At a time for remembrance we might ask ourselves what it means to forgive. What does the act of forgiveness entail and what does it demand both of those who forgive, and more importantly, those who are forgiven. Can some acts never be forgiven?

The purpose of forgiveness is, on the face of it, simple – to stop an endless and destructive cycle of vengeance and bitterness. The essence is that in my forgiveness I will not do to you as you have done to me. Hegel called forgiveness the "cancellation of fate".

Forgiveness avoids the tit-for-tat expressions of justice; it can provide, in modern parlance "closure" for both parties.

In the New Testament the crime and the forgiveness are contained in one deed - the crucifixion is both the unjust act of killing as well as the means of forgiveness itself; the sins of world are all focused on the cross where they are to be forgiven. It is, on any account, brutal and hard.

And in our everyday lives forgiveness is hard; even as an idea it is not easy to understand. Forgiveness is not to forget; nor does one behave as though one has forgotten. As human beings, to forgive and forget is an impossible ask. One might forgive, say, a bully for her actions, but it is unlikely that one will be able to forget what was done. Likewise for the actions on the battlefield.

To forgive requires one to engage with the past, to confront the deed and the offender. Forgiveness is not about refusing to pass moral judgement; it is not a pass on the part of the offender to avoid restitution. Forgiveness has been called a "gift to the undeserving". It is based on agreement that past actions are wrong and that a reconciliation between the wrong-doer and the wronged has taken place.

Forgiveness is also unconditional; it does not require a demonstration of remorse, although this certainly makes the act of forgiveness easier.

To forgive does not mean that one feels friendship to the offender. But it is difficult nonetheless. To behave towards your offender with kindness, attending to their welfare and safety, to do them good rather than harm and not feeling bitter or angry is undoubtedly tough.

But from forgiveness we are made into better individuals and from its gesture we can grow. Forgiveness is an act of adulthood and maturity - it is a deed that sees beyond. It provides relief from suffering and at a time of remembrance it is, perhaps, the most important act of all.


Welcome barista!

Each year Sixth Form students write, direct and produce plays to be performed by Year 8 students to compete for the Hawkins's Cup.

The theme for the plays this year was 'From another point of view'. The students were asked to take this title as inspiration for their plays and interpret it as they wished.

We were delighted to welcome back Mrs Alice Meechan and Mrs Judy Wiggett, both former teachers of Maths at Sir William Perkins's. Not only did their many years of experience at SWPS prove invaluable to their adjudications, but also, being Maths experts, they really did judge the Drama 'From another point of view'.



Particular highlights for the judges included 8L's use of transitions between scenes with the use of the 'magic door' that appeared and reappeared to transport the characters through different eras of time, forcing them to view what they had in the year 2018 differently.

They also commented on 8P's open appreciation of Maths throughout their piece, but more importantly the concept of how life has improved for women over the last 30 years.

Book of the Week


This week's BotW is 'Incognito' by David Eagleman, selected by Mrs Vidgen.
