Message from the Board Chair

The Board of Trustees, the Special Representative of the SG for UNIS (SRSG) and I have been working to improve our communication with the UNIS Honorary Trustees and to strengthen the ties between them and UNIS.

The UNIS Honorary Trustees are Permanent Representatives/Ambassadors to the United Nations who meet one or more of the criteria – that is, an Ambassador with a child or children in school, have more than ten of its citizens enrolled in the school, or provide language sponsorship/or financial contribution to UNIS.

Ambassador Marie Chatardova, Permanent Representative of the Czech Republic to the United Nations and Honorary Trustee, hosted a dinner with the SRSG and myself to introduce Dr. Dan Brenner to the UNIS Honorary Trustees. It was a lovely evening with warm hospitality and a wonderful musical performance by UNIS students.

Ambassador Burhan Gafoor, Permanent Representative of Singapore and Board Trustee, held a reception for members of the Board, the UNIS Senior School Leadership and Honorary Trustees, which gave everyone the opportunity to interact, relax and discuss UNIS.

At the UNIS Model UN Conference, Ambassador Geraldine Patricia Byrne Nason, Permanent Representative of Ireland and Honorary Trustee, gave the opening remarks and took questions from the student delegates who came from schools all over the tri-state area.

The Portuguese Ambassador Mr. Francisco Duarte Lopes and Brazilian Ambassador Mr. Maura Vieira and Honorary Trustees signed a Protocol of Cooperation with UNIS to sponsor Portuguese as a language in the after school programme.

Together we organized for Dr. Dan Brenner to meet the Secretary-General. Dr. Brenner had the opportunity to introduce himself to the SG, tell him a little about UNIS and his ideas and invite the SG to visit UNIS. As you can see there is much going on as we reinforce our relationship with the UN!

Track Program Builds Culture of Excellence

The Track and Field and Cross Country Programs at UNIS are alive and well. The program, thanks in part to a highly dedicated and talented staff, is producing high-caliber athletes who go on to compete at all divisions of universities and colleges from around the world. UNIS has recently produced athletes who have qualified and competed at the New York State Association of Independent Schools Indoor and Outdoor Championships, and who have gone on to represent New York City at New York State Championships.

Human Rights Conference January 10 & 11



The 21st Annual Student Human Rights Conference focused on the theme of "Defending Women's Rights: Gender Justice." Keynote speaker Marta Martinez-Martinez from UNHCR shared her documentary and experience with Gender Injustice in Uganda.

Day two at the UN, Camelyn Malalis, NYC Commissioner for Human Rights, challenged the students to suggest solutions for both local and global governments. Students continued the discussion with panelists Amol Pandit of FeMENists, Janai Smith, a youth advocate, and Nazeefa Hossein from Womankind.

UNISMUNC V had its fifth annual Model United Nations Conference hosted at UNIS, with keynote speaker H.E. Geraldine Byrne Nason, Permanent Representative of Ireland to the UN.

Since last April, the student executive committee and the USG of Committees, Femke Teunissen (T4), worked tirelessly to organize a smooth conference. UNISMUNC V was an important milestone for the club as it was the largest conference hosted to date with over 400 attendees from 26 schools all over the East Coast. In attendance were Director Dr. Dan Brenner, Under Secretary-General and UNIS Board Chair Catherine Pollard and Special Representative to the Secretary-General Joan McDonald. Delegates participated in eight committees discussing topics from Peacekeeping in Ukraine to Sexual and Reproductive Rights. This year they also hosted a Joint Crisis Conference on the Second Punic War between Rome and Carthage.
