As many of you will have read, the use of social media and the Internet are, justifiably, a "hot" topic in education. On the back of Safer Internet Day, schools and ministers are rightly thinking hard about what the potential consequences for students can be in terms of their online lives.

The widespread comments and concern arise from the fact that every student today will have their life documented in digital form. Good conduct and success will undoubtedly be posted online for friends and family to share and enjoy. But when poor or embarrassing conduct is revealed to the world it can be both harmful and upsetting.

Captured by the ubiquitous camera and fanned out through digital communication, indiscretion may become an albatross that an individual can never escape. Instantaneous global dissemination is part of the tremendous power of the internet and it is a power with potentially appalling consequences, magnifying a problem beyond measure. The digital world extends the private sphere both in space and time. For our young people today, the past may haunt them in a way inconceivable to previous generations.

Education will help: understanding the ramifications that might prevent an individual from indulging in a practice that leads to public humiliation or embarrassment, and as a result cause serious unhappiness and distress, is essential.

Our students, the internet generation, are living their lives as if in a fishbowl. Decisions that they make in terms of what they post on the internet require a consideration of their reputation, their future employers, and even their future partners. All this to ask from a teenager!

So how might a young person respond? They might be tempted to adopt one of two strategies: excessive caution or recklessness. Excessive caution may limit their choices now, whilst recklessness may limit choices for the future. Either way, education is key to a middle path where we can support, guide and help our students to navigate the digital world with safety and with confidence.



We talk to our students about what they write online and to whom they write. We make them aware that the power of the image is something which must always be taken into account and the risks of manipulation and sharing without consent.

Youthful experiment, taking risks, rebelling against the established order, are often central acts of growing up, of becoming independent and of developing into a well-adjusted adult. Yet life in the digital fish bowl is difficult to navigate, and our role at SWPS, as teachers and adults, is to provide them with a measure of skills to cope with integrity and with confidence.

Sixth Form Physics Trip to JET

Sixth Form physicists enjoyed a fascinating visit to the Culham Centre for Fusion Energy on Tuesday. This included a guided tour of the JET (Joint European Torus) facility which has been conducting fusion research for a number of years.

Students were able to see inside the full scale model torus (a doughnut shaped ring) in which scientists can trial using a robotic arm for maintenance and upgrades to the actual torus, as well as looking around the complex control centre and hearing about the planned next generations of fusion power plant which aim to make this non-polluting source of energy a reality.
