STUDENT COUNCIL REPORTS

Jefferson Middle School Student Council members Trenton Wood and Ema Nagel presented an update on the activities at JMS. Student Council collected \$198.25 in candygram donations to benefit the Pennsylvania Environmental Council to help protect the habitats, watersheds, and environment in our state.

On May 8, members attended Student Council Day at PNC Park, a reward for a year of hard work in helping to make this year's council a success.

In another effort to help the environment, a plastic recycling collection was held in an effort to help animals and their habits through the Save the Endangered Animals. Homerooms were given a mission to collect acceptable plastic caps and lids. The goal was two-fold: to collect plastic that may otherwise end up polluting animal habitats, and to amass enough plastic to have a Buddy Bench made for Jefferson Elementary. They did not reach their goal, but made a significant dent to continue the effort next year.

Student Council successfully sponsored, organized and hosted the first-ever JMS Talent Show. After months of planning and anticipation, the performance took place on May 10th. For the first attempt, there were 18 impressive acts of various talents, and the show was well-attended. After this year's success, they anticipate the possibility that a talent show may become an annual event from here on out at JMS.

Mellon Middle School Student Council members Emily Vella, William Sandoval, Lydia Volmrich, Danny Flynn, Aubree, and Madisen Ausman presented a report on being on the MMS Student Council and what it meant to them. Teacher and Staff Appreciation week was held at the beginning of May. All faculty, administrators and staff members enjoyed treats that were provided by the PTSA, Mt. Lebanon High School parents, and the Student Council showing that we greatly appreciate what our teachers, administrators, and staff members do for us each and every day. The Student Council also sponsored the 3rd annual Cafeteria Employees Appreciation Day last week. It was a big success as evidenced by the 31 students who served food, restocked the cold food shelves, or washed dishes during each of the lunch periods to recognize the efforts of the people who provide a vital service each school day. The Student Council also provided a corsage or a boutonniere for each cafeteria employee and a huge cake from Potomac bakery.

The high school production of "The Sound of Music" was held in early May. The cast, crew, and orchestra provided an evening filled with stunning performances each and every night and at the matinee too. Our extremely hard working teachers Mr. Vogel, Mrs. Kapron, Mr. Kuhar, Mr. LaPlaca, Ms. Majetic, and staff member, Mr. Stoklosa, provided a learning environment that taught the cast and tech crew many lessons about the beauty of live theatre. It was great to our classmates showcase their musical and comedic talents.

The Mt. Lebanon School District has been honored for the 11th consecutive year with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from The NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education. Now in its 20th year, the Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students. Certificates were presented to the elementary, middle school, and high school music staff for this outstanding honor.

Each year the Board recognizes members of our faculty and staff who are retiring. Through their diligent and skillful work, our retiring employees have enriched the lives of our students and their colleagues, and have directly contributed to the District's success. This year we have one administrator, four faculty members, and nine support staff retiring. Together they represent over 261 years of expertise and experience. The following retirees were presented with a certificate and a Mt. Lebanon pin as a small token of thanks and appreciation for their dedication: Janice Klein (37 years), William Coyne (26 years), Mark Kernion (33 years), Kathleen Konechny (26 years), Robert Vogel (38 years), James Chappel (10 years), Nancy Criswell (17 years), Barbara Delaney (13.5 years), Cindy Higgins (20 years), Robin Jacobs (14 years), Lennie Pollard (9 years), Teresa Spernak (16.5) years, Susan Wandless (18 years), and Suzanne Williams (20 years).

The Superintendent reported that Governor Tom Wolf announced the grant recipients for the School Safety and Security Grant Program. Mt. Lebanon will recieve \$476,660.00 over two years—the second largest award in our region for a broad range of training, equipment, and infrastructure enhancements. The District's grant proposal was based on the Administration and School Board's emphasis and concern for student mental health and well-being, and the building level safety and security assessments that were completed in partnership with the Mt. Lebanon Police Department. Dr. Steinhauer thanked Dr. Marybeth Irwin and Dr. Ron Davis for writing such a successful grant, and to Mr. Rick Marciniak and the Mt. Lebanon Police Department for their contributions to this meaningful and important school safety grant.

On May 21, Jefferson Middle School will host the Anti-Defamation League's 2019 Spread the Light Celebration at the high school where all 10 Mt Lebanon schools and Pittsburgh area school achieved the No Place for Hate designation. Over 350 students, teachers and administrators will be in attendance and each school will be presented with a No Place for Hate banner to hang in their school. To achieve this designation, administrators, faculty and staff received extensive antibias, anti-discrimination training from ADL facilitators. Faculty and student teams were created

to develop and implement at least three activities to combat bias and promote inclusion in their school. Achieving the No Place for Hate designation was an important goal for our schools and reflects the District's extensive work to foster a culture of acceptance and understanding, and our work to cultivate a place where everyone is treated with kindness, respect, and dignity.

Dr. Steinhauer announced the Dr. Chris Willard will visit the District again to continue his fall presentation about mindfulness as he presents Making Mindfulness Stick on Saturday, June 8 in the Washington Elementary Auditorium. Dr. Willard will discuss how parents and teachers can help kids manage the stresses of the modern world through mindful practices. He will also present simple strategies for implementing mindfulness in everyday settings. The talk is free and open to the public

BOARD REPORTS

<u>Policy Committee</u> – Mr. Lebowitz reported that the Policy Committee met on May 13 to review revisions to Policy JLCD, Administering Medicines to Students. It was recommended to move the policy forward for approval by the Board.

<u>Audit & Finance Committee</u> – Mr. Beal reported that when the District receives the single audit from the auditors, he will have a report for the Board.

<u>Parkway West Career and Technical Center</u> – Mr. Riemer reported that the Parkway West Career and Technical Center senior recognition awards were held on May 15. Outstanding senior were honored for their hard work. A luncheon was held for all the Student of the Month awardees throughout the year.

Three Parkway students placed in the 2019 SkillsUSA competition. Nick Dreger of Montour placed first in Automotive Maintenance and will be competing in the National competition. Lucas Gillespie of Upper St. Clair placed second in Building Construction, and Kirk McHugh of Montour placed third in Commercial Baking.

<u>Pathfinder School</u> – Mr. Cooper reported that the Pathfinder Board held a meeting on May 15. He reported that the roof project has begun and graduation will be held on June 5.

<u>PSBA/NSBA</u> – Mrs. Cappucci reported that the House Education Committee past four bills related to charter school reform – HB 356, Facilities Regulations; HB 357, Application and Charter Process; HB 355, Ethics Requirements for Charter Trustees and Administrators; and HB 358, Dual Enrollment for Charter Schools. PSBA opposes bills 356 and 357, supports bill 355, and does not oppose bill 358 but has concerns.

<u>SHASDA</u> – Mr. Cooper reported that the annual SHASDA breakfast to honor students who overcame adversities was held on April 27. Mt. Lebanon High School students Charles Meriman and Madeline Kelly were recognized at the breakfast.

Mt. Lebanon Foundation for Education – Dr. Diamond reported that the Taste of Lebo was held on April 27, with \$5,000 raised to support grants for teacher projects. Restaurants offered appetizers for participants and there were student performances at Clearview Commons. Totopo was the fan favorite at the event. MLFE received four grant applications for the fall of 2019 and two grants were awarded. Dr. Diamond reminded everyone that stadium blankets are still available and will make a lovely graduation gift.

<u>Community/District Task Force on Safety, Security & Mental Well-Being</u> - Dr. Strotmeyer reported that the final meeting of the Task Force was held on May 8. Dr. Steinhauer reviewed the purpose of the task force to consider the best ways to keep Mt. Lebanon students and staff safe.

An update on safety infrastructure and the school safety and security assessment criteria was reviewed. Dr. Irvin spoke on the \$476,000 PCCD Competitive Grant Award Mt. Lebanon revived, and the student assistance program.
