AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In most of the areas we examined, District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over safeguarding of public resources.

As referenced above, we noted certain matters that we communicated to District management and the Board of Directors in a letter dated May 23, 2019, related to small and attractive assets. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Renton School District No. 403 from September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2018.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the year ended August 31, 2018, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Procurement – competitive bidding for purchases, piggybacking, and change orders on public works projects
- Tracking and monitoring of theft sensitive assets, such as computers and equipment
- Associated Student Body activities at Hazen, Lindbergh and Renton High School – fundraisers and cash receipting
- Third-party cash receipting – using qualified public depository, timely remittance, compliance with vendor contracts, and related controls
- Self-insurance for health and welfare, unemployment, and workers compensation
- Financial condition and fiscal sustainability
- Special education enrollment reporting

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Renton School District No. 403 serves approximately 15,100 students from preschool through the 12th grade in King County. The District operates three comprehensive high schools, an alternative high school, four middle schools and 14 elementary schools. It also sponsors an early childhood center for regular and special education preschool and kindergarten students.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors oversees the District. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operation as well as its approximately 2,000 employees.
