
Sophomore English Summer Reading 2019

We Were


Liars by E. Lockhart

them have one chilling thing in common...


The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas

Obtaining the books:

We strongly suggest you purchase your own copy of the book so that you can annotate and highlight. However, if you are unable to do so, there are a limited number of copies in the Wigwam that you can obtain before the end of the school year. There should also be multiple copies at the public library, though they will be much more limited in availability. **Students should bring copies of these books on the first day of school.**

Assignment:

Reading becomes a genuinely fun activity when the reader connects with the text personally. Therefore, as you read, ask yourself questions, make personal connections, and form your own opinions and judgments on the characters, the plot, the author's purpose, and on whatever else YOU find engaging and interesting.

<u>During the first weeks of school, teachers will be conducting lessons based on these books, so it is imperative that each student comes prepared having read the selected book and having considered the following questions:</u>

- 1. How did any of the characters or events remind you of yourself? Why?
- **2.** If you could give the main character in your book some advice, what would you tell him or her? Why? How do you think they would respond to your advice?
- **3.** If you were in the story, what would your relationship be to the main character? Would you be friends? Enemies? Something else? Why?
- **4.** If you could ask the main character of this book three questions, what would you ask? Why do you want to know the answers to these questions?
- **5.** What is the main conflict that the main character in your book faces? How does the character change or grow as a result of this conflict?
- **6.** What are some important relationships in your book? Why are they important?
- **7.** What do you think the author is trying to say about people? Are they mostly good? Mostly evil? Selfish? Selfless? Something else? Why?
- **8.** What topic or big idea would you say this book is about? What do you think the author is trying to say about that topic?
- **9.** Choose a character that is interesting to you. Do you think that character makes good or bad decisions in this book? Why?
- **10.** How would the story change from another character's point-of-view? Why?
