The start of January always feels that it is dominated by one over-arching activity: examinations. GCSE trial examinations, A level Trial Examinations and our own Entrance Examinations. Both the oldest and the youngest have been writing answers, testing their skills and pushing their brains to the best of their ability.

Of course, exams are a standard feature of all our lives and the idea of testing our young people, through competitive examination, is part of our

In Britain the concept of a written examination first appeared in 1792, when a Cambridge Chemistry professor decided that, in place of the verbal examination in Latin, it would be much more efficient to get students to write down what they had learnt and what they knew. Once the exam was completed someone would mark them. Instead of one examiner testing one candidate, the written exam enabled one examiner to test hundreds. The written examination was born out of the Industrial Revolution.

In terms of the first country to hold a written examination, that honour belongs to China: the Chinese Civil Service Exam was held almost 2000 years ago. Candidates for that examination would be required to be in isolation for 72 hours. They had to live in a cell for three days. Names on the top of the examinations were not allowed; instead they wrote a code number and, to prevent the marker from identifying the candidate, the entire script was re-written by a third party before being marked.



So now the Trial Examinations are over and the papers returned and discussed, what tips are there to ensure that one can improve? There will be specific areas for individual development but there is one key lesson for all: providing oneself enough time to study; leaving things for the last minute is never a good idea.

Our student ambassadors did us proud, welcoming our visitors, looking after them during the morning and in particular during their break, and gave an excellent example of the SWPS kindness for which we are known. Polymer Moulding


Today the lower sixth took a hands on approach to learning about polymers. They experimented using silicone moulds to pour and embed items into clear casting resin and then reused shredded milk bottles and scrap polypropylene from the department to make their own recycled sheet material using the newly purchased heat press showing in a low tech way how plastics are recycled into new products in a practical way.
