, and she has given us a safe space where labels from outside the group don't affect us and we can be ourselves."

A nonprofit established by philanthropists Clint and Janet Reilly in 2007, Bay Scholars' impetus is on providing students with a comprehensive, faith-based education. The program works by selecting engaged scholars who shine academically and show a willingness to give back to their communities. These promising low-income students are awarded four-year scholarships.

According to Bay Scholars Executive Director Caitlin Curran Kavanagh, the formula for the successful endeavor is simple: "Recruit great students, connect them with great schools and remove the greatest barrier to education: Cost."


Serra's partnership with Bay Scholars began in 2017. During the past school year, 29 Serra students received the scholarship. Next year, 12 incoming freshmen will benefit from this extraordinary opportunity. Each scholar receives a \$14,000 scholarship paid over four years of high school. To date, Bay Scholars has awarded \$5,516,750 in scholarships to nearly 900 students across the Bay Area.

"I am grateful to Bay Scholars for their ability to bridge the gap for these students who, even after financial aid, still have trouble affording tuition," O'Leary said. "The Bay Scholars scholarship was the deciding factor for a significant number of families."

Just as the Hollywood movie created a wave of human kindness, it appears the Bay Scholars Club at Serra is beginning to as well.

"This club has made me value brotherhood even more," said Mikey El-Badry '22, Bay Scholars Club co-president. "I've learned that I always have to help my fellow Padres, just as they help me. 'Pay it forward' is a way to carry out our lives for the better."

Serra President Lars Lund Bids Farewell

For almost four decades, Lars Lund mentored thousands of young Padres on their faith journeys. As a teacher, campus minister and administrator, his north star always has been the students' spiritual, emotional and intellectual wellness.

This month, the former Serra president will start his next chapter as the director of advancement of the Bay Scholars Foundation. Bay Scholars enables promising scholars to flourish at 12 college preparatory, Catholic high schools.

"I am very happy that my new job will allow me to continue to support Serra, as we currently have 45 Padres who benefit from the foundation's support," Lund said. "During the last decade, the foundation has provided \$3.25 million in scholarships to students, with 1,355 scholarships awarded."



Lund's love for Catholic education began in sixth grade, and it has stayed with him through the years. Raised by a single mother, Lund transferred to Catholic school after he endured numerous academic and disciplinary challenges in public school. "Sister Mary Salud, the principal at St. Jeanne Catholic School, ran a tight ship," Lund recounted. "However, she had mercy on me even though I didn't deserve it. She believed in me, and I have tried my best to live up to her example. I needed the structure of a Catholic school, as well as the sense of joy and purpose the community gave me. My classmates and I learned that we are loved by God, and that the Lord has given us talents and abilities to make a difference in the world. Sister's actions sparked my vocation to Catholic school teaching and leadership."

Lund began his career at Serra in 1983 as a theology teacher. During his teaching tenure, he served as the religious studies chair, as well as a wrestling and tennis coach. He also moderated the Justice and Peace Club and the Ski Club, and was the assistant faculty advisor of the National Honor Society.

Lund became the principal of Serra in 2003. During his time as principal, he oversaw the completion of Phase I of Serra's Campus Master Plan, which included a new football stadium, weight training center, baseball stadium, all-weather track and field, and parking structure. Lund also was responsible for the design, funding and construction of the Phase II Master Plan, a \$21 million campaign for the Center for the Arts and Sciences and Aquatics Center.

Lund is especially proud of the renovation of the courtyard in front of the school, the centerpiece of which is a statute of the Blessed Mother.

"Mary was there for her son in all the major stages of Jesus' life," he noted. "It is entirely fitting that our Padres enter and leave Serra every day under Mary's loving presence. It's a reminder of the irreplaceable role their parents play in their lives."

In 2008, Lund was appointed president. He developed the school's first strategic plan, which increased Serra's endowment from \$4 million to \$10 million. With the help of several friends of Serra, Lund established the Fund a Dream Scholarship Program in 2005, which has raised more than \$5 million since its inception for Padres who dream of a Serra education.

"Lars was passionate about bringing the Fund a Dream Scholarship Program to Serra," said new Serra President Barry Thornton, Ed.D. "This fund has enabled many students who dreamed of a Serra education to become Padres. It is difficult to put into words the impact that Lars has had on the Serra community. So much of what you see on campus—from the Center for the Arts and Science to the vibrant academic and campus ministry programs—can be traced to Lars' leadership and dedication to establishing Serra as one of the finest Catholic preparatory schools in the Bay Area."

"After 30-plus years, we must thank Lars for his countless hours of devoted service to Serra High School," said Serra Board of Regents Chairman Shawn DeLuna '86. "His dedication to the mission of the school has prepared us for the future. The work that Lars has done as president has equipped the school for continual expansion and development. He exemplifies a true Padre—a man of faith, wisdom, service, community and leadership. Although he will be missed, his work and devotion will not be forgotten."


Lund's wife, Mary, is the director of advancement at Mercy, Burlingame. Their daughters, Kathleen and Theresa, are Mercy alumnae. Particularly memorable for Lund were the years that his son, Kevin '12 attended Serra. "One of my proudest Serra moments was watching my son graduate from Serra," he said. "Kevin was inspired by wise, caring teachers. My wife and I saw him develop his innate passion for learning, his character and his compassion for others. I'd like to thank Kevin Carey, Rick Boesen, Mark Goyette, Tom Monaghan, Ralph Stark, Ted Morton, Bob and Patti Ferretti, and Kyle Lierk for that."

Lund remains committed to Catholic education and said his new role will enable him to make a difference in the lives of students from myriad backgrounds.

"Lars is an inspiring and visionary leader who worked countless hours to keep Serra moving forward," said Board of Regents Vice Chairman Jeff Silk, who worked with Lund for nine years. "Lars' influence during the past 30-plus years has benefited so many people in our Serra family and community. Most important, Lars was always laser focused on ensuring our students' success. His legacy will live on."

Step into Chris Lowenstein's living room and it's a feast for the eyes—beautiful rare books line the shelves. Intricate, decorative covers are exquisite works of art.

In addition to being a beloved Honors and AP English teacher at Serra, Lowenstein has a niche antiquarian book business. Founded in 2007, Book Hunter's Holiday specializes in Dante Alighieri, specifically Dante's *Divine Comedy*. Lowenstein also collects Western Americana, particularly books written by or about pioneer and frontier women.

"My love of books comes from my two grandmothers, both of whom loved to read," Lowenstein noted. "I remember loving it as a young child when my paternal grandmother read my father's old *Peter Rabbit* books to me. Because of her, I love to listen to and read stories. My maternal grandmother also was a book lover and a voracious reader who loved to discuss big ideas. Although she wasn't able to continue her formal education after high school, she read books instead and exemplified intellectual curiosity."

When Lowenstein was teaching Dante in her AP English class at Notre Dame, she began collecting various editions of *Divine Comedy*. "I followed the investing advice of Warren Buffett-'Invest in what

you know," she recounted. "What I knew was Dante. I now have about 200 editions of Dante. My favorite one is an illustrated edition from the 1880s by Gustave Doré, one of the most famous illustrators of the 19th century."

In January, Lowenstein was the keynote speaker at a special event for the Roxburghe Club, a bibliophilic society in San Francisco. Her talk, "The Collection from Hell," described how she created, catalogued and sold a collection of undervalued editions of Dante's works.

Lowenstein enjoys the hunt for overlooked treasures. A few years ago, she stumbled across a rare book with a beautiful hand-painted cover, Life West of the West by C.S. Capp. The book was made by hand and contained stories of life in the California gold mines. Although Life West of the West had been copyrighted in the early years of California's statehood, it was never published. After careful research, Lowenstein later sold this firsthand account of the Gold Rush to the Bancroft Library at U.C. Berkeley.

Another unusual find was a World War I foot locker, which belonged to a French San Francisco resident who returned to France to fight in the French army.


"In addition to books, I collect ephemera, which is anything in print that's not a book," Lowenstein explained. "The foot locker contains all of the correspondence he sent during his time on the Western Front, including Verdun, the Somme and the first battle of Ypres. It also contained his complete uniform, canteen, gas mask, shrapnel and battlefield trophies. It's very rare to come across something that can tell a complete story."

Lowenstein's passion for books matches her passion for teaching. Her students are intrigued when she brings in rare books and special artifacts to share with her classes, such as a miniature *Emancipation Proclamation* from 1863.

"I hope that when I bring these antique treasures to school, it will spark my students' interest and make history real," Lowenstein said. "The joy of teaching is not always reflected in students' grades and test scores. In the rare book trade, there is a general belief that often a book that 'looks like nothing' can have the most value. A good bookseller trains her eye to recognize the value in what is overlooked. The cover of

a book does not always reflect the true value of its content. This is similar to teaching students. Sometimes, people dismiss teenagers. But, if you learn to train your eye to spot their value and talents, you will help them to recognize their full potential."

Lowenstein grew up in the Tri-School community. She is an alumna of Notre Dame ('86). Her brother, John Bunje '97, and her husband, Jeff Lowenstein '86, are Serra alumni. The Lowensteins' sons, Ryan '16 and Matt '19, are also Serra Padres.

Serra junior Max Leininger said playing the leading role of Robbie was simultaneously demanding and lots of fun.



onathan Allen '01 has an exciting job that keeps him engaged 24/7. As Serra's assistant director of advancement: communications, digital media and grants, Allen is on the go at all times. Often, that means nights and weekends. As the social media guru of the school, Allen enjoys telling a good story on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter.

"I enjoy writing about the achievement, fun and service to others that occurs in the Serra community every day," he said. "Social media is engaging because you can communicate messages to a broad audience in a succinct way. I love to incorporate photos and videos with the written word."

What is Allen's favorite social media platform?

"I am able to embrace creativity with Instagram because it's so photo-centric," he explained. "They say, 'visual is the new headline.' You can communicate so many ideas through a single photo."

Allen has worked hard to achieve one of the highest engagement rates of all high schools in the state. Serra's engagement rates frequently average five times industry standard.

"My goal and vision is to have the premier high school social media program in the state and nation," he said. "Some stories have had an incredible number of views—particularly stories of people overcoming obstacles. That always resonates with people because life is full of ups and downs. When we posted Tom Brady's first interview in 1994 on Throwback Thursday, it garnered more than one million views across Facebook and Twitter. Sportsillustrated.com and patriots.com shared it, too."

One of the secrets to social media success, Allen believes, is patience. "It's so tempting to post, post post," he explained. "Spending the time to find the best photo

with good lighting and engaging facial expressions is always worth the time. Sometimes, I try to post something lighthearted and witty, but I don't want to overdo it. Varying the humor, the pop culture references and the angles of the photos makes the posts more interesting and draws the reader back to see what's next."

In the fall, Allen was asked to be a speaker at the Finalsite West Coast Social Media Workshop in Los Angeles. His talk, "Engaging all Generations," resulted in him being asked to speak last month at the Finalsite National Conference in Chicago.


"It was an honor to represent Serra on a national level," he said. "I listen to a lot of podcasts on the future of social media and try to keep everything as fresh as possible. I'm simultaneously a promoter and a reporter, and it was wonderful to share what I do with other communications professionals."

In addition to managing social media, Allen assists with middle school marketing and writes articles for *Traditions* magazine and the Serra website. He has fond memories of his high school days.

"Serra is a special place to me because it's where I found my faith," Allen said. "My Catholic faith has shaped me as a husband and father. I'm the person I am today because of my Serra experience."

Now that life has come full circle by working for his alma mater, Allen has found his perfect fit.

"Humanity has connected with storytelling for thousands of years," he noted. "This is just a different form of storytelling. My job allows me to be creative in new ways. This aspect of my job has made me a better communications professional."





hen Father Junípero Serra, approached the site of Mission San Diego de Alcalá in 1769, he knew his vision could not be fulfilled without the support of his believers. They rallied behind Father Serra and erected the first of 21 missions that are the foundation of our Catholic faith in California.

"There is a lot of maintenance involved with keeping our building in good shape," Lund noted. "Just imagine the wear and tear of 840 teenagers—it's intense."

The fund enhances offerings in technology and innovation. The money also is used to improve our athletics program and add student activities, all of which build the Padre virtues of integrity, respect and compassion.

Participation matters, too, according to Fadelli. "Having 100 percent parent participation is crucial for us," he said. "When we seek grants and alternative forms of funding, foundations ask about our parent participation level. These institutions want to know that parents and alumni are already supporting our school."


Fadelli cited one gift from a family with a student on tuition assistance.

75th Anniversary Alumni Trivia Challenge









As Serra reaches its 75-year milestone of educating young men on the Peninsula, the Trivia Club celebrates its 40th anniversary as one of the school's oldest and most popular clubs on campus.

The club's roots go back to early 1979, when a team of Padres, led by math teachers Randy Vogel and Bruce Anthony, entered the Millard Fillmore Trivia Contest sponsored by Carlmont High School. Under the direction of Carlmont's vice principal, the late Bob Hunter '50, San Mateo County high schools spent a weekend in February answering obscure questions and honoring Millard Fillmore, one of our least known U.S. presidents. During the 16 years that Serra competed in the Fillmore contest, the Padres took home the championship trophy three times.

Four years later, in October 1983, Vogel held the first lunchtime trivia challenge at Serra. Since then, the contest has become one of the school's most competitive and lively activities each fall and spring. Vogel uses a television game show format, similar to the popular Quiz Bowl Competition, to ask simple questions where anticipation and speed are the ingredients to success.

"You'd be surprised how popular and intense the Trivia Club challenges are," said Dominic Love '19. "The gym floods with students and faculty members yelling and shouting. It rivals the Jungle Game!"

"I've always been a big fan of television game shows," Vogel said, "so I ordered lockout buzzers and put a format together that involves as many participants as possible."

Today, the Trivia Contest packs 150 spectators, students and faculty members into the gym, where teams of 10 people send representatives to the buzzer rounds, huddle together to earn extra points on the bonus rounds and shout, heckle and encourage each other. The energy is high and the enthusiasm is magnetic. Winning teams are honored with a cellophane bag of candy-a crowd favorite!



The questions usually are simple enough to give everyone a chance to compete.

"The teams are always spirited and competitive," Vogel added. "The challenges provides an opportunity for students and faculty members to socialize in a friendly

Over the years, the Trivia Club has hosted contests for middle schools. Trivia Club members also have participated in quiz bowl competitions at other high schools and have hosted special game days for the faculty and staff members.

"The trivia challenges are popular because they bring together a diverse group of students," Vogel noted. "Anyone can participate and have fun. It's a team-building competition and all members contribute."

The Mark L. Vorsatz '72 Athletics Performance Center, named in honor of our lead donor, features the most cutting-edge equipment and innovative technology. This floor-to-ceiling remodel has created a strength and conditioning space that is recognized by equipment company Sorinex as one of the best in Northern California.

Serra partnered with Sorinex for this venture after reviewing its successful weight room projects for the Atlanta Braves, New England Patriots, Oregon Ducks and Cal Bears, among others. The goal was to create a facility that serves the needs of the 81 percent of Serra students who participate in athletics.

"Our vision was to build a total performance center, which will help students in all facets of life," said Athletic Director Justin Ferdinand. "It starts with a first-class weight room, but what will follow is a plan to educate our student-athletes about the importance of proper nutrition and sleep that will improve their performance on the field and in the classroom. Pressures exist from a multitude of sources for teens today, and proper nutrition and sleep can be a big help. A lot can be gained from being a healthier person."

In addition, every athlete will have a customized workout at his fingertips. Ten new iPads will be fixed to each weight rack and use Bridge Athletic software to track the performance and gains of each student-athlete.

"The idea is to optimize every aspect of sports training for peak performance," Strength and Conditioning Coach Brian Carson said. "We can design our program more intelligently and allow more students access to our facility. We hope to see fewer injuries on the playing fields as a result of this new venture."

Head Athletic Trainer Duke Meek concurred, "We are committed to educating our athletes about everything that can affect their performance—from hydration, nutrition and sleep to stretching, agility and proper fitting equipment. We know engaging students in all aspects of their training can help avoid injury and improve their overall physical and emotional well-being. Weight training is an important element, and having top-of-the-line equipment is an advantage for all of our athletes."



Serra's volleyball program reached new heights in 2019, earning the first CCS volleyball championship in school history. Led by standouts Brian Ronan '19, Neeraj Keshav '19, Cade Rees '19, Matthew Conry '19, Kevin Ramos-Garzon '20 and Nick Disco '20, the Padres finished 10-2 in the WCAL and 32-9 overall. Ronan was named *The San Mateo Daily Journal* Player of the Year after setting a new school record for kills in a season—483. The outside hitter was named First Team All-WCAL and ended his four-year varsity career with 1,119 total kills. A complete player, Ronan also led the Padres with 47 aces and added 241 digs.

Senior setter Keshav was named team MVP, with Ronan earning the Coaches' Award and Conry earning the Spirit Award. Kenny Chun was honored as Most Improved. This season's success was truly a team effort, with five players generating four kills or more in the CCS championship game.

"Everyone is so versatile and selfless," Head Coach Heather Anthony told *The Mercury News*. "They play with so much heart. This is the team that can do anything."

Volleyball games in Serra's Jungle were electric, especially towards the end of spring when the Padres began their playoff run. The 6'7" Rees, also an All-League basketball player, gave the Padres noticeable size along with Conry and Disco. The springy Ronan played well above his height, soaring above the net to generate whip-like action on his spikes. Team MVP Keshav excelled in setting up his teammates with exceptional vision, anticipation and accuracy. It was a phenomenal year for a special group of student-athletes leading Serra's volleyball program to unprecedented success.


TAKE ME OUT



Three Serra alumni were selected in June's 2019 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. Two of the three Padres are power-hitting, left-handed batters who patrol the outfield, and one is a top-of-the-order spark plug.

Hunter Bishop '16, a Golden Spikes Award semifinalist, completed a transcendent junior season for Arizona State University at the Baton Rouge NCAA Regional. Bishop showed off his elite power this season, hitting 22 home runs with a .748 slugging percentage. He was named First Team All-Pac-12 and was selected by the San Francisco Giants in the first round with the 10th overall pick. Bishop was also named an Academic All-American. From NBC Sports:

MLB Pipeline ranked Bishop as the seventh best player in the draft. and the Giants landed him despite a historic run on position players in the top 10. The MLB Pipeline scouting report noted Bishop has "tremendous raw power" and has "shown bat speed, strength and loft consistently, with majestic home run power to his pull side, but also the ability to drive the ball to all fields."



SENIOR CAPSTONE PROJECT

CHALLENGES STUDENTS TO EXPLORE CATHOLIC AND PHILOSOPHICAL TEACHINGS

Serra's dynamic theology teachers work hard to keep the theology curriculum fresh and relevant for teenagers living in a frenetic and distracting world.

The senior capstone project is an excellent example of the creative coursework that challenges students to explore Catholic and philosophical teachings while delving into today's social justice issues.

Working in pairs, seniors are challenged to find a social justice issue that tugs at their heartstrings. Examples include abuse in the military, dog fighting, plastics in the ocean and food insecurity.

"The students' challenge is to convince others that this issue is something we should all care about," said theology/philosophy teacher Chris Buckels.

After researching facts and figures, students analyze data to understand the scope of their social justice problems and reflect on the seven principles of Catholic social teaching. Using design thinking principles, students find possible solutions, make prototypes and create comprehensive websites that educate the next generation of Padres.

Dominic Ulrich and Sunia Tuitavake examined high school bullying in their project, "No Bullies Allowed." Through extensive research and interviews, they discovered how prevalent bullying is across the country as they examined the wide range of emotional, social and psychiatric disorders resulting from bullying. Ulrich and Tuitavake have witnessed the damaging effects of bullying, and they are committed to uplifting vulnerable adolescents and increasing awareness about this issue.

"We believe the problem of bullying can be best solved by the younger generation," Ulrich said. Tuitavake added, "Our proposed solution includes student-led groups responsible for proactive prevention, as well as strong advocacy and support of victims who have been bullied."

In "This Mine Ain't Mine," Matthew Collins and James Mirt told the story of Alaskan native Michelle Ravenmoon, who is fighting to preserve her ancestors' way of life against the proposed construction of the Pebble Mine in Bristol Bay, Alaska.

According to Collins and Mirt, this is an example of environmental racism—a large corporation is using its financial strength to assert its will over a low-income community populated by minorities. Introducing Pebble Mine into Bristol Bay would not only affect the fish population and wildlife habitats, but also the people who live there and depend on fishing for food.


"Our hope is to create more national attention," Collins said.

"Many people we talked to know bits and pieces about Pebble Mine," added Mirt, "but it's a story that's hidden and doesn't have the broad audience it needs."

The passionate creativity illustrated by each of the students' projects continues to inspire.

"Every year, I am impressed by how thoughtful and creative our students are with these assignments," said Theology Department Chair Gary Meegan. "They pour their hearts into the research and come up with really compelling ideas. For many students, their interest and commitment to social justice issues extends beyond high school. Students often use these projects as the basis for continued research in college. We love it when they become true men of faith who advocate for justice long after they graduate."





heat enveloped a sprawling landscape. A tent city emerged on the horizon—an image of hope and despair for the displaced Syrians confined to its quarters. It was July of 2018, and Samir Abiezzi '20 was traveling to a Syrian refugee camp in the Middle Eastern nation of Lebanon. Samir was joined by his sister, Charlie, as well as their mother and a camera crew.

Both of Samir's parents are Lebanese immigrants who have lived the American Dream. The Abiezzi family frequently travels to Lebanon, but this year Samir and Charlie were

inspired to document the harrowing stories of refugee families scarred from the horrors of the Syrian Civil War. Samir and Charlie shared their documentary with Serra Padres during the school year. A family friend who works for the United Nations secured them a pass to enter the camp and film the struggles of displaced Syrians.

Once inside, Samir and Charlie found abysmal conditions. Tents lined the dirt streets from end to end. Tarps hung lifelessly, forming makeshift walls for each family's living space. A formerly pristine river that runs through the camp exhibited a brownish hue and was overflowing with trash.

A noxious smell arose from the rushing water. Children appeared malnourished and skinny. Their clothes were torn and tattered, worn down from years of conflict with the extreme Middle Eastern climate.

Abiezzi was particularly disturbed by the number of children who are affected by the use of chemical weapons. His goal in producing the documentary was to show the human side of tragedy, while simultaneously addressing the misperception people have of how refugees are affecting smaller countries such as Lebanon.

"I was surprised to learn that refugees want to stay in Lebanon," Abiezzi said. "There is nothing back home for them in Syria, so even though they are struggling to make a new life for themselves in their new country, they don't want to go back."

Public education in the camp is dismal, a sharp contrast to the Bay Area educational experiences of Samir and Charlie. Once children turn 16, they are expected to work throughout the day. A mother explained to the group that "there is nowhere for the children to go outside the camp, so they never leave."

Since the beginning of the Syrian Civil War in 2011, 2.4 million Syrians have fled to Lebanon, increasing Lebanon's population by 33 percent. The refugee camps typically have a central hub operated by the United Nations. There, refugees can secure medical and dental care, as well as assistance with PTSD.


The scars of a war-torn nation are readily apparent within the camp.

Chemical weapons caused growth problems for many children. Organ deformities, especially involving the lungs, are common. A 9-year-old boy, whom the Abiezzi family interviewed, had an arm deformity. His father was arrested by the Syrian government and imprisoned for six months before being allowed to join his wife and children in Lebanon. Throughout their struggles, the parents have one desire—for their children to have a future. There is little hope and little education.

The glaring disparity of opportunity for children in America versus those in the refugee camp was apparent to Samir, an honor student at Serra with a bright future ahead of him. His sister, Charlie, is a recent graduate of UC Berkeley. Samir and Charlie sat with the family for hours inside their tent home. All were human beings, no better or worse than the others, but with starkly different futures ahead of them.

The day began with the presentation of The Junípero Serra Award, which recognizes an alumnus who has shared his gifts and talents with the community, making a difference in the lives of others. World-renowned photographer Michael Collopy '76 is this year's recipient. He was joined by his wife, Alma, and son, Paul.

"Michael Collopy could not be a more perfect example of the spirit of the Junípero Serra Award," said Alumni Director Bob Greene '85. "Michael uses his artistry to tell the stories of peacemakers. Since the 9/11 tragedy, Michael has dedicated himself, through his photography and his foundation, to inspiring students across the country to get involved and find ways to create a more peaceful world."

Collopy shared the important qualities he learned at Serra–a sense of curiosity, recognizing humility, and developing compassion and empathy. He is known for his wonderful ability to spread peace throughout the world.

Referencing a quote from Mahatma Gandhi, he said, "The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others."

In 1996, Collopy released Works of Love are Works of Peace with the cooperation of Mother and the Hoover Institute at Stanford University. In 2009, Collopy was honored with Stanford University's Martin Luther King Peace Award. After a special Junípero Serra Award ceremony in

After a special Junipero Serra Award ceremony in the Morton Family Gymnasium, students broke off into small groups to attend workshops that highlighted all sorts of interesting professions.

"I really liked Kalvin Sid's workshop," said Liam Ehlers '19. "He graduated from Serra in 1987 and is a certified financial planner. He gave an interesting and compelling presentation on how to plan for the future and use a diversified portfolio."

"Career day is a microcosm of our outstanding school community," Allen said. "It's a chance for our alumni to share the knowledge they have acquired over decades of life experience with our Padres. Today, Serra graduates from myriad decades came back to campus for this mentorship event."



Kareem Barghouti '05 Mines Human Bacteria in Quest for Optimum Health

magine being on the cutting edge of the biotech world, identifying possible new ways to cure diseases and promote optimum health. Kareem Barghouti '05 is doing just that as the CEO and co-founder of VastBiome, a biotech company that mines the gut microbiome for potential drugs. He visited his alma mater on Career Day to share his advances in medical research with today's Padres.

"The microbiome is a rich ecosystem composed of bacteria that live in and on the human body," Barghouti explained. "We depend on microbes to stay healthy and protect us against diseases."

Barghouti received his bachelor's degree in biological sciences from UC Irvine and his MBA from Duke University with a concentration in healthcare sector management. At 21 years old, he experienced his first venture in the tech sector when he cofounded an online marketplace called StingyCampus.com. He later joined a fast-growing social media software company, Wildfire Interactive, as an account executive, which was acquired by Google in 2012.

"I spent six years at Google working in sales, marketing, strategy and operations across multiple regions including the UK, India and the United States," Barghouti noted. "With a passion for entrepreneurship and healthcare, I left Google in July 2017 and moved to Houston to participate in the Texas Medical Center's BioDesign Fellowship. My colleagues and I spent a year identifying unmet needs throughout the healthcare ecosystem."

In January 2018, Barghouti and his peers founded VastBiome, a drug discovery company that mines the gut microbiome for novel therapeutic molecules. The team is based in San Carlos. In addition to Barghouti, the VastBiome crew includes Peter McCaffrey, M.D., a board certified pathologist and former chief resident of Harvard Medical School; Kovi Bessoff, M.D., Ph.D., who was trained in drug discovery and microbiology at the University of Vermont; and Ayin Vala, M.S., who was trained in data science and artificial intelligence at Harvard.

Barghouti's team has developed a machine learning platform called VBx1, which analyzes the bacteria in the human gut to understand the roles that microbes play in controlling human health.

"We are able to source data from patients' microbiome that can help identify key genetic components of one's bacterial DNA and how they might influence the immune system. We are currently studying the role of the gut microbiome in respect to cancer, and whether a patient will respond to treatment. It's early for the field, but it's also very exciting with a lot of opportunity ahead for discovery. We are actively seeking introductions to investors, clinical researchers and pharmaceutical connections."

He was the MVP of the cross country team and was the fifth all-time fastest runner in Serra's history.

Barghouti was encouraged by his Serra teachers and coaches, and he is proud to be a Padre.

"The brotherhood is real, and I made deep connections with people I could depend on," he said. "As a Muslim student at a Catholic high school, I can say that I was completely accepted. When I was a freshman, 9-11 happened. I was nervous, but people at Serra were very respectful. I even read an Islamic prayer during Mass. When I went back this year to Career Day, it was still the welcoming family I remember. That's pretty incredible!"


ISAIAH SALINDA led Stanford University to NCAA and Pac-12 golf championships this spring. The senior captain was one of 28



REMEMBERING A BELOVED PADRE JOHN KELLY PASSES AWAY AT 90

John Kelly touched the lives of thousands of young men during his two-decade tenure at Serra. As a teacher, coach, counselor and director of athletics, his influence was felt far and wide. It was more of the same when he took on the task of overseeing and growing Samaritan House, a San Mateo charitable organization that serves people in need. Still, no matter what his occupation might have been post-Serra, Kelly was always a Padre at heart. For Kelly (and the army of Serra alumni, former teachers/ administrators, family members and others), the school's Dec. 15, 2017 state football bowl game in Sacramento was a signature event. The vast majority of those folks, however, could not attend the contest in person. Kelly, who passed away May 20, 2019 at the age of 90 during Serra's 75th academic year, was one of them.

John Kelly views Serra's CIF grid title from afar

On a mild mid-December afternoon in 2017, John Kelly lay on his bed in Room 6C5 on the sixth floor of the Lesley Towers in San Mateo, welcomed a visitor and waited for the scheduled 4 p.m. kickoff. Serra was about to face off with Cajon High School in the CIF state Division 2-AA bowl championship game in Sacramento.

Kelly had suffered a stroke some years prior, and his mobility had been seriously impaired ever since. He required a caregiver and he had not seen the Padres play all season. This was about to change via TV. But a seemingly endless barrage of commercials intruded and he was getting restless.

"I can't believe how many ads they have for a high school football game," he said. "It's ridiculous." As the sun slowly went down and the lights of San Mateo began to come on below his room at the high-rise retirement facility, the ballgame commenced.

Kelly (he was Father John Kelly during his Serra days) was riveted to his high-definition TV set. When Serra scored its first touchdown by running back Isiah Kendrick midway in the first period, the ex-Latin teacher noted, "We're going to need more of those." True.

After a second Serra TD by the fleet Kendrick, the clock ticked toward the close of the first half and Kelly was feeling somewhat optimistic (although he was definitely not thrilled about an earlier missed Serra field goal attempt). Then, with no time remaining in the half, Cajon scored on a long pass and Kelly moaned, "Oh, brother. I can't believe it." The Padres still led, 14-7, at the intermission.

During his career at Serra, which began in the fall of 1956 and ended in the mid-1970s, Kelly had seen more than his share of ups and downs in the Serra athletic program. So the state bowl game was special for him.

The second half vs. Cajon did not begin well for the Padres, as Cajon tied things up at 14-14. Kelly was not pleased. Then, an electrifying kickoff return by Malakai Rango gave Serra great red-zone field position and Kelly excitedly uttered one loud phrase as the spectacular junior motored through the Cajon defenders: "Get to the outside, get to the outside!" The Padres scored shortly after that and dominated Cajon for the rest of the contest, winning their first state bowl game, 38-14.

Although he was physically compromised and 110 miles from the prep action, Kelly had been able to view his favorite team capture its most important victory since the varsity football program was created in 1946. Finally, it was time for him to have his soup. Besides, he groused one more time, the postgame CIF show included too many commercials. Again. Kelly had seen enough. His visitor said goodbye and headed for the elevator. Room 6C5 was quiet once again.
