I have often written that our young people live in a world barely comprehended by their parents: it is a fast, demanding and ever present factor in their day. The pull of social media is difficult to resist, especially for teenagers and some can find it hard to maintain social relationships outside the orbit of the digital universe.

The dangers of the social media world have been widely stated. Television documentaries, radio programmes and hundreds of newspaper articles regularly and rightly examine this topic. Although it would appear that there is little, as yet, hard scientific evidence to demonstrate that over exposure to social sites are intrinsically bad for one's health, we all instinctively feel that hours spent on the computer, surfing the world wide web or social media, can be detrimental.

What we do know is that digital social media normalises impulses – something is thought and then posted. The consequent rate of change in terms of social norms is bewildering. For those of us who remember a time before Facebook, consider the following: imaging walking around your school with a picture of you or something that you were doing, and asking people, possibly even strangers, to like you.

Any enterprise whose sole purpose is to maximise the number of hits, clicks and images seen, even images of a self-destructive nature, will, far too often, turn a blind eye to the consequences.

So Safer Internet Day will enable us to focus on techniques, strategies and skills for our students to navigate the internet safely, to protect their personal data and, enjoy a hugely valuable resource of information.

## Classical Civilization Conference on Aristophanes' Frogs at Warwick University

Last Friday all those studying Classical Civilization in the Sixth Form attended a conference at Warwick University on one of their set plays, Aristophanes' comedy Frogs.

Following an introduction and an excellent talk by Professor Michael Scott in which the play was set in a historical context, the students attended a university-style seminar on the opening of the play and the expectations it sets up for the play as a whole.

After lunch there was a further excellent lecture by Professor C W Marshall from the University of British Columbia, in which the literary context of the play was explored more fully. Well done to Ella Hatherall and Hannah Burrows who had the confidence to ask the speakers some excellent questions.

A performance of the comedy by the students of the Classics department concluded the day. There was an impressive set and some fine performances which enabled the students to see how the play can be lifted from the page to the stage.



## Engineering Education Scheme

Five L6th students embarked on an Engineering Education Scheme project last term set for them by BP.

They spent two days over the Christmas holidays at a residential workshop at UCL working on their design solution to testing how the amount of sand pumped up from oil deposits can be detected.

They are now working on a test rig to try out their sensor before presenting their work to a panel of senior engineers at BP in April.

## Year 12 and 13 A level German Study Day

Last Thursday (24th January) the Year 12 and 13 A level German students visited an A level revision day at St George's College, where the University of King's College London brought along several of their staff to run a series of lectures covering some of the key topics studied in the German A level curriculum.

Many schools from the local area (and some from London) were there as well, meaning we could meet other students studying German and get an insight into their different opinions and ideas about key concepts and issues within German society.

The day was extremely useful, as we were able to take notes on some of the key aspects of German culture such as typical German traditions and holidays and the significant events regarding the communist state of the GDR and the effects of the fall of the Berlin Wall on German society. We were also able to break out into smaller groups to discuss the film and literary works we are studying and share ideas about the main ideas and themes in them. To finish with, we participated in a talk about the importance of translation in society and everyday life and how the meaning of a sentence can be completely altered by just a few words: encouraging us to be extra careful in our own translations!

Overall, the day was assuredly useful and really helped us with revising the key topics within the German A level syllabus.

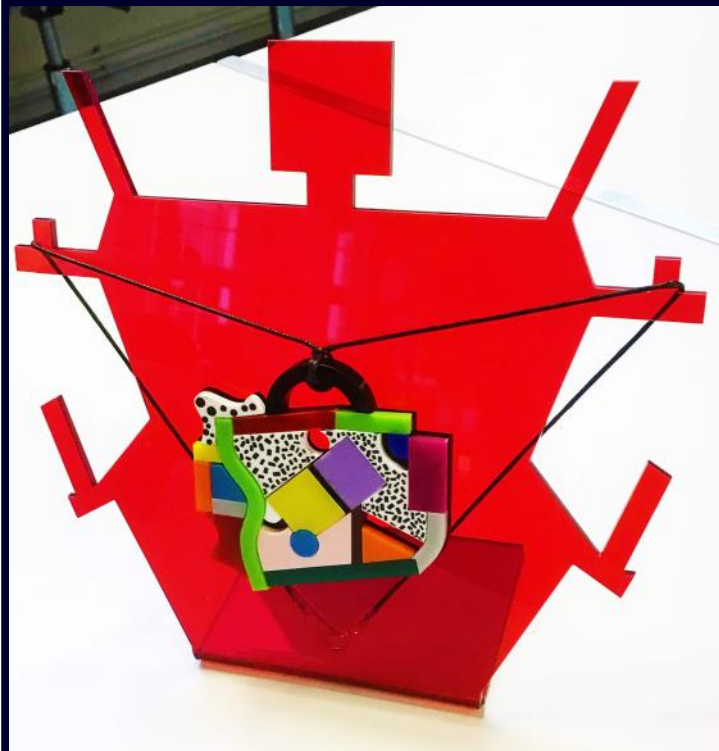

### Book of the Week

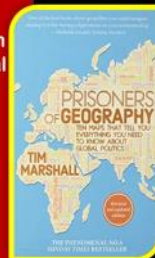
This week's BotW is 'Prisoner of Geography' by Tim Marshall, selected by Mrs Vidgen.

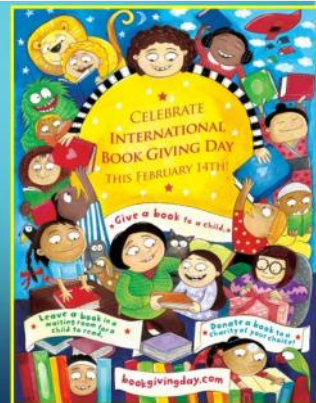
